

New York, March 27.—The New York World publishes the followng: London, March 26.-The report London, March 26.—The report of the auditor-general to the war office on the British army accounts for 1915-1916, issued tonight, throws an instructive light on the way in which some small part, at least, of the hundreds of millions of pounds voted for the army has been wasted, owing to theft, negligence and blundering. The report blandly states that mules worth £1,600 (\$8,000) were picketed on sandy soil at Borden Camp and escaped in the night. They were never recovered.

This candid admission has elicited much ironic comment. The Star remarks:

"Where these mules went, whether they were eaten by the troops or exported to Holland for the Germans, the patient auditor-general cannot tell. They simply vanished."

Immediate Suffrage Mrs. Pankhurst Asks of British Premier

London, March 27 .- A new demand for the immediate grant of the suffrage to women has been made on Premier Lloyd George by Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the militant leader. In a letter to the premier, Mrs. Pankhurst recalls his speech in the House of Commons on March 7, in which he expressed the readiness of the Government to grant self-government to Ireland without waiting for the end of the war. She adds: "We take it for granted that you make the same offer to us, and that you are prepared, during the war and without delay, to give us selfgovernment in the shape of parliamentary vote. We declare our wholehearted acceptance of the offer, which is so very obviously implied in the offer to Ireland, of a Government measure of woman suffrage to be carried into law immedi-

General Nivelle Continues To Drive Toward North and South of St. Quentin and Pushes Back Germans Between That Place and La Fere---Village of Coucy-la-Chateau Taken in Brilliant Night Attack.

THE WAR SITUATION

Driving forward north and south of St. Quentin, heart of the Hinden briving forward north and south of St. Quentin, neart of the Hinden-burg line, the Allies have cut two of the four main railroads which feed the city, while a third is well within reach of the French guns. With La Fere inundated by the retreating Germans, and two of its dominating La Fere inundated by the retreating Germans, and two of its dominating forts in the hands of the French, the chief interest in the tremendous battle which has been raging for a week on an eighty-mile front, shifted to historic St. Quentin. The Germans are making desperate attempts to wrest from the French the Essigny Benay plateau, from which Gen. Nivelle's guns command the southern approaches to the city and rander its position, in the opinion of military critics. and render its position, in the opinion of military critics, one of grave

South of La Fere the French troops have swung in a great curve south of La Fere the French troops have swung in a great curve around the forests of Coucy and St. Gobain, the formidable natural barrier which lies between them and Laon, the southernmost fortress on the Hindenburg line. In the centre of the curve General Nivelle has forced a wedge into the forest, but about ten square miles of heavily timbered country must yet be conquered before he reaches his goal.

ARE BRITISH CHECKED? ARE BRITISH CHECKED?

On the northern section of the great battle line the situation is somewhat obscure. Neither British nor German official communications throw much light on the operations here. Some progress has been made in the direction of Cambrai by General Haig, but apparently the determined resistance of the Germans has checked the British advance along the whole Arras sector. TURKS' END NEAR.

While the issue of the titanic struggle in France remains in doubt the stage is set for sensational possibilities in far off Mesopotamia. In the plain of the Tigris five armies are converging on the Turks in the hope of dealing a death blow to Ottoman power in its eastern empire. The Russians are advancing from Persia in three divisions, driving the Turks before them, and have already crossed the Turkish frontier at two places. To the south General Maude, conqueror of Bagdad, is pressing forward up the Tigris and the Diala Rivers. pressing forward up the Tigris and the Diala Rivers.

BRILLIANT NIGHT ATTACK

Paris, March 27 .- The village of Coucy-le-Chateau was captured by the French in an attack last night, the war office announces. Further progress was made in the lower sectoin of Coucy Forest, all of the north ern part of which is now held by the French. The statement follows:

"South of the Oise we continued to make progress in the lower Forest of Coucy, all of the northern part of which we occupied. The enemy was driven beyond the Barisis-Servais line. South of the forest our troops made a brilliant night attack and captured the village of Coucy-le-Chateau, which was defended energetically by the Germans.

"In the region north of Soissons we captured a farm northwest of Margival, and a point of support held in strength by the enemy.

"In the Argonne we made a successful surprise attack in the sector of Four-de-Paris, taking prisoners. In Lorraine enemy attacks on small French posts in the region of Letricourt were repulsed completely. "Elsewhere the night passed in quiet."

BRITISH LINE STRAIGHTENED

London, March 27 .- "Notwithstanding a continuance of adverse weather conditions," telegraphs the Reuter correspondent at the British army headquarters in Fance, "there was considerable activity during the last 24 hours. The taking of Lagnicourt straightens our line between Beaumetz and Croiselles, a sector of our advance which the Germans continue to dispute more vigorously than else-

"Our cavalry yesterday captured the village of Equancourt, on the Tortille River, on which the enemy at one time expected to make a stand, but which we now are well across. They also took the village of Longavesnes, the possession of which greatly improves our line between Roisel and Nurlu. The weather continues bad."

