



THE GOVERNMENT'S TREMENDOUS EFFORT.

The Whitney Government is taking an extraordinary interest in the East Middlesex election. A flood of orators has come in, and a Toronto organizer has been at work for weeks taking steps to man every poll. The Premier and half his cabinet are lending a hand. Even the reserves at Ottawa are pressed into service. No stone will be left unturned to secure the seat. As Mr. Rowell says, the efforts being put forth are unexampled.

A dead set is made on Mr. Rowell in his home county, and upon his policy of abolishing the bar. Why such activity on the part of a Government which is majority-fat? It is not that the majority needs increase. It is not that Mr. Neely is indispensable as a statesman. Nor is the presence of Mr. Neely the man so craved at Caesar's headquarters. He has not even the goodwill of his own party in the riding.

The reason, of course, for this sweaty haste that makes the cabinet minister joint-laborer with the humble henchman, has little to do with Mr. Neely himself, except in so far as he has taken up the cudgels for the Government. It is the Rowell policy that has scared the Administration out of its security. East Middlesex is a riding where local option opinion has been proved to be very strong. If in a by-election it pronounces in favor of the root and branch policy, it will be plain to all that the Temperance forces have identified themselves with Liberalism under Mr. Rowell's leadership. FOURTEEN CARTS FOR INCINERATION

Details of Proposed Scheme of Collection Submitted By Engineer.

HOW COST IS DIVIDED

Equipment for Gathering Garbage Will Require \$10,000 of Amount Granted.

At the meeting of the board of works held Thursday night Engineer Brazier was instructed to make an immediate examination of the sidewalks, laid this year by Contractor Anthistle, and also those sidewalks which were laid in 1907, on which the guarantees expire this year. Mr. Anthistle has been stopped

from further work for the city until the engineer has reported upon those walks which he has already completed. Although City Solicitor Meredith states that the companies which laid the sidewalks are responsible for the repairs even after the time that their guarantee expires, if it can be proved that the specifications were not followed at the time of construction, the board were of the opinion that an examination should be made this fail so as to avoid all possible chances of legal ac-

Heating System for Hospital.

An application was received from the hospital trust asking that the hospital be heated by steam from the incinerator when that building is in operation, and that the city council take steps to have the piping system for the conducting of the steam from one building to the other, installed as soon as possible. The total cost of such a system will be \$11,000. Mr. S. L. Davis, local representatives of the Johns-Manville Company, presented the plans of the system of his company, and Engineer Brazier was instructed to investigate and report at the next meeting of the committee.

Ald. Moore and Mayor Graham will confer with the city solicitor and the finance committee as to the most satisfactory method of meeting this additional item of expense.

Equipment for Incinerator. Engineer Brazier submitted a report on the garbage collection, in which he made a number of suggestions that will be seriously considered when that system is installed. Of the \$50,000 set aside for the incinerator and the garhage system, \$39,900 will be used for the construction and equipment of the building and \$10,100 for the collection of the refuse. JURY DECLARES BECKER GUILTY

Will Be Sentenced to the Electric Chair for Killing Rosenthal.

TAKES VERDICT CALMLY

Counsel for Prisoner Says Charge to Jury Was Unfair to Accused.

New York, Oct. 24, - "Guilty of murder in the first degree," was the verdict returned three minutes before midnight tonight by the jury in the case of Lieutenant Becker, charged with killing Herman Rosenthal.

The jury had been out exactly hours and 57 minutes. The length of its deliberation, and the frequency of its requests for exhibits, together with an unmistakable sign of hot arguments in the jury room, had led most of those who waited late at the criminal courts building to believe that there would be no agree-ment. So that when the blow finally fell upon the defendant its force was all the more crushing. Becker's lawyers had grown more confident as the hours sped. Becker himself, chatting pleasantly with his wife, the Plitt brothers, and a former reporter Frederick H. Hawley, who had testified in his behalf, was serenely confident that there could be no answer from the jury room save not guilty.

