## UNION OF N. B. MUNICIPALITIES

Text of Motions on Taxation, Property Qualification, Notice of Legislation and Term of County Councillors—List of Delegates, Etc.

On the last day of the sixth Convention of the Union of N. B. Municipalities, at Newcastle—Oct. 12th, 1911—Alderman H. H. Stuart of Newcastle read a paper on Municipal Taxation, after which he moved, seconded by Ald. T. W. Butler of Newcastle and Ald. F. L. Potts of St. John, the following resolution:

"That this Union of New Brunswick Municipalities assembled in convention in the town of Newcastle request the Legislature to pass, in the next session, a bill providing that any County, City or Town in the Province of New Brunswick shall, upon a majority vote of its qualified ratepayers or voting, have the power to reduce or abolish within its jurisdiction:

"Taxes on polls, improvements, personal property, and income, or any one or more of these, and raise its revenue by means of a land tax with or without a poll tax and with or without a system of business licenses."

Ald. Stuart's paper and resolution were both warmly supported by Ald. Potts and Ald. Butler, and in the afternoon, by Ald. F. W. Wallace of Sussex and others.

Ald. Potts said the paper was one of the ablest he had ever heard. He would strengthen Ald. Stuart's arguments, which he did in an earnest and powerful address, for change in the system of taxation as indicated in the paper—the abolition of taxes on improvements, personal property and income and the reduction or abolition of the poll tax and the raising of municipal revenue by taxes on land values only.

Ald. Butler said that the tax problem was the great problem confronting our people. He endorsed Ald. Stuart's paper in toto, but something had been overlooked. That was the double-tax, now charged by the present system, in cases where one borrowed money to build a home. The borrower was taxed on his building, and so was the lender, while if the lender had kept his money in a bank it would have escaped taxation. The present system of taxation was a penalty upon improvements. Every improvement brought extra taxes. We might work this matter out in our Municipal Councils if in conclusion, would allow us to do so. In concluding a specially able argument in behalf of the rights of the people, Ald. Butler said that never a millionaire died who had more than enough to put some mud over his coffin and never a pauper had had enough to put the same quantity of mud over his. He thoroughly agreed with Ald. Stuart that we should get from the Legislature the right for municipalities to say for themselves how they shall tax themselves. If any municipality goes astray the combination of them will set it right.

Ald. Wallace agreed with the paper. Sussex was sdbound. Land which was held for high price in Sussex was paying only the same taxes as ordinary farm land.

Councillor Siddall of Port Elgin, Town Clerk Reid of Campbellton and others spoke in favor of the resolution, which was also supported by Mayor Pelletier of Moncton, who said that he had a mandate from Moncton Trades and Labor Council in its favor.

Secretary Taylor of Westmorland, Ald. Anderson of Sackville, Ald. Chatham of Chatham, and Secretary of York Co. thought that the present system of municipal taxation could be made to work all right if the proper officers were appointed to enforce it.

The vote being taken the resolution was adopted by a large majority. The second resolution, on that had been presented by Ald. Stuart and Potts to the Executive the night before, asking the Legislature for an act to empower any County, City or town, upon a majority vote of its ratepayers or a two-thirds vote of council, to reduce or abolish within its jurisdiction income and property taxes, or either of them, for improvements and candidates for the offices of County Councillor, Alderman and Mayor, had been approved by the Executive and, upon a vote of the Executive being taken, was not referred for discussion.

The following resolution, moved by Ald. Kelly and seconded by Ald. Potts, was carried unanimously:

Resolved that this Union of N. B. Municipalities in annual convention do hereby strongly recommend to the provincial government the necessity of amending its rules and regulations relating to the introduction of bills to the Legislature as shall make it compulsory upon all applicants for a license to seek the right to use and control any public right, utility or power, to file with the secretary of the Union a copy of the proposed bill at least ten days before its introduction into the House, and that the standing rules committee shall insist upon proof that a copy of such bill has been so filed before any such bill be introduced, and further resolved that the above be in addition to any notice of legislation now required.

The following, moved by Councillor Cochrane, seconded by Councillor Donovan, was, on division, adopted:

Resolved that the government of N. B. be requested to amend Chapter 13 of the Consolidated Statutes of N. B., 1908, relating to municipalities and the special acts in amendment

thereof, providing for the election of councillors for parishes in the various counties the same day throughout the province and that the term of councillors be three years."

St. Stephen was chosen as the place for the next convention, the Union accepting the kind invitation of Coun. Polley, Ald. Hutz, and others from that county.

The election of officers resulted as follows:—Coun. Siddall, president; Coun. Polley, vice-president; Town Clerk McCready, Hon. Sec'y-treasurer.

The executive will comprise the retiring president, Mayor and Town Council of Newcastle, Secretary McCready and the press.

