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RETURNING OFFICERS ARE NAMED

Meeting of Town Council Tuesday Evening Attends to Election Matters

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the Clerk's office Tuesday, His Worship Mayor Murray presiding. There were present: Councilors, Ingram, Dickie, Matthews and Blissett.

Minutes of previous meeting were read and approved.

His Worship read a letter from Manager Brady of C. N. R. re the C.N.R. lot lately owned by the I.N.R. asking for a certified copy of the agreement between the Town Council and the late Thomas Malcolm.

Coun. Matthews moved that G. E. Asker be returning officer for Ward I; A. G. Adams for Ward II and Thos. J. McDevitt for Ward III. These returning officers were authorized to appoint their own roll clerks and constables.

The Town Clerk explained that as the Council could not vacate the present town offices at the date specified, March 31st, of which notice had been given Mrs. Murray, he had consulted with the Town solicitor and a new notice had been sent here. This would mean that the Town would have to pay rent for the Murray building until July 15th, although the Town offices would be removed by May 15th.

Coun. Matthews moved that the action of the Town Clerk be ratified by the Council.—Carried.

The Council then adjourned.

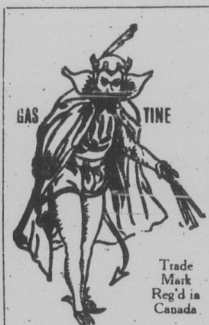

CANADA'S REVENUE.

Large Income Needed to Meet Our Mighty Expenditures.

Canada's revenue from all sources during the month of January reached a total of \$34,266,188, and was more than sufficient to meet the ordinary expenditures of the country, including those on interest and pensions during the month. The January statement issued by the Finance Department, moreover, indicates that revenue during the ten months of the fiscal year which have now elapsed were well up to expectations. During the period the revenue from all sources aggregated \$288,230,911, as compared with ordinary expenditures of \$271,352,190. There was thus a surplus of revenue over ordinary or consolidated fund expenditure in the period of \$16,878,721. Should the average of receipts be maintained during February and March the revenue for this fiscal year will attain a total of approximately \$345,000,000.

Details of the revenue for January are as follows:

Customs, \$16,131,304; excise, \$5,063,547; post office, \$1,700,000; public works, including railways and public works, \$35,842,428 on including excess profits and income taxes, \$85,575,983.

Capital expenditures during the ten months aggregated \$34,599,182, made up of \$288,815,088 expended on war account, and \$35,842,428 on public works. In January war expenditures reached \$9,105,804, and public works expenditures \$3,973,829. Capital expenditures for January this reached \$62,179,734, and about equalled the increase in the public debt for the month of \$62,015,108.

The expenditure on war account during the month was heavy by reason of closing up and adjustment of overseas accounts. The funded debt at the end of the month stood at \$2,447,542,908; the gross debt at \$2,222,087,801; net debt, \$1,900,146,168.

The Standing of the Parties.

Strange things happen in politics. The farmers and laborers of Ontario have climbed to power by means of an election system which they are opposed to, and yet if the system which they advocate were put into representation—had been in force, they would probably be numbered with his majesty's loyal opposition at the present time, or at the best be a minor group in a provincial government. A summary of Ontario election results as follows, the first column representing candidates elected and the second votes polled:

Liberals	29	336,715
Conservatives	25	386,796
Farmers	45	258,874
Laborites	12	127,036
Independents	4	46,086
Totals	111	1,153,567

From the above it will be seen that the average number of votes polled per candidate was 10,483. If the proportional representation method of elections had been in force the result of the election would have been approximately as follows: the first column representing candidates elected and the second votes polled:

Liberals	32	336,715
Conservatives	37	386,796
Farmers	25	258,874
Laborites	12	127,036
Independents	4	46,086
Totals	111	1,153,567

In other words the respective groups would vary in size according to the strength of the voting power which supported them. The Ontario elections show clearly the necessity for a change in our election machinery if representative government is to be an actual fact. A system which permits a political group with 286,786 supporters to secure only 25 seats as compared with 45 seats obtained by another group with only 127,036 supporters, is not in keeping with modern sentiment.

