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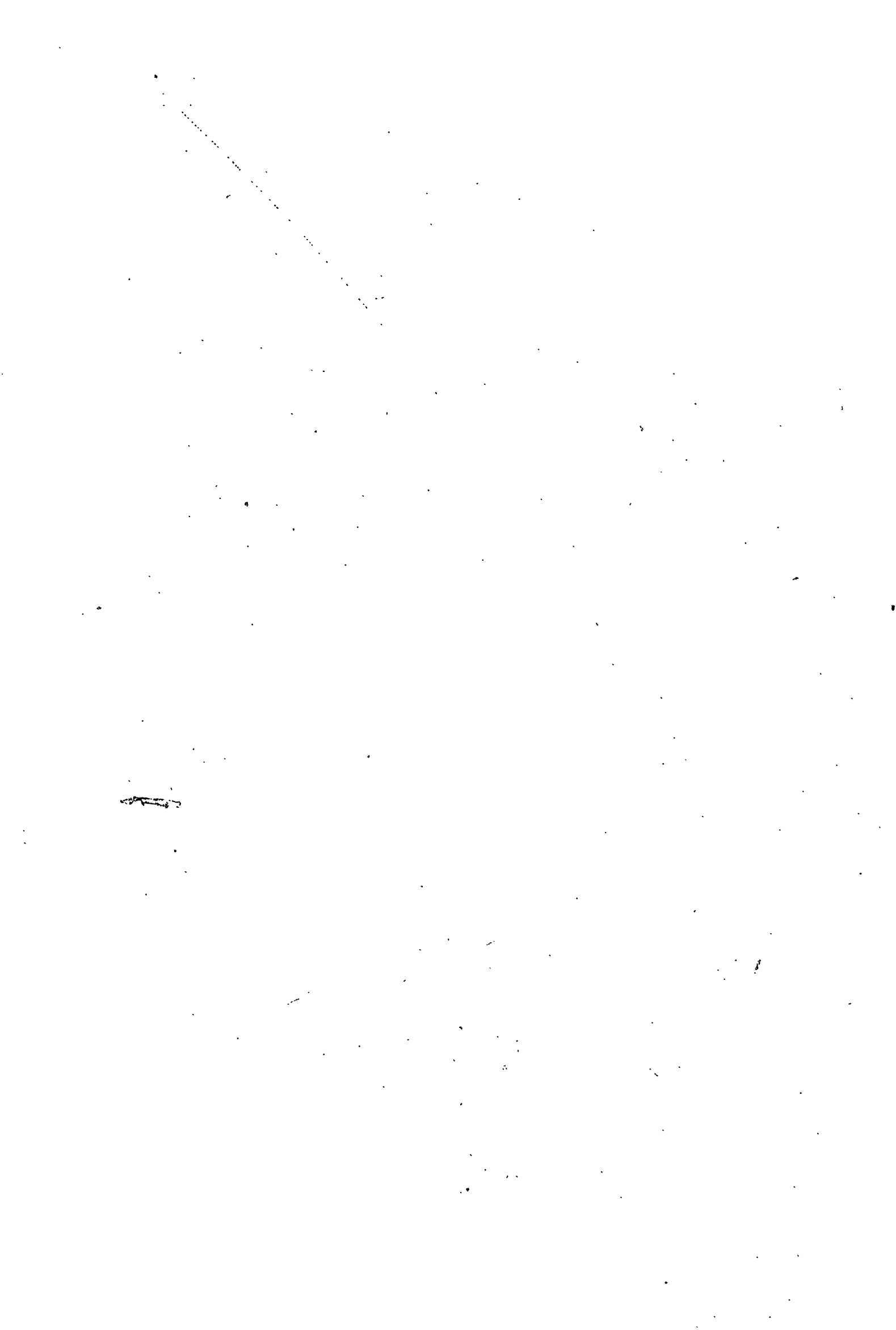

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SECOND REPORT.

THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE appointed to enquire into the present condition of the Post Office Department, with a view to the application of an efficient remedy to the defects in its Organization and Management, have agreed to the following REPORT:—

YOUR Committee have directed their attention, at an early period of the Session, to the Financial Affairs of the Department, its Receipts and Expenditure, and the manner in which the surplus Revenue was disposed of.

Your Committee have examined, at great length, the Deputy Post Master General, and called for various Statements, Returns, Documents, and Correspondence, which, with the Evidence taken by Your Committee, will be found appended to this Report.

The great number, and still incomplete state, of these Accounts, have, as yet, prevented Your Committee coming to a satisfactory conclusion on the voluminous papers connected with the Finances of the Department which have been laid before them. Sufficient data have, however, been obtained to convince them that the Post Office Department in the Canadas has been made a source of Revenue to Great Britain, large sums having been annually remitted by the Deputy Post Master General to the General Post Office, London. For the thirteen years ending in 1834 inclusive, the enormous sum of £91,685 8s. 8d. sterling, has been transmitted to England by the Post Office of this Province; the average remittance of the last four years being £10,041 13s. 4d. sterling, per annum.

Your Committee would be wanting in their duty to Your Honorable House, and to the People of this Province, did they not take the first opportunity loudly to protest against this illegal violation of the plainest principles of constitutional law, and the fundamental rights of the good People of this Colony. However the circumstances of the case may have originally necessitated the levying of this tax, previous to the establishment of a Representative form of Government in this Province, from the moment such form of Government was established therein, the surplus derived from this source of Revenue ought to have been immediately placed at the disposal and under the control of the Representatives of the People, in conformity with one of the important and indisputable birth-rights of British subjects, which were more peculiarly acknowledged and confirmed to Colonies having local Legislatures, by the faith and honor of the British Parliament pledged by the Declaratory Act of one thousand seven hundred and seventy eight, the violation of which principle has already cost Great Britain so dear, in the dismemberment of the Empire, and the loss of the former British Colonies, now the flourishing and happy United States of America.

By the Act passed in the fourth year of His present Majesty's Reign, chapter twenty seven, His Majesty's Government virtually admit the making of such remittances to be unconstitutional, and a violation of the rights of the subject.—Your Committee were, therefore, induced to hope that such practice would, at least, have been discontinued by the Deputy Post Master General, after he had become cognizant of the views of His Majesty's Government, as evinced in that Act. So far, however, from respecting the rights of Your Honorable House and of the People of this Province, Your Committee perceive that that Officer still continues to make these remittances.

At an early date, when Your Committee learnt that the Deputy Post Master General had already made a large remittance on account of the last year, 1835, they gave that Officer to understand that very probably Your Honorable House would hold him personally responsible for any further remittances he might make to the General Post Office in England, out of the Post Office Revenues collected in this Province. So far from respecting that warning, that Officer immediately after, as Your Committee learn by Statements furnished within the last few days, paid into the Commissariat Office, at Quebec, to be forwarded to England, twenty thousand dollars.

The sums thus remitted by that Officer to England, for the three quarters ending 5th October, 1835, from the Post Office revenue collected by him in both Canadas, amount as per minute in the margin, to the large sum of *Thirty three thousand dollars* equal to *Eight thousand two hundred and fifty pounds* currency.

The People of both the Canadas, have, even by the admission of the Deputy Post Master General, been "clamorous" in their demands for new Post Offices and increased Post Office accommodation. That Officer, although informed of these demands, has hitherto on various pretexts neglected to comply with them. On the contrary he appears to consider one of the principal duties of his office to be to render the Department in these Provinces as profitable a source of revenue as possible to the Parent State, and to consider the accommodation of their inhabitants a matter of secondary consideration. Under all the circumstances of the case, then, Your Committee respectfully suggest to Your Honorable House, the necessity of taking immediate steps to put a stop to this unconstitutional and illegal practice, and recommend that the Deputy Post Master General be held personally responsible for any further remittances which he might make to England from the Post Office revenue of this Province.

By the Statements laid before Your Committee, the gross receipts of the Department in the Canadas appear to have been for the three last years as follows:—

Your Committee cannot say whether these sums are included in the items above mentioned under the head "Newspapers and Pamphlets." The whole of the Expenditure in both Provinces, for Salaries, Contingencies, and transport of Mails, for the above years, appears to be as follows:—

Since procuring the Returns, upon which the above Statements are founded, Your Committee have called for and procured copies of the "Annual Returns of the state of the Post Office Department in the Canadas" made by the Deputy Post Master General to the General Post Office, England, for the above years, from which they have compiled the following comparative Statement of Receipts and Expenditure for the same years. Although the Items and Balances in the above Returns do not agree, it is evident that large sums notwithstanding, remain after the Expenses of the Department are paid. Taking for granted that these shewn by the Deputy Post Master's annual Returns are correct, the following will be found to be the nett proceeds of the Department for the above three years, after deducting the British Packet Postage due on Letters received from England by the Falmouth Mails:—

Your Committee have been extremely desirous to separate the Accounts of Upper and Lower Canada, from each other, in order to determine what is the nett amount of Post Office Revenue belonging to each Province, after their separate expenses are paid. To get at this information, Your Committee called on the Deputy Post Master General to compile and furnish them, with an annual debit and credit account in detail, of the Receipts and Expenditure of the

the Post Office Department in Lower Canada, for the years 1832, 1833, 1834; which Statements shew yearly a surplus Revenue from that Department, in each Province, as follows:—

Whatever balances accrue, are disposed of, by remittance to the General Post Office, London.

These balances would be still larger, had stricter economy been observed in the Department, and had the Officer at its head in these Provinces, not illegally and improperly applied to his own private use and advantage, large sums of the Public Revenue, to which he had no right. From the Returns furnished by that Officer of his various emoluments, it appears, that he has received and appropriated to his own use, in the course of little more than six years, ending 1834, no less a sum than £9,550. 5s. 2d. Currency; which sum was paid for the transmission of Newspapers, Pamphlets, and other Printed Papers through the Post Office. The appropriation of these proceeds, to his own private emolument, the Deputy Post Master General states, "has been made under a privilege recognized by the Post Master General, since the earliest introduction of the Post Office system in the British Provinces;" but as it already has been well observed, by a Committee of Your Honorable House appointed in the Session of 1831-2, to enquire into the management of the Post Office Department in this Province, this assertion is at total variance with a Return, dated so late as 5th July, 1827, laid before the House of Commons, by the Secretary of the General Post Office, London, in which it is stated, "the fees, if any, being unknown in this Office, are not taken into the above account." From this it is evident, that the appropriation by the Deputy Post Master General to his own profit, of the proceeds derived from the forwarding Newspapers by mail, was a circumstance unknown to the Post Master General in England, at the date of the above Return. In the absence of any law, Your Committee cannot consider any sanction of the Secretary of the General Post Office, sufficient to authorize the Deputy Post Master General to appropriate such proceeds to his own use. The only other authority produced by the Officer in question, to support this appropriation, is the following Section of the Imperial Act, 4th Geo. III, Chap. 24, Section 6th, Anno 1763:

"And for as much as it hath been usual for the Clerks in the Offices of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and also for certain Officers in the Office of His Majesty's Post Master General, to frank Printed Votes and Proceedings in Parliament, and Printed Newspapers, to be sent by the Post; Be it therefore enacted by the authority aforesaid, that it shall and may be lawful for such Clerks and Officers as aforesaid, being thereunto licensed by His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, or His Majesty's Post Master General, respectively, to continue to frank such Printed Votes and Proceedings in Parliament, and Printed Newspapers, in such manner as they have heretofore been accustomed to frank the same; provided that such Printed Votes, Proceedings and Newspapers, shall be sent without covers, or in covers open at the sides."

The Act from which the above section is taken, it is worthy of remark, was passed to prevent frauds and abuses in relation to the sending and receiving of Letters and Packets free from the Duty of Postage. It provides, among other things, that "all Letters and Packets directed (among other Officers) to the Deputy of the Post Master General for His Majesty's Dominions in America, shall be exempt from Postage." This is all, in the above Act, which has reference to the Post Office in His Majesty's Dominions in America. In no part of the Act is there the least shadow of authority to empower the Deputy Post Master General to fix a rate of Postage on Newspapers in those Dominions, or to appropriate the same to his own use. Granting for a moment that Postage ought to be paid by Printers for the transmission of their Papers, Your Committee consider it a monstrous absurdity that the head of the Department should, in the absence of all Law, and to the great injury of the Revenue, presume to fix that rate, and to appropriate to his own private profit, emolument and advantage, the proceeds. The Deputy Post Master General contributes no part of the expense incurred for the transmission of those Papers. The Province pays the whole. Yet, in the face of these facts, the Officer in question not only continues, but has given Your Committee to understand that he will continue to exact the above Postage, and to appropriate it to his own private use has heretofore.

The Section of the Act of 1763, cited by the Deputy Post Master General in support of this gross fraud and abuse, in the opinion of Your Committee, is not of the slightest authority in the case, as the Deputy Post Master General in this Province does not come under either of these descriptions of Officers, not being a Clerk in the Office of the Secretary of State, nor a Clerk in the Office of the Post Master General, and the Imperial Parliament would certainly never have meant to act so absurdly as to give to certain Clerks in the Office of the Post Master General, so lucrative a monopoly as the whole proceeds of Newspaper postage collected in the United Kingdom, were the Newspaper Printers obliged, as they are in this Province, to pay a certain annual sum for having their Papers transmitted by mail.

The Deputy Post Master General would pretend that the large sums of the Public Revenue, which he thus disposes to his own personal advantage, are a *quantum meruit* which he receives from the Printers for certain services which he renders them. But Your Committee would respectfully submit, that this reasoning is perfectly fallacious, since it is not the Deputy Post Master General but the Province which defrays the expenses of transporting and carrying the said Newspapers, and of receiving and delivering them at the Post Offices. The monies paid to contractors for carrying the mails, and the salaries and remuneration of the respective Post Masters, and their Assistants and Clerks, are, with the exception of a certain per centage on the amount of Newspaper postage collected, paid from the gross receipts from Letter Postage.

The Deputy Post Master General contributes none of the expenses for the transport of the Mails, nor of the Salaries to the Post Masters or their Assistants. The public revenue is therefore taxed for his private advantage; a fact which is established beyond a doubt by the evidence of the Contractor who forwards the Mail between Quebec and Montreal, who admits that the Province is charged an extra sum of £200 a year, for the transport of Newspapers on this route alone.

The amount which the Deputy Post Master General acknowledges to have received from this source for the last three years, was as follows :—

being on an average £1906. 16s. 2d. currency, per annum, a sum which falls short only £400 of what is now paid for the transport of the Mail from Quebec to Kingston in Upper Canada five and six times a week, a distance of 379 miles.

Under all these circumstances Your Committee consider that the Deputy Post Master General had no right to appropriate to his own private advantage the sums received for the transmission of Newspapers and other printed papers by Mail in these Provinces, and respectfully suggest that legal means be taken to oblige that Officer to reimburse the said sum of £9550. 5s. 2d. currency, which he exacted and appropriated to his own use; the said sum when recovered to be divided in a proper proportion between Upper and Lower Canada; that he be obliged for the future to abstain from such practices; and to pay into the general fund the nett sum which shall be received from Newspaper printers, and for the transmission of Newspapers per Post, after deducting the Post Masters per centage, which general fund ought to be expended after the necessary expenses are paid, in extending Post Office accommodation in these Provinces, instead of being remitted to England, as is now the case.

Your Committee having already by Bill for the regulation of the Post Office in this Province, given their opinion as to the sum which ought to be allowed as the salary and sole remuneration of the person at the head of the Department, recommend that proper means be taken, in the event of that Bill not becoming Law, to limit the salary and annual compensation of that Officer within the bounds which Your Honorable House determined in sanctioning that Bill. The amount which he derives at present from his office is beyond all just proportion to the services performed. He has received on an average of the three years ending 1834, £3185. 5s. 2d. per annum, a sum nearly equal to that allowed to His Excellency the Governor in Chief,—three times more than the salary of any of the Puisné Judges in the Province—almost equal to the whole amount paid to all the Post Masters in Upper Canada put together, and a third more than the allowances received by all the Post Masters in this Province. The disproportion of the Deputy Post Master General's emoluments will be more evident when it is considered that he has moreover in the General Post Office, to assist him in the performance of the duties of his office, one Clerk at £150 sterling per annum, an Accountant at £300 sterling per annum, two Clerks to ditto, one at £150 sterling per annum, and the other at £100 sterling, and a Messenger.

This Establishment, in the opinion of Your Committee, is more than is necessary for the wants of the Department, and ought to be reduced to the scale provided in the Bill passed by Your Honorable House. It was formed originally by the Post Master General under the impression that the Post Office Bill for the British North American Provinces, which was prepared in England and submitted to the respective Legislatures by Mr. Secretary Rice, would have met the approbation of these Legislatures. By that Bill the Post Office of all these Colonies was to be under one head at Quebec, and, to be prepared for the great increase of business consequent upon such a change, the Establishment of the General Post Office at Quebec was increased. As it is now certain that all the Colonies will never concur in the proposed consolidation measure, the Quebec Establishment ought to be reduced to the scale above proposed.—The Accountant branch is moreover, in the opinion of Your Committee, altogether inadequate to the purposes for which its establishment was intended, the Accountant being dependent in a great degree on the good will of the Deputy Post Master General for his continuance in office. Under these circumstances, no proper check can be expected.

Your Committee have in the course of their enquiry learnt that the Post Master at Quebec is at the same time Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod to the Legislative Council; these two situations are, in the opinion of Your Committee, perfectly incompatible.—They therefore recommend that the Post Master at Quebec, be called on to choose between these two situations, the public service requiring that the Post Master be in constant attendance at his office to superintend the responsible and important duties thereof.

Your Committee have next to call the attention of Your Honorable House to the gross discrepancies between the Return made to Your Committee, and that made to the Provincial Government as stated in the Blue Book, by the Deputy Post Master General of his Salary and Emoluments of office. Your Honorable House will be better able to judge of the extent to which that Officer has deceived the King's Government by an examination of the following comparative Statement from Returns laid before Your Committee, and those furnished by Mr. Stayner, for the Blue Book for the years 1831, 1832, 1833 and 1834 :—

In the Blue Books for the years 1831, 1832 and 1833 to the question whether "he enjoy any and what other profit or advantage not required to be stated in the preceding columns," the word "none" is opposite Mr. Stayner's name: the following note however is at the foot of the page :— "£200 per annum is allowed to the Deputy Post Master General for an Assistant in his office, his fees are derived from Printers who pay him for their papers sent through " the

"the Post Office, and distributed by his Deputies." The amount of these fees Your Committee would however remark is not furnished, neither is there any mention of the Commission, or United States Postage which he receives, and which amounts on an average of the last three years to £478. 5s. 2d. per annum.—In the Return sent in for the Blue Book for the year 1834 (a Copy of which will be found in the Appendix of this Report,) Mr. Stayner states that he receives "no fees"; and in answer to the query whether he enjoys any or what other advantage or profit, he states that "I possess the privilege of sending certain description of Newspapers through the Posts in the British American Provinces. The profit derived from this source I have not at present the means of computing for the year 1834." "I have received at the rate of £200 a year, for Assistants up to the 5th October 1834."

It is evident from those several extracts from the Returns furnished by the Deputy Post Master General for the information of His Majesty's Government, that this Officer by withholding the full and correct information required, has deceived the King's Government as to the extent and amount of his emoluments of office.

In thoroughly investigating the affairs of this Department, the labors of Your Committee have been much impeded by the carelessness of which some of the Officers of the Department have been guilty in regard to the regular keeping of Books. Mr. Sutherland, the predecessor of the present Deputy Post Master General, Your Committee is informed, "kept no Books of Accounts whatever," and certain Statements which have been furnished to Your Committee are imperfect owing to the circumstance that "the Books of Mails received, kept by the late Post Master at Quebec (Bignell) for certain periods, cannot be found." Similar carelessness on the part of the Post Master at Montreal prior to July 1828 seems to have prevailed.

Your Committee would suggest that the Books of the several Officers should be for the future considered the property of the Department and not of the person in charge, and that the Books be, on a change of Officers, handed over to the head of the Department, and a proper receipt taken for the same.

Your Committee directed much of their attention to the present state of the Post Office accommodation in this Province, and the further extension thereof as required by the wants and numbers of the population. The number of Post Offices in both the Canadas, in the years,

In order to ascertain the number of the new Post Offices required in this Province, Your Committee addressed circulars to the several Members of Your Honorable House, from whose answers they have compiled several Tables. The immediate establishment of a large number of new Post Offices is immediately required in this Province for the public accommodation in the following places:—

- In *Ancienne Lorette*, in the County of Quebec.
- In *St. Augustin, Pointe aux Trembles, Ste. Catherine de Fossambault, Les Ecurcuis, Deschambeault* and *Grondines*, in the County of Portneuf.
- In *Batiscau* and *Champlain*, in the County of Champlain.
- In *Pointe du Lac*, County of St. Maurice.
- In *Maskinongé, Ste. Melanie, Lanoraye* and *Lavaltrie*, in the County of Berthier.
- In *Lachenaye* and *Répentigny (bout de l'Isle)*, County of Lachenaye.
- In *Pointe aux Trembles, St. Laurent, Sault aux Recollets* and *Ste. Geneviève*, County of Montreal.
- In *St. Martin, St. Vincent de Paul, and Ste. Thérèse*, in the County of Terrebonne.
- In *St. Scholastique*, in the County of Two Mountains.
- In the *Cedars, Point Fortune, Pointe à Cavagnol* (the Schneider's), *St. Polycarpe* and *Isle Perrot*, in the County of Vaudreuil.
- In *Contrecoeur*, County of Verchères.
- In *Grande Grève, Gaspé Basin, Point St. Peter, Percé, Grand River, New Port, Ristigouche, Maria, River Capland, Paspébiac, Hopetown, Port Daniel*, in the Counties of Gaspé and Bonaventure.
- In *Métis, St. Simon, Le Bic* and *Matauc*, in the County of Rimouski.
- In *Cap St. Ignace*, in the County of l'Islet.
- In *St. Joseph* and *St. François*, in the County of Beauce.
- In *St. Henry*, in the County of Dorchester.
- In *St. Jean Baptiste Deschailons* and *St. Sylvestre*, in the County of Lotbinière.
- In *Pointe aux Sables*, in the County of Nicolet.
- In *Longueuil* and *St. Luc*, in the County of Chambly.
- In *St. Athanase* and *St. Jean Baptiste*, in the County of Rouville.
- In *St. Pie* and *St. Hugues*, in the County of St. Hyacinthe.
- In *St. Paschal*, in the County of Kamouraska.
- In *St. Michel* and *St. Gervais*, in the County of Bellechasse.
- In *East Stanbridge* and *Sutton*, in the County of Missiskoui.

The greater number of these Offices may readily be established without incurring any additional expense, the places for which they are required being, with the exception of those in Gaspé and Bonaventure, on or in the neighbourhood of Post Roads already established. The degree of neglect in the Deputy Post Master General to extend Post Office accommodation may at once be perceived from the fact that only eight Post Offices have been established along the grand Mail Route between Quebec and Montreal, although there are a great many old and flourishing Villages between these two Cities, through which the Mail passes at present ten times a week. Your Honorable House ought to insist that Post Offices be established forthwith in each of the Villages above mentioned, and also that Mails be transmitted along the South Shore of the River St. Lawrence above and below Quebec more than once a week. The Island of Montreal, and the Settlements on the banks of the Ottawa, and to the north of that River, require additional Mails, and in many places new Post Offices.

Your Committee consider it particularly their duty to call the attention of Your Honorable House to the condition of the District of Gaspé, which is and has always been in a manner altogether destitute of Post Office accommodation. From the answers of the Members of that District, it appears that there is but one Post Office in the whole of the County of Gaspé, and but very few in the County of Bonaventure. The Deputy Post Master General ascribes the cause to the impassable state of the Road between Mitis and the Ristigouche River (Baie des Chaleurs,) in consequence of which Letters addressed for Gaspé, are now sent through New Brunswick. No Mails are made up regularly at Quebec for Gaspé at present, the correspondence between that, as well as the greater part of the adjoining County, with the other parts of the Province, is thus very much impeded.

Your Committee, perceiving that the Standing Committee on Roads have in their Second Report, now under the consideration of Your Honorable House, recommended the grant of a sum of money to improve and complete the Road from Mitis to the Ristigouche, and an additional sum for the maintenance of certain Posts for the relief of Travellers on the same line, will abstain from making any remarks on this subject.

By reference to a Statement hereunto annexed, a list will be found of various applications which have been made to the Deputy Post Master General since his return from England for the establishment of new Post Offices in this Province. Several of these applications Your Committee regret have not as yet been attended to by that Officer, and much complaint has in consequence been created.

In a Letter addressed by that Officer to the Secretary of the General Post Office, England, dated 15th March, 1835, he gives it as his opinion, that the Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada, require at this time not less than 500 new Post Offices, and that in ten years hence they will need 1000 at least. He complains, however, that being situated from 500 to 1000 miles from the source of application he cannot do justice to the consideration of the questions arising from the numerous applications for increased Post Office accommodation, with which his desk is covered. This acknowledgment on the part of the head of the Post Office Department in these Provinces, together with the knowledge of the fact that Upper Canada would insist on a separate Post Office Establishment independent of the other Provinces, under the direction and control of a local Provincial Post Master General, and other weighty reasons which it is unnecessary here to detail, induced Your Committee to recommend a distinct Post Office Establishment under the control and management of a local Provincial Post Master General also for this Province, which arrangement was provided for in the Bill which Your Committee had the honor to submit for the consideration of, and which was approved by, Your Honorable House.—It only remains therefore for Your Committee to hope that the said Bill will meet with the approbation of the other branches of the Legislature.—Your Committee have likewise turned their attention to the loss experienced by the Revenue by their present practice of sending Letters by the Steamboats during the season of the navigation between Quebec and Montreal. That loss is calculated to amount to at least £2500 per annum. Your Honorable House having in the Post Office Bill, lately passed, provided remedy, as far as it was in your power, to this great loss to the Revenue, the responsibility of such loss, if that Bill do not become Law, must fall upon that branch of the Legislature which refuses to sanction the remedy proposed.

United States Postage. The following Statement drawn up by Your Committee, shews the amount of United States Postage collected in the Canadas for the three years ending in 1834, and the compensation derived from collecting the same, and the Deputy Post Master General's proportion of the latter :—

The sums of money irrecoverably lost in transmission through the Post in the Canadas, from January 1833 to October 1835, amount to nearly £700. Your Committee having made a special Report already on this head abstain from making any further remark thereon, further than to recommend that the Deputy Post Master General may make the proper arrangements to prevent the recurrence of similar losses to the public.

It was the intention of Your Committee to have laid before Your Honorable House a series of Statistical information as to the number of sheets of Newspapers printed within these Provinces, as well as of the number of sheets of United States papers received therein. With this view they caused circulars to be addressed to the several Newspaper printers and Post Masters in both Provinces, who were requested to reply to Queries addressed to them by order of Your Committee.

The interesting object Your Committee had in view, has, they regret to say, been entirely frustrated by the unwillingness and refusal of most of those to whom those circulars were addressed, to give the full information which Your Committee desired to obtain. It is to be hoped however that when this subject is again taken up, that the enquiry will meet with a more favorable result.

In the course of their enquiry Your Committee referred, as in duty bound, to the Reports of, and the evidence taken by, preceding Committees of Your Honorable House, relative to the Post Office Department, and have been much struck with the pertinacity with which the Deputy Post Master General refused to give those Committees any information relative to the finances of the Department, and the amount of his Emoluments; and must remark, that much of their labor

labor and trouble would have been spared, had that Officer given the information which was required from him frankly and honestly as he ought to have done, instead of having recourse to mystery and concealment which could only excite suspicions to his disparagement. From certain parts of the correspondence between that Officer and the Secretary of the Department in London, which has come under the observation of Your Committee, it appears that previous to being called before the Committee of Your Honorable House in 1831, Mr. Stayner pre-determined to withhold every information of any value relative to his Department which he expected might be demanded of him by the Committee. In order to be supported in this improper determination, he waited on the late Governor in Chief, as appears by a Letter dated 15th June, 1831, which he addressed to the Secretary of the Post Office, "to solicit His Lordship's advice." His Lordship he states concurred with him in the view which he had taken beforehand, and the requisite information was withheld. He then goes on add, "I therefore chose rather to incur the risk of displeasing the Provincial Parliament than to be an instrument of giving trouble to those authorities to whom I consider my first duties are engaged;" a rather strange contradiction with the professions of the Deputy Post Master General a few months before, when he stated that "his ambition was to put the Department on such a footing as would ensure to him the public approbation here." The acts of the Deputy Post Master General are the best commentary on these professions:—On the 29th December, 1835, he told Your Committee that he conceived it his duty to afford, to all parts of the Province, Post accommodation, to the extent of the funds at his disposal. How did he dispose of those funds? On the 20th of February following he remitted eight thousand dollars to England.—In the Letter above mentioned to the head of the Department in England, the Deputy Post Master General permits himself to make some unjust reflections on the Committee of 1831, and to accuse them of suppressing "some very important parts of his evidence." Your Committee have taken the pains to examine the records of 1831, in order to see if this grave charge brought by Mr. Stayner against the Committee of that day be founded or not. The parts of this evidence which he states were suppressed consist of a Letter dated 18th March, 1831. The "important" information which it contains consists in stating that "Newspaper Editors in this Province receive their exchange papers free of postage;" a fact which was already in the knowledge of every person in the community, and that there was a Deputy Post Master General in Canada, in 1775. This information is wrapt up in a mass of unnecessary verbiage which however "important" in the writer's estimation, was properly of no moment in that of the Committee. The communication referred to will be found in the Appendix to this Report.

Your Committee would respectfully submit, that Public Officers should be obliged when performing their public duties, to abstain for the future from remarks which cannot answer any good purpose, and which must at best be both ill-timed and ill-placed. The duty of the Deputy Post Master General here is merely to accommodate the public as far as his means permit, and to give all the information in his power when called on so to do, and his time can always be better employed in the performance of the duties of his office than in writing dispatches reflecting on superior authority, or in endeavouring to protect himself and his Department from that wholesome scrutiny which they stand so much in need of.

Your Committee would not have alluded to this matter, were it not that they perceived in a Letter from that Officer to Mr. Freeling, dated 29th March, 1835, a latent desire to act by the House of Assembly of Upper Canada, in the same manner that he for two Sessions acted towards Committees of Your Honorable House. It is to be hoped, however, that firmness on the part of Your Honorable House, and a determination on the part of His Majesty's Government to discountenance a repetition of such improper conduct in Public Officers, will put an end for ever to that concealment which has, until now, so constantly enveloped the affairs of the Post Office Department.

