OVER HUNDRED KILLED

Latest Official Estimate of Lives Lost In Assaulted Towns.

IS SURPRISINGLY SMALL

Considering Number of Shells Cast Into Unprotected

[Canadian Press.] New York, Dec. 18.—A cable to the Herald from London this morning says: The latest details of the raid on the ortheast coast of England show that the German cruisers had a narrow escape from pursuing British warships. The Germans were sighted by a British patrolling squadron, but by immediately retiring at full speed were able to escape in the mist.

According to the admiralty's state-ment, the warships taking part in the bombardment were two battle cruisers and one armored cruiser at Hartlepool, two battle cruisers and an armored cruiser at Scarborough and one battle cruiser and one armored cruiser at Whitby, two battle cruisers shelling the first two towns simultaneously, commencing soon after 8 o'clock in the morning of Wednesday and continuing about one-half hour.

At Whitby, the bombardment began at 9 o'clock, so it is considered possible hat the one battle cruiser engaged had come on from Scarborough Even if is so, at least four battle cruisers relying to cut through to Warsaw from the northwest. and two armored cruisers were en-

Germany possesses six battle cruisers, including the Goeben in the Black Sea. The death roll is heavy, but it is considered surprising that it was not greater, having regard to the number of shells which were fired. The approximate number of the casualties is 82 killed and 250 wounded at Hartlepool, 17 killed at Scarborough and 3 wounded, and 2 dead and 2 wounded at Whitby, making a total of 101 killed and 282 wounded. These figures are the latest officially given to the public. One effect of the raid is the striking impetus which has been given to recruiting. At Scotland Yard the number wishing to enlist yesterday was greatly in excess of the average.

Police Say Chauffeur's Arrest Will Clear Up Illicit Traffic.

ADMITS HAVING DRUG

In Police Court Statement Irwin Says Cafe Proprietor Gave Him Drug.

KNEW BAG'S CONTENTS

Alleges Chinese Told Him of What Valuable Satchel Really Hid.

With the arrest and conviction of John Erwin, a chauffeur, in police court today, the police claim to have a clue that will clear up the mystery that has for years surrounded the smuggling of opium, and the illicit drug trade in this city. They believe that they have at last located the Western Ontario opium headquarters.

Erwin, the chauffeur who drove the motor car that caused the death of John Fennell, a Toronto traveller, near Hyde Park a few months ago, was charged with having opium in his possession. He pleaded guilty, and Magistrate J. C. Judd imposed a \$10 fine.

In imposing such a light sentence, the magistrate declared that he was fining him on the supposition that he (Erwin) was telling the truth and that he had not touched the drug himself. Implicates Employer.

In a statement, made in the prisoners' box and taken down by the court stenographer, Erwin implicated his employer, Charlie Cheu, proprietor of the City Cafe.

A copy of this statement follows: "I was driving a car for Charlie Cheu, owner of the City Cafe, when he came out of his place of business with a black initialed club bag in his band. He got in the car and ordered me to drive to my home. When we arrived there, he handed the bag to me, saying: 'Now be kind of careful with that bag; there is a quantity of opium in

Asked by his lordship if any person saw Cheu hand him the bag, Erwin replied: "My mother did." Erwin admitted that he knew perfectly well that it was against the law to have opium in his possession. Predicts Other Arrests.

After the court session, Chief of Police W. T. T. Williams and members of the force held a conference, which, according to a statement made by the chief, will lead to other arrests. The black bag, now in the possession of the police, contained 19½ pounds of



Allies Gaining Ground in Flanders and Keeping Up Pressure Elsewhere -Russians Make Light of Alleged Victories—Turk Losing All in Africa.

London, Dec. 18 .- 12:18 p.m. - In the western arena there have been no vents of great importance; at least none has been reported. Foot by foot the Allies appear to be forcing the Germans out of their trenches in Flanders, and maintaining the pressure elsewhere on the front from the sea to Switzerland. Berlin and Vienna contend that the Russians are falling back along the entire front from the Baltic to the Carpathians, with the invading centre less than 30 miles from Warsaw. Petrograd, however, declines to concede victory to the