Advancing the illustration one step more would see that Ontario is being governed by a cabinet whose supporters represent approximately one-third of the electors. This is minority rule with a vengeance—Canadian Finance.

Canada's Helium Gas.
Helium gas rising out of the ground in Alberta and other parts of Western Canada, and now used, in some localities of that country, to do the family cooking, may one time be carrying Britain's lighter-than-air flying machines in all parts of the world. It has been stated that there is enough of this gas, which makes a satisfactory substitute for the highly inflammable hydrogen commonly used for airships, to supply the entire British Empire for many years. The wells in Western Canada are the only sources of the gas in the Empire. Its weight-supporting ability is 90 per cent. that of hydrogen. Aviation is occupying a good deal of attention in Canada, and this natural supply of the filler for gas bags of dirigibles promises to advance interest in air navigation.

Diameter of Pine Tree.
Mr. Hill, lockmaster at Buckhorn, Ont., experimented with a pine tree to determine improved growth which may be secured by proper care. Fifteen years ago, he pruned all the lower branches off a 4-inch, 2000 pine sapling, removing other saplings from its vicinity, dug up the earth around it and applied manure to its base. It is now 19 inches in diameter at its base and has a long, clean pole. Thus, during the fifteen years, the growth in diameter has averaged one inch annually.—Conservation.

Searching Autos.
Canadian automobileists crossing to the United States at Detroit are complaining that federal authorities have been "unreasonable" in inspecting their machines. It has been announced that the reason for the action of the custom officials was a discovery that considerable liquor was being smuggled into the United States in automobile radiators.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Under Sub-Section 2 of Section 70 of the Highway Act, 1915,

No Motor Vehicle

is allowed on any highway of the Province in the Spring of the year while the frost is coming out of the ground, without permission of the Supervisor, with the exception of Erysicians, Clergymen and Ambulance Drivers. Sub-section 1 of the same section of the Act forbids the carrying of loads over 3000 pounds and the hauling of portable mills on wheels between the Fifteenth Day of March and the Fifteenth Day of May, in any year, without a written permit from the Supervisor of Roads. This notice will remain in force until the Supervisor is satisfied that the road is fit for motor traffic, as applied to sub-section 2, and until arrangement be made with the Supervisor in compliance with the Act, as applied to sub-section 1.

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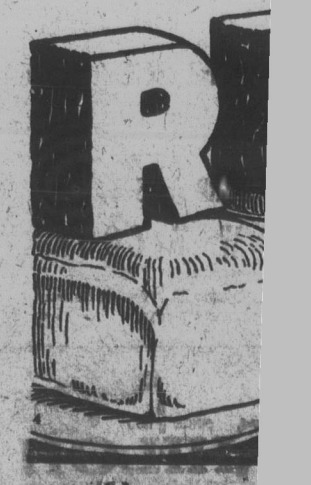

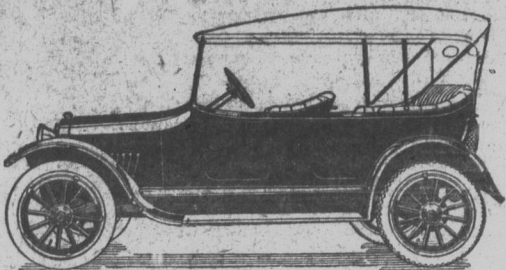

SAYS REPORTS ARE EXAGGERATED

Quebec Oriental Railway Despite Severe Weather Conditions Kept On All Winter.

Editor, Campbellton Graphic.

As a subscriber, I am a small space in your esteemed paper regarding the railway which runs on the Gaspé Coast. I have been the past several years on the Quebec Oriental & Atlantic Railway & N. 1st.—We require better Railway Service, and Transportation facilities. 2nd.—We strongly recommend that the Atlantic Quebec & Western, and the Quebec Oriental railways become a part and parcel of the Canadian National Railway system of Canada, the road preventing these railways from being used by private corporations, which would be absolutely detrimental to the interests of this Coast.