Much remains yet to be done, in order to arrive at a proper opinion of the state of that Department, and especially of its financial concerns. This, however, must be the work of time, patience and close investigation.

Wherefore Your Committee respectfully recommend to Your Honorable House to continue, next Session, the enquiry into the condition of the Post Office Department, with a view to the application of an efficient remedy to the defects in its organization and management.

All which is nevertheless humbly submitted.

MINUTES OF EVIDENCE.

Friday, 13th November, 1835.

EDMUND B. O'CALLAGHAN, Esquire, in the Chair.

William Lyon McKenzie, Esquire, Member of the Assembly of Upper Canada, called in; and examined:—

- 1.—Can you give the Committee any information relative to the Post Office Department in the Canadas?—There are many complaints in Upper Canada against the Post Office Department.
- 2.—What are the complaints made by the People of Upper Canada against the Post Office Department, as now constituted?—The opinion of the House of Assembly is, and I believe it has always been, that the Post Office Department, as now constituted, is an unlawful establishment; it monopolizes the conveyance of epistolary correspondence, which it taxes heavily, and appropriates the proceeds here and in England, without the knowledge and consent of the House of Assembly; it regulates at its will the number of Post Masters, and the rates of their Salaries or Emoluments; selects and dismisses the incumbents at its pleasure; determines the roads on which the mail shall pass, and the places at which there shall be mail accommodation, and who shall carry the mails, and at what rates they shall be carried; it resolves that one section of country, although thickly settled, shall have

no Post Offices, and that another section almost destitute of inhabitants, shall nevertheless have regular mails, according to its caprice, it decides that one place shall have a daily mail, another a weekly mail, another only semi-weekly, and so on; it taxes Newspapers and other Printed Papers such a sum per annum, as it thinks fit, and this sum the Deputy Post Master General chooses to consider his perquisite, whatever may be its amount, obliging the parties who mail their correspondence to pay, or ordering, if it thinks fit, that their journals shall no longer pass in the mails; in short, it is a very bad substitute for a Provincial Post Office, which would be regulated by Law, and the revenue appropriated (as all the revenue of a Colony ought to be) under the authority of the Legislature. My first attempt to obtain a better order of things in Upper Canada, was in 1826; in January that year, the House of Assembly addressed the King, stating that the clause from the 18th of George III, introduced into the 31st of the same Reign, which directs that all monies raised in Upper Canada are to be accounted for before the House of Assembly, and to be appropriated by that House, was by them held to be a fundamental part of the Constitution; that the Post Office Department raised money in Upper Canada contrary to the spirit of the said 31st Geo. 3rd, clauses 46th and 47th; and that in order to prevent abuses, found to exist, facilitate commercial intercourse, and promote the diffusion of knowledge, a Provincial Post Office, responsible to the constituted authorities in Upper Canada, would be the fitting remedy. His Majesty returned no answer to this Address. In 1829, I was Chairman of a Committee of the House of Assembly to enquire into the state of the Post Office Department, but Mr. Stayner would not transmit information concerning his receipts and expenditures; other efforts have been made since then, both in Upper and Lower Canada, to improve the system; and in England in 1832, the question was brought before the House of Commons, by the Petition of many thousands of the Colonists complaining of a British interference contrary to Law; this was followed up by strong representations to the Colonial Department by Mr. Viger and myself; we had severally interviews with Members of the British Government on the subject, and at last it was determined to send for Mr. Stayner to London; he handed to Sir F. Freeling, certain details of the Revenue of the Post Office, which were laid before Parliament in Answer to an Address moved by Mr. Hume. Mr. Stayner exhibited great unwillingness to tell either the British Parliament or the Upper Canada Legislature, what the Revenue was, and last winter the House of Assembly of Upper Canada referred the Post Office question to the Committee on Grievances, which reported an Address to His Excellency for information, no part of which was obtained during that Session, although it lasted nearly two months after the Address had been sent up to the Lieutenant Governor. Copy of that Address; His Excellency's reply, and Mr. Stayner's answer, I now deliver to the Committee.

[The Witness delivered in the same.]

Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of Upper Canada, for information relative to the Post Office Department.

To His Excellency Sir John Colborne, K. C. B. Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Upper Canada, Major General Commanding His Majesty's Forces therein, &c. &c. &c.

May it please Your Excellency:

We, His Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Commons of Upper Canada, in Provincial Parliament assembled, humbly request that Your Excellency will be pleased to obtain from the Deputy Post Master General at Quebec, and that there be laid before this House, for its information, at as early a period in the present Session as the nature of the enquiry will admit of:

A Return of the Establishment of the General Post Office in Upper and Lower Canada, and in each of the other Colonies in North America, for the years 1832, 1833, and 1834, stating the number of Post Masters and Deputy Post Masters in each Province, the amount of Salary, Allowances, and Emoluments; and the name of each Post Master and Deputy Post Master in Upper Canada, shewing the Salary, Allowances, Fees, and the whole income they severally received, and from what sources it is derived, and the authority under which the same is paid them; stating also the gross amount of Revenue collected at each Post Office in Upper Canada, and the whole expense of collecting the same; with the Contingent Expenses incurred in the Canadas in detail, so far as it can be shewn; particularly the expense of conveying the Mails, with the name of each Mail Contractor, the amount received by him, and the rates at which the Mails are conveyed.

A Return of the gross amount of Postage in Upper and Lower Canada, and each of the other Colonies in North America, distinguishing each, during each of the years 1832, 1833, and 1834; distinguishing also the amount of Newspaper and Pamphlet Postage charged, from the amount of Letter Postage received at each Office, and shewing in what manner the proceeds have been applied.

A Statement of the gross amount of Newspaper Postage paid by each Printer or Proprietor of Newspapers in the Canadas and other Colonies in North America, in each of the years 1832, 1833, and 1834, shewing in what manner the proceeds have been appropriated, with copy of any Orders, Despatches, or other Authority under which such Postages have been exacted in the Colonies during the last ten years.

A Statement shewing in detail the Emoluments of the Deputy Post Master General of British North America, whether from Salary, Fees, Allowances, Newspaper Postages, Pamphlet Postages, per centages on the collection of the United States Letter or Newspaper Postage, or from any other source whatever, during the years 1832, 1833, and 1834, and shewing the authority under which he receives the several items of income.

A Statement shewing the Postage paid by the Patriot Newspaper, first published at Kingston, and in Toronto from the commencement of the series, with the dates of the several payments.

A Statement shewing the sums remitted by the General Post Office Department in Canada, and the other British Colonies, to the General Post Office, London, and also the United States Postage, remitted to the Post Office Department of the United States, in and for the years 1827, 1828, 1829, 1830, 1831, 1832, 1833, and 1834; and stating the balance now in the hands of the Deputy Post Master General at Quebec, and the period up to which the last remittance to London was made.

A Statement of the amount of monies found in the dead, or misdirected Letters in the British Colonies in North America, from 1827 to 1834, both years inclusive, and shewing the purposes to which it has been applied.

A Statement of the amount of Colonial Postage, whether on Letters or Newspapers, charged at Quebec and Halifax, to the Department in London, and collected, or intended so to be, in England or other parts of the King's Dominions beyond North America, for 1832, 1833, and 1834.

A Return shewing the several classes of persons who frank Letters, or who have the privilege of transmitting Letters through the Post Office at reduced rates of Postage, with the extent to which their privileges extend.

Had it been practicable to make out a separate and distinct Statement of the Revenue raised by taxation in the Post Office Department in this Colony, with the expenditure, we would have confined our enquiries to Upper Canada; but as the amounts of the several Colonies are blended together, we have requested such information as would shew the effects of the system now in operation, and which it has been recommended to us to alter and amend.

Copy of a Letter from the Deputy Post Master General to Lieutenant Colonel Rowen :

GENERAL POST OFFICE,
Quebec, 6th March, 1835.

SIR,

I hasten to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 26th February, enclosing copy of an Address from the House of Assembly of Upper Canada, respecting the Post Office Department under my charge, and requesting me, by command of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, to furnish, for the information of the Assembly, the Returns required by them as soon as possible.

I beg leave, in answer to your communication, to inform you, for the information of His Excellency, that I shall immediately set about collecting and compiling the great amount of information required, or as much of it as the means at my disposal will enable me to obtain; but, as an act of justice to myself and to prevent disappointment, should the voluminous Returns called for not be ready so soon as might have been expected, I must observe that the task prepared for me is a heavier one than can be imagined by any one not conversant with the subject, and will, with my very limited assistance, and the necessity of keeping the current duties of the Department going, necessarily occupy a considerable length of time.

3.—What knowledge have you, that the Deputy Post Master General (Mr. Stayner) appropriates to his own use, the Revenues arising from the transmission of Newspapers and other printed papers through the Post Office?—The Returns ordered by the House of Commons of Great Britain and Ireland, to be printed, July 10th, 1833, shew that such is the case.—(*Appendix No. 1.*)

4.—Is the Newspaper Postage charged equally and impartially to the Journalists in Upper Canada, according to the tariff of postages made by the Department?—No, it is not. At first I mailed my Newspapers, when a Newspaper Proprietor, according to the quantity sent. After I had been in England, and had seen Mr. Stayner's Return of Newspaper Postages, I changed my course, and entered only a part of the impression sent, and stated to Mr. Howard, the Post Master, and through the Press, that I had done so. When I retired from all connexion with the Press, I refused to pay Mr. Howard the balance of Postage due on the Newspapers I had last mailed, amounting to about £40, and he placed the alleged debt in the hands of Lawyer Draper for collection. I instructed my Attorney to say, that if Mr. Stayner would, in good faith, allow the question to come before a Jury in the Court of King's Bench, in Toronto, where I live, he might employ all the Counsel (Advocates) in the Colony, to support his demand, if he thought fit; that I would employ no Lawyer, and if a Jury could be persuaded that a verdict ought to be given against me, I would instantly pay the demand and all expenses. This course Mr. Stayner thought proper to decline; but I will never pay him a shilling until he brings his claim before a Jury, and I think he ought to do that, or admit it to have been unjust. While I remained connected with the Press I durst not have questioned the justice of his demands, for he could have retaliated, as he has done with others, by ordering his Deputies to refuse to mail the papers, except as Letters, until the postage was paid. There is no uniformity in the mode of collecting Newspaper Postage—some paying only for half their circulation, and others nothing at all—while a third class pay the full rates. Dr. Barker, Editor of the *Whig*, at Kingston, wrote me on the 16th of February last, that, although he returned only seventy five subscribers weekly to the Post Office, he mailed four hundred; that the *Chronicle* returned sixty and mailed three hundred, and the *Spectator* returned forty and mailed one hundred and forty. The *Kingston Chronicle*, in its comments upon the returns made by Mr. Stayner of his perquisites, mentioned that the *Montreal Gazette*, with a circulation nearer to two thousand than two hundred and fifty, entered and paid only for the smaller number, and that it, the *Chronicle*, in adopting the same ratio, felt consoled that with its humble offering of £10 annually for Postage, it had nevertheless a very comfortable subscription list. Mr. Radcliffe, who was for a long time Editor of the *Reformer*, informed me that for several years he paid no Newspaper Postage. Dr. Fisher, of this City, stated before a Committee of this House, that the Post Master General, Mr. Sutherland, compromised the postage of the *Albion*, and agreed to take 2s. 6d., while other people were paying 4s. I tried to ascertain that fact at the time the arrangement was in existence, but could not then obtain proof. It appears by the Returns made by Mr. Stayner to England, that his perquisites, from the *Guardian* alone, in one year, amounted to £227. I might state many more cases of partial and unequal exactions, under colour of laws which never had an existence, but perhaps these will suffice. So far as I can form a judgment from his whole conduct, Mr. Stayner has had recourse to every possible method by which he could hope to retain and conceal his illegal demands on the Canadian public, and prevent the Department of the Post Office from becoming efficient for the public service, and fully responsible to the country.

Copy of a Letter from Daniel Sutherland, Esquire, Deputy Post Master General, to William Lyon McKenzie, Esquire,

Quebec, 1st June, 1834.

SIR,

I have to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of 18th ultimo, relative to the conveyance of Newspapers through the Post Office, and suggesting improvements, which I am not authorized to adopt, suffice it to say, that I think myself very fortunate, if I can follow the plan laid down by my superiors, into effect, through so very new and so very extensive a country.

All Weekly Newspapers printed on one sheet, once a week, are charged at the rate of 4s. each, per annum, and payable quarterly, by the Printers, and if twice, on one or a half sheet, 5s., and payable in same way. It is easier for the proprietor to collect the postage along with the subscriptions, than for the Post Master to receive about one penny on each, from such a number of persons, and keep a distinct account thereof, many of whom perhaps do not go to the Post Office once in six months. No person in the Colonies is exempt from paying postage, except the Officers of the Post Office, and no Newspapers either going to or coming from Great Britain, are exempt from paying *Packet Postage*, unless franked by Mr. Freeling. Members of the Imperial Parliament have no right to frank out of the Kingdom, and papers addressed to them would be subject to *Packet Postage*. Post Masters have a right to send and receive their own Colonial Letters, free of Postage, but not to frank those of strangers. Papers from the United States, passing through our Post Office, are liable to pay one penny each for the transport, and which must necessarily be received from the persons to whom they are directed or delivered.

It cannot be necessary for me to point out the difference between Great Britain and this Country, in the one, scarcely any thing but Turnpike Roads, and in the other, when Roads at certain seasons of the year are nearly impassible, by either man or

horse,

horse, and if the Portmanteaus are stuffed full of Newspapers, or Printed Papers, to the exclusion of all epistolary correspondence, how would the expenses of the Couriers, or Mail Carriers, be defrayed?—I do not mean by this to throw any obstacle in the way of increasing the number of Newspapers throughout the Canadas—very far from it, I would much rather encourage their circulation; but it must be evident to you, that at present, there are many insurmountable difficulties in the way.

Saturday, 14th November, 1835.

Thomas Allen Stayner, Esquire, called in; and examined:—

The Witness having been asked to produce the several Returns required by the Order of the Committee, dated yesterday, replied that the said Returns are not all complete, but shall be prepared to produce such as are ready on Monday next. The remainder of the Documents required, or such as it is possible to produce, will be ready on Monday week.

1.—Are the Townships, Parishes, and principal Villages of Upper and Lower Canada accommodated with Post Offices at convenient distances?—In many parts, I conceive that they are, but in a great many other portions, owing principally to the rapid spread of population of late years, there are portions which are not, as yet, sufficiently accommodated; but I am using every exertion to supply the wants of every portion of these Provinces. I beg here to observe that my long detention in England, on business of the Department in the years 1833 and 1834, interfered very seriously with the increase of Post accommodation in the Country, as during that interval it was not possible for the persons left in the temporary charge of the Department by me, to attend to that branch of duty, it being one demanding the exercise of a degree of judgment, and particular knowledge of the localities of the Country, which could not be found, except in a person possessing the advantage of a long experience and study.

2.—Please furnish a Return of the Names of the several Parishes, Townships and other places in Upper and Lower Canada in which Post Offices are at present established, the dates of their establishment, and the authority under which the same were created, with the distances of each Post Office from Quebec, and the rates of Postage charged on Single Letters by the present Tariff?—The Witness will be happy to furnish the information required, to the best of his ability.

3.—What are your special instructions to the several Post Masters in the Canadas, with regard to Office hours; and can you place before this Committee any general Code of instructions made out by you, or by the Department, for the guidance of Deputy Post Masters, Mail Contractors and others?—My instructions with regard to Office hours are contained in a Book of Instructions to my Deputies—Article XXIV. This Book I shall be happy to lay before the Committee.—Instructions for the government of Mail Contractors and their servants, are for the most part contained in the form of contract subscribed to by them,—and by an Oath of Office or Affirmation taken by every Post Master or Mail Driver—one copy of which is left with him for his government. Copies of these instruments I shall lay before the Committee.

4.—Do you think the compensation now made to Country Post Masters, sufficient to remunerate them for their trouble, especially that of delivering Newspapers and other Printed Papers?—I think that, generally speaking, Country Post Masters are not sufficiently remunerated for their trouble. They receive an allowance of 20 per cent. on the net Letter Postage collected; and at many Offices the receipts are so small, that if a Post Master were paid the whole amount of Postage collected by him, as a personal compensation, it might even then be said that he is badly paid, compared to what he might make by his labour in other pursuits. As regards compensation to Post Masters for delivering Newspapers and other Printed Papers, I beg to explain that, on all such Papers mailed at their Offices, and the transmission of which, (under my privilege) is paid for at the time of posting, the Post Masters are compensated by me, generally in the same ratio that they are compensated for their trouble with Letters—but for delivering out Newspapers which reach them from other Offices, they receive no compensation. It may not be improper here to remark, that the privilege of free Postage enjoyed by them to a certain extent, is in many cases, considered by Post Masters as the chief reward for their services, and I believe it is with many the principal reason for taking and holding Office; but this advantage operates unequally. With Country Merchants it is of great importance, whereas with persons of limited correspondence, the advantage is often trifling.

5.—Will you state to the Committee to what extent this free Postage extends, as applied to Country Post Masters?—The privilege is the same with all Post Masters, they are allowed to receive free and to frank Double Letters, or half ounce Packages, on their own business.

6.—By what law or instruction is a certain limit fixed to the privilege of Post Masters;—if any, from what source does it proceed?—It is a Regulation originating with the Post Master General, and arising out of the peculiar circumstances of the country,—in short the impossibility, as it was supposed, of procuring Post Masters, and conducting a Post Office Establishment, without allowing to Post Masters the right of free Postage for their personal correspondence. I beg to add that I am not in possession of the original authority containing the Regulation in question, nor of any Order from the Post Master General on the subject. When I was appointed to my present situation in the Department, I found the right of franking greatly abused by Post Masters, and I have been obliged to issue orders, forbidding them to frank or to receive free Packages, exceeding the limits above described.

7.—The Committee are then to understand that you have no authority to impose limits to this privilege, except your own?—I do not consider, from any thing I have said, that it is to be inferred I have arrogated to myself the right of fixing limits to the privilege of Post Masters in this matter. I meant not to convey such an idea. It was explained to me by my predecessor, the late Mr. Sutherland, upon my assuming my present Office, that Post Masters had always enjoyed the right of free Postage, the understanding being, however, that the limits should be half an ounce. I soon discovered that this limit was disregarded by many Post Masters, and that the Province was seriously injured thereby, and as soon as possible, I endeavoured to put a stop to the abuse. When I published a book of printed Instructions, for the guidance of my Deputies; I inserted an Article on the subject of this privilege, and I sent a copy of that book of Instructions to the Post Master General, of which I was given to understand His Lordship approved.

8.—Will you lay before the Committee, Copies of your Instructions to Post Masters for their guidance in franking; and also state to the Committee how, and by whom, you were given to understand that the Post Master General had approved of such Instructions?—I will lay before the Committee Copies of my Instructions to Post Masters for their guidance relating to franking. With respect to the approval of those Instructions by the Post Master General, I never received any written signification to that effect, but in my frequent conversations with the Duke of Richmond, the late Post Master General, and the Secretary of the General Post Office, in 1833 and 1834, the subject of the franking privilege enjoyed by Post Masters in the Provinces was frequently discussed, amongst other matters connected with the interior economy of the Department, when I fully explained all that had ever taken place in reference to it. Those Officers appeared to think that I had acted with judgment and zeal in what I had done.

9.—Then the Committee are to understand that you have no written or documentary authority, in regard to the limits which you have fixed to the franking privilege?—Yes.

10.—What was the authority upon which the late Mr. Sutherland gave you to understand that Post Masters had enjoyed a right to the privilege of franking and receiving letters, to a certain extent, free of Postage?—The late Mr. Sutherland gave me to understand what I have had the honor to state to the Committee in my answers to questions Nos. 6 and 7, namely, that it was upon the authority of the Post Master General, and (as he believed) coeval with the formation of the Post Office Establishment in the Colonies. He had never seen any written or printed authority for it, but had pursued the practice as he found it when he was appointed Deputy Post Master General. I recollect also that Mr. Sutherland informed me that when he was in England, in 1827, he had some conversation with the Post Office authorities there, upon this subject, with the view of endeavouring to devise some plan for a change in a system which he thought a bad one, but that nothing was decided upon.

11.—Are you acquainted with the Regulations in force in Great Britain and Ireland on the foregoing subject; and whether the Post Masters, or persons in charge of Post Offices in those countries, enjoy the same privileges as those referred to in the preceding answers?—In Great Britain and Ireland, the Deputies, as they are called, *i. e.* Post Masters, do not possess a franking privilege, corresponding with that enjoyed by Post Masters in this country. They have the right (I believe) of sending and receiving free, all their correspondence on the public business of the Department. Post Masters in those countries receive a fixed compensation for their services, in the shape of an annual stipend; and, as regards their private correspondence, possess no advantages over the public at large.

12.—Will you have the goodness to shew this Committee the law by authority of which you levy a tax upon Newspapers and other Printed Papers, transmitted through the Post Office?—I cannot produce a Law by authority of which I make a charge for transmitting Newspapers and other Printed Papers through the Post Office. The grounds, however, under which I have exercised the right of receiving a consideration for transmitting such Papers, and of appropriating that consideration as an emolument to myself, will be found explained in one of the Statements which I am called upon by the Committee to lay before it.

13.—Can you exercise any right in collecting taxes on Newspapers not recognized or sanctioned by Law; or do you conceive that any usage, precedent, or custom can give you a right to tax any portion of His Majesty's subjects without the express consent of Parliament?—To answer this question in one word, I would say "No," that is, I have no right to lay any tax not sanctioned by Law; but I have always believed that the Post Master General of England, in permitting his Deputy in this Country to send Newspapers through the Post for a compensation to himself, was borne out by Law. I cannot with confidence point to that Law, and say, "this is the authority," but there is an Act in the Post Office Law passed in the 4th year of George the 3d, chapter 24, which has struck me as being the ground upon which the Post Master General has exercised the right in question, and under which the successive Deputy Post Masters General of these Provinces have enjoyed the benefit thereof;—the section of the Act, which I allude to, I will lay before the Committee, without, however, presuming to say that it is the authority which governed the Head of the General Post Office in conferring the privilege. It may not, I trust, be deemed out of place, if I here observe that the Deputy Post Master General in Jamaica, (in which Country the same Post Office Laws prevail, which at present govern us here) possesses the exclusive right of sending Newspapers by the Posts in that Island,—and derives a personal emolument therefrom:—neither will it, I hope, be thought improper in me to observe, that but for the exercise of this right, or privilege, in either Country, the circulation of Newspapers by the Post would have been virtually prohibited, since the alternative would be to send them charged with Postage as Letters.

14.—How can that Law be applied to the Canadas; has it any reference specially to them?—The Committee will be enabled to judge, when I lay it before them. It refers, I conceive, to certain Deputies of the Post Master General in all Countries,

Countries, and I believe that I am one of those meant to be included; but as I have already observed, I cannot undertake to say, that this has been the Post Master General's authority. That Officer is the only person perhaps who can conclusively refer to the *authority* under which he has acted.

15.—If you conceive that you have a right, by virtue of any Act of Parliament, to impose a Postage on Newspapers, do you conceive that you have also a similar right to fix the rate thereof according to your own discretion, and to appropriate the amount imposed by you on their transmission to your own private advantage?—I conceive that I have the right of arranging with Printers and others who wish to send their Papers under my privilege, the measure of compensation to be allowed me for rendering them that service. I cannot, nor do not, exact this tax or whatever else it may be called, in the ordinary meaning of the term "exact," but it has been mutually agreed upon as a *quantum meruit* to the Deputy Post Master General for rendering the service; and that Printers have found it the cheapest way of getting the service in question performed is very evident, or they would have adopted some other mode of conveyance for their Papers. It is perhaps only proper for me here to observe, that I have never altered any of the rates charged upon Printers or others for sending Newspapers or Pamphlets through the Post, but have confined myself to the scale acted upon by my predecessor whom I succeeded nearly eight years ago. In his time, however, there were, I believe, no Newspapers published in the Province more frequently than twice a week. When certain Presses commenced publishing thrice a week or oftener, the Proprietors applied to me to know at what rate I would undertake to forward them; I agreed with them upon the amount, and the rates then agreed upon have been adhered to up to this time.

Monday, 16th November, 1835.

Thomas Allen Stayner, Esquire, being again called in, delivered in certain Returns, (*Appendix, Nos. 2 to 25,*) with the following Letters:—

Monday Morning, 16th November, 1835.

Sir,

I beg to lay before the Committee, the Returns which upon my last examination, I promised to have in readiness this morning; they are, *as far as they go*, Copies of the Statements required by the House of Assembly of Upper Canada, during its last Session, but which I found it impossible to prepare within the time prescribed, owing principally to the necessity of referring to distant Post Offices for information on several material points of the requisition. Failing, from the causes I have stated, to render those Returns within the last Session of the Assembly of Upper Canada, I had hoped to have it in my power ere this, to add to the Statements relative to the Canadas, those asked for in reference to Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, for which I applied to Mr. Howe, the Deputy Post Master General in charge of those Provinces, as soon as I knew they would be wanted, but I regret to say they have not yet reached me. I beg to be permitted to lay before the Committee Copy of my Letter to Mr. Howe, the Deputy Post Master General at Halifax, and of his answer thereto, which will prove, I trust, that I have, as far as in me lay, attended to the wishes of the Assembly of Upper Canada, in this as in other respects connected with their desire for information on the subject of the Post Office.

I have to acknowledge the receipt of your Letter of the 10th ult., accompanied by an Address from the House of Assembly of the Province of Upper Canada, to His Excellency Sir John Colborne, praying for certain information respecting the Post Office Department in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.

Having been directed by His Excellency Sir Colin Campbell, to prepare Returns to be presented to the Legislature of this Province at the next Session, which will embrace much of the required information, I will lose no time after they are completed, in forwarding Copies of them to you, and in further complying as far as I am able, with the requisition of the House of Assembly of Upper Canada.

16.—As the revenue arising from the transmission of Newspapers and Pamphlets is one of your perquisites as Deputy Post Master General, do you give any part of that Revenue to defray the expenses attending the transmission of the Mails?—No.

17.—Are the Newspapers and Pamphlets mailed with the Letters?—No, they are not mailed with the Letters, but sent in separate Parcels.

18.—Are Letters and Newspapers sent by the same conveyance?—Yes.

19.—How are the expenses attending the transmission of Newspapers and Pamphlets defrayed?—I have no reason to think that any expense has been incurred by the sending of Newspapers and Pamphlets;—they go in the same Portmanteaus with the Letters, and were no Newspapers sent, the Contractors charge would probably be the same that they have been, as they would have precisely the same number of journeys to perform, whether they conveyed Printed Papers or not. I make this observation with reference to the time that is past, and as the result of my observation and experience in the business of the Post-Office up to the present moment; but I consider it right to state also, that from the disposition manifested in almost every quarter of these Provinces to multiply Newspaper and Pamphlet publications, the period is not far distant when it will be necessary to send Newspapers and other Periodicals by a separate conveyance to the Mails of Letters, as is already done upon some of the important Routes in the neighbouring States, in which event there would unquestionably be an additional expense imposed upon Government for the conveyance of such Printed Papers.

20.—You are requested to place before this Committee, Copies of all Communications sent by you to the Post Office Department in England, since your return from that Country, or your Office Letter Book, if it contains that Correspondence, also the original Copies of all Communications or Instructions transmitted to you from that Department, or from the Colonial Office, within the same period?—I have no objection to furnish the Papers required.

21.—Will you lay before the Committee a Copy of your Letter to the Post Master General, and his Answer to the same, which you declined to furnish to the Committee of this House in your examination on the 11th February, 1832?—I will.

22.—You are requested to place before this Committee, Copy of a Report made by you on the Post Office Department in these Colonies, and which is referred to by Mr. Spring Rice, in his Circular, dated Downing Street, 5th of October, 1834?—I have retained no Copy of the Report referred to.

23.—Are you in the habit of making Reports to the Head of your Department without preserving Copies of the said Reports, as is generally done in all Public Offices?—When at home, in Quebec, I keep Copies of all Official Communications made to the Head of my Department. When in England, I made many Communications to the Post Master General, of which I have preserved no Copies. No written Reports have been made by me directly to the Colonial Office.

24.—Could you furnish the Committee with the data and calculations upon which you founded the said Report?—I shall do so as far as I can.

25.—Please hand in a Statement of the Sums of Money paid over by you to the Commissariat Department, in the years 1828, 1829, 1830 and 1831, on account of the Revenue raised by the Post Office Department, distinguishing the amount paid in each year, which you declined furnishing a Committee of this House, on the 11th February, 1832?—The Return will be found in the Voucher No. 21, (*Appendix No. 22.*) which I handed in this morning.

26.—You are requested to place before this Committee, Copy of your Account Current with the United States Post Office Department for 1834, and of the arrangements under which you conduct the monied transactions of your Department with the United States Government?—A Copy of the Account Current will be furnished, and I will describe the existing arrangements under which I conduct the monied transactions of my Department with the United States Government.

27.—What is the amount of remuneration received by you from the Post Office Department in the United States, and has the Post Master General in England any knowledge of the Income you derive from this source?—The amount will be found in Voucher No. 19, (*Appendix No. 20.*) The Post Master General is aware that I derive an emolument from this source, but he has never required me to state the amount.

28.—You are requested to place before this Committee, a Return of all Defaulters in your Department in Upper and Lower Canada, whether as Contractors, Deputy Post Masters, Deputy Post Master General, Agents for Packet Boats, or otherwise employed since 1800, with the amount for which they are severally entered in the Books of the Department as in arrear?—I will give the required Return in as complete detail as in my power.

29.—In reference to Question No. 25, and your Answer thereto, is the Committee to understand that your Remittances are made directly to the General Post Office, London, or made to the Commissariat Department in Canada, for that Department?—They are made to the Commissariat here, for the Post Office Department.

Friday, 20th November, 1835.

