The British Puzzle.

The Duke of Devonshire's speech last night puts another tangle in British politics. The duke came out boldly as an advocate of retaliation against protective countries, thus exploding the report that he would join forces with Lord Rosebery. Both the Rosebery and the Campbell-Bannerman Liberals denounce retaliation as an impossible policy. The duke declared against protection and Imperial preferential trade. On the platform with him last night was Lord George Hamilton, another seceder from the Balfour Cabinet, yet both supported the Balfour programme. The duke explained the anomaly by saying that the Premier had allowed himself to be so dragged into the Chamberlain propaganda that the Unionists would find it difficult to act with the Government if there was any desire to differentiate retaliation and protection. The duke's explanation may be explained by saying that he fears Balfour will be rushed into protection by Chamberlain, and that retaliation will become a secondary consideration. His pronouncement, however, will strengthen the Government by holding the Devonshire Unionists in line when Balfour goes to the country.







FEW JOCKEYS OUT OF THE ORDINARY

They Are in Big Demand, and Are Being Offered Enormous Salaries.

DEMAND FOR GOOD JOCKEYS.

No other line of work offers the op-portunity of earning a large salary in a short time such as is afforded in the field of racetrack jockeys. The extra-ordinary earnings of successful joc-keys have frequently been comment-ed upon. Some of them earn an income greater than that of the President of the United States. It is a sing-ular that with such constant demand for this peculiar kind of talent the supply has not grown more than it has. For years jockeys have been Arken, S. C., this week. Mr. Whitney has. For years jockeys have been earning enormous wages, but the number of them—that is, of competent ones—does not keep pace with the demand. Recently there has been extravagant bidding for the services of three boys now riding at the New Orleans meeting, and it is safe to say that the doctor himself has gathered in a few more dollars for the them is against Reach, Rogers & Co., which will be a test case to determine whether the old owners are liable for damages and to what extent. While some of the leading jockeys are fairly well educated other boys equally successful are ignorant. It is generally conceded that one of the main essentials to success in the saddle is confidence, a stock in trade by the way, that ena stock in trade, by the way, that en-ters largely into triumph in any line of athletics or even of business. Not only do boys not attract attention un-til they begin to win but they do not until flushed with victory. It is quite likely that boys of good ability are frequently kept in the background because luck is not with them, and they do not happen to win rather than do not ride well enough to win. Likewise many boys win largely through good fortune and thereby hasten on to success and fame on the wings of good luck. But for all that it is odd that with the great demand there is for or-dinarily good boys there are so few riders out of the ordinary.