Ald. Stuart's paper was on motion of Aldermen F. W. Wallace and J. R. Polley, ordered to be entered in the minutes. In the absence of Secretary McCready on Thursday, F. St. J. Bliss efficiently filled the duties of that office. Everything passed off pleasantly and the Union concluded one of its most profitable sessions with a supper on Thursday evening tendered by the town.

N. B. Territorial Revenue Will This Year Exceed \$500,000.

**CALIFORNIA TO EXPERIMENT**

Adopts Initiative and Referendum, The Recall and Woman Suffrage.

San Francisco, Oct. 12.—Woman suffrage has triumphed in California. Returns last today wiped out the majority previously recorded against the amendment, and since this turn the margin in favor of the amendment has increased steadily. For suffrage, 119,086; against, 117,408. Majority for the amendment, 1,678.

These figures represent the returns from 2,717 precincts, out of a total of 3,121 in the State. Virtually all of the remaining precincts are in counties which have given suffrage majorities. So overwhelming was the vote in favor of the more important amendment, the initiative and referendum, and the recall, including the judiciary—that tabulation of the returns was suspended with nearly a third of the precincts remaining unreported. The final count taken showed the following results:

For the initiative and referendum, 188,777; against, 44,850. For the recall, 155,572; against, 46,280.

THE CAMPBELLTON FIRE

Most readers would probably notice that the Provincial Auditor General, Mr. W. A. Loudon, has made what is probably a fine audit of the financial affairs of a Campbellton in connection with the late fire. The total relief sent into the town and which passed into the hands of the Public Committee amounted to \$193,440.62. Of this amount, the grant of \$70,000 made by the Dominion Government in aid of the burned town was wisely applied to the purpose of protecting the bonds and preserving the public credit, a stroke of good management, and after itemized expenditures on building account, grants in cash, and in various other ways, the sum of \$9,243.85 was transferred to the town special poor fund. Campbellton came out of the great disaster in much better form than at one time appeared possible. Its loss, as estimated by the insurance companies, was \$2,500,000. It received \$1,400,000 insurance, the \$193,000 above stated, and some smaller grants which were not included in the general statement. The loss was relatively heavy, but the conditions enabled the work of reconstruction to go on speedily; and to this the late government contribution through its railroad and other departments so that the work of restoration went on effectively, and all who wanted work got it promptly. The citizens, too, showed nerve and energy. Fires are not to be approved, but the new Campbellton is better than the old one, comfortable as the old one was. A good deal is due to the good management of the local committee and authority—St. John Globe.

## A CHINESE REPUBLIC IS PROCLAIMED

**Serious Uprising In Central China Against The Manchu Dynasty Aims to Make Dr. Sun Yat Sen President**

Hankow Province of Hu-Peh, China, Oct. 12—The revolution which has been hanging over China for months past, and of which the rising in the province of Sze-Chuen was only a small part, has begun in earnest. It is a concerted movement to take the Empire and declare a republic. The noted exiled revolutionist, Dr. Sun Yat Sen, leader of the party opposed to the Manchu dynasty, if the plans do not miscarry, is to be elected President of the New Republic.

He was the delegate of the revolutionary party to the United States in 1910, and it is believed during that tour to have made arrangements for the financing of the movement. The whole Assembly has seceded from the Imperial Government. The rebels are well organized and financially strong. They have confiscated the local treasuries and banks, and are issuing their own paper money, redeeming the Government notes with this, as the foreign banks are refusing Government notes.

The revolutionaries have captured Wu-Chang, the native section of Hankow and Han-Yang, all adjoining cities in Hu-Peh Province. Chang Sha, capital of Hunan, is reported to have risen in revolt and Nanjing, capital of the Province of Kiang-Su, is on the verge of a rising, several public buildings have been destroyed.

Thousands of soldiers have joined the mutiny in Hu-Peh. Many Manchus have been killed and the terrified people are fleeing from cities into the country, carrying their belongings. The prisons have been opened and the criminals liberated.

There has been fighting in the streets, but the most stringent orders have been issued that the lives of foreigners and their property shall be respected.

London, Oct. 14—A special despatch received here from Shanghai says: "A republic has been proclaimed at Wu Chang. A strong force of rebels has left Hankow with the object of engaging the imperial troops coming from the north, and a big battle is expected within a few days."

Chicago, Oct. 14—Dr. Sun Yat Sen, who is favored by the Chinese revolutionists for president of the republic they hope to establish, is in Chicago. He arrived here early this morning. He was found late to-night at the headquarters of the Young China Society, where he had gone to attend a secret meeting to aid in raising funds for the revolution.

"I cannot discuss my plans or tell anything of my movements since I came to Chicago," he said. Perhaps I can give out some information in two or three days."

London, Oct. 14—Altogether the outlook for the throne is extremely ominous. Except for the Manchus, whose numbers are insignificant, the loyalty of the army even in Peking and Tientsin is doubtful, and especially when they hear of the revolutionists' successes.