Thomas Allen Stayner, Esquire, again called in; and examined:—

The Witness handed in, in compliance with the Order of the Committee: A Copy of his Book of Instructions to his Deputies, and a Copy of Mail Contractors Agreements for carrying the Mail, also a Copy of the Oath of Office taken by Mail Contractors and Couriers; these two latter embracing most of the material points of duty of Contractors and Couriers. He begs to add that the Book of Instructions and the Oath of Office is delivered in the French language to those who understand only that language. [*Placed among the files of the Session.*]

Also, Extracts from his Instructions to his Deputies, relative to Franking. [*Placed among the files of the Session.*]

Also, a Section of the Act of George the Third, respecting the Franking of Newspapers, which he mentioned upon his late examination, as having in his opinion some relation to his Newspaper privilege. [*Embodied in the Report.*]

Also, Copies of Letters to and from the General Post Office since his return from England.—[*Appendix Nos. 26 to 40.*]
—*Note.*—Several other Letters laid before the Committee are placed among the files of the Session, their publication not being considered essential by the Committee, having reference merely to matters of minor importance.

Also, Copy of his Letter to the Post Master General's Secretary, after the close of the Session of 1831, with the Secretary's Answer thereto.—[*Appendix Nos. 41 and 42.*]

Also the Account Current with the United States for 1834, and Statement of his arrangements for monied transactions with the United States General Post Office.—[*Appendix Nos. 43 to 47.*]

30.—In your answer to Question 15, you stated that you considered that you had a right to arrange with Printers, and others who wish to send their Papers through the Post Office, the compensation which they ought to pay, and in answer to Question 16, you stated that no part of that money goes to defray the expenses attending the transmission of the Mails, by what Law do you appropriate the amount derived from this source to your own private advantage?—The authority to which I have always looked, is the immemorial usage frequently recognized by the Head of my Department in England, which has granted me the money in question as my privilege. These recognitions will appear amongst the papers which I have already handed in to the Committee.

31.—Do you consider the authority referred to in the last answer sufficient (if you had it) to authorize you to appropriate to your private advantage the proceeds of the Post Office derived from other sources, although there existed no Statute Law to sanction it?—I do not consider that any authority could justify my acting contrary to Law.

32.—If it would, in your opinion, require a Law to authorize you to appropriate to your private advantage the General Revenues of the Post Office, do you not think that the same authority would be requisite to sanction the appropriation to your private use of any part of those Revenues?—I suppose it would, but I have never appropriated any portion of the Public Revenues to my private use.

33.—In your opinion, then, the Revenues derived from the transmission of Newspapers through the Post Office, do not form a part of the Post Office Revenues, although the expense attendant on their transmission, whether as payment to Contractors for carrying them, or to Clerks for sorting and delivering them, or for keeping the Accounts attendant on all this trouble, is paid out of the Public Revenue, and although you cannot shew any Law, or clause of a Law, to authorize you to appropriate the proceeds to your private use?—I most respectfully urge that I cannot admit the assumptions contained in this question. I am not conscious, in the first place, that Government has ever been put to one shilling's expense for carrying the Newspapers;—th' I have already stated in a previous answer. In the next place, I beg to remind this Honorable Committee that I have already stated, that I compensate the different Post Masters out of my own pocket for their trouble.

34.—Who pays the several Under Clerks or Assistants employed in the several Offices of Quebec and Montreal, or in the Office of the Deputy Post Master General?—Up to the 5th of October, 1834, I received an allowance of £200 a year, to assist me in paying for Clerks. My expenses, however, under this head, were often as much as £400 a year, or even more. I never considered that Government was exposed to any expense, at Quebec, for managing the Newspapers. The Post Master for the time, I have always considered as being a Member of my own Office, and he has always been happy to do this business for me. I have done part of his business for him, and he in return has rendered me this service. At Montreal, the Post Master pays his own Clerk out of an allowance of £150 a year, granted him by Government, sixteen or seventeen years ago; and I allow him altogether about £125 a year, as a compensation to him for transacting the American Postage business, (from which I derive the per centage or commission) and for managing the Newspapers. I may therefore safely aver that at neither Quebec or Montreal is the Public Revenue subjected to any cost for Clerks or Assistants on the score of the Newspapers through which I derive an emolument.

35.—By your last answer it appears that previous to the 5th of October, 1834, an allowance was paid to you and to the Post Master at Montreal for Clerks; was any of the time of these Clerks occupied in receiving, sorting and delivering Newspapers and other Printed Papers, and in keeping the Accounts attendant on those duties?—The respective Post Masters at those Offices got the duty done for me;—they either did it with their own hands or by the Assistants or Clerks employed by them.

36.—If those expenses or any part thereof be paid from that portion of the Post Office Revenues, which you admit to belong to the Public, is not Government then put to some expense by the transmission of Newspapers through the Post Office?—If the Post Masters at any time, employed those Clerks in the management of the Newspapers which they paid out of their Government allowance, they no doubt employed the Clerks which they paid out of the Fund granted them by me, about the other business of the Office; and I conceive that one was equivalent to the other, and that Government sustained no loss thereby. It was unavoidable that the Newspaper business should be managed in the Post Office, and the Post Master would either attend to it himself or get it done by others. I beg here to observe that I have never thought it a part of my duty to enquire, whether a Post Master who receives an allowance for Assistance, pays away the whole of that allowance for Clerks or not. If he can get the duty done by members of his own family without charge, he has a right to do so.

37.—What new arrangement has taken place in the Quebec and Montreal Offices since October, 1834?—The arrangement which took place in October, 1834, is described in a Return, No. 3 [Appendix No. 4]—which I handed to the Committee on the 16th instant, a new apportionment of some of the duties of the Head Quarter Department was made, by which, instead of allowing me £200. a year for Clerks, that allowance was taken from me, and the different branches had hands assigned to them, all paid by Government, equal as it was supposed to do the duty in an efficient manner. It formed part of the new arrangement, that the Accounts should be examined and compiled, not as heretofore in my immediate Office, but by an Accountant and Clerks appointed by the Post Master General. This Branch was made strong in hands, not only to enable them to attend to the additional duty assigned to them at once by the Post Master General,—that of incorporating the Accounts of the Lower Provinces, with those of the Canadas; but with a view to meet the increasing duties of the Post Office generally, in the expected extension of business which it was known might be counted upon. The above refers to Quebec. No new arrangement has yet been made for the Montreal Office.

38.—Will you be pleased to hand in the Names of the several Officers referred to in the said Return?—The Names of the several Officers are as follows:—

William Griffin was appointed my Clerk in May last, previous to that the situation was held by Henry Griffin, who was then made Post Office Surveyor.

39.—By whom are these several persons appointed, and from what sources are they paid?—The Post Master General formed the Establishment, that is, he fixed the number of persons, and the salaries to each, and besides approving of me, as Deputy Post Master General, he himself appointed, and sent out from England, the Accountant and his two Clerks. The rest of the individuals whose names are given in my last answer, were appointed by me. All those persons receive their pay out of the Post Office Revenue.

40.—Part of the time of these Officers and persons whose salaries are derived exclusively from the Post Office Revenue, being occupied in receiving, distributing and delivering Newspapers and other Printed Papers, does it not follow, that Government therefore contributes partly to the expenses attendant on the transmission of Newspapers and other Printed Papers through the Post Office?—In one sense this induction may be admitted, in the present constitution of the individual Office at Quebec; but I beg to observe that this constitution or establishment was formed by the Post Master General under the impression that the Post Office Act for the several Provinces, which was recently prepared in England, and submitted to the respective Legislatures by Mr. Secretary Rice, would take effect in January, 1836, when my Newspaper privilege would cease. It was in order to be prepared for the great change in the business at Quebec, which it was supposed would then take place, that the Post Master General thought it advisable to form a more complete establishment for the Head Quarters of the Department, than had previously existed.

41.—Do you intend to continue not only to exact Postage on Newspapers and other Printed Papers transmitted through the Post Office, but also to appropriate the proceeds to your own private advantage, in the absence of all Law to sanction the proceeding, notwithstanding you admit that under the new arrangement the expenses attendant thereupon are borne at Quebec exclusively by the Post Office Revenue; and although you have also admitted that you in no way contribute to the expenses of the transmission of the Mails?—Until I receive Orders from the Post Master General, I must continue the present usage: in fact I should be perfectly at a loss to know what other plan to pursue. I must either continue the present course, or tax those Newspapers and Pamphlets with regular postage, which it is well known would at once put a stop to their transmission.

transmission by Post. On the other hand, to send those Papers free of any charge, would be impracticable, even if I were willing, (which I cannot be supposed to be) to relinquish the chief source of my income; for at many of the Offices, the Deputies would, I am confident, not perform the duty, if they were not paid for doing it. The term "Postage" as applied to the charge I make for forwarding Newspapers under the present system, ought to be distinguished from the legal meaning of the term. At the General Post Office, London, the compensation received by me for performing this service, or having it performed, is styled a "Gratuity." As to the expenses attending the management of the Newspapers, I beg to state, and refer to my former answers in support thereof, that I have never admitted they were borne by the Post Office Revenue. As regards the Office at Quebec, I have said that since October, 1834, I have not paid any thing out of my own funds for the service—it is performed for me voluntarily by the First Clerk and his Assistants, without fee or reward, and if they were to ask me for a separate compensation for the work, I would give it to them. All that can be said upon the subject even with regard to the Quebec Office, is that the management of the Newspapers, compels the Clerks to work a little harder than they otherwise would have to do.

42.—Will you lay before the Committee a Statement shewing the gross amount of the compensation paid by you to each of the PostMasters in Lower Canada, also, how much to each and the name of each Post Master thus compensated; referred to in your answer (33)?—In one of the Statements called for by the Committee in its Order of the 13th November, instant, and which I am now preparing, the information here asked for will be found.

Monday, 23d November, 1835.

Thomas Aldi Stagner, Esquire, again called; and examined:—

43.—Are there not Letter Carriers attached to the several Post Offices in Quebec, Montreal and Three Rivers, and do they not receive a certain sum on each Letter they deliver at the houses or residences of the persons to whom the Letters are addressed?—There are Letter Carriers attached to the Offices of Quebec and Montreal. For Montreal there is at present only one allowed—the salary charged to the Post Office for this service is £30. a year. At Quebec under the establishment to which I have before referred and which came into operation in October, 1834, there are three—the first of them receive £60. a year—the other two £52. each. It has always been the custom for the Letter Carrier to receive a Penny upon each Letter from the person to whom he delivers it, as a Fee or Gratuity to himself. This is never exacted, and I have always instructed the Carriers to explain to the Public, that they are not obliged to pay this Penny. Some few individuals have refused to pay it, but most persons give it cheerfully, knowing that the salary of the Carriers is in itself a very scanty reward for a duty which in this climate is particularly troublesome and painful. At Three Rivers there is no established Letter Carrier, but the Post Master receives a small allowance for sending out Letters, of, I think, one halfpenny each Letter. I have some time since recommended that Montreal should be put upon the same footing as Quebec, with regard to Letter Carriers, or at all events that there should be to Letter Carriers for that Town upon an improved rate of pay, and I believe it is the intention of the Post Master General to make this arrangement. The Post Master at Montreal derives the above mentioned Thirty pounds as if for one Letter Carrier, but I believe he employs two or more, and they are no doubt chiefly compensated out of the Penny received from individuals.

44.—Are the Letter Carriers allowed to receive a penny on Newspapers delivered by them?—I was not aware that they received a penny on Newspapers, but I have understood that in some of the Towns it is the custom for Merchants or Householders to give a gratuity at Christmas to Letter Carriers for taking out their Newspapers. I may further remark that I have never considered it as forming a part of a Letter Carrier's duty to deliver at the houses of Subscribers those Newspapers which are sent by the Post under my privilege. When Newspapers are sent as Letters they are considered as entitled in every respect to the same treatment as Letters.

45.—Furnish to the Committee a Statement shewing the Amount derived from this source by the Letter Carriers for each of the years 1832, 1833, and 1834, for Quebec, Montreal, and Three Rivers?—I will furnish such a Statement.

46.—Are the perquisites, or any part thereof, received by Letter Carriers in the Cities of Quebec and Montreal, deducted from the fixed Saries which they receive?—No.

47.—Please furnish a Debit and Credit Account in detail, of the Receipts and Expenditure of your Department in Lower Canada for each of the years 1832, 1833, and 1834, shewing the balances, if any, remaining each year, distinguishing in the Receipts of each year, the Amount received for Letter Postage, and Newspaper and Pamphlet Postage, and shewing the Amount expended under the several heads of:

- Paid Deputy Post Master General (Salary, Allowances, &c. Newspaper privilege and United States Agency.)
- Paid Post Masters,
- Paid Contractors,
- Paid Contingencies,
- Remitted United States,

and state how the balance has been disposed of each year?—I will prepare such an account as soon as I possibly can.

48.—Furnish a similar Debit and Credit Account, for the same years, of the Receipts and Expenditure of the Department in Upper Canada classed under the same heads?—I will also prepare such an Account for Upper Canada.

49.—Where the distributing Offices in the two Canadas, for the United States Mails?—Montreal and Stanstead, in Lower Canada; Prescott, Kingston, and Queenston, in Upper Canada. The Post Master of Niagara keeps an account with the United States Post Office for the correspondence of that Town alone, which I incorporate in my accounts with the Department at Washington. At Brockville also the Post Master keeps an account with the American Post Master opposite, of which I have never received a statement.

50.—Please lay before the Committee copies of the several Post Masters' Accounts Current to the General Post Office for United States stage on Letters and Newspapers received at and sent from Queenston, Prescott, Niagara, and Stanstead, for each of the Quarters ending 31st March, 30th June, 30th September, and 31st December, 1834?—I will do so.

51.—Do you receive, as a perquisite, a copy (*gratis*) of each of the Newspapers published in this Province or in Upper Canada, or do you consider that you are entitled to receive such a perquisite?—Many of the Printers in the Canadas send me a Copy (*gratis*) their Newspapers. I may say that I consider myself entitled to a Copy as a perquisite, though I have never attached much importance to it, because another free Copy is sent to the Post Master of the place, which I can always see and read if I think proper.

52.—Are you not called on annually by the Head of the Executive in this Province to furnish a Return of the amount derived by you from your Office, whether as salary, fees or emoluments, for the information of His Majesty's Government in England?—In.

53.—Please furnish the Committee with a Copy of the Return which you made for the year 1834?—I will.

54.—Furnish the Committee with a Copy of your Letter to the Secretary to the General Post Office, forwarding Copy of a Petition from Printers in Lower Canada to His Excellency Sir James Kempt, then Governor of the Province, praying that Papers

Papers might be circulated "Free of Postage as in England," to which you refer at the foot of the Statement No. 16, [Appendix No. 17] laid by you before this Committee?—I will do so.

55.—Lay before this Committee, Copy of the reply received from the General Post Office to your Letter, dated Quebec, 29th March, 1835, which you addressed to Sir Francis Freeling?—I have received no answer to that Letter.

56.—At what periods are your Quarterly Accounts made up?—5th January, 5th April, 5th July and 5th October.

57.—Furnish a Statement of the sums transmitted to England by you, for the Quarters of 1835?—I will do so.

58.—Are there any other Officers connected with the Post Office Department in the Canadas besides those enumerated in your Returns, and in your answer 38?—None receiving Pay from the Department, except two Surveyors appointed this year.

59.—What are the names of those Officers, and what are their duties, and pay?—Their names are Wm. Henry Griffin and Charles Berczy—the former is considered the Surveyor for Lower Canada, the latter for the Upper Province. They are appointed for the purpose of assisting the Deputy Post Master General in various branches of his duty, more especially for organizing new Post Offices, instructing Post Masters in their duties, superintending the proceedings of Post Masters and Mail Carriers, investigating complaints and applying remedies where faults are found to exist in practical working of the business of the Post Office, within their respective Districts. They receive as Salary £150. and 21s. per diem, whilst travelling, together with 6d. a mile.

60.—When and by whom were they appointed?—They were appointed, or more properly nominated by me under an order from the Post Master General to that effect. Of the dates of their respective appointments I am not sure, but I will ascertain and inform the Committee—I think Mr. Griffin was appointed in May last, and Mr. Berczy in the following month or in July. [Witness afterwards added that Mr. Griffin was appointed on the 1st May, 1835, and Mr. Berczy, on the 22d June, 1835.]

61.—Were they, or any of them, appointed and employed by you previous to the receipt of the order from the Post Master General?—No.

62.—What are the duties of those Officers when they are not travelling?—Their employment is to attend to the correspondence arising out of their various duties, to report their proceedings to the Deputy Post Master General, &c. Those Officers have incessant occupation.

63.—Who performed the duties now performed by the Accountant and his two Clerks, and by the Surveyors, before those Officers were appointed?—I and my Assistants in a great measure. But I must explain more distinctly that, with regard to the duties now performed by the Surveyors, I have for many years been largely indebted to several of my Deputies in both Upper and Lower Canada, who have rendered me assistance in this way, which I have not had it in my power adequately to compensate them for. On some occasions I have employed those Post Masters on travelling duties, charging their expenses to the Post Office.

64.—Furnish a Return of the Amount of Bills of Exchange found in dead and misdirected Letters in Upper and Lower Canada from 1827 to 1834, both years inclusive, and shewing the purposes to which such Bills or their proceeds have been applied?—I have never kept an account of Bills of Exchange found in dead and misdirected Letters, but whenever I discovered a Bill of Exchange, or other valuable paper, I took care to use the utmost care in forwarding it to its proper destination. In some cases I have kept copies of my Letters on such subjects, but not always; frequently they were sent to their address in the way of ordinary Dead Letters without any record being made of them, beyond a memorandum or note, which I destroyed when the paper was acknowledged. I will make a collection of all the cases of returned Bills of Exchange which I can find, and lay the same before the Committee.

65.—Do you not keep Returns similar to those required, of money found in dead or misdirected Letters?—We do now keep a Book in which is registered all valuable Papers as well as money found in Letters, and of the mode in which the same are disposed of. Formerly I had not assistance sufficient to enable me to attend to this branch of duty so systematically as a regular establishment now enables me to do. Until lately we did not keep a Book even for returned Bank Notes or Money, but we were in the practice of sending the Notes, &c. to the person to whom they belonged and of receiving back his receipt for the same upon a printed form. These receipts were strung upon a file, and it is from that file I have made up the Statement which I had the honor to hand in some days ago.

66.—Then the Committee are to understand that you are "now" in the habit of keeping Returns of the Bills of Exchange found in dead or misdirected Letters; when was that arrangement commenced?—It was commenced in October, 1834, or shortly after, by Mr. King, the Accountant, who prepared a Book upon the plan of that kept in the Returned Letter Office, London.

67.—Furnish a Return of the amount of Bills of Exchange found in dead and misdirected Letters in Upper and Lower Canada since October, 1834, shewing the purposes to which such Bills or their proceeds have been applied?—I will do so.

68.—From your answer 38, it appears that Mr. John Sewell is 1st Sorting Clerk or Post Master at Quebec; does not that gentleman hold the Office of Usher of the Black Rod in the Legislative Council?—He does.

69.—Is he not required as Usher of the Black Rod to attend on the Legislative Council whilst that Branch of the Legislature is in Session?—He does, I believe, attend the Legislative Council for a portion of each day, but I have not found that his attendance there has interfered with his duties as a Post Officer. He makes up by extraordinary exertions in the few hours he attends the Council. It may be proper for me here to observe, that last year, when I offered to Mr. Sewell the appointment which he now holds in the Post Office, I expressed a fear that his situation as Usher might interfere with his business as Post Master, and distinctly explained to him that if I found it to operate in this way, he must resign either the one situation or the other. In this he cheerfully acquiesced and the understanding remains the same at this hour.

70.—Do you think that a person performing his duties as Usher of the Black Rod in the Legislative Council, can at the same time be attending the public as Post Master, for the performance of the duties of which latter Office he receives a respectable and competent Salary?—I beg to say that I think I have already answered this question by stating that I have found the duties of the Post Office properly performed.

71.—Did Mr. Sewell give security for the due performance of the duties of his Office as Post Master or Sorting Clerk?—He did.

72.—What are the names of his Sureties, and the amount for which they are severally bound?—The names of his Sureties are the Honorable Chief Justice Sewell, and William Sewell, Esquire, Sheriff of Quebec. They are bound jointly and severally to the amount of £2000.

73.—In case Mr. Sewell should prove a defaulter, would you not be obliged to proceed against him in a Court of King's Bench, of which Court one of his Sureties is the presiding Judge?—I should consult His Majesty's Attorney General as to the steps proper for me to take.

74.—Please submit to the Committee Copies of the Instructions by which the execution of the duties of your Office are regulated, which you refused to furnish to a Committee of this House in December, 1831?—I will.

Tuesday, 24th November, 1835.

Mr. Michel Gawin, called in; and examined:—

1.—Are you Contractor for Carrying the Mail between Quebec and Montreal?—I am.

- 2.—How often is the Mail carried Quebec and Montreal?—Five times a week.
- 3.—What is the distance between the two Cities?—Sixty leagues.
- 4.—What is the sum which you receive for carrying the Mail between Quebec and Montreal?—£1131.
- 5.—You are aware that a large number of Newspapers are transmitted by the Mail from Montreal to Quebec, and from Quebec to Montreal?—Yes.
- 6.—Would you transmit the Mail for a less sum than what you receive at present, if no Newspapers were sent by the Mail?—Yes, for if there were no Newspapers in the Bags, we could transmit the Mail in a shorter time and with less expense, on horseback, than we now do.
- 7.—Could you give this Committee an idea of how much less the Mail could be transported between Quebec and Montreal if there were no Newspapers in the Bags?—If I had the privilege of carrying it on horseback, there would be a saving of about £200.

Friday, 27th November, 1835.

Ordered,—That the following Questions be addressed to the Post Masters in the Canadas :—

- 1.—How many Newspapers are published in your Town or neighbourhood?
- 2.—How many of each number of these Papers are forwarded by you per Mail during each quarter, beginning 5th January, 1833?
- 3.—What number of sheets of United States Papers and Pamphlets did you deliver during the above period from your Office?
- 4.—How many Provincial Newspapers are "paid-sent" from your Office quarterly during the said period, by others besides the publishers?
- 5.—What is the amount of Postage collected by you on British Newspapers quarterly during the above period?

Ordered,—That the following Questions be addressed to the Publishers and Proprietors of Newspapers in the Canadas :—

- 1.—How often is your Paper published?
- 2.—How many copies of your Paper do you forward quarterly by Mail, since 5th January, 1833?
- 3.—What amount did you pay quarterly, since the above period, to the Deputy Post Master General at Quebec, or to the Post Office, for the privilege of transmitting your Papers by Mail?

Ordered,—That the following Questions be addressed to the Members of this House :—

- 1.—Are there a sufficient number of Post Offices in your County to accommodate the Population?
- 2.—Please to send to the Committee the names of those Towns and Villages in your County, in each of which a Post Office is established?
- 3.—Please to state to the Committee also the names of the Towns and Villages in your County, in which, in your opinion, a Post Office ought to be located?
- 4.—Have applications to your knowledge been made to the Deputy Post Master General for Post Offices in any of the Towns and Villages referred to in the last question; if so, state the name of the place for which such request was made, also whether any attention was paid to the application, and if so, what were the reasons given for non-compliance therewith?
- 5.—Are any of the Towns and Villages referred to in Queries 3 and 4, situate on a Post Road; if not, what is the state of the Roads leading thereto?

Thomas Allen Stayner, Esquire, being again called in; delivered to the Committee the following Documents :—

- A Return of the names of Post Masters in Lower Canada, shewing the salary, allowances, fees, and the whole income they severally received for the years 1832, 1833 and 1834.—[Appendix Nos. 48 to 50.]
- Also, the data upon which he founded the Report referred to by Mr. Spring Rice in his Despatch dated Downing Street, 5th October, 1834.—[Appendix No. 51.]
- Also, a Return of the Names of Defaulters in the Post Office Department, so far as he has been able to comply with the Order of this Committee, [Appendix No. 52.] accompanied by the following remarks :—
- I have no means however of tracing back the debt of any Defaulter to a period anterior to my own assumption of the charge of the Department (April, 1828,) as Mr. Sutherland, my immediate predecessor, kept no Book of Accounts whatever. If a Deputy fell in arrears, he always made good the debt himself. Previous to Mr. Sutherland's appointment in 1816, I can discover nothing of the nature of the information required. I am not aware of the Post Office Revenue having sustained any loss through Defaulters. The Deputy Post Master General has always made up the bad debts of his Deputies. I have understood that Mr. Sutherland had to pay from this cause, during the twelve years he held the Office, upwards of £5000.
- That the Committee may clearly understand in what way the Deputy Post Master General makes good the balances of Defaulters who are his Deputies, it may be necessary to state here, that he becomes chargeable at the end of each quarter with the whole amount of Revenue collected by each of his Deputies, whether they pay him regularly or not.
- Also, Copy of the Return respecting his pay and emoluments furnished by Command of the Governor in Chief, for the year 1834.—[Appendix No. 53.]
- Also, Copy of his Letter to the Secretary of the General Post Office, forwarding Copy of a Petition from the Printers of Lower Canada, to His Excellency Sir James Kempt, dated 2d January, 1829.—[Appendix No. 54.]
- Also, a Return of the amount of Bills of Exchange found in dead and misdirected Letters in Upper and Lower Canada, since October, 1834, shewing the purposes to which such Bills or their proceeds have been applied.—[Appendix No. 55.]
- Also, Copies of Instructions by which the execution of the duties of his Office are regulated, consisting of Instructions from the Post Master General, accompanying his Commission, dated 10th May, 1828; and fifteen sheets principally in the shape of Letters from the General Post Office, containing Orders or Instructions from the Department on special points of duty.—[Appendix Nos. 56 to 60.]—Note.—The remainder of the Papers are placed among the files of the Session, their publication not being considered necessary by the Committee.
- Also, an Account of sums of money transmitted to England on account of the Post Office Revenue for the quarter of 1835.—[Appendix No. 61.]

75—You are requested to state to the Committee, what responsibility such Post Masters incur who receive United States Mails; how they account for the amount of such Mails,—whether in money for the whole amount, exclusive of dead and refused letter postage,

postage, or by transmitting to the General Post Office Quarterly Accounts, debiting the several Post Offices to which such Mails may have been distributed?—Those Post Masters are responsible to me for the whole amount of United States Postage received by them, as I am to General Post Office at Washington, and they collect from the Interior Offices all monies on United States Letters and Papers transmitted through their respective Offices. With regard to American Postage on dead and refused Letters, it has been found more convenient to charge it in their British Account, and it is then separated at the General Post Office, and the due proportion charged to the Post Office at Washington. The above is the plan pursued generally with regard to American Postage, though some difference exists between Upper and Lower Canada on certain points. In the former Province for example, as the Distributing Post Master receives the Emoluments derived from the Commission on this Postage, (after paying a portion, generally a moiety, to the Interior Post Master,) I consider *him* responsible for any bad debts that may be made, at the same time that I always exert myself to assist him in pursuing delinquents. In Lower Canada on the contrary, where I have derived the benefit of this Commission, I consider *myself* bound to bear the Distributing Post Master harmless from any loss through the delinquencies of those Post Masters who are indebted for American Postage.

76.—Please lay before the Committee, a Statement shewing the Amount of Bonds given by each Post Master in the Canadas receiving and distributing United States Mail?—I will.

77.—Do the Provinces of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, or the Post Office Revenues of either of these Provinces, bear any of the expense of transmitting the Mails from this Province thither?—Yes.

78.—What proportion of expense does the Province or Post Office Revenues of Nova Scotia bear?—I shall endeavour to ascertain and furnish the required information.

79.—Please furnish a similar Statement of the proportion of expense of transmitting the Mails from New Brunswick to this Province, borne by that Province?—If I can procure this information from Mr. Howe's papers, I shall be happy to furnish it to the Committee.

80.—How comes it that the expense of transmitting the Mails from Quebec to Woodstock, in the Province of New Brunswick, and from Woodstock to Fredericton, in the said Province, is charged to the Canadas?—It has always been so done. As the whole Post Office Revenue of all the Provinces eventually merges into one fund (that of the General Post Office, London,) the Post Master General has been indifferent as to whether this expense was charged in my Accounts or Mr. Howe's. I regulate the Couriers as far down as Fredericton, and therefore pay them.

81.—Are the Accounts of your Department audited by any efficient Board, or Auditor, within these Colonies, or what check is there by which errors can be detected on this side the sea, where the transactions chiefly occur, if so, when was such Board established?—By reference to one of the Documents handed in by me, it will be seen that there is a "Post Office Accountant," (so called,) and Clerks attached to this Establishment, since October, 1831. The Accountant examines and checks the Accounts, and compiles them, and then forwards them to the General Post Office, London, where they undergo another examination.

82.—Are the Accountant and his Clerks under your control, and responsible to you for the proper performance of their official duties?—No, they form a distinct branch of the Department here; and although I am the head of the whole Department in these Provinces, I do not consider these Officers as under my orders.

83.—Is the Accountant, or his Clerks, bound to receive any orders from you, or to obey them when received?—In the Instructions to the Accountant from the Post Master General, he receives certain specific orders for his duties in the treatment of the Accounts, &c., and he is told that he is to obey such Instructions as he may receive from me, and to render me such assistance as I may require, &c. This I of course understand, and so does the Accountant, as signifying that he is to obey such Instructions from me as may not trench upon the superior orders of the Post Master General, and the application which has been given to it is, that when I am occasionally hard pressed by work in my immediate office, I call upon Mr. King, for assistance.

84.—Should he disobey your orders, do you consider that you have the power of suspending him from his office, or discharging him from his employment?—No, certainly not; I should report the subject to the Post Master General.

85.—Does the Post Master General generally manifest such confidence in you, as to be guided by the Reports which you from time to time make relative to the Post Office Department in these Provinces?—The Post Master General has, I think, confidence in my zeal and integrity, and I have no doubt that generally speaking, my opinion has some weight with him; but the Post Master General of course considers me (as I really am) his Deputy, and he never fails to exercise his own judgment in every case that comes before him, in which I am concerned.

86.—Are you bound to receive any orders from the Accountant, or to furnish him with such explanations or information relative to the Post Office Accounts as he may require?—I never received any instructions on this head, but consider it my duty to be governed, as regards my intercourse with the Accountant, by the instructions which he holds from the Post Master General. When in England, I was informed, with reference to this subject, that upon the consolidation of the Department under the proposed new Act, I should be supplied with instructions suited to my change of circumstances.

87.—Is the examination by the Accountant here of the Post Office Accounts final?—No.