3rd.—Bonaventure and Gaspé Counties have about 85,000 square miles of Crown lands in stony regions adjacent to these railways and about 300,000 acres of cultivated land, and the vast fishing industries, tanning, etc., therefore we must have adequate Railway facilities.

Canada's Revenue

Large Income Needed to Meet Our Mighty Expenditures.

Canada's revenue from all sources during the month of January reached a total of \$34,266,188, and was more than sufficient to meet the ordinary expenditures of the country, including those on interest and pensions during the month. The January statement issued by the Finance Department, moreover, indicates that revenue during the ten months of the fiscal year which have been elapsed were well up to expectations. During the period receipts from all sources aggregated \$288,250,911, as compared with ordinary expenditures of \$271,252,190; there was thus a surplus of revenue over ordinary or consolidated fund expenditures in the period of \$16,998,721. Should the average of receipts be maintained during February and March the revenue for this fiscal year will attain a total of approximately \$345,000,000.

Details of the revenue for January are as follows:

Customs, \$16,135,204; excise, \$3,051,847; post office, \$1,700,000; public works, including railways and canals, \$3,643,883; miscellaneous, including excess profits and income taxes, \$65,575,983.

Capital expenditures during the ten months aggregated \$234,559,182, made up of \$238,815,088 expended on war account, and \$35,662,428 on public works. In January war expenditures reached \$59,105,904, and public works expenditures \$3,073,829. Capital expenditures for January thus reached \$62,179,734, and about equalled the increase in the public debt for the month of \$62,015,109. The expenditure on war account during the month was heavy by reason of closing up and adjustment of overseas accounts. The funded debt at the close of the month stood at \$2,447,642,908; the gross debt at \$3,323,687,801; net debt, \$1,900,146,168.

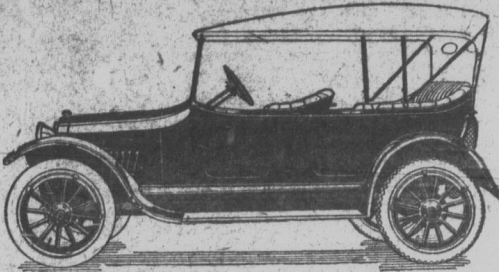

THEIR OF TO-DAY.

AR of Them Have Been Tried Before.

Communism, agrarianism, proletarianism, anarchism, have all had their day, and it was a bad day—in Athens and Sparta and Rome and Jerusalem and Paris, writes Henry van Dyke, in the Scribner. Why are there any other day? The divine right of kings and capitalists to impose their will upon their fellowmen has been tested many times and has always failed to make good before the throne of Eternal Wisdom and Righteousness. The bloody bankruptcy of the French reign of terror was no worse, and no better, than the break-down of the attempt of the Holy Alliance to re-establish the tyranny of hereditary titles and unjust prerogatives. Why ask us to return to these old discredited theories? They are not really guide-posts. They are signs of "the thoroughfare." Give us something really new, gentlemen. Think out some better way of co-operation between the "haves" and the "have-nots." Devise some better mode of inducing the lazy to work and of restraining the clever and industrious from claiming exorbitant gains. That is what we need, as surely as two and two make four.

If you can do this, I promise you that a considerable company of the "intellectual" middle-class, neither "high-brow" who think they know it all, nor "low-brow" who maintain that nothing is worth knowing, will be ready for a promising adventure. Meantime we follow the old guide-posts which have been proved, and take our needful ease by the campfire where we find creature comforts and friendly talk. And if our camp is attacked by brigands, we shall have our guns ready.

I do not mean to be drawn into a discussion of the bold brutality of the Bolsheviks of Russia, or the sneaking villainies of the I. W. W. in America. These lie outside of the region of literature. They are to be met not with essays and orations, but with laws and guns. The deities of life, the securities of home, the safeguards of social order, having been won, by toil and fighting, from the abyss of barbarism, will not be suffered to perish. The anti-social mania, nor the sentimentalism of the social imbecile will be permitted to destroy them. We look to statesmen and warriors to take care of this.