Takes Shock Well. The convicted man bore up under the shock with the grimness and resolution that had characterized him all through the trial. When the momentous answer came to the question of the clerk of the court, "Gentlemen, have you agreed upon a verdict?" the lieutenant turned calmly toward Harold B. Skinner, the foreman, and displayed no emotion whatever as Mr. Skinner pronounced a few short words that spelled his fate. The only sign of agitation, the only visible appear ance of shock, was a grayness that spread over his dark face, the nartraction of the muscles of the throat. Presently, when he lifted his right hand, and gave oath as to the facts of his age and circumstances, there was not a quiver of the big arm or a waver of a finger. He could answer the formal questions put to him only in husky tones, barely audible a few feet from where he stood at the bar of the

Wife Faints.

While the jury was making up its mind absolute stillness, heightened by the midnight quiet of the streets, prevailed in the courtroom.

After the verdict was given no one was allowed to leave the room until the jury had filed out. Justice Goff had given orders that anyone disturbing the proceedings in the slightest degree should be brought before him for punishment.

Two hundred persons or more gathered at the courtroom door. her ear almost at the keyhole, sat the prisoner's wife. As the last juror left the room by another exit, the door flew open and a man rushed excitedly into the corridor. The crowd gave way. He was half-way down the steps to the telephone booth when a policeman shouted:

"What's the verdict?" The fleeing man tooked over his shoulder.

'Guilty!" he shouted. For a moment there was silence, keen, intense, gripping. It was broken by a woman's muffled scream, and the sound of a falling body.

The prisoner's wife had fainted dead away. Just before the verdict was given Mr. McIntyre made his last plea. He asked that the court grant an earlier request of the jury to inspect the testimony of the persons who talked to Sam Schepps in Het Springs, Ark., The court refused to hear the plea. 

BECKER APPEALS FOR NEW TRIAL

Is Confident of Being Acquitted Before a Higher Court.

TRIAL OF THE GUNMEN

Actual Slayers of Rosenthal Will Now Be Prosecuted by Whitman.

[Canadian Press.]

New York, Oct. 25.-'I am sorry the jury found as they did," was Lieut. Charles Becker's only comment to his jailer this morning, as the convicted man sat on the edge of his prison cot with his chin resting in his cupped hands. The iron nerve which stood by him throughout the ordeal of the 15-day trial did not desert him today, and his bearing was as firm and steady as at any time during the proceedings in the court room,

Becker's coolness may be partly ac-counted for by his confidence that an appeal will mean a reversal, followed by a new trial and probably acquittal. Before he was taken to his cell from the court room, he said to friends seated near him: "Have no fear, this case is not ended yet. There will be new trial, and I will be tried again at a time when public clamor does that in these present proceedings I have had the fair and impartial trial which is guaranteed to all men under

Ask for New Trial, The work of drawing up the papers in the motion for a new trial will begin at once, and the documents will be placed before the court of appeals within a few days. Lloyd P. Striker,

of Becker's counsel, said today that the appeal would probably take a year's time. John F. McIntyre, Becker's chief counsel, was confident of success in this action. "There is not the slightest doubt," he said, "that there will be a reversal of the verdict n a higher court." Basis for the appeal will be found in the hundreds of objections and exceptions raised by the defence in the course of the trial.

Sentence on Wednesday. Becker will be arraigned in court on Wednesday next, and at that time entence of death will be pronounced. It was declared this morning that he jury arrived at its verdict of first legree murder after only three formal ballots. At no time during the eight neurs of deliberation was there a question of Becker's guilt—the only natter of debate being as to whether the verdict should be for first degree murder, meaning death to the prissecond degree murder, which is punishable by life imprisonment. It was said that the first ballot showed eight of the jurors for conviction in the first degree, while on the second poll all but one of the twelve were agreed. The final ballot, taken shortbefore midnight, was unanimous for a verdict of first degree murder.

Trial for Gunmen. District Attorney Whitman will now turn his attention to the cases of the gunmen of the Rosenthal murer, who must be tried before the same special term of court as Becker. They have all asked for special trials, but it is believed that Becker's conviction will make their trials something not much more than legal form-

A record in criminal trials in this city has been established by the prompt disposition of the Becker case. Although it was one of the most important and momentous cases ever called to trial here, it was disposed of in fifteen days, during which time 3,-000 pages of testimony was taken and 97 witnesses examined. The cost of the trial will reach a total far less than that of most big criminal cases, it is said. The large single item of expense was for bringing a witness from England, This item was about \$2,000. The cost of running the court is figured at about \$700 a day, while the expense of paying and caring for the jury was about \$200 a day.