88.—In case errors are discovered in England in the Post Office Accounts of these Provinces, what course is pursued, and how are you finally discharged from responsibility?—Observations are sent out by the Accountant General; the Accountant will call upon the Deputy to furnish the necessary Voucher, or pay in the amount of the error, as the case may be; and when this is done the responsibility is discharged.

89.—Does the Accountant examine into the correctness of the Accounts of the years preceding the establishment of his Office?—No; those Accounts had been examined by the Accountant General in England previous to his appointment.

90.—Do you deposit the Post Office Revenues from time to time in any and which of the Banks for security?—I keep accounts with the Banks of Upper Canada, the City Bank of Montreal and the Quebec Bank, and in these I make my deposits of Post Office Revenue.

91.—Do they allow interest on the sums deposited?—No.

92.—Furnish the Committee with a Statement similar to that already handed in by you and numbered 19, [Appendix No. 20.] of your emoluments, whether from salary, fees, allowances, Newspaper Postage, Pamphlet Postage, per centage on the collection of United States Letter or Newspaper Postage, or from any other source whatever during the years 1828, 1829, 1830 and 1831?—I will do so.

93.—Did any correspondence or communication take place between yourself and the Post Office Department in London, relative to the outline of a Law for the regulation of the Post Office, in Lower Canada, copy of which Bill was laid before the House of Assembly last Session?—I had frequent communication with the Post Office Department in London on this subject.

94.—Was such communication verbal or in writing?—They were both verbal and in writing.

95.—Please furnish this Committee with Copies of the information which you furnished the Post Master General on this subject, and the data on which the same was made up?—I preserved no copy of the information furnished by me, not having time for making any, nor indeed thinking it necessary.

Monday, 30th November, 1835.

Thomas Allen Stayner, Esquire, again called in; and examined:—

96.—Have you any further Documents to lay before this Committee?—I beg to lay before the Committee the following Returns or Statements, viz:—

A Return of the several Parishes, Townships, and other places in Upper and Lower Canada in which Post Offices are at present established, with the distance of each Post Office from Quebec, and the rates of Postage charged on single Letters by the present Tariff.—[Appendix No. 62.]

Statement of the amount derived by the Letter Carriers of the Offices of Quebec, Montreal and Three Rivers respectively, from the gratuity of a Penny per Letter, received on such Letters as they carry out, for the years 1832, 1833 and 1834.—[Appendix No. 63.]

Proportion of the expense of conveying the Mail between Quebec and Halifax, borne by or chargeable to the several Provinces.—[Appendix No. 64.]

Amount of Bonds given by Post Masters receiving United States' Mails.—[Appendix No. 65.]

97.—Lay before this Committee a Return of the amount of British Packet Postage collected in each of the Canadas (on Letters brought by Packet Boats) for each of the years 1828, 1829, 1830, 1831, 1832, 1833 and 1834?—It is utterly out of my power to furnish the Committee with this information. I cannot even tell the aggregate amount of British Postage on Letters sent to the Canadas, without applying to Mr. Howe at Halifax for the same;—that he can inform me is I think probable.

98.—How then have you been able to estimate as you have done in a Memorandum laid before this Committee, the British Postage to be remitted to England, at £3000?—That was a rough estimate founded upon enquiries made by me at the General Post Office, London. I think from the data collected, that I judged that the British Postage upon all the Letters sent to the British Provinces *via* Halifax, might average about £250, a month, or £3000 a year.

99.—Was the information procured from Official Papers; were those papers printed, and have you retained copies of them by you?—So far as I can recollect, I obtained the information in the course of conversation at the Accountant General's Office. I never saw any printed paper on the subject, nor have I retained a copy of any particulars relating to it. When I was preparing the estimate alluded to, I did not think it necessary to furnish, otherwise than in round numbers, the different sums composing the aggregate. Indeed it must be obvious that by far the greatest proportion of the sums therein mentioned, must be problematical, nor until the proposed scheme should be in operation for some time, would it be possible to know with arithmetical certainty, whether the estimate was correctly founded or not.

Friday, 4th December, 1835.

Thomas Allen Stayner, Esquire, being again called in; said:—I beg to submit the following Documents and Statements which have been called for by the Committee:—

A Return of the present number of Post Offices in Upper and Lower Canada, with the dates when the same were established, and the authority under which the Offices were created. [Placed among the Records, as a similar Table is to be found in former Journals of the House.]

A Report of the decision of Lord Mansfield upon a case against the Post Office for recovery of the value of a Money Letter. [Appendix No. 10 to 1st Report.]

With reference to a remark made by me on the last day of my examination, viz: that I should be unable to ascertain the amount of British Packet Postage received in the Canadas for a certain number of years, ending in 1834, I beg leave to acquaint the Committee, that in turning this matter over in my mind after my examination, it occurred to me that a means did exist, by which I might ascertain pretty nearly, if not with perfect certainty, the total amount of Packet Postage for both Canadas within the years required. I am not yet quite convinced that I can do this; but if the Post Master of Montreal has preserved Records of his Letter Bills received from Halifax, (and I have written to him to ascertain the fact,) I shall then, if required to do so by the Committee, be enabled to make out a tolerably accurate Return of all Packet Postage received in the Canadas from 1828 to 1834. But there are no means of discovering what proportion of this Postage was for Upper Canada and what for the Lower Province.

100.—Will you be pleased to request Mr. Howe, of Halifax, to furnish you, for the information of this Committee, with Statements shewing the amount of British Packet Postage received for each of the years 1828, 1829, 1830, 1831, 1832, 1833, and 1834, in British North America, distinguishing the amount received for each of the Lower Provinces from that charged to the Canadas?—I shall do so.

101.—Lay before this Committee, a Return shewing the amount of British Packet Postage collected in each of the Canadas on Letters addressed to the several Civil and Military Departments, during the years 1828, 1829, 1830, 1831, 1832, 1833, and 1834, distinguishing each year the Civil from the Military Department?—I beg, in answer to this requisition, to explain that all Letters and Packets, whether on Civil or Military business, from and to the Government in England, go by the British Packets, free of any Postage whatever. There are occasionally Letters from individuals in England, who are not authorized to frank, addressed to the Public Departments in these Provinces, which are rated with Postage, and this Postage is charged with other Postage to the account of the Department, but I have no means of ascertaining the amount. In like manner also there are Letters from Public Officers in this country belonging to both the Civil and Military Departments, addressed to persons in Europe, who are not entitled to Free Postage, this Postage is also charged here, but as far as Halifax only. I think it right to add, however, that I think the amount of Postage thus charged is not considerable.

102.—Can you on a rough estimation state what would be the amount of British Packet and Inland American Postage to be paid by the Civil and Military Departments in the Canadas (distinguishing the Civil from the Military) were they to pay Postage?—Any estimate that I may make for these objects must be very rough. I will, however, (with the permission of the Committee,) take a little time to consider the question, and render the best answer that I may be able to prepare.

103.—Do the blank Returns, Account Books, and other papers forwarded for the Military Departments in the Canadas, form a very great bulk of the Falmouth Mails received here, and can you give the Committee any idea of the weight of some of those Bags of public papers?—Blank Account Books, and I believe likewise Blank Returns in sheet, and other papers forwarded for the Military Departments in the Canadas, do very frequently form a great bulk in the Falmouth Mails received here, and at certain seasons in the year, when these Mails are necessarily conveyed on men's shoulders over the worst part of the route, they tend to retard the progress of the Couriers very seriously. I will endeavour to ascertain at the Sorting Office what the weight of some of these Bags is.

104.—As this great bulk of Papers necessarily retards the Mail Couriers very much on their overland journey, were a supply of those public forms and papers sent by Transports, in the course of the Summer, to the Departments in the Canadas, would not the Mails be brought in a much shorter time than at present from Halifax?—At certain periods of the year, more particularly during the Spring and Fall, the overland communication with Halifax is very difficult. On portions of the route between the River St. Lawrence and Fredericton, I have known the Couriers to be under the necessity of wading up to their breasts in water for miles together, with the Mail Bags on their heads or shoulders, to preserve them from the water, thus discharging a service which perhaps no men in the world, but Canadian Voyageurs, could accomplish. With this fact stated, it is very evident that the heavier the Mail the slower must be its progress, and I am quite safe in saying that at these difficult seasons, the Mails would arrive in much shorter time, if they were composed of Letters alone.

105.—Do the Mercantile Body of Canada usually transmit and receive their British epistolary Correspondence *via* Halifax, or by way of New York, and by which of these routes are the Despatches of the Government chiefly received and sent?—The Mercantile Body of Canada now use the New York channel for their correspondence. Our Merchants occasionally receive Letters from England *via* Falmouth and Halifax, but I believe they seldom send any, finding as they do, that there are more frequent opportunities by New York, and that the expedition is greater. Government Despatches are sent and received by both the above routes. Bulky Packages, where dispatch is of no great moment, go and come *via* Halifax and Falmouth, there being no expense attached to the conveyance by this channel; but I have reason to believe that with all correspondence where *time* is a consideration, the Public Departments make use of the New York Merchant Packets.

106.—Which do you consider, the Halifax or New York route, the least expensive for forwarding or receiving Letters to and from Great Britain and Ireland?—The New York route under the present Tariff of Postage, is certainly the cheapest.

107.—What principle or rule do you act on in choosing Newspapers to advertize Letters remaining in the several Post Offices?—The rule I have acted upon has been to employ that Paper which has the most extensive circulation, provided the Proprietor would advertize at a reasonable price, which has generally been considered 8s. 4d. for publishing 100 Letters three several times, that is a Penny per Letter for three insertions.

108.—Why have you selected a violent partizan Theological Newspaper, called the "Christian Guardian," in Toronto, as your medium for advertizing Letters, and depriving the Toronto Advocate of that advertizing, although it performed the duty at a very reasonable rate; and do you consider it to be a part of your duty to give the patronage of your advertizing to a Paper in Montreal because it has used all the means at its disposal to abuse and vilify the House of Assembly of this Province?—I had employed the Colonial Advocate at Toronto to advertize the Letters remaining in the Post Office of that City until the Paper was discontinued. Mr. Howard, the Post Master of Toronto, then wrote to me to know what Paper he should employ, and acting upon the principle I have mentioned in my last answer, I authorized him to employ the Christian Guardian as having the greatest circulation. As to the Christian Guardian being a violent partizan Paper, I know nothing of it, not having to the best of my recollection, ever read a number of that Paper. The Paper employed at Montreal for advertizing the Letters remaining in the Post Office there, is the "Herald," which Paper has been employed for that purpose ever since I held my present appointment. I have never considered it to be a part of my duty to give the patronage of my advertizing to the Herald or any other Paper on account of its political character, and I can fearlessly appeal to the whole course of my public duty as Deputy Post Master General, to prove that no imputation of this kind can attach to me. I have never enquired nor thought of enquiring into the political creed of the Proprietor of a Newspaper, when considering what Paper I should employ to advertize dead Letters or other Post Office matters in. The very fact of my having employed the Advocate and the Herald together, two Papers of very different politics, should, I think, be sufficient to acquit me of the suspicion of patronizing Papers of a particular bias in politics. I employed the Colonial Advocate when published by Mr. McKenzie, until he gave it up, and I was compelled to look for another medium for publishing the dead Letters. And I can honestly say that I should not have taken the advertizing of the Department from that Paper had it continued in existence. Further than this I shall only say, and I feel confident I am justified in saying it, that if I were to endeavour to select a Newspaper in any Town free from a strong partizan character, as the channel for the advertisements of the Department, I should look in vain.

109.—Previous to giving your Advertisements to those Papers, did you call for tenders from the other Newspaper Proprietors so as to learn at which Office the business might be performed at the lowest expense to the public?—The time when those Papers were first employed is now so distant that I cannot recollect whether I called for tenders or not. I do not however think that I called for tenders. I preferred these Papers because I understood they had the greatest country circulation, and having good reason to believe that the rates at which the Proprietors were willing to perform the work, were reasonable.

Ordered,—That the Deputy Post Master General lay before this Committee, a Return shewing the amount of Inland British American Postage collected in each of the Canadas, on Letters forwarded by the Packet Boats to England for each of the years 1829, 1830, 1831, 1832, 1833 and 1834.

Also, a Return of the Inland Postage collected in each of the Canadas, on Provincial Letters from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, during each of the years 1828, 1829, 1830, 1831, 1832, 1833 and 1834.

Also, Returns of the amount of Newspaper Postage collected in each of the Canadas, on Newspapers by the Falmouth Packets; also, the amount collected in each of the said Provinces on other Newspapers coming through the Post Offices of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, for the years 1828, 1829, 1830, 1831, 1832, 1833 and 1834.

Also, a Comparative Statement of the number and names of the persons employed in the Post Office Department at Quebec, and their salaries immediately previous to the new arrangement made in October, 1834, and the number, names and salaries of those employed at present, distinguishing the French Canadians employed in the Department, the offices they hold, and the salaries they receive.

Also, the Names of the French Canadians employed in the Post Office Department in Montreal and Three Rivers, the salaries they receive, and the offices they hold.

Monday, 7th December, 1835.

Thomas Allen Stayner, Esquire, again called in; and examined:—

110.—In selecting Papers for the advertizing patronage of your Department, how do you judge of those which have "the greatest country circulation;" is it by the amount paid by those Newspapers to the Post Office for the privilege of being transmitted by Mail?—This would certainly be some guide, but I think I have generally asked the Post Master of the Town, which Paper had altogether the greatest circulation, or which would do the business on the best terms. I take the liberty of remarking here, that I do not recollect having taken the advertizing from any one Paper and given it to another, whilst the Paper first employed continued to exist, even though other Papers, published in the same Town, may have acquired a greater circulation.

111.—Are Letters ordered to be advertized in French and English Papers?—No; there is no order on the subject.

112.—When Letters are advertized in French Papers without such being ordered, are they paid for by the Department, or is an allowance in any way made for such advertisements?—No demand has ever been made upon me by the Proprietor of a French Paper for advertizing Letters, nor do I recollect having ever seen Unclaimed Letters advertized in French Newspapers. Several Papers have published Post Office advertisements voluntarily and without any charge, but as far as my memory serves me, they have always been English Papers.

113.—Look at the French Newspaper now handed to you, and say whether the Post Office advertisement pointed out is published by order of your Department?—The Letters advertized in this Paper were published by authority of the Post Office. It would appear from this, that the Proprietors publish the List of Dead Letters in both their French and English editions. When I first employed them to publish the Quebec Dead Letter List, I think their Paper was printed in both languages; when they separated their Paper and published one sheet in English and another in French, I think it most likely (though I certainly cannot charge

charge my memory with the fact) that I requested the List might be published in the two sheets. I say, I think it likely I did so; because it is evidently calculated to diffuse the information more widely than one sheet published in English could do, and it has always been my wish to give these notices as much publicity as possible. I beg leave here to explain, with reference to my last answer, that when I said I had not seen a List of Dead Letters published in a French Newspaper, I meant at a Press exclusively French.

114.—Are the Unclaimed Letters, remaining in the Post Office at Montreal, advertized in French Newspapers?—No, they have never since I have belonged to the Post Office Department been published in more than one Paper at Montreal, and that is an English one.

115.—Do you not consider that the People who speak French, in the City and District of Montreal, ought to have the same accommodation in the way of advertizing their Unclaimed Letters as their Fellow Citizens who speak the English language, or those of their Fellow Subjects in the District of Quebec who speak French?—I do not think that I should be justified in making any distinctions on account of language, that would impose an injury upon any class. I have never employed more than one Paper in any Town for advertizing the Dead Letter List on account of the expense. I rather think that when I first employed the Paper at Montreal in which Dead Letters are at present published, there was no French Paper printed in that City; if there had been, and that the majority of Letters were addressed to persons with French names, I certainly would have employed that Paper, but I beg leave to refer this Honorable Committee to any Quarterly List of Dead Letters published either at Quebec or Montreal, and I am confident they will find that nine-tenths of the names are British or Irish. I further beg to remark, that my orders are, (and I believe they are carefully attended to,) that frequent notices of Unclaimed Letters should be published in the Lobbies of the Offices at Quebec and Montreal, and besides these, the Quarterly Notices are also cut from the Paper and posted on boards, so that every one visiting a Post Office, whether he be of French or British extraction, has the means of knowing whether there are any Letters to his address or not.

116.—What particular advantage do you consider is derived from advertizing Unclaimed Letters for "British or Irish" people in French Papers, which are seldom or never subscribed for or read by that class of persons, or in advertizing Letters for persons speaking the French language only, in English Papers which they seldom or never see?—There can certainly be no advantage conferred upon either class, by publishing their Letters in Papers which they do not read or hear read; but that there is a general benefit conferred upon the community at large, by publishing Letters in the way I do, is very evident, because great numbers of such Letters are called for, and taken up; the people who claim them stating that they had either seen their Letters advertized themselves, or heard through their friends, that there were Letters advertized in their names. I think it right here to inform this Honorable Committee, that when I took charge of the Post Office Department, there existed no regulation for advertizing Dead Letters. I laid down the plan myself as likely to be useful, and I have found it eminently so.

117.—Would it not therefore be more profitable to the Department to advertize the Unclaimed Letters addressed to persons in the District of Montreal, speaking French, in French Newspapers, than in Papers published exclusively in the English language, as is now the practice in that District?—The consideration of the expense attending the advertizing of Unclaimed Letters, has hitherto prevented my employing more than one Paper in any Town for that purpose. I do not think it would be profitable to the Department to employ two Papers, but as the suggestion has been made to me in the last question, I will certainly adopt it, and direct that hereafter a List of the Unclaimed Letters at Montreal shall be published quarterly, in a French, as well as in an English Paper.

118.—Have you any further explanation to give this Committee in answer to Question 102, put to you on Friday last?—Since this question was proposed to me I have been making enquiries of the persons employed in the Sorting Office, and find it impossible to collect such information upon the subject as would justify me in attempting even a rough estimate of what would be the amount of Postage for any given period upon Government Packets and Letters sent by the Halifax Route. The Packet Postage from London to Halifax by that Route is 8s. 8d. sterling an ounce; the Provincial or Inland Postage between Halifax and Toronto 11s. an ounce. Some idea may perhaps be collected from these facts, of the enormous charge to which heavy packages would be liable if they were taxed with postage according to the present Tariff. The amount would be many thousands of pounds per annum, perhaps from thirty to forty thousand pounds; but as I have already observed, any estimate must be a very rough one.

119.—In reference to Question 103, have you any additional explanation to offer?—I cannot say what the weight of the articles referred to in the latter part of my answer may be, in any Mail, because they are mixed with other portions of the Mail. I have myself seen from six to nine or ten very large and heavy bags, consisting of Letters, Returns, Books and Newspapers, arrive with the English Mail, some of them weighing certainly not less than 100 to 130 pounds; and these bags as I have observed in an earlier part of my examination, are at certain periods of the year, to be borne on the shoulders of the Couriers for great distances, while they are toiling their way thro' water or snow breast high. I must here remark that within the last year, the great bulk of the Falmouth Mails, is composed of Newspapers, which when they arrive here, are generally out of date, and consequently useless; their information having been anticipated by the New York Packets.

120.—Do you receive any per centage, allowance, profit or emolument of any description from the sums remitted by you to England on account of the Post Office Department?—No.

121.—Lay before the Committee a Statement shewing 1st. The available claims due from Post Masters and others in Lower Canada to the Post Office Department on the 5th day of October, 1835; 2d. The funds belonging to the Department, in your hands or to your credit, whether as cash in hand, cash in the Banks, or Bills of Exchange, on the same day; 3d. The amount of claims against, and debts due by the Department on the same day. Likewise, similar Returns for Upper Canada to the same date?—I beg to observe that many Accounts of my Deputies for the quarter ending in October, have not yet come in, consequently it will be impossible for me to attempt rendering such a Return as is here called for, until they do come in, and are examined and compiled. I will do my utmost to meet the views of the Committee in this task, as I have in others which they have been pleased to set me, but I beg them to consider that for more than three weeks past, I and my Clerks have been engaged day and night in preparing Statements for them, and that we are now nearly worn out by the extraordinary exertion which has been called for, whilst every other business of the Office has been and is in a great measure suspended. I trust that under these circumstances, some consideration will be shewn to me, and that the Committee will believe I am asking nothing but what is reasonable and necessary, when I request that sufficient time may be allowed me to prepare those and the other Returns and Statements which are now demanded; they shall be rendered as far as it is in my power to complete them.

122.—Please lay before the Committee, the Printers and Stationers' Accounts and Vouchers for the Printing work and Advertizing for your Department for the year 1834, charged in the Contingent Return furnished to this Committee?—I will do so.

123.—Please lay likewise before the Committee, the Accounts and Vouchers for that part of the Contingent Expenses of your Department for the year 1834, classed under the heads:—Law Charges; Travelling Expenses; Mail Bags and Portmanteaus; Office Rent; Carrying out Letters; Fuel and Candles; Mail Locks; Seals and Stamps; Scales and Weights for weighing Packets; Maps; Various other objects?—I will do so.

124.—For what term of years are Contracts for carrying the Mail generally entered into by you?—Generally for from one to five years. Upon forming new Routes we frequently make the Contract for only one or two years. This is often the desire of the Contractor with whom, as the undertaking is new, he does not wish to involve himself in an engagement that may prove disadvantageous to him.

125.—Are you in the habit of changing the Routes, or altering the conditions of those engagements, after the Contracts are signed?—I never change a Route, or alter the conditions of the Contract—pending a Contract—if I can possibly avoid it. I believe, however, I may have changed some Routes and altered the conditions. There is a Clause in our form of Contract that

I may do so if I find it necessary. I have in a few instances increased the allowance to Couriers when I have been convinced that they were insufficiently paid, but, I believe, never except upon small Routes.

126.—Do you, then, enter into a new Contract, or do you consider the Contract, by the alteration, void?—The Contract would not in its general character be void, but I have a right, by the form of the engagement, to pay the Contractor for the increased distance which he may be called upon to perform, in proportion to the sum payable to him for the original distance, or to diminish his allowance in the same proportion, should his route be shortened. My plan would be to engraft the alteration upon the original contract. I do not recollect that I have ever been called upon to make such an alteration.

127.—Please furnish this Committee with Copies of all Contracts (over £100) entered into by you, and at present in force for carrying the Mail, also the names of persons who tendered to carry the Mail and whose tenders were not accepted, the rates at which they proposed to carry the Mail, and the reasons (if any) why you did not accept their offers; if it would be inconvenient to furnish Copies of these Contracts, produce the Originals, which this Committee will return to you when examined?—I will do so.

128.—Would not Letters and Papers be likely to reach their destination much sooner, if sent by the Steamers in summer, especially on the route of the Saint Lawrence and Lake Ontario?—During the season of navigation, Letters and Papers may doubtless often be sent with more despatch by Steamers from Montreal to Quebec, than by the land route; but I do not think it would be any improvement to attempt sending our Mails upwards by Steam Boat—that is, from Quebec to Montreal. The Steamers leave Quebec during the summer, from six o'clock, P. M. to two or three o'clock the following morning, as the tide may serve. The Boats thus leaving, are more frequently than otherwise, either heavily laden, or have loaded vessels in tow; and I do not think that their average passages are less than thirty six hours. The Post now closes at six o'clock, P. M., in summer, and reaches Montreal (if the roads are not very bad indeed) within thirty six hours; and this rate of progress can be calculated upon throughout the year, except during a few days in the spring and fall. I repeat, therefore, that I can see no advantage in employing Steamers on their upward trip, and I have strong doubts whether it would answer to employ them for the downward Mails, except a daily Line were put in operation from the commencement of the season of navigation, and to continue through the same; and this is not likely to be done on the Saint Lawrence, except the Post Office will incur a heavy expense to keep Boats in motion that would otherwise remain idle; for it is well known that during the early part of the summer, and until the Shipping and Emigrants begin to arrive at Quebec in numbers, there are only two or three trips a week made by the Steamers, and these not with regularity. In the autumn too, it is not unfrequent for Steamers to be two or three days and nights in making the voyage between Montreal and Quebec, in consequence of the fogs which prevail on the River. I beg leave here to remark that I have always considered it as a principle, in providing for the conveyance of Mails, that uniform regularity in their progress, even though the speed be not very great, is better than great speed occasionally, with the liability to occasional interruptions and delays; by the present mode, that of land conveyance, even with the indifferent roads which we possess, there is, I conceive, more regularity than there would be with Steamers upon the line connecting Quebec with Montreal. These considerations have hitherto deterred me from attempting Steam Boat conveyance for our Mails on the River Saint Lawrence, or of recommending it for the approval of the Post Master General. I have never consulted the Steam Boat Proprietors as to the expense that would attend the employment of their vessels as daily Packets; but I have reason to think it would be very considerable. The roads in Upper Canada are worse than they are in the Lower Province generally, and the progress of the Mail on the Grand Route, along the coast of Lake Ontario, is slower and more irregular than those between Quebec and Montreal; the advantage, therefore, of employing Steamers on that Lake for the conveyance of the Mails is more probable than the employment of them on the Saint Lawrence; but to insure a full advantage, there should, I conceive, be a daily and regular Line, that is—Boats should start at a fixed hour from either extremity of the Lake, and be engaged to serve all the accessible points on the route. It is to be borne in mind, that in employing Steamers upon the above mentioned lines of communication, the expense will be in addition to the expense of the present land conveyance, inasmuch as the towns and places on the road which cannot be approached by the Steamer, must continue to be served by a land conveyance.

Saturday, 12th December, 1835.

Edwin James King, Esquire, called in; and examined:—

1.—What situation do you hold in the Post Office Department in this Province, and when and by what authority were you appointed to that Office?—I am Accountant to the Post Office of British North America. I was appointed to Office in July, 1834, by the Post Master General in England.

2.—What are the duties which you are obliged to perform in the Post Office Department?—To examine and correct the Accounts of Provincial Post Masters; and I debit or credit them with a corrected account to such examination.

3.—To what Officer, or authority, do you transmit your Report on the Post Masters' Accounts when you have examined and corrected them?—General Accounts are made out from the corrected Documents, which with these Documents, are given to the Deputy Post Master General for his examination and signature.

4.—If errors are found by you in the Post Masters' Accounts, what course do you pursue; do you transmit the Accounts back to the Post Masters, or report the errors to the Deputy Post Master General?—There are certain errors, such as the claims of the Post Masters in their Accounts without Documents, in such cases I refer to the Deputy Post Master General for his authority allowing them or disallowing them.

5.—In case Post Masters do not account for the whole of the Postage charged against them, do you in like manner report the circumstances to the Deputy Post Master General?—I charge them with the whole of the Postage charged against them by other Post Masters. I acquaint them of the amount of any errors that I may have discovered, with directions either to debit or credit themselves with the difference in the next Quarter's Accounts; in some cases to remit the amount to the Deputy Post Master General, if a charge against them; or if to their credit, it is remitted to them by the Deputy Post Master General. In these cases my examination is final.

6.—How often in the year are Post Masters bound to transmit their Accounts for examination to you?—Quarterly.

7.—Is your examination and Report on Post Masters' Accounts final in all cases?—When the General Accounts are submitted to the Deputy Post Master General, for his admission as to their correctness, he makes what observations he thinks necessary.

8.—After having made what observations he thinks necessary, where are the Accounts sent; do you see any thing more of them?—They are returned to me.

9.—And what do you do with them in such cases?—They are sent to the General Post Office at London.

10.—Is the Committee then to understand, that Post Masters' Accounts are first sent to you for examination and correction, and that after you are done with them, you transmit them to the Deputy Post Master General who makes what observations he thinks necessary thereon, and that they are then transmitted through you to London for final Audit by the proper Officer there?—After I have made the necessary examination, I draw up an Account Current which, together with the Post Masters' Accounts, I transmit to the Deputy Post Master General, which Officer I charge with the Amount of the Revenue. Should any observations be found

found necessary on the papers so transmitted by me, the Deputy Post Master General makes them, and refers back the papers to me. It has never as yet occurred, however, that any observations have been made by that Officer on the papers which I have laid before him. I would beg here to remark that before I make out my Account Current, a certificate from the Commissariat of the Amount transmitted by the Deputy Post Master General to England, on account of the Quarter to which the Accounts above referred to belong, is furnished to me, and I place the Amount of the certificate to the credit of the Deputy Post Master General in the Account Current; having received back from the Deputy Post Master General the Account Current above mentioned, with the accompanying Vouchers, I transmit the same to England to the General Post Office.

11.—Are you responsible for the proper and efficient performance of your official duties to any authority in this Province?—No.

12.—Are you bound to obey instructions which you might receive from the Deputy Post Master General here relative to your official duties?—In such cases where he requires information and assistance.

13.—Furnish this Committee with a Copy of your Commission, and of your Instructions as Accountant?—I hand in a Copy of my Instructions, and will furnish a Copy of my Commission to this Committee. [Appendix H. No. 66.—Commission place among the Records.]

14.—What is your annual Salary, and are you paid in Sterling money?—Three hundred pounds Sterling a year.

15.—What assistance are you allowed, and what are the Salaries of your Clerk or Clerks?—Two Clerks; the first at £150. Sterling, the second at £100. Sterling; both appointed by the Post Master General.

16.—Have you any allowance, fee, or emolument in addition to your salary?—None.

17.—Did you hold any situation in the Post Office Department in England previous to your appointment to the Department here; if so, what was that office?—I was Clerk in the Accountant General's Office (Post Office) in London.

Monday, 14th December, 1835.

Thomas Allen Stayer, Esquire, was again called in; and delivered to the Committee the following Papers:—

A Debit and Credit Account for Upper and Lower Canada, in a new shape, as required by the Committee, for the years 1832, 1833 and 1834; also, a Statement shewing the amount of United States Postage collected in the Canadas, and the compensation paid for collecting the same in the years 1832, 1833 and 1834. [Appendix No. 67 to 78.]

Statement of the Emoluments of the Deputy Post Master General for the years 1828, 1829, 1830 and 1831. [Appendix No. 79.]

Comparative Statement of the number and names of the persons employed in the Post Office Department at Quebec, 5th October, 1834, and at present. [Appendix No. 80.]

Names and Salaries of the French Canadians employed in the Post Office at Montreal and Three Rivers. [Appendix No. 81.]

A Return of Bills of Exchange found in Dead Letters. [Appendix No. 82.]