**HOME RULE BILL DRAFTED**  
A late despatch from Dublin says a rough draft of the home rule bill has been prepared for submission to the cabinet. It provides for a grant of \$50,000,000 to start the new parliament. The nationalists asked for \$75,000,000.

**212,854 NEW SETTLERS**  
During the first five months of the fiscal year immigrants arrived in Canada to the number of 212,854, an increase of 18 per cent. as compared with the same period last year. Of the arrivals 141,021 came via ocean ports and 71,833 from the United States. Last year during the same period the United States arrivals numbered 65,189 and these via ocean ports, 115,189.

## DUKE OF CONNAUGHT ROYALLY WELCOMED

Quebec, Oct. 14.—Quebec was ablaze with electric lights last night, and as the Duke of Connaught drove through the principal streets on his way to the railway station to take train for Ottawa, the Duke and Duchess were greeted by the greatest enthusiasm. Not since the tercentenary celebration has there been such a display, all the public buildings being aglow with lights. As Their Royal Highnesses passed down to the station, there were display of fireworks and crowds of people assembled all along the route to give the vice regal party a greeting. Hearty cheers rang out as the carriage containing Their Highnesses passed by.

The luncheon at the Chateau Frontenac in the afternoon was a brilliant affair. The dominion cabinet were all in attendance. This function was followed by a state dinner at Spencerwood and there was afterwards a reception at Spencerwood. All these functions were most brilliant affairs and attended by prominent people of the dominion.

His Royal Highness left for Ottawa last night by special train. The train was a magnificent one, being all new cars just turned out from the Angus shops, and bearing the monogram of the duke. Highnesses, the Duke and Duchess of Connaught, arrived in Ottawa Ottawa, Oct. 14.—Their Royal this afternoon and were accorded a patriotic welcome in which practically the whole city participated.

Thousands lined the profusely decorated streets. It is estimated over 50,000 people participated in the welcome. From the time the palatial special train pulled into the Union Station until Their Royal Highnesses were escorted to government house, the streets were packed. A crowd, estimated all the way from 20,000 to 30,000 jammed the spacious lawns in front of the Houses of Parliament. Besides the civic address of welcome, which was read by His Worship Mayor Hopewell, several were presented to His Royal Highness from national and fraternal societies in Ottawa.

## FOUR GRAND PRIX FOR C T R

In connection with the Grand Trunk Exhibit at the Festival of Empire Crystal Palace, London, England, further advices dated September 12th, have been received from London regarding the awards that were given to the Grand Trunk, and the Grand Trunk Pacific, and it is gratifying to know that these Companies have received four "Grand Prix" for their splendid display instead of the two that were announced in the cable received on September 1st.

These awards have been under the following—'Arts and Crafts', 'Engineering, Lighting, and Transportation', and 'Building Trades'; also 'Advertising'. This is considered by the Companies named as a great honour, as other railways exhibiting at the Exhibition have only received one award.

The official report from the Grand Trunk representative at this Exhibition, for week ending September 8th, shows that the number of persons visiting the Grand Trunk Pavilion was 21,185, bringing the attendance up to September 8th, to 279,042 people.

Effective on Monday, September 18th, the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway inaugurated a mixed train service to be operated on the Regina Branch between Melville and Regina. This train will run Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, leaving Melville at 10.35 a.m. and arriving at Regina at 7.35 p.m. Leaving Regina Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays at 7 a.m., arriving at Melville at 4 p.m. and will make stops at the intermediate stations.

## ALGONQUIN NATIONAL PARK

The high altitude of Ontario is one of the attractions and has much to do with the benefit derived from a visit to it. The elevation above sea level at Algonquin Park Station the objective point on the railway, is 1700 ft. There is tonic quality to the air which must be experienced to be understood. The Northumberland County court was to have resumed on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock but the fog in the river made an early trip of the boat to Newcastle an impossibility and many of those interested could not arrive on time. Consequently, His Honor Judge McLatchey, adjourned the setting until 2 p.m.

At Thursday's morning session His Honor pronounced judgment on Andrew Murdoch. The prisoner asked leniency on the ground that his health was greatly impaired. He was sentenced to three years in Dorchester penitentiary. Murdoch was represented by R. A. Murray, K. C.

John Handley and John O'Kane who pleaded guilty to breaking into W. F. Cassidy's establishment at Chatham, were next brought into court. His Honor, after acquainting the prisoners of the seriousness of the offence, informed them that he was going to give them an opportunity to do better. He allowed both defendants out on suspended sentence on condition of their good behaviour for one year. He required both men to give security of \$1000 each, \$500 on their own behalf and two sureties each of \$250.

The jury brought in a verdict of theft of a basket of grapes against John Cripps. Mr. A. A. Davidson prosecuted and Mr. R. A. Lawlor defended. The accused was allowed out on suspended sentence. Sureties of \$1000 were given.