HYDRO EXPENDITURE ON CAPITAL ACCOUNT THIS YEAR NEARS \$7,000,000

[Special to The Advertiser.]
TORONTO, March 26.—Capital expenditure totalling nearly seven million dollars is proposed by the hydro-electric power commission of Ontario for the fiscal year ending October 31, 1917, according to further supplementary estimates tabled in the Legislature today.

The Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway commission proposes capital expenditures during the same period, of \$376,593.

The further supplementary estimates of the province involve an expenditure of nearly one and a half million dollars. Some of the interesting items are:
Public employment bureaus, \$30,000; bureau of municipal affairs, \$5,000; Western University, London, \$60,000, (Increase of \$10,000); Queen's University of Toronto, (special grant), \$100,000; colonization roads, \$218,706; special grants for road construction, \$100,000; fire ranging and equipment, (additional), \$155,000.



Therefore the obligations due to British subjects, who may be so unfortunate as to be detained in Germany or other enemy be behind the German lines and under German control, will be taken care of as to custody of revenue, until war ends. Efforts have been made by Germans to transfer to companies in Holland, Denmark and Sweden, their title to Canadian securities so that interest and dividends may be transmitted to these countries and then sent on to Germany.

Whether that prediction will prove to be true or not, it is safe to assert that the minister of finance is pleased with the co-operation he has received in his appeals to the country for loans. On three different occasions he has sent out appeals for loans, and on each occasion the response has been ample and the loan largely

There are many satisfactory, pleasing features that contributed to such a satisfactory result. Our chartered banks each time have responded to the full extent required of them. They have proved their own strength, and their loyalty and goodwill at the same time. They have been friends in need. The banks, life companies and financial institutions of Canada that have so well stood the strain of war times will, like Canada itself, come out of the war with more confidence in themselves and the people of Canada, and of other countries, and will have greater faith and confidence than ever.

Financial co-operation has resulted in good every way.

CANADA'S OUTLOOK

One of the greatest benefits that comes from travelling is the accidental associations you meet with. When travelling last week, I had the good fortune to meet with a prominent and influential American. Naturally the subject turned towards the greatest of all subjects, the World War. When he found out I was a Canadian, he said, "I cannot tell you how much the Americans are beginning to admire Canada. The way in which the Canadian boys have come forward and the magnificent account they have given of themselves, has filled the Americans with admiration. Our admiration for Canada and for Canadian boys has done us as much good as the kaiser, with his wrong ideas and out of date methods, has done us harm. You know we have never in America fully appreciated what the people of Canada have proven themselves to be. We always liked Canadians, regarded them as quiet, peaceful and law-abiding citizens, but we never had any idea, even with men or money, that the country was anything like as great as it has shown itself to be. In the matter of men, there can be no grander proof than the proof that has been given by them upon the battlefield. Your young men from coast to coast have responded to the call in a very magnificent way. There is no section of the country where they have not come forward in large numbers, almost in larger numbers than the country could large numbers, almost in larger numbers than the country walks of life. I by any means afford and continue the ordinary walks of life. I have no doubt that ordinary vocations have felt the strain and that the Northwest at the present time is suffering for want of men, because its young men have gone to follow the flag. In the matter of money we did not think your banks were nearly as strong as they have shown themselves to be. Out of every war loan they have taken large proportions of it and this voluntarily. The people of the United States are beginning to realize that Canada's best is the world's best. We always knew that Canada had immense railroad corporations, but we did not think your banks in size were at all rivals of your great railways. You know it is one of the wonders of the world that so small a population as Canada, I understand seven or eight millions, has three transcontinental railways spanning the continent. It is not so many years ago that it was regarded as a foolish enterprise on the part of Canada to attempt to build one railway, and it was supposed that Confederation would fall through because of the undertaking to build the Canadian Pacific, which we in America did not believe Canada had the financial resources to complete. We were under the impression that whenever Canada wanted money, it would go across to England for it, and our surprise has been all the greater that they have not needed to go one step for money, but have found for each war loan applied for, not only sufficient to meet it, but had always amply over-subscribed surplus. In addition to taking up these great loans, Canada is buying back loans that had been made in England."

There is no doubt in my mind that when the war is over and even before the war is over, there will be applications from the United States to start branch industries in Canada, and I need not point out which places are more likely to carry on this, across the river from Detroit, taking in Amherstburg, Sandwich, Windsor, Walkerville, Ford City and Ojibway. There is no doubt that large steel works will be established there, but steel works will only be the commencement, because many other large works will follow. There will no doubt be many other great industries follow and the Detroit River on the Canadian side, from end to end will be one continuous water front of magnificent industries just as it is on the other side of the river. Nature has marked out that spot as one of the best for manufacturing industries on the continent. It is quite as good a spot for industries as Pittsburg or any of the Eastern cities. We know how Cleveland has gone ahead. Detroit, with its special industry, automobiles, has had wonderful progress in the last few years. At this point, iron ore and coal could easily meet and there would be no better spot on the continent for a shipbuilding centre than here. I am inclined to believe that the St. Clair River, now that the Imperial Oil, which CONTINUED ON PAGE 10