129.—Can you form any idea of the amount of Letters transmitted by Steam Boats, during the summer between Quebec and Montreal, and vice versa?—Any calculation that I can form on this subject must be vague, since I have never had an opportunity of discovering the number of Packets and Letters sent; but that the number is very great, must be evident to any one who has ever made a passage of late years between Quebec and Montreal, as he will have seen the Cabin Tables of the Steam Boats covered by those Letters. It must be recollected too, that this illegal conveyance of Letters occurs during the busy period of the year, when the Mercantile correspondence is infinitely greater than during the winter. If I were to suppose that there are two hundred and fifty trips of the Steam Boats performed during the summer, and that upon an average the Postage lost to Revenue amounted to £10 a trip, making £2,500 per annum, I think I should be within the mark.

130.—Have you ever considered or matured any plan by which the amount of Revenue, or any part thereof, lost by the present transmission of Letters in summer by Steam Boats, could be saved, without at the same time depriving the commercial community of the advantages they enjoy in quickness of despatch, and more frequent departure of their Letters by the Boats than by Mail?—I have thought it possible that the commercial part of the community, and others also, might be allowed to avail themselves of the conveyance of their Letters by Steam Boats, if the Proprietors of the Boats and their Captains, were compelled to deliver those Letters deposited on board, at the Post Offices of the Towns to which they were addressed. The Letters might then be delivered through the medium of the Post Office, either at the regular Postage, as if sent by the land route, or at a mitigated charge.

131.—Would not the end required be attained if the Post Office Department entered into arrangement with the Proprietors of Steam Boats for the establishment of a regular River Mail during the summer months, as on the North River between New York and Albany, independent and exclusive of the Land Mail at present in operation; if not, what obstacles are there to the proposed arrangement?—No doubt the end might be attained in the way just mentioned; but (as I think I have explained upon my examination on the 7th inst.) at a much heavier cost, than by the mode described in my last answer. If a Contract be made with the Steam Boat Proprietors, they will, of course, be bound to run their Boats regularly whether they have any other object than the conveyance of the Mail or not, and they will, of course, demand a remuneration accordingly.

132.—Could not Bags be left from the Department at the Steam Boats into which Merchants and others, desirous of transmitting their Letters by Steam Boats, might be at liberty to drop their Letters, and which Bags the Captain or Purser would be obliged to take, to seal or tie, and to deliver at the Post Office of the Port at which he would arrive, for which trouble he might be allowed the usual gratuity to Ship Captains for delivering Ship Letters?—This might be done certainly, and I had a similar plan in view when I stated, in my answer previous to the last, that the commercial people and others might be allowed to avail themselves of the facilities afforded by the Steam Boats, without injuring the rights of the Post Office.

133.—In Mr. Spring Rice's Despatch of October 5th, 1834, it is stated that a considerable amount of Postage, for the Correspondence of the Provincial Authorities, remains due to the Post Office, which the respective Public Officers have not the means of paying, except through a Vote of the Legislature; what are the items alluded to in that Despatch, and what is the amount which is considered to be at present due by those Authorities to the Post Office?—I will afford the information required.

134.—Please lay before this Committee, a List of Applications received by you since your return from England for the establishment of New Post Offices in Lower Canada; shewing, 1st. The Name of the Applicant and the date of the application; 2nd. The place in which the proposed Post Office was required for; 3rd. If the application was granted, and the date when the new Post Office was established; 4th. If not, the reasons for not acceding to the request,—in the following form:—

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—I shall furnish the List required.

135.—Please furnish a similar Return to the last, requested for Upper Canada likewise?—I shall do so. [Appendix No. 83.]

136.—Is the loss of money transmitted by Mail a matter of frequent occurrence in the Post Office Department in the Canadas?—Considering the great amount of money transmitted by the Mails in the Canadas, which is principally done through the medium of Bank Notes, I think that the losses are very rare.

137.—You are required to lay before this Committee, a Return of the Complaints made to your Department, relative to the loss of money transmitted by Mail within the last three years, 1833, 1834 and 1835, shewing the name of the Complainant, the date of the complaint or loss, the respective sums enclosed in each Letter and missed, and whether the same was recovered or not, in the following form:—

Wednesday, 23rd December, 1835.

Thomas Allen Stayner, Esquire, again called in; and examined:—

138.—Are you prepared to furnish any further Returns required of you by this Committee?—I beg to lay before the Committee the following Papers required by their order:—

Copies of the Accounts and Vouchers for the Printing work and Advertizements of the Post Office Department in the Canadas, for the year 1834, charged in the Contingent Returns furnished to the Committee, per Schedule.

Also, Copies of the Accounts and Vouchers for that part of the Contingent expenses of the Post Office Department in the Canadas, for the year 1834, classed under the heads of "Law Charges," "Travelling Expenses," "Mail Bags and Portmanteaus," "Office Rent," "Carrying out Letters," "Fuel and Candles," "Mail Locks," "Seals and Stamps," "Scales and Weights," "Maps, and various other objects," per Schedule. (Appendix Nos. 84 and 85.) [Note.—The Schedules only are printed with one Voucher. [Appendix No. 86.] The other Vouchers are among the files of the Session.]

139.—What becomes of Dead Letters in this Province?—Those that originate in England are returned there to be opened and sent to the writers, or destroyed. Those that originate in the Provinces are opened in the General Post Office, Quebec, and sent to the writers, or destroyed. They are opened by a Sworn Clerk, Mr. Kemlin.

140.—Is there any extra expense incurred for the transport of Mails, by the establishing or opening of New Post Offices on a Post Road already established at the extremities and on different points of which, Post Offices already are placed?—I do not recollect having ever been called upon to pay any thing additional for the transport of a Mail, in consequence of establishing New Offices on a Post Road, though Contractors have frequently complained that it is hard for them to be compelled to keep their time good, when they are obliged to serve more Offices than existed on the Route when they first took the Contract.

141.—What are the names of the places at which Post Offices are established on the North side of the River St. Lawrence between Quebec and Montreal, (exclusive of these two Offices,) and in what year was the latest Post Office on that Route established?—Cap Santé; Portneuf; Ste. Anne; Three Rivers; Yamachiche; River du Loup; Berthier, with a Sub Office at St. Sulpice. The above are all the Offices between Quebec and Montreal. And it appears by a Return rendered by me to the Committee, that the latest creation of an Office on this Route was Yamachiche, on the 6th July, 1831.

142.—What is the distance between Quebec and Cap Santé; and how many Parishes are there between these two places unprovided with Post Offices?—The distance between Quebec and Cap Santé is about 30 miles; the Parishes lying between Quebec and Cap Santé, unprovided with Post Offices, are, to the best of my knowledge, St. Foi; Lorette, St. Augustin, Pointe aux Trembles, Les Ecureuils.

143.—What is the distance between Cap Santé and the next Post Office at Portneuf?—Five miles.

144.—What is the distance between Montreal and the first Post Office on the Mail Road below that City?—The first regular Post Office on the Mail Road is Berthier, 45 miles below Montreal, but, as I have mentioned in a previous answer, there is a Sub Office to Berthier, at St. Sulpice, about 5 leagues above Berthier, and 10 leagues below Montreal, which Sub Office (although it does not keep accounts with the General Post Office) affords the same accommodation to the public, that other Offices do.

145.—How happens it that such inequality has arisen in the distribution of Post Offices, that the nearest above Quebec is 30 miles, and the nearest below Montreal is 30 miles, whilst there are two within five miles of each other on one part of the Road?—More Offices have not been considered necessary, or if they have ever been asked for, suitable persons as Post Masters could not be found willing to undertake the duty. I have experienced the greatest difficulty in finding persons willing to act as Post Masters in the Canadian Parishes. It is notorious that there is very little Letter writing in the French Canadian Parishes, and the emoluments of the Post Master from his per centage, being but trifling, few persons are willing to undertake the drudgery of attending an Office and keeping accounts for so inconsiderable a reward. I may observe that the difficulty of finding Post Masters for the smaller Offices on such a Route as that between Montreal and Quebec, where the Mail passes ten times in each week, is greater than it is on Routes less frequently served; for it may be, that the Mail passes in the middle of the night, and no man is inclined to undertake the duty of opening and dispatching Mails under such circumstances, without being paid at a higher rate for his services, than I have had it in my power to pay.

146.—Are you aware that there are as many as 14 or 15 Parishes on the main Road between Quebec and Montreal unprovided with Post Offices?—I have no doubt there are as many as 14 or 15 Parishes so situated, that is, Parishes which have no Post Office located within their limits.

147.—Have you made any exertions to extend Post Office accommodations between Montreal and Quebec since 1831, the date of the establishment of the latest Post Office on that Route?—I have so far made exertions, that I have discussed the applications that have been presented to me on the subject, with the individuals interested, with the wish, if possible, of granting them. Those applications have however been but few: I can only recollect three, viz.:—One from Deschambault, which I was intending to establish when I was called to England in the spring of 1833, and the application for which has not been renewed since my return. Another at Pointe aux Trembles, for which, if my memory serves me correctly, I received only a verbal application, but which I hope to put in operation shortly; and a third at Grondines: This last I was preparing to put into Commission the commencement of next quarter, but I was yesterday waited upon by the individual who has chiefly interested himself in the question, (a Mr. Houd,) and from his representations I have been obliged to postpone the establishment of this Office till a new arrangement can be made respecting a Post Master to take charge of it.

148.—Do you take any steps to establish new Post Offices where necessary, unless applied to specially for that purpose?—I believe that some years ago, in a few instances, I suggested to the inhabitants of certain places the advantages of having Post Offices, and requested them to nominate Post Masters; but of late years I have not found it at all necessary to do any thing of the kind,

kind, as the spontaneous applications have been so numerous that I have not had it in my power to grant them in sufficient numbers to meet the wishes of the parties, though I am endeavouring to do so. The demands of this kind from Upper Canada are more frequent than from the Lower Province.

149.—What are the names, to the best of your recollection, of the "certain places" alluded to in your last answer?—I have only at this moment a distinct recollection of one such instance, that is, "Chatham," at the foot of Grenville Canal, which I foresaw would, in consequence of the public works going on in its neighbourhood, soon become a place of importance, as has proved to be the case. I believe there were a few other places, but the time is distant, and I cannot speak positively to the names. I have an idea that I also made the first proposition for an Office at Lennoxville, Lower Canada.

150.—What is the distance between Chatham, or Carillon, and the nearest Post Office, (St. Andrews,) and what is the distance between Lennoxville and the next Post Office at Sherbrooke Village?—The distance between Chatham and St. Andrews is about 3 miles, and the distance between Lennoxville and Sherbrooke is, I think, between 4 and 5 miles.

151.—If you were furnished with the names of proper persons to serve as Post Masters in the villages on the route between Quebec and Montreal at present unprovided with Post Office accommodation, would you have any objection to put new Offices in operation in those Villages?—I shall have no objection to put Offices into operation in those Villages, or in any other Villages situated on established Post Roads, when I am furnished with the names of proper persons as Post Masters, on the usual condition of their supplying me with the requisite security for the performance of the duty.

152.—Much complaint has been made of the want of Post Office accommodation in the Counties of Gaspé and Bonaventure, and of the irregularity of the arrival of the Mails, from which circumstances it is stated that that Section of the Province is almost shut out from all communication with the other parts of the country; can you state to the Committee what these evils are owing to; what difficulties prevent the extension of Post Office accommodation to that District; and whether you intend to make arrangements to secure to the inhabitants of these Counties any equal accommodation with their other fellow subjects?—I am perfectly aware that there is a great want of Post accommodation in the Counties of Gaspé and Bonaventure, and that even such arrangements as do exist in those quarters of the Province, are very imperfect. The cause of this may be stated in a few words: it is, that there exists no direct road of communication between these remote sections of the Province, and the Head Quarters of the Post Office Department at Quebec; and I must here record it as my belief, that no efficient system of amelioration in the Post Office arrangements there, can be introduced, until the "Metis Road" (from the River Saint Lawrence to the head of the Ristigouche) is made practicable. I quite agree with Mr. Deblois, Member of the Provincial Parliament for the County of Bonaventure, (whose answers to certain questions from the Post Office Committee have been shewn to me) in his views on this part of the subject, and would respectfully urge upon the consideration of the proper authorities, the necessity of completing the aforesaid Road, as the foundation of a plan for identifying Bonaventure and Gaspé with the rest of the Province, from which they are now in a great degree shut out. At present my only means of transmitting Mails to Ristigouche and Bay of Chaleur, is by the circuitous and tedious channel of "Fredericton" and "Miramichi," thence along the Gulph Shore to "Dalhousie," from whence they are crossed over to the Post Office establishment at Carleton. The Committee will please to observe, that the greatest part of this Route is through the Province of New Brunswick, the Post arrangements of which are not under my control, and for which I cannot be held responsible; it is utterly impossible therefore, (independent of the great consumption of time connected with this route,) that it can become a satisfactory one to the people of this Province. The Metis Road is the natural Route, and when it is made practicable, and a few Settlers located upon it, at intervals of perhaps four or five leagues from each other, it will be a comparatively easy task to organize a chain of Post Offices through from the Saint Lawrence to the Ristigouche, and thence (following the course of the different Roads and Settlements) to Point Peter at Gaspé. In a conversation which I have recently held with Mr. Le Boutillier, the Member for the County of Gaspé, on the subject of improving the Posts in that quarter, I stated my intention of sending an Officer of the Post Office Department next Spring to Gaspé and Bonaventure, for the purpose of making such arrangements as may be found practicable, to meet the wants of the inhabitants. I must however repeat my declaration, that no efficient system can be formed, and followed up, until we possess the means of sending our Couriers through the "Metis Road." I can form a connection between the Counties of Gaspé and Bonaventure; make several new Offices, and establish better discipline amongst those now in existence; but the grand object—that of a quicker and safer communication between Quebec and those parts, I have not the power of accomplishing, nor shall not have, until (as I have already stated) a Post Road shall exist over which I can have control. I find I have omitted to state that the only means of Post communication with Gaspé which we now possess, is by means of a Courier engaged by the Post Master at Point Peter, to come to Quebec, and return with the Correspondence and Newspapers, twice in the course of the Winter. In the Summer, there is no Post Office communication maintained: the inhabitants, during that period, depend upon Merchant Vessels for sending and receiving their Correspondence.

153.—What are your Instructions to the Post Master at Three Rivers, relative to Office hours?—The Post Master at Three Rivers is subject to the general regulations with regard to Office hours, as prescribed in the Book of Instructions to Post Masters; that is to say, to keep his Office open for business from 7 o'clock, A. M. to 7 P. M. between the 1st May and 31st October; and from 8 o'clock, A. M. to 4 o'clock, P. M. from 1st November to 30th April. On Sundays, between the hours of Divine Service.

154.—At what hour is the Mail directed to be closed at that Office?—I think my Instructions are, that he shall close the Mail at 11 o'clock, A. M. I only speak from memory; but as he despatches the Mail East and West, not later than 12 o'clock, my impression is, that I ordered him to close at 11.

155.—This Committee has been informed that he closes his Mail at 10 o'clock, A. M. and shuts his Office at 2 o'clock, P. M. thus putting the inhabitants of that Town to much inconvenience; has such practice been to your knowledge, and if not, will you take immediate and efficient steps to put a stop to it?—This is the first intimation I have had of such a departure from the Regulations, and I will take immediate steps to put a stop thereto.

Thursday, 24th December, 1835.

Thomas Allen Stagner, Esquire, was again called in; and laid before the Committee the following Statements required by their order, so far as he has been able at this time to complete them:—

A Statement of the amount of British Packet Postage received at Quebec and Montreal, for distribution in Upper and Lower Canada, in each of the years from 1828 to 1834 inclusive.—[Appendix No. 87.]

A Statement of Inland Postage on Provincial Letters from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, received at Quebec and Montreal for distribution in Upper and Lower Canada, during each of the years from 1828 to 1834 inclusive.—[Appendix No. 88.] (The blanks which are now unavoidably left in these Statements, shall be filled up so soon as I can obtain the necessary information for which I have written, to Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.)

Adverting to my answer (upon my examination yesterday) to the Question put to me by the Committee respecting the time of closing the Mail at Three Rivers, I beg to state that having referred to the Road Bills, I find that the rule with the Post Master at present, is to despatch the Mails East and West, at 11 o'clock. He is therefore not in fault in closing his Mails at 10 o'clock, as I have always considered it right, that there should be one hour allowed between the closing of the Mails at Three Rivers and dispatching

despatching the Couriers. It further appears by the Bills, that in Summer the Couriers are dispatched at 12 o'clock whenever practicable, and during that season I have no doubt that Letters are received for Mailing until 11 o'clock. I will ascertain those points, if the Committee desire it, more particularly; in the mean time I have thought it a matter of justice to the Post Master, to state what I have now done with respect to the hour of closing the Mails—as yesterday the difference between the Summer and the Winter arrangements at Three Rivers did not strike me.

Mr. Stayner was then further examined :—

156.—Have you ever brought under the consideration of the Executive, or the Legislature of this Province, the necessity of establishing or rendering practicable the Road from Metis to the head of the Ristigouche?—I have never made a written communication on the subject, but I have several times spoken of it to Their Excellencies Sir James Kempt and Lord Aylmer, and stated what I have now had the honor of doing to the Committee, that it was absolutely necessary this Road should be established before we could have an efficient Post communication with the Counties of Gaspé and Bonaventure; a truth of which Their Excellencies seemed to be fully aware. Sir James Kempt appeared to be exceedingly anxious to have the Road in question completed, as he considered it necessary on many important accounts, as well as in relation to the Post.

157.—Have you ever adopted any arrangements to make up and send Mails to the District of Gaspé by Schooners, or other vessels sailing thither in the Summer months?—No; I have never made any arrangements to this effect, and the public are perhaps just as well satisfied to send their Letters and Papers themselves by those vessels without the interference of the Post Office. It now occurs to me, that we do occasionally make up and send by the above vessels, packets of any Letters that may happen to be left at the Post Office for Gaspé, addressing them to the Post Master there. I think this is the case, but it is necessary I should make enquiry at the Sorting Office on the subject before I can vouch for it. At all events the Letters sent in this way cannot be numerous, as people do not think it necessary to employ the Post Office when they can make use of a private correspondence with less trouble to themselves.

158.—In your capacity as Deputy Post Master General, is it not a part of your duty to attend to the interests of your Department, and although the public, in your opinion, are “as well satisfied to send their Letters and Papers by vessels without the interference of the Post Office,” would it not be your business to see that the Post Office Revenue does not suffer, whilst you at the same time afford the public all possible accommodation by making up and transmitting Mails as often as you can have the opportunity so to do, during the season, in Vessels trading to Gaspé?—I do not think that I have any right to prevent persons sending their Letters by Vessels if they think proper so to do. It is my duty to attend to the interests of the Post Office and the convenience of the public conjointly, but I have never felt that under my instructions it was incumbent upon me to provide a water conveyance for the Mail to Gaspé, nor that it was my duty to prevent individuals from sending their Letters to and from that place by private means. Gaspé it may be observed, although within the limits of Lower Canada, is so shut out from the rest of the Province by the absence of any Road of communication, that as regards the Post Establishment, it is almost like another country.

159.—Laying aside for the present your right to prevent Letters being sent by vessels from one place to another, is it not a part of your duty to do all in your power to advance the interests of your Department, increase its revenues, and accommodate the public; and are you not of opinion these three objects would be in a great measure attained by your despatching Mails from time to time by the River to the Gaspé District in the Summer season?—As I have already had the honour of stating to the Committee, very few persons think of making the Post Office the medium of transporting their correspondence with Gaspé during the summer, and the total amount of letters which the Department is employed to send, is very trifling. Besides this, I do not think that much reliance could be placed on the advantages of employing such Craft as generally ply between Gaspé and Quebec. They are often very irregular in their progress, and I understand stop at different Ports and Harbours on their way for the purpose of trading.—Mails of Letters can scarcely be considered safe when forwarded by such means.

160.—At what Ports and Harbours are they in the habit of calling before reaching Gaspé Bay?—It is impossible for me to say; I can only state what I have heard generally.

161.—The Committee are desirous of understanding whether it is your intention, as Deputy Post Master General, to order River Mails to be made up and despatched to Gaspé during the Navigation Season, for the accommodation of the Public and the advantage of the Revenue, by such Vessels as you may find trading or going thither for the future, from time to time?—In answer to this question, I beg to say that as I propose sending a Post Office Surveyor to Gaspé in the ensuing Spring, for the purpose of making improvements in the Post arrangements of that section of the Province, generally, I shall ascertain, through the information which he will have the means of acquiring, whether the Trading Vessels alluded to, can be advantageously employed during the season of Navigation, to convey Mails to Gaspé; and if it can be done, I certainly will employ them. I hope the Committee will do me the justice to believe that I am anxiously desirous of facilitating Post intercourse between the different sections of this Province, as well as between the several Provinces, and that I am disposed at all times to avail myself of any suggestions that may be afforded to me, having for their object any improvement in the Posts.

162.—What time do you expect the Surveyor to report?—I cannot tell. He will go on his mission as soon as the season will admit, and will return as soon as he has attended to the several objects with which he will be charged.

163.—Are the Committee then to understand that the District of Gaspé is to be deprived until the Surveyor's return, which is uncertain, of the casual accommodation to be afforded by the despatching of River Mails by the Post Office Department?—I wish the Committee to understand that I am desirous of sending Letters to Gaspé, whenever, in my judgment, it will be advantageous to the public to do so. At present there is only one Post Office at Gaspé, and that is situated at Point Peter. I will give Instructions that should vessels be sailing direct for that part of Gaspé in the Spring, before the Surveyor returns from his mission, Mails shall be sent by them.

164.—If the Representatives of the Counties of Gaspé and Bonaventure were to furnish you with the names of proper persons to act as Post Masters in the several Villages along the shores of the Bay of Chaleur and Gaspé Bay, would it not facilitate such arrangements as you propose making for the transmission of River Mails during the next and following Summers?—I think it would. I should, as a matter of course, have directed the Surveyor to address himself to the Representatives for information on the subjects connected with his mission, when he visited the country.

Tuesday, 29th December, 1835.

Thomas Allen Stayner, Esquire, again called in; and examined :—

165.—This Committee having enquired into the state of the Post Office accommodation in this Province, have been informed that several thriving Villages not on Post Roads, are without such accommodation, and are desirous to have Post Offices, viz :—

St. Scholastique, in the County of Two Mountains.

St. Vincent de Paul, St. Martin, Ste. Thérèse, in the County of Terrebonne.

 Ste. Catherine de Fossambault, in the County of Portneuf.
 St. Paschal, in the County of Kamouraska.
 St. Polycarpe and Isle Perrot, in the County of Vaudreuil.
 Kemp's Bridge, Inverness, in the County of Megantic.
 St. Gervais, in the County of Bellechasse.
 St. Jude, in the County of Richelieu.

Contrecoeur, St. Marc, St. Antoine, in the County of Verchères.

The Committee therefore, wish to know if it is your intention to extend Post Office accommodation to those Parishes, applications from several of which it is stated have already been sent in to you, without success?—In reply to this question, I beg to inform the Committee, that as I conceive it to be my duty to afford all parts of the Province Post accommodation to the extent of the Funds at my disposal, I shall attentively apply myself to make arrangements for supplying the Parishes and places enumerated by the Committee with Post Offices, and the means of communicating with other places. All I ask for is, that I may have a reasonable time allowed me for organizing such extensive additions to the Establishment as are now required. Much correspondence and research are frequently necessary to complete the arrangements for opening new Lines of Route; and as my assistance is limited, it is not possible to create all the new Offices that may be desirable at once. I take occasion here to observe, that my long absence from my Office in the years 1833 and 1834, when called to England on business of the Post Office, threw that branch of my duty which relates to the creation of Offices and the opening of new Post Routes, greatly in arrears, and I have not yet had it in my power to repair the consequences of this absence, though I am using every exertion to that effect. I beg to add, that from what I know of the character of the places enumerated in the List prepared by the Committee, I entertain but little doubt that I shall, upon enquiry, feel myself justified in creating Offices at the places described, and I hope also to be able to effect this in the course of the ensuing summer.

166.—If the Representatives of the several Counties in which those Villages are situated, furnish you with the names of proper persons to act as Post Masters therein, would it not expedite and facilitate the necessary arrangements, and enable you at an early period to extend the accommodations required?—It would certainly tend to facilitate the necessary arrangements, if the Members of the Assembly alluded to, were to furnish me with the names of persons whom they may consider suitable for conducting the duties of the several Offices at the places named; and to those recommendations the Committee may be assured I shall be disposed to shew every respect.

167.—How often per week does the Mail go to the Lines *via* the Kennebec Road?—Once a week.

168.—Is there not a pretty considerable amount of correspondence by that Route, and were the Mail to be despatched oftener, say twice a week, would it not, in your opinion, be a great accommodation to the Mercantile community of Quebec, and tend to increase the productiveness of that branch of the Revenue?—The correspondence by this Route is not great at present, but I have no doubt it would increase if the Mail were carried upon it twice a week. I think this is a Route which will, ere many years, become of great importance to the Commercial interests of this Province, and that it will be desirable to send the Mail by it twice a week, so soon as the United States General Post Office can be induced to make a corresponding arrangement on their side of the Line, until which it would be useless in us to send it more frequently than we now do.

169.—How many Mails arrive at Hilton's (State of Maine) now per week?—One. I have heard that within a short time, since the Winter Roads have been formed, a Stage comes to Hilton's at the height of Land, a second time per week, and that Letters have been brought by it; but this is not an arrangement recognized by the General Post Office at Washington, and it will only continue whilst the winter travelling lasts.

170.—Have any applications been made to you to run a Mail to Hilton, twice a week, and what are your intentions relating thereto?—Applications have been made to me recently by persons connected with the Mail and Stages upon the Route in question, to send the Mail twice a week, and I have thought myself justified (in considering the prospective advantages of that Line of communication,) to hold out the following promise: That paying now £150 a year, for carrying the Mail once a week, I would consent to pay £250 a year for carrying it twice a week, in a respectable manner, in good Stage Waggon, so soon as I could prevail upon the American Post Office Department to make a corresponding arrangement within its Territory. I am waiting for an answer from the parties to whom I have held out this encouragement, and if they accept my proposal, I shall do my utmost to prevail upon the American Post Master General to enter into my views upon the subject.

171.—The Committee understand that you collect and account to the Post Master General in Washington, for all United States Postage due on Letters delivered in the several Post Offices in this Province?—I do so.

172.—Does the Department at Washington reciprocate this accommodation, and collect and remit to you the Canada Postage (if any) due on Letters addressed to parties in the United States, and delivered at any Post Office there?—No.

173.—Have you ever entered into any communication with the Post Master General at Washington with a view to the collection at the Post Offices in the United States, where Letters from Canada may be delivered, of the Postage due thereon, and for the remittance to you of that portion which may belong to this Province?—No, I have not.

174.—Would not such an arrangement be a great accommodation to the Public in this Country, and might it not be entered into without any great damage to our Post Office Revenue?—An arrangement of the kind would probably be an accommodation to the Public in this Country, but we should be obliged to pay American Post Masters for collecting that Revenue which is now collected by our own Post Masters. Of course, such an arrangement as is here alluded to could not be entered into by me without an authority from the Post Master General in England, to whom I have never applied on the subject, for this reason, that my predecessor, Mr. Sutherland, informed me that he had many years since recommended the adoption of the plan to the Department at Home, but that the Post Master General had refused his consent to it, upon the principle, if my memory serves me, that it was a *Rule or a Law*, that British Post Office Revenue must not be collected in a Foreign Country. The Committee will of course understand that the consent of the Post Master General of the United States, is likewise necessary to any arrangement of this kind.

175.—Would the payment of a per centage for the collection of Canada Postage in the United States be an insurmountable obstacle in your mind to the entering on the proposed arrangement, if you had the consent of your superior, and if the Post Master General at Washington had no objection to reciprocate?—No; I cannot see that the payment of a per centage to the American Post Master General would form an insurmountable obstacle, if the consent of my superior, and of the Post Master General at Washington were obtained. I merely mention the fact, referred to, that the Committee might understand that the operation of the measure would be to take money out of the Province.

176.—Do you not retain, in your Contracts, a right to fine Contractors, or Conductors of Mails in certain cases?—I do.

177.—How are the Fines disposed of which are levied in these cases?—They go to the Credit of the General Post Office, that is, they are deducted upon the face of the Receipt granted by the Contractor.

178.—Please lay before the Committee, a Return shewing the amount of Fines levied by you for each of the years 1832, 1833, and 1834, distinguishing Upper from Lower Canada?—I will do so.

179.—In the Contingency Accounts laid by you before the Committee, there is an item of £812. 2. 1. Currency, charged for extraordinary

extraordinary expenses incurred by you going to, coming from, and whilst remaining in England; by whose order did you undertake that journey?—By order of the Post Master General.

180.—Lay before this Committee, a Copy of the Letter which you received from the Post Master General, ordering you to proceed to England?—I will do so.

181.—With what Departments were you in communication whilst in England?—My communications were with the General Post Office; but on several occasions I attended the Post Master General and the Secretary of the General Post Office in their conferences with the Colonial Secretary, on the subject of the Post Office question in these Provinces.

182.—From the 20th June, 1833, to the 25th July, 1834, the period during which, it appears, you remained in London, were you called on by either of the Departments with which you communicated, to furnish, and did you furnish whilst in London, or since your return, any written Report on the state of, or relating to, the Post Office Department in these Provinces?—Whilst in London I furnished to the General Post Office my opinions in relation to the new arrangements proposed for the Department in these Provinces—both in writing and verbally. I was in the habit of frequent intercourse on this subject with his Grace the Duke of Richmond, then Post Master General, Mr. Freeling, the Assistant Secretary, and the Post Office Solicitor. Since my return to this Country I have made no other Reports than such as are before the Committee.

183.—Can you furnish this Committee with Copies of the written Reports alluded to in your last answer?—No, I cannot. I preserved no Copies. I had no Clerk to assist me in the duty, and I never undertook to preserve Copies, not conceiving it necessary to do so.

184.—You are requested to take back the Schedules annexed to the Contingency Vouchers, which you laid before the Committee, and to annex to that of the Printers the residence of such Printers, and to state in the other Schedule the article for which the sum opposite the name was paid. Also, to annex at the foot of each Schedule, a recapitulation, shewing the amount disbursed in Upper Canada, and the amount disbursed in Lower Canada, in the form prescribed in pencil mark, and when done, to return the said Papers to this Committee?—I will do so.

Monday, 8th February, 1836.