Can Improve on Nature. Nature does not reason, she has no moral consciousness, she does not economize her resources, she is inefficient, she is wasteful and dilatory, and spends with one hand what she saves with the other, writes John Burroughs in the Yale Review. She is blind; her method is the hit-and-miss method of a man who fights in the dark. She hits her mark, not because she aims at it, but because she shoots in all directions. She fills the air with her bullets. She wants to plant in yonder marsh her cat-tail flag, or her purple loosestrife, and she trusts her seed to every wind that blows, and to the foot of every bird that visits her marshes, no matter which way they are going. But behold how she has endowed man to improve upon all her slack and round about methods! She enables them to cheat, and mislead, and circumvent her. He steals her secrets, he tames her very lightning, he forces her hand on a hundred occasions; he turns her rivers, he levels her hills, he obliterates her marshes, he makes her deserts bloom as the rose; he masters her atoms and he surges and weighs her orbs, he finds out her ways in the heavens. He discovers the most completely hidden thing in the universe, the ether, and he has learned how to use it for his own purposes; his wireless telegraphy turns it into a news highway; above the seas, over the mountains and across continents, it carries his messages.

In man nature has evolved the human from the luhuman, she has evolved justice and mercy from rapine and cruelty, she has evolved the civic from the domestic, the state from the tribe. She has evolved the Briton and the Frenchman from the prehistoric man. She has not yet got rid of the Hun in the German, but she is fast getting rid of the German in her overseas Germanic stock. The bleaching process goes on apace.

An Arabian Restaurant. In his book "War in the Garden of Eden," Kermit Roosevelt gives a picturesque description of restaurant life in the Arabian bazaar: "I wandered off into the bazaar to get something to eat. In native fashion I first bought a big flap of bread from an old woman, and then to a pickle booth to get some beet, which I wrapped in my bread. Next I ordered some lamb kababs roasted. The meat is cut in pellets, spitted on rods six or eight inches long, and laid over the glowing charcoal embers. In the shop there are long tables with benches beside them. The customer spreads his former purchases, and when his kababs are ready he sits his dinner. He next proceeds to a coffee house, where he has a couple of glasses of tea and three or four diminutive cups of coffee to top off, and the meal is finished. The Arab eats sparingly as a rule, but when he gives or attends a banquet, he stuffs himself to his utmost capacity."

From German to French. In Africa the natives of the Camerooun country have recently changed their allegiance from German to French, but their loyalty to the musical instruments of olden times still holds true. Air-filled skins and bamboo compose these strange instruments, which are used in the meditative rites and festival dances of the tribes.

FLAX-GROWING IN CANADA.

Industry Has Shown Signs of Reviving Since the War.

The carefully considered effort which is being made by the Provincial Government of Ontario to encourage the cultivation of flax in the northern part of the province is a welcome evidence of foresight. For there is a very considerable shortage of flax in the world's markets, and the old sources of supply are, for the time being, at any rate, seriously curtailed. Thus, in the days before the war, and for some time after its onset, great quantities of flax came from Russia, whilst Belgium and Holland also made considerable contributions. To-day, Russia is practically out of the market, and the supplies from Holland and Belgium are still limited. This condition has, of course, obtained for some time past, and, two or three years ago, when the demand for linen for airplanes wings and other war purposes was making heavy calls on the linen production capabilities of the Allies, Canada supplied herself seriously to the question of increasing the flax production of the country. To this end the Government promised a fixed price for the crop, and a bounty, running from two to nine cents a pound, to the spinner for the finished yarn. The authorities, moreover, suffered no delay in the matter. With characteristic energy they established a complete plant at Fort Erie, Saskatchewan, for the extraction of the fibres from the flax and arranged for the carrying out of a series of experiments in spinning, in Kitchener, Ont. The idea of the Canadian Government was, of course, not only to establish an industry which would help to meet the war needs of the Allies, but one which might be developed, after the war, to the increasing advantage of the Dominion as a whole.

