EASTERN BUSH FIRES

Great Destruction in the Vicinity of Kingston.

Kingston, Ont., May 4.-Disastrous bush fires have been raging north of Sharbot Lake and fine timber limits have been destroyed and many homes have been devastated, and cattle, stock and household effects consumed.

The fire began near Plevria, farmers were clearing land and burning underbrush. The village of Vennacher has been destroyed and safety of Plevna is feared. Lumbermen all through the district are great sufferers. The fire spread with great rapidity. People fled without taking goods with them. So far no lives are reported lost.

FINLAND BEING SLOWLY CRUSHED

Russia Has Inaugurated a Government of Oriental Despotism.

London, May 4.-Further accounts printed in the English newspapers in regard to the situation in Finland indicate that although the arbitrary measures of the Russian Government have in nowise been relaxed, the spirit tained, despite the expulsion of the leading patriots. One of the most striking evidences of this uncompromising attitude is seen in the fact that nearly all the conscripts levied under the new conscription act have refused to join the army and have the threats of the Government. The popular feeling is one of deep indignation.

"To understand this indignation," writes a correspondent, "it must be remembered the measures adopted are as unprecendented in Finland as they would be in England. Hitherto the liberty of a subject was guaranteed by law. No man could be punished with-out trial, and officials, like other people, were respensible before the courts for the legality of their acts. All that has been abolished by the St. Petersburg bureaucracy, who have now introduced the Oriental system of arbitrary despotism, under which every man's property and liberty, and even his life, are at the mercy of the executive of a government, which is above law, and free of all restrains on its liberty of action. The system has proved a dismal failure in Russia, where the people have never known anything better, and it is hard to believe that it can be a success when applied to a nation of people like the Finns, who have grown up amid Western traditions of personal liberty and self-government.'

Remarkable Increase in the **Numbers Leaving Britain** for Canada.

Ottawa, May 4.-It is astonishing how the tide of British immigration to Canada has been swollen during the last two or three years. Taking the months of January, February, March and April, the total British arrivals \$1 were in 1901 but 3,347. During the same period of 1902 they jumped to 5,186, and for the four months of the present year, ending April 30, they had increased to 16,457, or a gain of 13,110, as compared with 1901. In the four months' period of 1901 the arrivals from the United States were 5,031. The first four months, of the subsequent were in 1901 but 3,347.