Edwin James King, Esquire, again called in; and examined:—

18.—Have you since your assumption to Office, made any Reports to the Post Master General, his Deputy, or Secretary, touching improvements or alterations in the keeping of the Post Office Accounts, or other matter concerning your Department?—Last November I submitted a scheme for the consideration of the Deputy Post Master General, referring to the proper maintenance of the check between the Post Office at Quebec and the Country Post Masters in the Canadas, and I have also one ready to submit for the purpose of establishing a practicable check upon the cross Posts; that is, the correspondence between the several Post Towns.

19.—Lay before the Committee, Copies of such Annual, Quarterly, and Periodical Accounts as you have transmitted to the General Post Office, London, in conformity with the Instructions given you by the Post Master General on your appointment to Office, dated London, 3d July, 1834?—I shall do so.

Tuesday, 9th February, 1836.

Thomas Allen Stayner, Esquire, again called in; and examined:—

185.—Have you adopted any Law proceedings to recover the several sums due to the Post Office Department by the Defaulters reported by you to this Committee; and have you succeeded in obliging them to pay up their balances?—I have adopted Law proceedings against the Post Master of Barford, Mr. Whitehead, and against Mr. Bethune, the late Post Master of Cobourg; the other Debtors I have frequently written to, and I hope that I shall recover from most of them without resorting to Law. Mr. Irvine, of Coteau du Lac, has left the country, and his Securities are not to be found. I beg to explain, that the Revenue has not sustained any loss by those Defaulters, the Debts are actually due to me as Deputy Post Master General, inasmuch as I have credited to Government the full amount of their abstracts.

186.—Do you still continue the said Defaulters in Office?—Mr. Bethune is not in Office; I was preparing to remove him when he resigned. Mount, of Delaware, is dead. Cameron, of Alexandria, has, I think, paid his debt; but being a small matter I cannot be certain without reference to my Office; he is no longer employed. Ramsey, of Adolphustown, is also out of Office; as are Murdoch, of Lanark, and Burke, of Richmond. Believing that the others will pay their debts eventually, I have not considered it incumbent upon me to dismiss them from Office; for it will be observed that these debts are not of long standing; the Officers can indeed scarcely be called Defaulters. It is besides not an easy matter at all times to find a substitute for a Post Master: I am indeed frequently subjected to much difficulty in searching successors to Post Masters who resign or are dismissed, and I could not, even if I were so disposed, dismiss every Post Master from Office for being a little in arrears. I think I may venture to say that the system I have pursued, of vigilantly looking after Post Masters myself, without resorting to Law until every other effort for recovering the balances due by my Deputies has failed, has succeeded very well.

187.—Have you received any particular Instructions from the head of your Department in London, relative to the disposal of the surplus of Post Office Revenue in your hands?—Every Instruction which I have received relative to the disposal of surplus Revenue, I have already had the honor of laying before this Committee.

188.—Have you verbally, or in writing, been given to understand by the head of your Department in England, that the Government was not desirous of deriving any profit from the Post Office in the Canadas; and that they had no objection that any surplus in your hands may be expended in extending Post Office communications within these Provinces?—As already said, I have not received any Instructions on this subject other than what the Committee are in possession of. As the question speaks of "verbal" intimations to me from the head of my Department, I can only say, that in any conversations which I held with My Lord the Post Master General on the subject of the Posts here, His Lordship evinced an anxiety that the wants of the people with regard to Post accommodation should be properly supplied. I was never told that any surplus Revenue accruing *must* be expended in extending Post Office communications within these Provinces, but I considered that the feeling with the Post Master General was, that where new Post Routes and increased facilities were required, I was to supply them. When I left England, it was supposed that the Act for the re-organization of the Post Office Establishment in these Provinces submitted to the several Provincial Governments by Mr. Secretary Rice, would go into effect the 1st of January, 1836, when it was intended that I should be provided with fresh Instructions for my government.

189.—Please lay before this Committee, Copies of the material Reports dated October, 1832, transmitted by you to the Post Master General, and referred to in G. H. Freeling's Letter, dated 11th March, 1833?—I will do so.

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Letter of yesterday's date, conveying the desire of the Special Committee appointed to enquire into the State of the Post Office Department, that I should furnish with the least possible delay, Copies of the Annual Reports made to the Post Master General on the State of the Post Office Department in these Provinces, for the years 1828, 1829, 1830, 1831, 1832, 1833 and 1834, and a Copy also of the Map of the Post Roads, Offices, &c. in British North America, alluded to in my Letter dated 23d December (Qr. October?) 1832.

In reply to your Communication, I beg you will do me the favour to inform the Chairman of the Committee, that I have never transmitted any other Annual Reports, than for the years 1831, 1832 and 1833. I commenced those Reports in 1831, taking up at that time, the state of the Department as it stood in April, 1828, when I assumed the charge of it, and from the same year, viz., 1831, I intended making Annual Reports; but the plan was persevered in only for the two years next following, viz., 1832 and 1833. The preparation of these Statements requires more time than I have had at my disposal since I returned from England, and on this account I have never compiled a Report for 1834. I shall lose no time in copying for the use of the Committee, the Annual Reports for 1831 and 1833, and should the Committee then think fit to demand Statements for the other years, it will be my duty to compile them as soon as I can.

I shall immediately employ a person at copying the Map required by the Committee.

Note. A.—The 12s. 1d. here stated under the head of "Derived from other sources" arise from a Commission of 2½ per cent. allowed by an authority from His Majesty's Treasury to Post Masters for keeping Accounts for Postage with the Military Departments. Mr. Macanlay out of the Total Income described, pays two Clerks £160 per annum, and supplies an Office with Light and Fuel for the same. This Officer states that in addition to the other Items for Boxes and Drawers have averaged for the years 1852, 1853, and 1854, £3. 14s. 2d per annum, a sum which he adds is not sufficient to cover the interest of the money expended in fitting them up.

B.—This sum of £155. 18s. 7d. is made up as follows, viz: £111. 17s. 4d. Commission on keeping Postage Accounts with Public Departments, Institutions and Individuals; £27. 1s. 3d. for rent of Post Office Boxes, and £17, being pence received by him for sending out Town Letters.—Mr. Howard, like Mr. Macanlay and every other Post Master, provides his own Clerks, an Office, Fuel, Candles, and Stationery out of the aggregate sum stated opposite his name. The compensation to all Post Masters either under the Head of Salary or Allowance is granted by the authority of the Post Master General.—The Commission on United States Postage is allowed by the American Government.—The allowance for collecting the dues on Newspapers, under the privilege of the Deputy Post Master General, is granted by that Officer to his Deputies for their trouble.—The Commission on keeping Postage Accounts is a private arrangement between the Post Master and Individuals,—the same may be said of the rent of Boxes.—The pence derived by Mr. Howard for the sending out of Town Letters is also a provisional arrangement for the benefit of the public, which will be superseded so soon as a regular Penny Post is established in the City of Toronto.

C.—Under the column of Assistants or Clerks, I have given the names, as they have been reported to me by the Post Masters, of all the persons permitted to assist in their respective Post Offices, these are all sworn, but they possess no privilege or right in the Department, beyond that of assisting the Principal, or acting for him during his absence.—It is frequently necessary, even at small Offices in Country places, to allow the Post Master to employ more than one Assistant in the duties of the Office; but I have recently found it necessary to make a regulation by which only one of the Clerks or Assistants at a Country office is permitted to open and make up Mails and keep the Accounts, the other Clerks take in, or deliver out, Letters, from and to the public, but have nothing more to do in the business.

D.—Some explanation may be necessary with respect to the allowance under the head of "Stationery" in order to account for the variety of amounts which appear opposite the names of the different Offices, and for the allowance in the case of some Offices—not being the same for each year.—This allowance is intended to indemnify the Post Master for the expense he incurs for wrapping-paper, sealing-wax, and twine, used in packing the Mails he despatches; it has been sometimes augmented to cover the expense of Candlelight, when there is much night work at any Office.—At some Offices the allowance is made equivalent to the sum which the Post Master certifies he has actually expended for the object in question, but generally a certain sum per annum is fixed by the Deputy Post Master General, founded upon his judgment of the extent of business performed at the Office,—and the allowance is gradually augmented as the business increases—in all cases the claim for "Stationery Allowance" is specially and carefully considered by the Deputy Post Master General.—At some of the oldest Offices the compensation under the head of "Stationery" was many years ago fixed upon rather a higher scale than is now allowed to Offices in general; in those cases the allowance was specially approved of by the Post Master General, and remain as originally ordered by him, the cases are however few, and in no instance is the amount very considerable.

A STATEMENT is required of the "Gross Amount of Revenue collected at each Office in Upper Canada, and the whole expense of collecting the same, for the years 1832, 1833 and 1834.

The information desired by this section of the Requisition of the House of Assembly, so far as relates to the "Gross Amount of Revenue collected at each Office in Upper Canada," is (if I understand the language rightly) contained in Return numbered 12; but I do not see how it is possible to ascertain "the whole expense of collecting the same," i. e. the Revenue in Upper Canada, since a part of the expense consists in the Mail conveyance, the Contingent, and several other charges of the Department at large, the proportion of which, as applicable to Upper Canada, no one can tell:—If on the other hand by the term "expense of collecting" it is required to know merely what compensation the Post Masters receive, the information is contained in Returns numbered 4, 5 and 6. Here I trust I may be permitted to observe that I have carefully studied the Address of the House of Assembly, as well with regard to the item in question, as to its other parts, with a view of rendering all the information required so far as in me lay; but should it appear that I have misconstrued the wording of the Requisition in any part, I can only say that I shall regret it, and be ready to remedy the error as soon as it is pointed out to me.

(General Remark.)

The Address from the House of Assembly amongst other information, connected with the Mails, requires that the rate (i. e. the rate of progression as I understand it) at which the Mails are conveyed, should be stated. I have endeavoured as far as possible to comply with this requisition, by giving the average rate of progress of the respective Mails as bargained for by me with the Contractors; but persons acquainted with the climate and Roads of the Canadas, must be aware of the impossibility of enforcing a strict compliance with the stipulations of a Mail Contract in this Country (as regards the rate of Travel) at all periods of the year. On many of the Roads it is quite possible in dry weather to travel 7 or 8 miles an hour, whilst in a rainy season, or in the Spring or Fall of the Year, the same Road cannot by any exertion be travelled at a faster rate than 3 or 4 Miles! In forming the Contracts I endeavour to ascertain what rate of speed is necessary and attainable under ordinary circumstances, and I make my agreement accordingly,—exercising my judgment in imposing Fines upon the Contractor when it can be proved that he or his people have not used proper efforts to get over their Stages in time. I beg to observe that as a means of check upon the Couriers or Mail Drivers, I take care that a Time or Road Bill accompanies each Mail upon all important Routes, and on these are noted by the different Post-Masters, the time occupied in each Stage—with other remarks, and they form the grounds upon which I impose fines upon the Contractors, or take other steps against them for neglect of duty.

A.—This is so returned by Mr. Bethune, the late Post Master at Cobourg, and I can obtain no further information from him on the subject; I have reason to suspect that the Newspaper Returns from Mr. Bethune for the years 1832-1833, and until he was removed from the Department in November 1831, are incorrect; but Mr. Bethune being bankrupt, I have no recourse against him—the sums brought to account in these Statements are all that were ever remitted to me.

General Observations.

The proceeds have been appropriated as an emolument of the Deputy Post Master General, under a privilege recognized by the Post Master General since the earliest introduction of the Post Office system in the British Provinces—(vide Observation at the foot of the Statement shewing the emoluments of the Deputy Post Master General from every source)—in

addition to which I will here remark, as it affords a reason for the creation of the privilege, that the Imperial Statutes under which the Post Office Department in these Colonies now exists, contain no provision for the transmission of Newspapers or Pamphlets by Post except as Letters! and as it is obvious that the exaction of letter postage on such Papers, &c. would have amounted to an interdiction as regards them, of the benefits of Mail conveyance, the Government or the Post Master General (as I have understood) judged it expedient to permit the Deputy Post Master General to Frank those papers, &c. thro' the Post, for a consideration such as should be agreed upon between himself and the Printers, appropriating the compensation as a personal emolument. I have been informed that this privilege is sanctioned by an old Act of Parliament, but I cannot vouch for it.—I beg further to remark that for many years past, the trouble attending the making up and transmitting Newspapers and Pamphlets has become so serious, that as a matter of necessity, as well as of justice, I have compensated my Deputies for the service out of the amount received by me.—I now subjoin Copies of all Orders or other Authorities from the General Post Office, London, having any bearing upon the question, that have been addressed to this Establishment since my appointment as Deputy Post Master General, a period of between seven and eight years; any thing previous thereto that may have existed I can have no access to, as my predecessors upon retiring from office, took away with them all Letters and Documents except such as were considered necessary for conducting the duties of the Department.

The first communication upon this subject received by me, was in a Letter of which the following is a Copy, from the Secretary to the General Post Office, dated 3d Sept. 1830—it is in answer to a Letter from me to the Secretary, forwarding Copy of a Petition from the Printers in Lower Canada, to His Excellency Sir James Kempt, then Governor of the Province, praying that their papers might be circulated "free of postage as in England."

My Lord, the Post Master General having taken into consideration your Letter transmitting Copy of one from the Secretary to the Governor General of the Canadas, with a Petition to His Excellency from the Proprietors and Printers of Newspapers in the Province, praying that their Papers may be circulated free of postage as in this country, I am commanded to observe that the applicants do not appear to recollect that the Newspapers in this country contribute largely to the Stamp Revenue, which may be considered as the price of their conveyance by Post, and to acquaint you, that as the Papers in Canada are not subject to the same duties, His Grace cannot deem them entitled to a similar exemption.

Without imputing any blame to the Post Master at Montreal, it appears that upon these occasions he has misconceived his Instructions, and you will be pleased to give directions that Newspapers, when deposited in the Post Office, must be forwarded without delay, and if not circulated under your privilege, they should be charged with the full rates of postage.

I beg to acquaint you that I have laid before my Lord the Post Master General your representations on the subject of the Deputy Post Master at Montreal having declined to forward your Newspapers by the Post, without the payment of the usual gratuity to the Deputy Post Master General at Quebec; and I am commanded to acquaint you that the gratuity in question is the long established and authorized perquisite of the Officer in question, and that all Newspapers circulated by the Post in British North America, otherwise than under his privilege, are liable by Law to the charge of the full rates of postage.

I regret the delay which occurred to your Newspapers on the occasions alluded to, which appears to have arisen from a misconception of his Instructions on the part of the Post Master at Montreal, but you will see from the foregoing explanation that if he had forwarded them, they must have been charged with postage.

A. I have stated these sources of Income in *Sterling*, because they are paid in that money. Up to the month of October, 1834, I was allowed £200 per annum, towards paying for assistance in my office: From October, however, that allowance was struck off, and a new arrangement of a portion of my duties was determined upon by the Post Master General, as described in Return numbered 3, accompanying this. It is not in my power to refer to the Original Authorities under which my Salary and allowances in question were granted—they were enjoyed by my predecessors in office from a remote period, and I acquired a right to them by virtue of my Commission.

B. The Deputy Post Master General for the time being, has possessed this privilege since the first establishment of the Post Office in the British Provinces—I cannot point out the authority under which the privilege originated, but I know that it has been repeatedly recognized by my Head of Department in England, and never considered it incumbent upon me, or indeed proper, to enquire into the date or form of the authority.—It will be observed that the total sum derived thro' this privilege exceeds the gross amount paid by the Newspaper Printers:—the difference between these sums is produced by casual Papers and Pamphlets (American and Provincial) forwarded by others than Printers.

C. This is a source of Income altogether independent of the Imperial or British Revenue—nevertheless, as the amount is required to be stated by the House of Assembly, I furnish it with the same unreserve that I do the other items of my Income. I am the General Agent of the United States Post Office for the collection of American Postage in these Provinces, and am held responsible for this Postage, which I collect and transmit regularly to Washington.

Notes.

A. It is not in my power to state, neither can Mr. Macaulay nor Mr. Howard, the Post Masters at Kingston and Toronto, who collected the above Monies, state, the precise days of the respective payments—tho' that the monies were all paid (with the exception of an abatement of £17. 5. 0. made by me, and explained in Note B.) the above gentlemen and myself are prepared to declare upon oath if necessary. Why the precise days of payment cannot now be cited, will, I trust, be found satisfactorily accounted for in the following Note from Mr. Macaulay, to whom I referred the question—the reasons stated by him as regards Kingston, applying in substance to Toronto. Mr. Macaulay says—"Mr. Dalton was not punctual in paying up his Newspaper dues; sometimes I accounted for them myself to the Deputy Post Master General at the quarterly periods, tho' the money was not actually received by me at the time; but generally they were settled for by Mr. Dalton by a promissory note, payable in 90 days after date, or by a draft"—A species of accommodation which I beg to add, I have never refused to any Printer who has requested it.

At Toronto, Mr. Dalton did a considerable amount of Printing work for the Department, and any difference between his claims on this score, and his debt for the transmission of his papers, was accounted for by him, either in cash or by his promissory obligations, which obligations he has always honorably redeemed. For the October quarter 1834, and January quarter 1835, it will be perceived by the Remark in the proper place, that Mr. Dalton paid for the transmission of his papers, when they were taken to the Post Office.

B. It became necessary to introduce into this Statement, an account of the charge made against Mr. Dalton, for the transmission of his paper, the "Catholic," because when he discontinued the publication of that paper, he stated that he was a severe sufferer both by it and the "Patriot," from the non-payment of the subscriptions, and other causes—and on this ground, he appealed to my consideration of his case, as regarded my claim upon him for the transmission of those papers. He was then indebted to me £17. 5. 0.—and having every reason to believe that his statement was true, I cancelled my demand against him for this sum, distinctly explaining to him at the time, that altho' the peculiar circumstances of his case induced me to forego my claim in this instance, it was not to be assumed as a precedent either by him or any other Newspaper proprietor.

C. I beg leave to avail myself of this opportunity to explain, in reference to payments on account of the "Patriot" which appear in the Statement of Newspaper Postage laid before the House of Commons in 1833, that the discrepancy between that Statement, and the present, arises from the fact that in making up the former, the Clerk who was employed at the task, finding amongst the Kingston Accounts, Memoranda of only two payments in behalf of the "Patriot," supposed that no more had been made, and without referring to me on the subject, filled in the amounts accordingly! I was at that time engaged in preparations for my departure for England, and being nearly overwhelmed with business, was unable to revise all the papers that were being made out in my office, so carefully as under other circumstances I should have done—and in this way the error escaped my notice. It is due to myself further to say with regard to what is called "Newspaper Postage," that this being an emolument of my own, I never considered it necessary to be so particular in preserving the Documents connected with it, as of those relating to Government Monies, neither have I ever exacted from my Deputies, (who assist me in the collection of these monies) such formal and precise Accounts as they render of the Public Revenue; and this I hope will be borne in mind should other inaccuracies under the same head (of the existence of which however I am not aware) be detected. It is not my wish to render any other than correct statements, and I have taken every means in my power to make those I am now preparing, perfectly correct: still, trifling errors may have crept in, and should it prove so, I repeat that they have arisen from causes such as I have attempted to describe.

Notes,

1. I assumed charge of the Department as Deputy Post Master General on the 5th April, 1828, and am not in possession of Documents to shew the Sums remitted to either the General Post Office in London, or Washington, previous to that date.

2. It is not possible for me to discover to a certainty the balance of Monies in my hands on the 24th February, 1835, which is the date of the Address of the House of Assembly, because that period is in the middle of a quarter, and it is only when a quarter's Accounts are closed, and the balance struck, that I can tell precisely how much I am indebted to the General Post Office; as nearly however as I can judge, the balance in my hands on the 24th February, 1835, was about £1500 or £1600. At that date the Accounts for the October quarter had been transmitted, and the regular quarterly remittance made, and the Accounts from my Deputies and their Balances, for the succeeding quarter (January) had only in part been received. I beg to add that I remit to the General Post Office in London four times a year, and when I make those remittances, I generally discharge the whole Balance for which I am liable, so that four times in each year I am actually not in possession of any Money belonging to the General Post Office; it happens indeed, not unfrequently, that I am in advance to the Department.

3. The great increase which will be observed in the amount of United States Revenue collected in this Country and remitted to Washington within the last four years, has arisen chiefly at Queenston, or rather thro' the Accounts kept at that Office.

I have the honor to report for the information of my Lord the Post Master General, that I returned to Quebec and resumed my duties on the 25th of last month. Mr. King, the Accountant, had got here a few days before me, and Messrs. Daintrey and Kimlin (the Clerks) arrived here a few days since.

I find that a vast amount of business has been held over for my arrival,—amongst other claims for immediate consideration are from 100 to 150 applications for Post Offices, required principally upon entirely new routes. The merits of those applications require to be tested by personal investigation, for it is impossible otherwise to decide correctly between the conflicting statements which in many cases are got up by rival interests in the same quarter of the Country ; I feel therefore most sensibly at this time the necessity of having Surveyors to assist me in this branch of my duty, and I earnestly beg that those promised by His Grace the Duke of Richmond may be sent out as soon as possible.

SIR,

I feel myself very unpleasantly situated with regard to the degree of accountability to which I am to be subjected as regards the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick charge. I shall as concisely as possible describe the awkward position in which I am placed in relation to this question, submitting it to my Lord the Post Master General to give such orders as will enable me to understand distinctly what is my duty and what is expected of me.

A few days since Mr. Howe sent the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick April Quarters Accounts to Mr. King, the Accountant, for examination, saying he had done so in consequence of orders from the General Post Office, London. On the face of the Account Current signed by Mr. Howe—he states himself as being debtor to the General Post Office £1823. 4s. 9d. and his Deputies £277. 16s. 1d., in all about £2,100. Sterling. Mr. King at first appeared to think he must call upon me to acknowledge my accountability for those monies; for altho' he saw and admitted the injustice of my being made accountable for large sums of money due by persons over whom I possess no control whatever, he thought his instructions left him no choice! However, when he came to reflect that my Accounts for the same Quarter were already in England, and that it was therefore impossible for him to comply with that part of his instructions which directs him to incorporate the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick Accounts with those of the Canadas, he concluded to send them forward as they stood, and to apply for further orders—this he has done.

I beg leave to observe here that I am not disposed to shrink from the responsibility of the charge of the Department in Nova Scotia and New-Brunswick, if it is the intention of the Post Master General that I should assume it; but it surely never can be intended that I am to be held answerable for the debts of the Deputies in those remote Provinces, before they are placed under my orders, and I receive security for their good behaviour, as is the case in Canada.

It is equally impossible for me to suppose it is intended that in any event, I am to assume the responsibility of the *old debts* due by Mr. Howe and his Deputies! The total amount of those debts is very large and the liability might be very injurious to me, for even were Mr. Howe's Bonds to be transferred to me as security, it would be an inadequate one. His Bond to the General Post Office is for £1500 only—whilst in the month of April last, he owed £2100, and for ought I know the debt may now be much greater. I have the highest personal regard for Mr. Howe, and have the utmost confidence in his integrity, but it is not reasonable that I should be exposed to an undue liability for his back debts.

I have further to remark that Mr. Howe in his Account Current makes a distinction between the sums due by himself and his Deputies, from which it would appear he does not consider himself answerable for the latter; you may probably think that this requires explanation.—As to those Deputies I know nothing of them; nor whether they have ever furnished Bonds, or are able to pay the debts charged against them. The sum of my argument, Sir, is this—that if I am to assume the responsibility of the Department in the Lower Provinces, I humbly conceive it necessary, in the first place, that the different Deputies, including Mr. Howe, should be instructed to consider themselves subject to my orders, which will enable me to exact fitting security from them respectively, under a penalty for the non-performance of their duties, recoverable in this Country. 2dly. That my responsibility as Deputy Post Master General should not extend to the old debts of those Officers, but that they should be paid off to the General Post Office in London, thro' Mr. Howe; and my liability extend no further back than the date at which they (the Officers) are placed under my orders.

I shall only further observe that when in England and honored by being consulted as to a new arrangement of the Posts in British North America, I represented that it was indispensable to the successful working of *any* scheme, that there should be out one Head to the Department in the Provinces. I stated this from a conviction of the necessity of the case—not with any wish to extend my power or influence; and were it possible to have avoided so heavy an additional charge, I would most

willingly have kept clear of it; yet having pledged my character for the propriety of the measure, I am prepared to encounter the consequences—simply asking that the arrangements may be made in such a way as to shield me from any other liability than the actual interests of the Post Office require.

SIR,

The enclosed Letter from Mr. Porteous, the Post Master of Montreal, will afford you some idea of the serious inconvenience to which the Post Office and the public at that place are exposed for want of suitable accommodation in an office. The insufficiency of the place now occupied as an office at Montreal has frequently been submitted by me for the consideration of my Lord the Post Master General, and I believe it is one of the topics dwelt upon in the representations made by the Merchants of that City relative to the Post Office Establishment.

The Post Master provides the office himself—and his argument is that he cannot afford out of his income, to provide an office suitable for the wants of the public in such a City as Montreal.

In the Estimate for a new arrangement of the Montreal Establishment which I had the honor to submit last Summer, I strongly urged the propriety of having the expense of the office at that place paid by the General Post Office—and I again humbly recommend the adoption of this plan—otherwise neither the Post Master nor the public will ever be satisfied. It would gratify me very much, and relieve me from annoyance and perplexity if the Estimates for the Establishments at Montreal, Kingston and York (now Toronto City) were decided upon, and I hope it may not be deemed importunate that I respectfully entreat your attention to those Items amongst the questions still undecided in-reference to the Department in these Provinces.

I have told Mr. Porteous in answer to his Letter, that I could not undertake to grant him any authority for procuring an Office at the expense of the Revenue—and as to his looking to the Merchants for assistance, I shall most assuredly not give my sanction to that, as I have had too much reason to know, that the Merchants of Montreal have already identified themselves with the concerns of that Post Office to an extent, calculated in my opinion, to subvert the discipline and subordination which should be maintained in this, as in every other Government Establishment.

SIR,

As the time is now approaching at which houses are rented, I beg leave to represent the *insufficiency* and *unsafe* state of the present Post Offices, and to solicit your consideration of the case, and your assistance *if it possibly can be extended thereto*; should you not be able to afford any aid from the Department, would you have any objections to my soliciting some help from the Mercantile body of this City who are deeply interested in the convenience, safety and position of such a public Institution.

Mr. Ross our proprietor has now introduced Tailors and dry goods Shops *immediately below* the Post Office, and those with Armour's *Printing Office* on one side, and a Boarding House on the other, render the danger to which the Post Office, with its valuable contents, is hourly exposed to from fire, very great indeed, and the consequences and inconvenience that would ensue from such an event, are so palpable and reasonable, that I sincerely hope you will take the matter into consideration and afford us some relief, however little it may be. The idea of so many Money letters, and other valuable deposits laying night after night exposed in the manner I state, would certainly be *severely commented upon by sufferers*, were any thing to happen, and I feel it an absolute duty to lay the matter before you. The public, from the alterations Mr. Ross has introduced, are now obliged to grope up a pair of stairs, hardly any light, and in Winter attended with the danger of breaking some of their bones; after getting up they then turn into a small Lobby half filled with fire-wood; an inconvenience we are (from want of room otherwise) obliged to insist upon. From the remarks daily made at the Office by many of the respectable Merchants here, I think some help may be procured from them; but without your approbation I should not like to make the application. One thing certain the Office cannot remain where it is any longer, it must be removed to some place of *more safety* than its present location, for the danger from fire is *alarming* to all who feel any interest in the Post Office. These considerations I respectfully submit for your decision, and am truly

I have submitted to my Lord the Post Master General, your Letter of the 20th November last, together with one from the Accountant to the Post Office at Quebec, to the Accountant General, relative to the incorporation of the Accounts of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick with those of Canada.

I am to state for your information and for the guidance of the Accountant, that the Accounts from Nova Scotia, &c., to the 5th July, 1834, after having been examined by Mr. King, may be transmitted home, as heretofore; but that from and after the 6th July last, they are to be incorporated into the general Account of the Post Office in British North America, keeping however, the balance due from the Deputy Post Master General of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick distinct and separate from yours, until the Colonial Legislatures shall have passed the Bills now pending for the new arrangements of the Posts in British North America.

You will, therefore, see that under this arrangement you are placed in no responsibility whatever as regards the Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and that you can incur none, until those Provinces are placed in your charge, when the new Bills shall come into operation.

I have to add with reference to an observation in your Letter, that Mr. Howe is precisely under the same responsibility for his sub-Deputies in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, that you are for those in Canada.

SIR,

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 2d January, calling my attention to the Copy of a letter from Mr. J. Waller, representing the want of Post Office accommodation at Barrie in Upper Canada; and requesting me likewise to furnish such information as will enable you to reply to Mr. Waller with regard to the Newspapers which he states he has forwarded regularly to his sons at Barrie, through the privilege of the Secretary of State's Clerks, but which have not reached their destination.

Mr. Waller having omitted to furnish the name of either of his sons at Barrie, it is out of my power to communicate with them, as I could have wished to do for the purpose of ascertaining in a more circumstantial way than I possibly can, through the father's letter, the actual facts connected with their complaints. It is stated that a Letter from the senior Mr. Waller, dated 12th June, and sent *via* New York, was not received by the son till the 12th of October!—this is certainly a long time to wait for a letter from England, but the delay may have happened without the slightest blame being importable to any Officer of the Post Office Establishment in this country. The letter was in all probability resting "till called for," either at the Office of Toronto City (the seat of Government) or at "Holland Landing" Office, (the nearest Post Office to the Settlement of Barrie, though still probably 30 or 40 miles distant from it) for a couple of months or more. I am unable to say any thing more satisfactory about the Newspapers—they have no doubt been forwarded to one of the Offices nearest to "Barrie," and not being called for, have been returned to England as "Dead." Mr. Waller (the son) in his complaint, exclaims against the "wretched" Post Office arrangements which keep him thus long deprived of his letters! I cannot blame him: it is not to be wondered at, that people so plagued about their correspondence should be indignant, but I individually, suffer this reproach as well in the *minds*, as in the *language* of those people, though I merit nothing of the kind; for I am as anxious as they themselves can be, to extend the Post communications into the interior of Upper Canada, that they may keep pace with the rapid advances of Settlement making in that fine Province, by an intelligent and interesting class of people, but I have not the means.

