The Condition of London. The unsafe condition of London streets, Crossing the Rappahannock. owing to the daring audacity of garette robbers, is a subject which is generally attracting the Euglish press. The English news-

papers are filled with details of garotte robberies and daring encounters. The following is a summary, which embraces the most interesting particulars :

Outrages of the most daring kind con-tinue to be committed in the streets of Lon-don, notwithstanding that the police have succeeded in arresting a number of garotters. The alarm is not unwarranted, judging by the bold and barefaced manner in which the criminal part of the population are now pursuing their calling. A banker's clerk has been attacked in open day in Waterloo Road. A gentleman was knocked down while passing from St. Paul's-churchvard into Paternoster-row, at five o'clock in the evening, and had to be carried bleeding

and insensible to the nearest hospital. Even the very children of the raffians who co these atrocities seem to have caught the passion for violence. Two girls, whose heads scarcely reach to the top of the dock, were charged at the Clerkenwell Police-court with robbing a woman in the Caledonianroad in the evening. They asked her for