Now flax is essentially the crop for the small holder. There is, it is true, really no limit to the scale upon which it can be grown, but the process of hand weeding, to which it so readily responds, makes flax a crop particularly adapted to the kind of labor generally available on a small holding. It is for this reason, no doubt, amongst others, that the Ontario Government has adopted the scheme, just referred to, of encouraging flax growing in the northern part of the province. Under this plan, various mills in older Ontario, will supply seed to be distributed among selected settlers in the north country, in quantities sufficient to plant two or more acres, whilst the settler when he has harvested his crop, to return to the mill an amount of seed equal to that which was sent to him. It is proposed then to compare the northern seed and fibre with the product grown from similar seed in the older districts, and if the results prove satisfactory, the Government is prepared to take still further steps to encourage cultivation.

Ultimately it is hoped to establish in Canada a complete linen trade, on a large scale, and not merely to cultivate flax for export. There is, however, to-day an immediate market for exported Canadian flax, set only for the sake of the linen which may be made from it, but for the sake of its many greatly needed by-products, such as linseed oil and cake.

Cheap Greenbacks.

Time was in Toronto when the American dollar, to-day worth \$1.17 in Canadian money, could be picked up for 40 cents. Those were the far-off days of the American Civil War, before most of Toronto money magnates had entered the world, and when Sir Edmund Walker, president of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, was a youth in his uncle's private banking office at Hamilton, where he handled the great influx of depreciated American money, separate ledgers were kept for it and our own Canadian currency.

The financial situation of the Northern States at that time has no parallel to that of Britain and Canada today. The North had not borrowed money abroad to secure the ships of war. Uncle Sam had merely expanded his currency to an enormous extent. Early in the war most of the gold and silver in the States had been sent abroad to pay for supplies. There was nothing but paper in the country and with that and the uncertain fortunes of war, from early in the campaign American notes were at a big discount over here. During a considerable portion of the period between 1861 and 1865 the American dollar brought 50 cents and even 40 cents. At one time things looked as black for the North that in Quebec the American greenback fell to 40 cents, whereas the Confederate dollar, which hardly passed current at all in Canada, brought 30 cents. Not until about 1875 did the American dollar get to par.

Ole the Bear.

Ole the Bear (A. H. Westerberg), mail carrier between Revelstoke, B.C., and Downie Creek, forty-five miles up the Big Bend, succeeded in accomplishing a feat that establishes a new record in this district. The great depth of snow up the Big Bend, together with the heavy crust caused by raining and freezing, made it practically impossible for a horse to travel the road, but Ole conceived the idea of making snowshoes for his horse, which he did out of birch, constructing them circular in shape and more than a foot across. For protection he covered the horse's leg with blankets, and thus he succeeded in making Revelstoke in three days without harm to him or to his horse.

February Has Five Sundays.

For the first time in forty years there is five Sundays in February. Ordinarily the sequence of five Sundays in February occurs once in each twenty-eight years, but owing to the fact that 1900 was not a leap year the calendar "slipped a cog" and Sunday, being shut out of place in numerical order, it did not get back into position to become the first and last day of the month from 1890 until this year.

TOWN FINANCES.

The editor of our contemporary is laboring under difficulties in his endeavor to prove that the Graphic is unfair to the present town council.

In his financial statement published April 7th he deliberately endeavored to convince his readers that the statement covered the financial conditions up to date or "when the bonds were sold". Now he is endeavoring to cover this up, and asserts he only intended to cover the fiscal year.

The Graphic had nothing to cover up, so we gave the facts as received from the Town Treasurer, and these figures covered the business up to March 31st. Even the financial expert of our contemporary cannot claim that they are not substantially correct.

NOT THE TRUTH.