'Tis very true, as Mr. Waller states, that nearly two years ago I promised to establish an Office at "Barrie," and I promised the same to many other places similarly situated, but just then, I was ordered to England—nothing could be done in that way during my absence—and since my return, I have been so overwhelmed with work, that it has been quite as much as I could manage, to keep the current duties going, without establishing any new Offices.

The phrase "wretched" made use of by Mr. Waller in speaking of our Post Office arrangements, is not intended, as I believe, to apply to the lines of Post Route now in existence—but simply to the fact which is undeniable—that thousands of well educated people (with whom Post Office accommodation is almost a necessary of life) inhabiting the back parts of the Province, where they have formed thriving Towns and Settlements, from 20 to 50 or more miles from the Posts now organized, are totally without the means of corresponding with their distant friends—except they send and bring their letters by private agency.

I am within bounds in saying that at this moment,—there are from *two to three* hundred distinct societies of people, spread over the country, in Upper Canada alone, similarly situated to the Inhabitants of Barrie, and who like them are suffering for want of that accommodation which I would fain give them, had I the power of doing it. This is a cruel state of things, and the more to be lamented, because I believe that the demands of those people could be supplied (to a reasonable extent at all events) without burdening the Post Office Revenue:—by this I mean, that so active is the spirit of enterprise amongst that class of persons who are now crowding into the new Settlements throughout the whole extent of Upper Canada, as well as in many parts of the Lower Province, and so great their disposition for letter writing, that in a short time the increased Revenue would liberally repay the outlay demanded. All I ask for, Sir, to enable me to relieve the inhabitants from the cause of their well grounded complaints on the score of Post Offices, and my Lord the Post Master General from being assailed with vexatious representations, is that *His Lordship will allow me assistance adequate to the great amount of duty that has devolved upon me*—an amount which I am sure has not hitherto been rightly judged of in the quarter where alone it is essential it should be known.

I do not ask for assistance, more than is necessary—that I myself may eat the bread of idleness—I never shrink from labor in my life, and whilst I have the honor to hold the trust I do, my whole time, and such energies as I possess, shall, even at the sacrifice of my health, be unsparingly devoted to the object of sustaining this Department—but circumstanced as I now am, impossibilities are exacted from me! No man without more assistance than I command, can do justice to such a charge, and I know and feel that if my representations are not listened to: if the confidence which I ask is not reposed in me, I must sink, and some one more fortunate than I am in representing the actual state of things will take my place, and do better than I have done, not because he will bring more zeal and industry to bear upon the subject, but because he will have the means of securing adequate assistance.

His Grace the Duke of Richmond, when I represented the impossibility of doing with one Clerk, which he granted for my own immediate Office, when the old allowance of £200. a year for assistance was struck off, was pleased to say, it was only to be considered as an *experiment*, and that if I found it not enough, I should have more assistance! I very well knew that it was not enough. I saw distinctly that His Grace was not aware of the great variety and extent of the duties devolving upon me, but I of course submitted to the decision, determined not to say any thing more against it, until I should be able to show by the best proof, that of actual experience, that the service could not be performed by the hands allowed for it. Ever since my return to this country, I have had three hands constantly engaged with me in my own Office, and did we not labour incessantly from morning till night, and (as regards myself) frequently on Sundays, as well as other days, I never could have got through with the duties—and with all this exertion, as I have before stated, I have not had it in my power to create any new Offices—the utmost I have been able to accomplish, has been to keep the established duties going. If it is asked—*why I require so much more assistance now, than was formerly necessary*—my answer is, that my correspondence has increased at a rate, which no one could have ventured to predict a very few years ago. Population is pouring into the country from all quarters, and Commercial and other enterprizes, connected with the rapid march of civilization, call immediately upon the Post Office for facilities in that Department commensurate to the general improvement that is going on. Permit me to say, Sir, that the means of judging in England, of the extent of labor devolving upon me, are very imperfect. To compare the amount of Revenue collected by us, and the expense of that collection, and of carrying on the service generally, by the scale which obtains in England, does not afford a fair criterion: the rate does not apply! With you, all is order and system, the result of the gradual progress of improvement for many years; here, on the contrary, the Post Office has grown into importance with unexampled rapidity—the demand for improvement is already far in advance of the means of supply; and for want of Post Office Laws and Regulations suited to the circumstances of the country, we have often to resort to provisional measures, the whole of which I must not only see acted upon, but see *how they act*; and when they fail of their intended effect, as they often do, try others! Hence my labor is incessant, and I perceive no chance of any relief, for although I might in time, drill into regularity the different Officers if their numbers were limited, yet from the perpetual increase of Offices—the unpracticed hands that we have to employ in them, and the frequent dismissals and resignations going on constantly in the minor Offices, it is evident that for many years the same watchfulness and exertion will be called for from the person holding my situation which I am now compelled to exercise.

To speak to a fact which may perhaps carry more weight with it than general assertions,—I beg to say that I have frequently received of late from 40 to 50, and on one occasion (last week) 70 letters to my own address, and to be answered by myself, by one morning's Mail, and many of those upon embarrassing and important subjects, requiring serious consideration to enable me to deal with them properly—yet I would still have laboured on without troubling you with such representations as I am here making, had I been able by my utmost efforts to satisfy the demands of the Provinces with regard to new Offices—but I have clearly ascertained that I am not able. Here lies the great difficulty and that which I am most anxious My Lord the Post Master General should fully understand—I have not the means of extending the Posts into the interior, in the degree required by the People, and which I admit to be necessary! The complaints of the Inhabitants on this score, are becoming loud and threatening, and I consider it as a part of my duty to describe them as far as I am able, to the Post Master General, being convinced, that if they are not met by me with early attention, they will speedily be ingrafted upon the catalogue of Provincial grievances, and be laid before the House of Commons, and this I trust it is not an act of supererogation in me to endeavour to avert; for I feel that if I were not to make the representations I am now making, I should be but ill able to defend myself from the reproaches against my conduct as Deputy Post Master General, which would be coupled with any reference made either to the Government, or the House of Commons.

I am now about making up a Schedule of the Petitions for new Offices—my Desk is covered with them: there are I should think not less than 150 applications of this nature, signed by thousands of persons, and many of them supported by the Governor of the Province of Upper Canada. Many of those Documents are voluminous, comprizing conflicting statements from rival interests in the same divisions of the Province—one portion of the Inhabitants, wishing perhaps, to have the Office placed in one quarter of a Township—a second portion in another. In recommending the Post Masters too, (which is generally done by the Inhabitants when an Office is first applied for,) it is not unfrequently the case, that rival Candidates for the situation are brought forward by different parties. For "Barrie" for example there are no less than seven recommended! All this calls for much research and correspondence—nor can I, situated as I may be, 500 or 1000 miles from the source of application, do justice to the consideration of such questions, except by the advice and assistance of Surveyors. It is indeed impossible to do any longer without this description of Officer—not only to aid in the extension of the Posts, but for numerous other objects growing out of a widely spread Post Establishment.

In the five years that intervened between the date of my appointment as Deputy Post Master General and my call to England, I had by great exertion increased the number of regular Offices under my control from 90, to I think about 260 or 270! but beyond that that as already stated, I have not been able to go; one reason for this is—that the situations where new Offices are now most wanted, are so remote, and my means of information consequently so unsatisfactory, that it would be improper in me to agree to form them, and to make Contracts and other arrangements for the conveyance of the Mails, &c., without the advice of persons acting under my orders, upon whose judgment, after visiting the spots respectively, I could place reliance. The Provinces of Lower and Upper Canada, (to say nothing of the Lower Provinces,) require at this time—not less than 500 Offices—that is to say, double the number they now have, and in ten years from this time, they will need a thousand at least. With proper assistance, I could create and put into successful operation, all that are wanted, at the rate of 100 each year,—less than this scale of advancement will not satisfy the public.

I have thus, in noticing Mr. Waller's complaint, ventured to enter at some length into a description of the present condition of the Post Office Establishment in this country, and its prospects—for I fear that I have not hitherto succeeded in making these well understood, or I should before now have been supplied with the Surveyors which His Grace the Duke of Richmond promised last year—or at all events, failing in this, that I should have been authorized to engage temporarily, within the country, persons to perform the duties for which the Surveyors were intended. I have now waited six months since resuming my duties, without hearing of this long desired assistance—endeavouring in the interval to satisfy the numerous claimants for Post Offices, as best I might; but now the consequences of longer delay have become so alarming that after mature reflection, I have considered it as a duty to the Post Master General to take upon myself the responsibility of employing two intelligent and active men, to be selected from my Deputies, as acting Surveyors, to be occupied exclusively, under such Instructions as I shall give them, in organizing new Offices, making the necessary Contracts for the conveyance of the Mails, and other objects connected with this branch of service. I shall promise these persons 20s. a day, and 6d. a mile for travelling, which is less than the proposed allowance to the regular Surveyors intended for this country.

I am aware that I am encountering a heavy responsibility in this step, but I trust that my motives will justify me with My Lord the Post Master General, and that he will authorize me to make the claim in my accounts, whilst the persons in question are employed by me. As to the extra hands, which I am obliged to employ in my own immediate Office, I shall not presume to make any charge on that head, till it is sanctioned by the Post Master General—trusting however that under the principle laid down by the Duke of Richmond, I shall not be expected to *continue to pay* for extra hands myself. The Accountant Branch and the Sorting Office are sufficiently well provided for, these divisions can get through with their duty.

In another despatch I shall have the honor of explaining that the intended new constitution of the Post Office in these Colonies, cannot possibly go into effect at the period contemplated—it is indeed from present appearances not improbable, that the proposed measure will fall through—in which event, as a matter of course, the General Post Office in London, will have to continue to administer the duties of the Department under such advantages as the present constitution may be capable of affording; until a new arrangement shall be determined upon. The turn which this affair has taken, destroying the hope of the introduction of a new system for some time to come, is an additional reason for me, if one were wanted, for urging as I respectfully beg to do, the adoption of a vigorous course of proceedings in the extension and general improvement of the Post Office Department throughout the Province—such as will meet the wishes of the well disposed and reasonable portion of the Inhabitants—and leave no fair ground for complaint. So far as I am concerned, I am prepared to carry into effect the views of the Post Master General to any extent that he may be pleased command, and I shall await His Lordship's decision on this, (which I cannot but consider a very important) matter, with much solicitude.

S.—I firmly believe that the expense of employing Surveyors, would be fully made up to the Revenue in one item alone, that of forming Contracts for the conveyance of the Mails in remote parts of the Country; at present the Department is exposed to imposition on this score, against which it is impossible for me effectually to provide; Surveyors, by being on the spot, can alone afford proper security.

SIR,

I beg leave to hand you a printed copy of the Draft of the Bill for the new organization of the Post Office Establishment in these Colonies, in the shape in which it was laid before the Provincial Parliament of Upper Canada, at the opening of the Annual Session in January last, and I avail myself of the occasion to report, for the information of my Lord the Post Master General, the result of the reference on this subject made to the several Provinces by His Majesty's Government, so far as I have yet been made acquainted therewith.

In the Nova Scotia Assembly, Mr. Howe reports to me that the question experienced but little notice, for some time it was thought that it would not be entered upon at all, but at length, just at the close of the Session, a Committee was named to correspond with influential Members of the Assemblies in the other Provinces on the subject. Mr. Howe adds that he does not think any thing further will be done in the matter by Nova Scotia.

In New Brunswick they printed the Bill, but did little more; the subject was discussed in the Assembly, but the prevailing opinion being that the proposed alterations would only have the effect of burthening the Provincial Funds with a charge which the Country was too poor at present to afford, the matter dropt and may be considered as having altogether failed. The fact is that in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, the rage for the settlement and improvement of the Country which prevails in the Canadas, and which has created in these two Provinces of late years such an interest in the Post Office, is hardly felt, the people seem contented to jog on with things as they are and as they have been for a considerable time, and the possibility of being called upon to make up annually a considerable deficiency on account of the Post Office Establishment, I understand alarms them. From Prince Edward's Island, I have no Report further than that the Assembly then up to a late period of its Session, had done nothing with the Bill.

In Lower Canada, the Bill was submitted to the Assembly by the Governor, but the Session closed abruptly after a short sitting, without any notice having been taken of the subject; whether the Bill would have been proceeded upon had the Session continued open for a longer period, it is impossible for me to say. Of the Newspapers of this Province, (some of which were formerly very violent on the subject) the greater part seem carefully to abstain from touching upon the question: It would appear that the Printers, after seeing the Bill, and ascertaining that by it they would be obliged to pay for the transmission of their Newspapers, in some cases three or four times as much as they now do, thought it better to let the matter alone. Some of the Printers indeed in alluding to the provisions of the Act, have condemned the original movers of the inquiry into the Post Office question, for provoking a measure which would be likely to saddle them (the Printers) with new regulations more onerous than the old ones.

In Upper Canada, Mr. McKenzie whose name is not unknown at the General Post Office, London, and who is now a Member of the Assembly of that Province, has been named as the Chairman of the Committee for considering the Bill, and in that capacity he has been instrumental in drawing up and sending to me, thro' the Governor of the Province, the within Requisition for information respecting the Post Office which it will require a long time to prepare, indeed it is impossible to get it ready during the present Session. In reply to the application, I have informed His Excellency that I would set about collecting the information, but that I apprehended it could not be furnished so soon as it appeared to be expected. You will perceive Sir, in this Requisition, that the Assembly of Upper Canada has not confined itself to demanding information relating exclusively to that Province, but I am called upon to give statements embracing the Post Office business of all the British North American Colonies. Whether it is proper that I should comply with a demand of so comprehensive a character, My Lord the Post Master General is the best judge, and as

it has not been possible for me to render the Statements this Session, and as there will be sufficient time for me to receive his instructions on the subject, before the Assembly meets again, I should be glad to know whether I am to furnish the Statements without reservation.

Part of the information now required, can only be obtained thro' Mr. Howe, of Halifax, who is not under my orders.—I have however requested him to furnish me with it, and if he thinks himself warranted, he will do so.

SIR,

On the 29th of last month in replying to your Letter relative to Mr. Armour's complaint against the Post Master of Montreal, for not forwarding his Gazette by the Post in the way that he desired to have it done—I informed you that Mr. Armour had brought the subject of his Newspaper before the House of Assembly of this Province at its last Session—and in doing so, had succeeded in making the administration of the concerns of the Post Office Department generally, a matter for Parliamentary enquiry.

In reference to the intimation contained in my Letter above mentioned, that I would in a few days have the honor of submitting to you for the consideration of my Lord the Post Master General, the Report and proceedings of the House upon the question, I beg leave now to lay these Documents before you, (contained in a small printed Book herewith,) and to solicit your particular notice of the same, and to my remarks thereon.

It is unnecessary for me to say much here, in relation to the details of the enquiry, but it is proper however I conceive, to acquaint you, that as soon as I learnt that a motion had been made in the Assembly for the formation of a Committee to enquire into the Receipts and Expenditure of the Department, feeling myself at a loss how to act (being unprovided with any Instructions for my government in the circumstances in which I saw I should be placed), I waited upon the Governor General Lord Aylmer, to solicit His Lordship's advice. His Excellency was pleased to enter with me into the subject in a very kind manner, and concurred with me in the view which I took of it—namely, that without Orders to that effect from His Grace the Post Master General, I was not at liberty to make such disclosures with regard to the Finance concerns of the Department, as it was evident the House of Assembly would endeavour to obtain, and that therefore my course was to confine myself to affording information on such matters as I conceived the Post Master General would wish the House of Assembly to become acquainted with, and respectfully to decline answering other questions.

The line of conduct here described, I endeavoured in my several examinations before the Committee to observe: I gave every information that I thought it my duty to afford, and although the Committee have not seen fit to publish in their proceedings some very important parts of my evidence, I am nevertheless convinced that the information they have obtained through me, has corrected many erroneous ideas respecting the Post Office Establishment in this country, which Mr. Armour and some other Printers, of the same views, have been industriously disseminating for a long time—and that altogether the Enquiry will be of service to the character of the Department.

The Committee in their Report animadvert upon the "mystery" which I have observed in my examinations, because I would not answer their Questions relating to the Money matters of the Department? Had I taken upon myself to do so, I felt that I might be doing a great deal of mischief; for although they might not at this moment have discovered any thing in the way of Profit to induce them to desire the control of the Department, a scheme which some individuals have been preparing, or at least speculating upon, my answering such questions without reserve, would have been establishing a precedent that would not have been lost sight of, and which at no distant period (if not at once) might prove embarrassing to the General Post Office and His Majesty's Government, and I chose therefore, until I could receive Instructions for my guidance, rather to incur the risk of displeasing the Provincial Parliament, than be an instrument of giving trouble to those Authorities to whom my first duties are engaged.

His Grace the Post Master General cannot fail to observe, upon reading the evidence, the disingenuousness which has been exercised by some of the Printers (through whose agency this enquiry was instituted) in their examination before the Committee, in order to make out a case which might secure the interference of the House of Assembly in their behalf. The whole measure was got up in all its bearings by the management of the before mentioned Mr. Armour, who working upon the credulity of other Printers, persuaded them that by joining with him they would either secure the sending of their Papers by the Post Free, or at all events send them at a lower rate than they now pay. I must at the same time remark, that with the exception of Mr. Armour, and one or two others, the Printers in both Upper and Lower Canada seem to be well affected towards the Post Office Department, and were it not for the troublesome person just named, nothing in the shape of complaint would have appeared, either in respect to Newspapers, or any thing else.

I cannot omit this opportunity of saying, that in Upper Canada, where formerly complaints of want of Post accommodation were frequent, an entirely different expression appears to prevail. Between 40 and 50 new Offices, and many new Routes have been established in that Province, within less than three years, and the inhabitants generally appear to be satisfied with the disposition evinced by this Department. In Upper Canada, however, there is better encouragement for the increase of Post facilities, than in the Lower Province; where except in the few large Commercial Towns and in those Sections of the Country which are occupied by an English population, very little interest has hitherto been taken in the Post.

Answer of T. A. Stayner, Esquire, to Question 26, page 13.

I beg to lay before the Committee, as required, Copies of my Account Current with the United States General Post Office for the year 1834, in four Quarterly Statements, and in reply to the demand that I should state the arrangements under which I conduct my monied transactions with the United States, I desire to inform the Committee, that I am the General Agent of the United States Post Office for the collection of their Revenue in the Canadas, and that I am held personally responsible to that Department for such Revenue. In my capacity as such Agent—I compile Quarterly—the Accounts of the several Receiving and Distributing Offices for American Postage, in both Upper and Lower Canada, receiving the Revenue from the several Post Masters, and remitting it to Washington, as will appear by the Accounts Current sent herewith.

My arrangement with the General Post Office at Washington is, that in consideration of collecting the United States Postage, examining and compiling the Accounts, and making myself responsible for the due transmission of the Revenue to Washington, I am allowed to charge the same Commission as is granted to American Post Masters.

In Lower Canada the great mass of American Postage is collected at Montreal and Quebec. The Accounts are made up at the former Office, which is the chief distributing Office for American Postage in Lower Canada.

The Commission allowed by the American Government on its Postage collected in the Lower Province, has always been applied as the personal emolument of the Deputy Post Master General, who gives a proportion of it to his Deputies as a compensation to them for their trouble.

With regard to Upper Canada, I take the same trouble and am liable to the same responsibility with the Accounts and Revenue of American Postage in that Province, that I am for the Lower Province; but I derive no advantage from this source from Upper Canada, as I allow the whole Commission to be divided amongst the several Deputies. At Kingston I have sanctioned a separate Agency for the collection of American Postage in the person of my Deputy Mr. Macaulay, who makes up an account in his own name with the Post Master General at Washington.

I remit the American Postage collected in these Provinces, to the Post Master General at Washington, Quarterly, in Bills of Exchange.

A. The sum of £130, returned under the Head of "Derived from other Sources" is stated by Mr. Porteous to be composed of £55, received by him for Rent of Letter-Boxes, £50 allowed him by me for keeping the United States Postage Accounts, and £25 Commission charged upon Credit Accounts for Postage &c., kept by him with Merchants and others at his own risk.—Mr. Porteous pays me £50 a year for Pence collected under my privilege upon casual Newspapers, and states that he considers he receives £75 a year from that source more than he pays to me; this money I have allowed him to retain as a compensation to himself, for the trouble imposed upon him by the management of the Newspaper business and American Letters, in addition to £50 a year, which I allow him specifically for the latter service.

B. The sums received at the Quebec Office under the Head of "Derived from other Sources," are composed of Commissions on Public Accounts, Rent of Letter Boxes, and Commissions arising on Accounts kept with private Individuals by the Post Master at his own personal risk.

C. In the Return of the Establishment of the General Post Office for the year 1832, the total Amount of Salary and Emolument received by the Post Masters in Lower Canada for that year, is stated to be £3054. 18s. 11d. being £6. 10s. 3d. more than is shown by this Statement; this difference is composed of Commission received by Post Masters for collecting United States Postage, and of which it has been found impossible to obtain complete detailed Statements, many Post Masters not retaining any record of sums received under this Head.

DATA which was founded the Deputy Post Master General's Report referred to in Mr. Secretary T. Spring Rice's Despatch on the Post Office, dated 5th October, 1834.

With reference to the desire of the Committee, that I should furnish a Copy of my Estimate of the probable effect of the proposed Post Office Law upon the Revenue, I beg to say that I have been so fortunate as to find amongst my Papers the original Notes upon which I drafted the Estimate in question, which enables me to comply with the order in a more satisfactory manner than I feared I could do.

Probable effect for one year upon the Post Office Revenue, in British North America, by the operation of the proposed new Act for the Government of the Post Office in the several Provinces, viz. :—

This Estimate shews a probable deficiency of £4700. and although the calculation is necessarily a loose one, I thought at the time I formed it, and I still think, that in practice, it would *as regards the aggregate*, be found not far wide of the truth. I stated to the Post Master General when rendering this Statement, that all the Provinces, more especially the Canadas, stood in need of further Post accommodation, and I considered it right, in order to meet those wants, and thus give satisfaction to the public, that we should make the sum to be provided £6000. I apportioned this sum of £6000. as follows:—

Upper Canada,	2000.

To be accounted for by the Post Master General to those Provinces respectively, in the Accounts to be kept with them.

I beg leave now to furnish some remarks by way of justifying the view I took of the subject when I prepared the foregoing Estimate, to assist me in doing which I have lettered the several Items:—

- A.—I think that the loss to be apprehended under this head cannot be counted at less than I have made it.
 B.—When in England I had no certain means of judging what might be the amount of the Postage Accounts of the several Provinces, under this head; but I should think they amount to as much as I have stated.
 C.—I think this a low Estimate.
 D.—I only learnt in England that these sums of money were provided by the Legislatures of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, towards supporting certain lines of Post. I could not find by reference to the Accounts of the Deputy Post Master General at Halifax, any trace of the appropriation of the Money, nor do I know how the Account is kept, but it was necessary that in forming a plan for the re-organization of the Posts, this Money should be brought into the calculation.
 E.—Upon the line of communication with New Brunswick, a number of families are settled for the purpose of keeping the Road, and assisting the Courier at difficult passes. These families are supplied with Rations of Flour at the expense of the Military Chest, and a man is paid 2s. a-day, from the same source, to look after them and see that they fulfil the obligations of their agreement. The total cost is about £200. a-year, and as the British Government upon a transfer of the Post Office Revenue, could not be expected to bear the charge, I included it in the Estimate.
 F.—I believe I am not far wrong in fixing this Item at £3000. It was formerly much more, but the New York Merchant Packets have taken a great deal of the correspondence away from the old Halifax and Falmouth line.
 G.—I now think this Item too low.
 H.—And this also—but taking the whole together, if I were now called upon to form an Estimate for the object under discussion, I would make the total amount very nearly what it appears in the Statement which I have now the honor to hand to the Committee.

I have the honor to transmit herewith, for the information of His Grace the Post Master General, Copy of a Letter from the Secretary of Sir James Kempt, the Governor General of the Canadas, transmitting a Petition to His Excellency from the Proprietors and Printers of Newspapers in the Province, complaining of the exaction of what they are pleased to term a *tax* for the transmission of their Gazettes thro' the Post Office, and praying His Excellency's interference to relieve them from this burthen, and to obtain for them the right of sending their Papers by the Mail free of Postage:—I have likewise the honor of laying before you Copy of my Letter to His Excellency's Secretary, in reply, in which I state my intention of submitting the subject for the consideration of the Post Master General, and of soliciting His Lordship's orders for my guidance. In fulfilling this promise, which I am now doing, it may be necessary to explain at greater length than I have done in my communication to His Excellency the Governor, that the practice now complained of by the Printers, of paying the Deputy Post Master General a certain annual consideration for the transmission of their Papers through the Post, has existed since the first establishment of the Post Office Department in the Country, a period of upwards of 10 years, and has always been considered by the Head of the Department, as his perquisite, the only one he enjoys. The authority for this I have not the means of tracing, (as I have informed His Excellency) though I cannot doubt that there originally was one.

Previous to addressing this Petition to the Governor, several of the Printers applied to me to make an arrangement, whereby the subscribers to the Gazettes might be made to pay the Postage (at 1d. each Paper,) as the Papers should be delivered to them by the different Post Masters, instead of the Deputy Post Master General's receiving an annual allowance from the publisher, and this plan would I believe give general satisfaction to the Printers, but as I conceived I had no authority to enter into such an engagement as that proposed, and was anxious that, as objections had been raised to the present mode of collection, the question should go before the proper authorities, I declined acceding to the proposition, and the Petition to the Governor immediately followed. In this Petition, however, the parties appear to desire that their Newspapers should be sent free of any Postage or charge whatever; alleging that such is the practice in Great Britain, but it may not be improper here to remark that Newspapers in this Country pay no Stamp or Excise duty of any kind.

In concluding this communication, I beg to be permitted to add without any reference to my individual interests in the settlement of the question, that if Printers are allowed to send their Newspapers free of any Postage, the number forwarded in this way would be so great that additional Couriers would be required for their conveyance upon nearly all the Routes, and the duty of the Post Masters who distribute the Papers, will at the same time be so much increased, that they will naturally demand a remuneration for their trouble, though hitherto they have performed the task without any compensation.

INSTRUCTIONS given by William Duke of Manchester, His Majesty's Post Master General.

To THOMAS ALLEN STAYNER, Esq.

Deputy Post Master General of His Majesty's Provinces of Canada and New Brunswick.

You are to take the Oath of Office and otherwise qualify yourself as directed by the Act of the 9th Queen Anne, for establishing a Post Office for all Her Majesty's Dominions.

As you are answerable to me for the conduct of your several Deputies, you are to appoint such only as are persons of known good reputation and abilities, and must take sufficient Security from them to His Majesty as well for the punctual payment of all monies received by them for the Postage of Letters, as for the diligent and faithful discharge of their duty, taking care also that they duly qualify themselves agreeably to the Act of the 9th Queen Anne.

You are by the first opportunity to acquaint me with the Appointments you may make from time to time, on the death or removal of any of your Deputies.

You and your Deputies in the several Sea Port Towns within your Commission, must be attentive to the utmost of your power upon the arrival of any Ship, that the Letters are brought to their respective Post Offices so by you established, as soon as may be, and you are to pay One Penny, sterling, for each Letter or Packet to the Commander or Master, or other person belonging to such Ship or Vessel bringing the same, as directed by the Act of the 9th Queen Anne, cap. 10, sec. 16, which Penny is to be added to the legal Postage as further directed by 5th Geo. 3, cap. 25, sec. 3 and 4.

But you will observe that by the Act of the 39th of the King, cap. 76, for the more secure conveyance of Ship Letters, &c. Twopence each Letter is to be paid to the Masters of Vessels bringing such sealed Bags as have been delivered to them from Persons authorized so to do at the Place or Post Town from which such Vessel shall have sailed. For further particulars respecting the receiving and forwarding such Letters you will refer to the distinct Instructions on that head.

For the greater safety of all Letters which shall be collected by you or your Deputies to be forwarded by the Packet Boats to any other Port on the Continent of America, or to any of the American Islands, or to England, you are to cause them to be sealed up in different Bags with a Ticket on each Bag, expressing the number of Letters and the Amount of Inland British American Postage charged upon the same, and in order to distinguish such Bags from each other, you are to fix a label to each with the name of the Town.

Letters from Great Britain or Ireland directed to persons in your District but who cannot be found, and have lain in your Office, or any Office under your control, three months, and have been advertized or posted up in some conspicuous place on the outside of such Office, must be returned under cover to me, and upon each Letter so returned the true reason should be written in Red Ink, why they could not be delivered, such as "Not to be found"—"Gone away"—"Dead"—"Refused," and the like—and if any Letters should be missent to your Offices, they are to be returned to me by the first Mail, observing to write on the outside Cover, "Missent Letters."

You are to cause the Letters of every Place under your management to be carefully stamped on the back with the name of the Post Town from whence they are sent, and you and your Deputies are to keep exact accounts of the amount of Postage and the number of Letters received and despatched from each Post Town in your District.

You are to keep just and exact Accounts of all Receipts and Disbursements for Salaries and other incidental expenses, and at the expiration of every Quarter, viz. 5th July, 10th October, 5th January, and 5th April, you are to transmit to me by the first opportunity a general Statement thereof, with every article properly vouched, and the Account must be attested by you on Oath before a competent authority.

You are not to fail making regular remittances as the Revenue arises in your hands, at least once a Quarter, for which purpose you are to pay the same to the Commissary General, taking his Certificates for the Amount, which you will transmit to me or my Secretary.

You are to consider and report to me from time to time your opinion what further improvements may be made for the benefit of Correspondence and of this Revenue, and you may establish such new Offices within the Districts under your management as shall at any time appear to be for the benefit of the Revenue and Correspondence, reporting the same to me.

You are by every opportunity to send me early accounts of all material transactions and remarkable occurrences, to be communicated if necessary to His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State.

You are to observe all such further Orders and Instructions as you shall from time to time receive from me or from my Secretary or by my Orders, and likewise to use your utmost skill and abilities to promote His Majesty's Service according to the true intent of the trust reposed in you.

Letter from Sir Francis Freeling, Baronet, to T. A. Stayner, Esquire.

SIR,

Having brought under the consideration of my Lord the Post Master General the expediency of a more convenient arrangement and direction of the business of the Post Office in New Brunswick, it has appeared to His Grace advisable that the Deputy Post Masters, Couriers, and others, employed under this Department in that Province, should be made responsible to, and receive their Instructions from, the Office at Halifax, N. S., instead of Quebec, which would at the same time assimilate the business of this branch of the Public Service with the others established in Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick, of which Halifax forms the Head Quarters.

