Some people, chief amongst them those who take the least interest in sport, will tell us that the less said about this subject the better. From these grouchers we beg to differ. True, we did not get the Intercollegiate Championship in any of the three major sports and for this we do not offer any excuses. Of championships, however, we did manage to get four, and even if of a minor nature they are not to be despised.

Where, however, we think McGill excels in sports in the style of game she plays. We pride ourselves in being true sports and in this we think there is some justification. Our teams play the game and it matters little how the score is going, our fellows are there all the time. As an example of this the last basketball game will do. We were hopelessly at sea with a badly crippled team, and the score was going against us. The team did not quit, instead of that they kept the Toronto team going at full speed.

Let us look now at Athletics from an entirely different standpoint. Whenever before in the history of McGill have our teams had the support which they have had this year? The price of reserved seats in both hockey and football was raised, and yet when the tickets came on sale there was a long line waiting to buy them. If sport in college is of any use outside of the advertisement it is . to the University and the physical benefit it is to the men themselves, it is in raising what we call "college spirit." That is in binding the individuals of our college life more closely together, and in making McGill graduates and undergraduates more loyal to their Alma Mater.

From this standpoint we think our athletic season has been a success.

MR. W. E. G. MURRAY, Editor 1912 Annual.

This here has done so many things that it is difficult to know where to start, but as he was born at an early age we may perhaps be pardoned for mentioning this event first.

Mr. W. E. G. Murray entered this life April 8th, 1891, at Maple Ridge. B.C. Maple Ridge is an—er—city, 25 miles from Vancouver, and here Mr. Murray remained till 1906 when he went to the Vancouver High School. WILL-IAM E. G. MURRAY being built on the plan of "more speed than cargo," developed into an Athlete and became a Track man of some repute, equalling the school record for the mile. His young mind also outran all competitors and he won the speaking contest and left head of the school, receiving a silver medal for this deed. Mr. Murray was unable to show us this trophy as he left it in care of his uncle in Vancouver before coming East.

WILLIAM EWART G. MURRAY then entered McGill College, B.C., in '08. His gentle spirit rebelled against his professor's tyranny and he started a young rebellion in the Arts Faculty. The Seniors of that time naturally looked on this with abhorrance and a number of them marched Mr. Murray downstairs and locked him up till his excitement cooled. Our hero, however, lived down this incident and became President of his year and Captain of the Track Team.

After a year of McGill in B.C., our hero decided to tempt fortune in the East, and in 1909 WILLIAM EWART GLADSTONE MURRAY (now you have it in its full beauty) arrived at McGill College, Montreal, and entered Arts '12.

He made the Track Team at once, and in the Intercollegiate Meet in Toronto was second in the mile, the winner defeating him by a bare two inches. He made a record in the cross-country run $-7\frac{3}{4}$ miles for 42 min. 21 secs.—and in the same year won the gold medal in the speaking contest, thus banishing the rumour that his wind was out of order—(he **has** this medal).

In the fall he was elected Captain of the Harrier Team and they succeeded in winning the Intercollegiate Championship, and he has just been elected President of the Track Team for 1911-12, so he will figure on next year's Student Council.

This is a goodly list, but there is more to come. William — EWART— Gladstone—MURRAY is the next Editor of the Martlet. He is to fill the chair next year and we are sure he will do so more than efficiently. He is Editor of the Annual this year, and he will therefore be well grounded in the command of language which is necessary, and, as he is an orator of no mean calibre, the moral effect on his staff ought to be excellent. Good luck to him and—God help him.





In all, there were nine bouts, and some very good showing was made, especially in wrestling.


Of the boxing, the best showing was made in the 125 lb. class, but the winner has yet to fight a bout for his place on the team.

From the start the Medical septette played good combination and bembarded the Arts goal. Bruneau their goal-tender, feeling somewhat uncomfortable. Bad shooting and lack of coolness before an opponent's goal was the cause of no scoring for sometime. W. P. Brown, Med's. rover, by strenuous play found the nets for the Meds. Demuth, of Rossland, put in some effective body play and made circles round Lovatt who was not well supported and placed a second goal. Graham, Arts' Rover, Darling and Nicholson, broke away by clever passing and playing the boards, and a peach of a shot was well stopped by smiling Belanger and a regular whirlwind shot was also cast outside the nets by the same Phillipe who kept his head all the time. Brown and Laing put lots of pepper into the game, and Audette, the microbe centre, as soon as Lyons dropped the puck wriggled through the whole bunch and found the nets for the third goal. 



The Rutgers "Targum" is one of the few of our weekly contemporaries, and is consequently open to the same objections as we and others of that ilk are. It is "a sort of bally harumfrodite;" a newspaper and literary magazine in one. From time to time good articles appear, but these of necessity of the shorter variety. It is a good type of the paper which must in its own columns keep in touch all the members of the student body and express their thoughts, being the sole medium for such expression.

At the present time a campaign is being waged for the installation of the so called "Honour System" in the conduction of examinations. This system has been adopted in a large number of Universities and good results are claimed for it by its supporters.

An editorial in the "**Targum**," if correct, reveals an astonishing state of affairs at Rutgers; the writer maintaining that more than half "crib" during examinations and many openly boast of their success. Somewhat paradoxically at first sight the editor adduces this fact in favor of installing the "Honor System" in which the writers are not watched in any manner, maintaining that it is the present condition of supervision which caused the students to look upon their "crooked" ways as merely a competition between themselves and the Professor.

A senior retorts that the season lies much deeper than that as the practical application of the system none of the classes proved a complete failure. Rutgers has certainly a delicate problem to deal with, and we hope they may cope with it successfully and prevent its spread, especially in our direction.