The editor of the Tribune has accused his friends of late councils of suppressing or holding over large bills for the present council to pay. This is not a fair statement. No accounts were held back, but all were promptly referred to the council by the Town Clerk just as they were received. There were doubtless accounts of "previous year's business" which were not received until after the year closed but this was no fault of any mayor or council. The same is happening in this current year.

Merchants were too busy in December to render accounts, and many merchants supplying the town render their accounts quarterly or even at longer periods.

To say that the Town Clerk, the former mayor or any councillor deliberately held back these accounts is not a just statement.

HIS FINANCE.

The Tribune financial expert endeavors to show that the town finances are \$62,000 to the good on the council's financial year, and all this was accomplished upon an assessment of \$73,000 of which \$24,000 was for school purposes. Surely the editor is wasting his time on such small matters. The management of the C.N.R. should employ him to turn their deficits into surplus.

EDITOR'S MAIL

Dear Editor:—Now that the public know who are the aspirants for civic honors, the writer would ask for a short space in to-day's Graphic, to briefly touch on civic management, promising I will not say half of what I would like to say on the subject.

The result of the nominations must have been considerable of a shock to those anxious citizens, who looked for improvement and greater business ability in the personnel of the next Council, to find that four of the old Board, had no opposition. After the regime of last year's extravagance and waste, 'tis a pity some of the Councillors cannot see themselves as ninety per cent of the ratepayers do, for if they did, they would drop behind the scenes, or "fold their tents like the Arab, and as silently steal away." The apathy and indifference on the part of our people, must be apparent to all, and in the writer's opinion, is unparalleled in any town of equal size, that I know of. If the ratepayers had turned out to the meetings called last fall to deal with a proposed fire station, we would not to-day, be hearing this cry of waste and extravagance from the mouths of our citizens.

Admitting that all of last year's Board were inexperienced in town affairs, and in business training, is that a sufficiently good excuse for the stand they took in the erection of a fire station, costing in the vicinity of \$32,000, when the public know that one third of that amount would have been sufficient for such a purpose?

Would men of good judgement have started the erection of a concrete and brick building at the time they did? Did Mayor Murray endeavor to dissuade them from such a course? We have no record that he did. Did he not have the power to veto this action, of course he had. The public should know if the amount of public funds wasted on this building exceeded \$10,000.

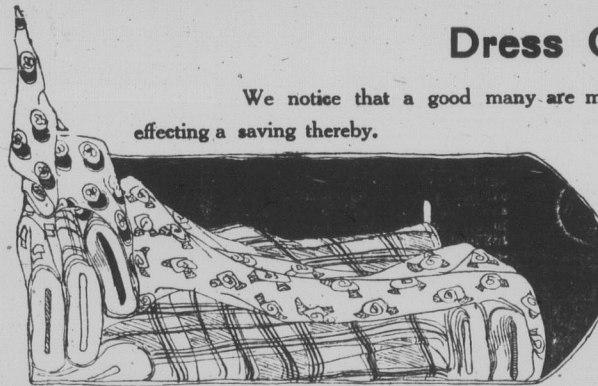

Would business men have paid \$1500.00 for the lot of land on which this much talked of building stands, one of the worst mud holes within the town's limits, and particularly as the fact has just leaked out, that the lot is a leasehold one, and not a freehold? The fact is admitted that the firemen as a whole, or the fire chief "put it all over them."

It is pretty well known that the

very energetic and optimistic regarding the town's future, but he has failed to show the public the blunders of last year, which if he had done from the start, there would have been opposition. We sincerely hope that the public will awake to their sense of responsibility during the management of affairs for the coming year, and that the new Council will receive the public's good will on every hand.

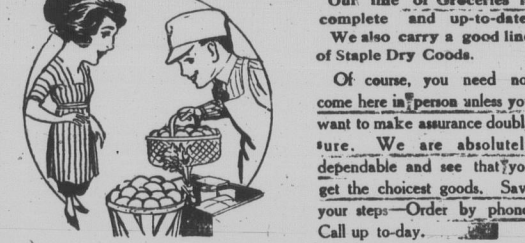