In this view of the question it is not proposed to disturb any of the Post arrangements in the Canadas, but that all those in the Province of New Brunswick should be transferred to the controul and guidance of the Deputy Post Master General of Nova Scotia; and I am to request, in order to carry this measure into effect, you will have the goodness to communicate fully with Mr. Howe, at Halifax, and report what Offices, Couriers, &c. are to be accountable to, and paid by, him, and the date when the new regulations are to commence.

I have written to the above effect to Mr. Howe by this Mail, and he has been instructed to communicate with you on the subject.

SIR,

I have laid before my Lord the Post Master General your Report of the 14th July last, stating that having satisfied yourself as to the propriety of the measure, both as respects the Public accommodation and the benefit of the Post Office Revenue, you had established a Post Office at Maitland, situated between Prescott and Brockville, on the grand Mail route between Lower and Upper Canada, and nominated Samuel Thomas, Deputy Post Master—and at Guelph, the head quarter town of the Canada Land Company, 35 miles N. W. of Dundas, and nominated David Gilkinson your Deputy; both places being in Upper Canada.

I am to acquaint you that under your assurance that you have satisfied yourself *that these measures will be for the benefit of the Revenue*, His Grace has directed me to state, that he has approved them *by way of experiment only*; and that it will be necessary, at the end of a year, you should report the results, in order that His Grace may be enabled to decide whether they ought to be confirmed.

You will please to understand the above to be a standing rule with regard to the establishment of any new Offices, and in all cases it is desirable you should state, in the first instance, the estimated additional expense to be incurred for Couriers, Allowances to Deputies, &c. for such new Establishments.

GENERAL POST OFFICE,
4th November, 1830.

SIR,

Having laid before His Grace the Post Master General your Letter of the 27th September, requesting Instructions in regard to the Postage of Packets containing Patterns which are taken to your Office by the Masters of private Vessels with their Ship Letters, I have to inform you that although the Post Office is legally entitled to the full rates of Postage on such Packets, yet as they were not intended to be sent through the Post, and the demand of the whole amount charged must, in most cases, lead to their being altogether refused by the parties, to whom it may be inconvenient or injurious, while the Revenue loses all profit for

their conveyance; His Grace is of opinion that it may be expedient to facilitate the receipt of such Parcels under certain regulations, and is pleased to leave a discretionary power with you to be exercised according to the circumstances of each case, and not delegated to any other person, or acted upon at any Office but that at Quebec.

The following are the General Rules which His Grace has laid down for your guidance:—

No abatement shall be made on any Packet charged less than £1. nor on any, the principal part of the contents of which shall consist of Letters or written Papers.

The full Postage shall be charged on any Letters that may be found accompanying Patterns or other Articles in Parcels, and the Postage of the Patterns or Articles themselves, reduced to a Sum equal to one fourth of the whole charge upon such Parcels.

You will further be pleased to understand that the discretionary power left with you, is only to apply to Ship Letter Packages, and not to such as may originate in the Country and be deposited by the Senders in the different Receiving Houses.

A.—This Money is the emolument of the First Letter Carrier, W. T. Langston, in addition to his Salary of £60. sterl. The other two Letter Carriers are very young men, about 18 years of age—and receive nothing for their Services besides their Salaries of £52. sterl. each. Mr. Langston, besides managing the Letter Carrying business, gives his attendance every day at the Post Office, to assist in closing the Mails, and I conceive that he fully earns all that he receives—whether in the shape of pay or emoluments.

B.—Mr. Porteous, Post Master of Montreal, states that this sum of Eighty Pounds a-year is the average amount collected for carrying out Letters in that City, and that it is about equally divided between two Letter Carriers, each of whom has one-half of the City allotted to him.

C.—The Post Master of Three Rivers states, that the person employed by him for carrying out Letters, receives about Ten Pounds a-year in the way of gratuities.

General Instructions to Edwin James King, Esq. Accountant to the Post Office in British North America.

You will take upon yourself the charge and management of the Accounts of the Post Office in British North America, including the claims and allowances for re-directed, refused, and undelivered Letters, for which purpose the Accounts of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward's Island will be sent to you to be incorporated in one General Account of British North America.

The Accounts and Checks should be maintained and furnished upon the principle that obtains in this country, so far as is practicable; and you will not fail to adopt any improvement which your experience may suggest, or any alterations which may occur to you as necessary from the nature and character of the Post in the Provinces, reporting by the first opportunity such alterations as you may propose to make, or as you may have found necessary to make, for the consideration of the Post Master General.

The object of your appointment is not only to place the system of Accounts in the British North American Provinces upon a satisfactory footing, but to establish a check upon the Deputy Post Master General as well as the subordinate Post Masters and Public Accountants of every description attached to the Post Offices in all matters relating to the Accounts, but not interfering with the maintenance of the check; you are to obey such instructions as you may receive from the Deputy Post Master General, and bearing in mind his responsibility for the collection of the Revenue, you will afford him every information and assistance which he can possibly require.

The Annual, Quarterly and Periodical Accounts should receive the Signature of the Deputy Post Master General, as an admission of their correctness in addition to your own; they are to be transmitted to this country with the least possible delay after the expiration of the Year or Quarter, as the case may be; and in the event of any hesitation on the part of the Deputy Post Master General, the Accounts are not therefore to be detained for that cause, but to be accompanied by your report, and the Deputy Post Master General's reasons for declining to admit them.

You will be particularly careful in all cases to give an exact analysis of the apparent balance, shewing the cash in hand and bills received, &c. though not in time to be included.

You will furnish on the special requisition of the Legislatures of the respective Provinces, through the Deputy Post Master General, similar Accounts to those laid annually before the Parliaments of the United Kingdom, so far as regards the Revenue arising within the Provinces.

It is presumed that the two Clerks, which are allotted to you, will be amply sufficient for all the purposes of your Appointment if you take that full and active share which you ought to do in the business of your Department; these Clerks are acting under your superintendance and control, and in the event of actual incapacity or of gross misconduct, you will not hesitate to remove either, or both, provisionally subject to the pleasure of the Post Master General, engaging in the mean time a competent person, so that the performance of the duty may not be impeded.

Your own Salary at the rate of £300. sterling per annum, and those of your Clerks, viz.: the 1st Clerk at £150. the 2d Clerk at £100. will be paid by the Deputy Post Master General, and charged in his Disbursements, and he will also provide an Office and Stationery for the service of your Office at the Public Expense.

You are further to observe such Instructions as you may from time to time receive from the Post Master General or by his Orders.

Note 4.—There was one Officer short of the number ordinarily employed at Quebec, on the 5th October, just before the new Establishment came into effect,—this was occasioned by the death of Mr. Bignell in June.—His place in the Office was taken by Mr. William Henry Griffin, and Mr. William Henry Griffin's place by Mr. William Griffin, the latter gentleman continuing at the same time to perform the duties, for which the Deputy Post Master General allowed him £150 a year. This was a temporary arrangement made by Mr. Thomson, the Acting Deputy Post Master General, and intended to continue only until the Deputy Post Master General, who was then in England, should return.

Letter from the Post Master at Three Rivers to the Deputy Post Master General.

POST OFFICE THREE RIVERS,
26th December, 1835.

SIR;

I had yesterday the honor of receiving your letter of the 24th instant, intimating to me, that a complaint had been made to the Post Office Committee against this Office, for closing the Mails at 10 o'clock, A.M., and the Office at 2 o'clock, P.M. and in reply, I beg your acceptance of my best thanks for the explanation you gave to the Committee with respect to closing the Mails at the hour in question; which, however, is only applicable to Mails dispatched for Montreal; those for Quebec never being closed before 11 o'clock, A.M., and for the most part, much later, because they are never dispatched before 12 o'clock, noon.

With regard to the other charge, of closing the Office at 2 o'clock, P.M., I beg leave to deny it in the most positive terms; for except on Saturdays and Mondays, when no Posts come in or are dispatched, except from the Townships, the Office is never shut before 3 o'clock in the afternoon; and when it happens that the Posts are later in arriving, at a much later hour. During the last three months, I have myself issued letters at every hour from 9 in the morning till 10 o'clock at night.

This is the first time that I have heard of the complaint in question. It has never been made to me, or to any other person about the Post Office; and if it had, I was perfectly prepared to satisfy any person of its not being well founded.

Those who are most in the habit of frequenting this Office with, and for letters, are ready to testify to the accuracy of these statements, as well as to certify their general satisfaction with the manner in which the duties of the Office are performed, should that be deemed necessary.

THE COMMITTEE have required to be prepared a Statement shewing:—

1st. The available claims due from Post Masters and others in Lower Canada to the Post Office Department on the 5th day of October, 1835.

2ndly. The Funds belonging to the Department in my hands, or at my credit, whether as Cash in hand, Cash in the Banks, or Bills of Exchange, on the same day.

3rdly. The Amount of claims against, and debts due by, the Department on the same day.

Likewise similar Returns for Upper Canada to the same date.

When this order was handed to me, I informed the Committee that I would, as far as lay in my power, endeavour to furnish the Statements; but the impression upon my mind at the time (and which I expressed to the Committee) was, that it would be impracticable to prepare Returns in literal conformity to the order; since then, having carefully studied the requisition, it has become evident that there is no possibility of making up all those Statements in the form required, and it appears to me that the Committee cannot but see the truth of this declaration, when I have explained that the Accounts of the different Provinces being unavoidably blended together in my Returns to the General Post Office, it cannot be ascertained what proportion of my old balance may be considered applicable to either Province; in any general Statement, therefore, which I may prepare, that balance must stand alone. I have accordingly made a Return, in which the total balance due to the General Post Office, in London, is stated in the manner just described; but, with a view to elucidate the subject as much as possible, I have, in addition, prepared a distinct and separate Return of the Amount of Postage collected in each of the two Provinces for the Quarter ending the 5th October, with the charges applicable to each (as nearly as they can be got at,) and the balances accruing to each Province, by the operation, appear in those Statements.

As to the Funds belonging to the Department in my hands on the 5th of October, 1835, I must again represent to the Committee the impossibility of complying literally with the terms of the order. I am not required by the Post Master General to keep a deposite of monies belonging to the General Post Office separate from my own monies, and I have never done so.

It is necessary, for the proper conducting of my duties, that I should keep monies in several Banks in both the Canadas, and I also keep monies in my own chest. I take care to have, at all times, more money either in Bank, or in my own immediate custody, than is sufficient to satisfy the claims of the Post Office; but even if it were otherwise, the large securities lodged at the General Post Office, London, in my behalf, are a sufficient guarantee to Government against any possible loss or defalcation that could arise through me. I consider that I have an undoubted right to deposite Post Office Revenue where I think proper, my securities being responsible to Government that it shall be forthcoming at the time I am required to remit it to England.

On the 5th October, 1835; when I appear to have been indebted to the General Post Office about £2,200, I had more than that amount in Bank in Upper and Lower Canada, besides a large sum in Notes and Bills of Exchange in my own chest, but it is impossible for me to state otherwise than I have done, what proportion of Post Office Money was in my own hands, and what in the Bank. I have judged it necessary to enter into this somewhat lengthened explanation of the circumstances connected with the custody of the Post Office Monies, as from the form of the questions put to me, the Committee seem to have thought that I kept Accounts at the Banks specifically for the Post Office Revenue,—a thing which I have never attempted doing.

I shall now proceed to furnish Statements, approximating, as nearly as circumstances will permit, to the letter of the order; hoping that with the explanations afforded above, and the notes which I shall subjoin, the Committee will be satisfied that I have done every thing in my power to meet their wishes.

EXPLANATORY REMARKS.

Notes.

- A. This Letter was mailed at Toronto City to Mr. Weagant's address at Williamsburg, and was supposed to have been abstracted by a young man named Westley, Assistant in the Williamsburg Post Office, who declared that the Mail from Toronto City, which contained Mr. Weagant's Money Letter, never reached the Williamsburg Office.—Of the truth of the suspicions which attached to Westley, no legal proof could be obtained.—From proofs elicited, at the time this affair occurred, of the manner in which the duties of the Williamsburg Office were conducted, I considered it necessary to dismiss the Post Master, and break up the Office, until an eligible person to take charge of it could be found.
- B. The Montreal Packet which contained this Letter, never reached Isle aux Noix, and no trace of it could be discovered.
- C. This was a remittance made by the Branch Bank of Upper Canada at Cobourg to Kingston, and was abstracted from the Mail at Haldimand, by the son of the Post Master of that place.—He was tried for the offence and convicted.—The principal part of the money was given up by the thief, and the deficiency was made good by his father, who at the same time resigned his Office.
- D. Every possible exertion was used to discover the author of these losses, but without effect.
- E. This Letter not having reached its destination in due course, was supposed to have been lost.—It was, after some time occupied in the Montreal Post Office; the direction being so imperfect as to render it impossible to determine to what place the writer intended the Letter should be sent.
- F. No trace could be discovered of the Mail which conveyed this Letter.
- G. The Mail which conveyed this Letter never reached the Quebec Post Office, and no clue to its loss could be found.
- H. The Mail Bag which conveyed this Letter, was lost in the St. Lawrence, by the Courier, in attempting to cross from Caughnawaga to Lachine,—the ice gave way with the Courier, and he narrowly escaped being drowned: no fault could be attributed to him, as the loss of the Bag was purely accidental.
- I. No Record of this Money Letter appeared in the Quebec Office Books, and the Post Master of Quebec denied that any such Money Letter was ever mailed by Mr. Gagnon at the time he stated.
- K. A Money Letter appears by the Quebec Office Books, to have been mailed at Yamaska, on the 28th December, 1833, addressed to Mr. L. R. Blanchard.—This Mr. Gagnon states to have been a Money Letter put into the Quebec Office by him, intended for Mr. L. R. Blanchard, of St. Hyacinthe, this latter place is frequently called "Maska" and "Grand Maska," and it is supposed that some ambiguity in the address of the Letter, (Mr. Gagnon writing a very obscure hand,) caused it to be mailed for Yamaska.—The Post Master of Yamaska stated that the Mail from Quebec of the 28th December, never reached his Office, and after diligent enquiry, no trace of either the Mail or the Money Letter could be discovered.—This subject is more fully treated of in a Special Report made to the Committee in December last, 1835.
- L. Mr. C. Ross mailed at the Quebec Office, for L'Assomption, on the 4th and 15th January, three Money Letters addressed to J. Emond of Repentigny, J. Dugas of St. Jacques, and Made. Guyon of L'Assomption; not receiving any acknowledgment from those persons of the receipt of the sums remitted by him. Mr. Ross requested that enquiry might be made on the subject.—This was done, and Mr. Therien, the then Post Master of L'Assomption, stated that the Money Letters in question had been received at his Office, and delivered to the parties addressed, as soon as called for, and on being urged to explain a complaint which had been made to the General Post Office, that though the parties had after considerable delay, received the Money remitted to them by Mr. Ross, yet that Mr. Therien had in two cases, opened and withheld the Letters, merely delivering the enclosures, Mr. Therien denied this accusation, and maintained that any irregularity or delay which had taken place in the delivery of the Letters, arose from Messrs. Dugas and Emond having neglected to come into L'Assomption for them.—As the Deputy Post Master General's return to Canada was daily expected at this time, Mr. Therien's conduct in the matter, was left for his decision, and the Deputy Post Master General, on his return, considering that Mr. Therien had laid himself open to just suspicion of improper dealing with the Money Letters in question, he removed him from the charge of the L'Assomption Office.
- M. Mr. Therien, Post Master, of L'Assomption, affirmed that he had mailed a Money Letter addressed to Mr. Deschamps, at Quebec, on the 7th February, with three other Letters for the same City; no such mail was ever received at the Quebec Office.
- N. This Letter was mailed at Toronto City, for L'Original, by a Mr. Radenhurst, addressed to C. P. Treadwell, Original, and purloined with its contents while *en route*, by A. R. McDonell, then Post Master of St. Raphael's, U. C. For this offence McDonell was tried at the Cornwall Assize, convicted and sentenced to seven years imprisonment in the Kingston Penitentiary.—A part of the money found upon the person of McDonell, was handed over to Mr. Treadwell, by the Court, say £62. 10s.
- O. A Commission was appointed to enquire into the circumstances connected with the loss of these Money Letters, but after a laborious and strict investigation, the gentlemen who composed it, were unable to determine by whom or in what manner the depredations had been committed.—The Letters appear to have been duly forwarded from the London and St. Thomas Post Offices, but the Mails containing them never reached the Toronto City Post Office, for which they were intended.

- P. This was a remittance on account of Post Office Revenue due by Mr. Merritt, Post Master of St. Catherine's, U. C. Mr. Merritt's Assistant stated that he had mailed the sum, noted in the return, on the 9th December, 1834, this Mail was never received at the Quebec Office, and from various circumstances calculated to raise his suspicions, Mr. Merritt was led to conclude, that the money had not been transmitted as stated by his Assistant, and he made good the loss.
- Q. The Mail from King-ton for Montreal, of the 16th February, 1835, containing the Money Letters stated in the Return, was dropped from the Stage near Ozuabruok, U. C. on the night of the 17th February, it was picked up by a labouring man named Cook, broken open and plundered by his wife, and the greater part of the contents burnt.—Edward Cook died in Cornwall Gaol, his wife, Fanny Cook, was tried and found guilty at the Cornwall Assizes.—A prosecution against the Mail Contractor for the Montreal and Kingston route, by whose want of care the Mail was dropped, is now in progress, and when the penalty sued for shall be recovered, the parties who have sustained loss by this occurrence, will be reimbursed.—One hundred and twelve Dollars of the money found in Cook's possession, have been deposited with the Deputy Post Master General, by order of the Court.
- R. This Letter not having been recorded as a Money Letter, could not be traced.
- S. This Letter was mailed from Montreal, on the 6th July, but did not reach its destination until (I believe) some time in October last, and in consequence of this great delay, was supposed to have been lost; the cause of the retardation could not be ascertained, but the conclusion is that it was accidental and not criminal.
- T. This sum of money was stated by Mr. Bishoprick to have been inclosed in a Letter from a Mr. Playter, to Messrs. R. F. Maitland & Co. of Montreal, which Letter was by Mr. Bishoprick inclosed in one from himself, addressed to the same firm, and mailed at the Bytown Office.—Mr. Maitland received this Letter himself, (immediately after the arrival of the Bytown Mail at Montreal,) with the seal perfectly uninjured, and the inner Letter from Mr. Playter was in the like good order, yet on being opened, the money stated by Mr. Bishoprick to have been inclosed therein, was not to be found.—From the impossibility of abstracting money from the inner Letter, under the circumstances above detailed, without damage to the seals of either that or the envelope, combined with other causes of suspicion, it is more than probable that Mr. Bishoprick's statement was not correct.

GENERAL REMARKS.

Not having kept a Book specially for recording the Facts and Correspondence connected with Missing Money Letters, the difficulty of research, in order to prepare such a Statement as is required by the Committee, has been greater, and the task has occupied much more time than I had calculated upon.—In the Return now rendered, I have made a collection of all the cases of which I have any knowledge, and in reference to those appearing to me, to require more information than could be conveniently conveyed under the Heads in the Form laid down by the Committee, I have appended certain Explanatory Notes, which show the steps taken by this Department, to trace the lost property, and the causes of the losses.—In laying these Statements before the Committee, it is only a duty to the Post Office Department for me to remark, that although there can be no doubt that Bank Notes and other available Monies are occasionally stolen from the Mails by Individuals belonging to the Establishment, or others, yet, considering the large sums daily transmitted, the proportion of losses is by no means great, nor would they be near so considerable as they are, if persons sending monies by the Post, were to use a moderate degree of care in folding and addressing their Packets.—Letters containing Bank Notes are frequently so carelessly folded, that the inclosures are visible; those Letters are perhaps intrusted to a messenger, to be deposited in a Post Office, and his cupidity being aroused by a knowledge of the contents, the Letters are suppressed by the way, and the contents stolen, whilst the Post Office sustains the odium of the loss.—Besides this there are good reasons for believing that there are persons so base as to pretend to have forwarded money to their Correspondents by Post, although they never did so, their object being by this stratagem to get rid of their obligation to pay debts which they are either unwilling or unable to discharge.

The derangement of the business of my Office, caused by the pestilence which has been raging throughout the Canadas, all summer, and a severe fit of illness which confined me to my house for a number of weeks, have prevented my giving prompt attention to several orders from you, amongst others, to that contained in your letter of the 27th March, directing me to state, for the information of His Grace the Post Master General, the Amount of my Salary and Emoluments for the last three years. I now proceed to furnish you with the required Statement, premising, however, with regard to that portion of my Income which is derived from Newspapers sent through the Post, that although I know my Account cannot be far from the truth, I cannot vouch for its being critically correct, for this reason, that I have sustained various losses in collecting the dues from the Printers, and besides, not anticipating that I should be called upon for a return of this kind, I have not been so particular in preserving a record of the Amounts accruing as I would otherwise have been; I repeat, however, that it is substantially correct.

Communication from T. A. Stayner, Esquire, to a Special Committee of the House in 1831.

I beg to avail myself of this opportunity of repairing an omission which occurred in replying to the questions relative to the transmission of Newspapers by the Mail, (upon the charge for which the Printers have complained), and to request that what I now state may be entered upon the proceedings, viz. :—*All Printers in this country, receive their exchange Papers from other Printers, both in these Provinces and in the United States, without being subjected to any charge for their transmission through our territory.*

With reference to the question, as to when the Post Office was established in these Provinces, I have learnt, since giving my reply to that question, that in 1775 there was a Deputy Post Master General in this country, and that the Mail was then sent twice a week between Quebec and Montreal.—The Department had even at that time been established many years.

My general Instructions direct me to establish new Offices “wherever they may be necessary for the correspondence of the country,” reporting the same to the Post Master General. These Reports are accompanied by Maps, which it is my duty to prepare, shewing the connection between the new Offices and those previously in existence—by means of which the Department at home (which is already provided with a general Map of the Post Routes throughout these Provinces) is enabled to mark the progress made in the extension of the Post facilities, and together with my Reports, to judge of the propriety of my proceedings in relation to this branch of my duty.

With a view of further satisfying the House of Assembly that the Home Department of the General Post Office has every disposition to increase the Post accommodation to the extent of the wants of the inhabitants, I beg leave to produce an extract from a letter of the Secretary of the General Post Office, to me, dated the 7th of August last. The paragraph is in allusion to a Report which I had then recently made of the creation of a number of new offices and of other improvements, it is as follows :—

“Much as has been already done, I would recommend you to consider the propriety and expediency of extending and increasing the communications by Post still further, as well on the Grand Routes as on the Branches, and more especially in cases in which there is a prospect that the additional accommodation will afford the means of defraying the extra expenses, and where the increase of population and the formation of new Towns and Settlements may fairly justify it. The arrangements of the Post Office ought to keep pace with the settlement and with the consequent demands for accommodation of the country.”

The Committee will, I trust, be satisfied from these proofs, that the Parent Department feels no disposition to withhold any accommodation in the way of new offices that can reasonably be asked for; it is my duty, however, to see that in establishing fresh lines of Post, there is a prospect of their being really useful, and that the expense incurred is not thrown away. It, therefore, behoves me before complying with requisitions for new Offices to collect every information bearing upon the subject. This of course takes time, and people ought not to be surprized if an immediate approval is not bestowed upon every application that is presented. I must further observe, for the information of the Committee, that in no part of my Instructions is it made a stipulation that the receipts upon any Post Route must bear not less than a certain proportion to the expense of its maintenance. The orders under which I act inculcate a more liberal course of proceeding, and most assuredly I can have no motive to induce me to act counter to those orders, nor have I ever done so. My ambition is to be instrumental in putting the Post Office Department in these Provinces upon an efficient and respectable footing, such as will insure to me the approbation of the public here and of my immediate superiors in England, two objects which I conceive the same line of conduct will enable me to realize.

I hope it may not be deemed improper for me to take this opportunity of remarking that I have been less than three years in charge of the Post Office in this country. In assuming the duty, I had much labor to go through, and many difficulties to encounter in forming a system for the interior management of the Department, upon which I might extend its advantages in the way that I knew the fast increasing demands of the country would require. The improvements which I have made in this respect I trust are not inconsiderable, though they may not be so obvious to the public, as the increase in the number of Offices and the opening of new Routes. In reference to these latter objects, I have the following facts to offer.

The number of Offices in operation in Upper and Lower Canada in June, 1828, when my appointment was notified here, was 102.

The number is at present 160, with the probability of amounting to 200 in a very short time.

The number of miles of Post Route travelled has increased in a still greater proportion than the number of Offices, and a corresponding improvement in the dispatch, (that is, the rate of travelling), has taken place upon every road that would admit of it, or where it appeared to be necessary.

The greater number of the Offices created by me have been in the Upper Province. The reason of this is explained by the simple fact that more have been applied for in the one Province than the other. I have the same desire to spread the advantages, which a well conducted Post Office is calculated to afford, in Lower Canada as in the Upper Province; but if Offices are not asked for, or if people cannot be produced who will act as Post Masters where Offices are desirable, (which is not unfrequently the case), it is certainly not the fault of this Department if they are not created.

Letter from Lord Bathurst to the Earl of Dalhousie.

(Copy.)

Downing Street, 11th September, 1820.

MY LORD,

I have the honour to transmit to your Lordship, a copy of a Letter from Mr. Freeling with its inclosures from Mr. Sutherland, Deputy Post Master General in North America, relative to the private conveyance of letters by the Steam Boats, more particularly between Quebec and Montreal. These papers having been referred to His Majesty's Law Officers, it appears that the regular course of enforcing the provisions of the Act of Parliament under which the parties so conveying letters in private vessels are liable to penalties, would be by directing a prosecution against the offenders in the Colonial Courts, and under ordinary circumstances I should have no difficulty in so advising the Post Master General.—But as the attention of the House of Assembly has recently been particularly directed to the Post Office Revenue, and doubts have been suggested as to the right of Great Britain to receive it, it has appeared to me that an enforcement of these rights at the present moment might embarrass your Lordship, by giving to the Assembly an additional ground of contention with the Government of this Country, and I have therefore considered it more advisable to recommend that the Deputy Post Master General at Quebec, should be instructed to communicate with your Lordship on this subject, and not to institute any proceedings for the recovery of penalties without your full concurrence.

Your Lordship will be best able to judge of the effect such proceeding might produce, and will accordingly be best qualified to decide as to the propriety of their being either immediately adopted or temporarily postponed.

I am commanded by my Lords the Post Master General, to transmit to you for the information of Earl Bathurst, extract of a letter from their Lordships' Deputy in British North America, dated 12th October, and copy of one of 1st November, on the subject of private Steam Vessels carrying Letters without the intervention of the Post Office, more especially between Quebec and Montreal, between which places there is a regular Post communication twice a week, and requesting instructions for his guidance.

Although no reasonable doubt could be entertained of the illegality of the practice, their Lordships thought it right to refer the papers to their Solicitor, for his opinion thereon. He states that by the Statute 9th Queen Anne, Cap. 10, Sec. 17, "It is enacted that no person or persons whatever in Her Majesty's Plantations in America, (other than the Deputies of the Post Master General,) shall presume to receive, take up, order, despatch, convey, carry, recarry, or deliver any letter, (other than such letters as are excepted by the 2d Sec. of this Act,) or make any collection of letters, or set up, or employ any post, packet boat, or any other vessel or boat, person or persons, conveyance or conveyances whatever for the receiving, carrying or delivering any letter or packet, by sea or by land, or on any river within Her Majesty's Dominions, on pain of forfeiting £5 Sterling for every offence against the tenor of this Act, and also the sum of £100 for every week that such offences shall continue." And under that section he is of opinion that "the practice of the conveyance of letters by Steam Boats as alluded in the letter from the Deputy Post Master General of Canada is illegal," and he adds that by Section 19 of the same Act "the Penalties are made recoverable in any of Her Majesty's Courts of Record," but he cannot give an opinion as to the recovery of the Penalties in Canada. The Deputy Post Master General states that he had agreed to allow the Captains of the Steam Boats 2d. per letter, and they charged the legal postage for their conveyance, but that he had received information from Upper Canada, that many persons there refused to pay postage on letters conveyed by Steam Boats as being an illegal charge, and that the subject is to be brought before the Legislature at the ensuing Session.

It is presumed that the rights of the Post Office is clear, and their Lordships natural course would be to direct their Deputy in Canada, to enforce the Law against the offenders, thereby protecting His Majesty's Revenue, so that it might continue to be brought to the Exchequer of this country; but as the Legislature of these Provinces has in several instances manifested an inclination to interfere with the internal Posts and their Revenues, and as the Solicitor cannot give an opinion as to the recovery in Canada of any Penalties to which the parties might be liable under the Acts before quoted, their Lordships consider the subject as one of great delicacy, and have thought it right to state the circumstances for Earl Bathurst's consideration, and to request his Lordship's opinion before any instructions are sent out to their Deputy in Canada on the subject.

Letter from D. Sutherland, Deputy Post Master General, to James Stuart, Esquire, Attorney General.

GENERAL POST OFFICE,
Quebec, 3d December, 1826.

DEAR SIR,

Ever since the introduction of Steam Boats into these Provinces, the Post Office Revenue has diminished considerably during the season of navigation, as many people send their letters by them instead of through the Post Office, merely to avoid paying Postage, and although I had Letter Boxes put on board of each for the convenience of the public, and the safe conveyance of letters, yet they prefer sending them by persons on board of these boats to the manifest injury of the Revenue, and as I conceive it to be my duty to put a stop to this practice by every legal means in my power, I request your opinion whether it is lawful to have Letters carried by Steam Boats, or other river craft, or by the captains, crews, or passengers on board of either, free of Postage, and if not, what steps ought I to take to enforce the law?

OPINION.

I am of opinion that the carrying and delivery of Letters, free of Postage, by persons conveyed in Steam Boats, and others, as mentioned in the preceding letter, except in the cases specially permitted by law, is illegal; and that the proper course for putting a stop to this unlawful practice would be to prosecute the persons guilty of it, for the pecuniary penalties which they thereby incur. There can, I conceive, occur no difficulty in the recovery of these, if care be taken to substantiate the facts constituting the offences referred to, according to the provisions of the Statutes upon this subject, particularly of the 9th Ann, Cap. 10, and 25th Geo. III. Cap 25.
