TO THE SHERIFF OF THE HURON DISTRICT.

We the undersigned Freeholders of the County of Huron having heard with satisfaction and dismay that the Attorney General for Canada East has introduced resolutions into the House of Parliament for charging the amount of rebellious losses in the Lower Province amounting to £180,000 to £200,000 on the Consolidated Fund.

Resolved, That this meeting is of opinion that a settlement of all just claims of losses by the inhabitants of that part of the Province from the Lower Canada during the Rebellion of 1837-8 should be made with delay; and it is the sense of this meeting that we have directed to this subject certain resolutions submitted to the House of Assembly by the Honorable H. H. Lafontaine.

It has been my anxious endeavor, in offering my good offices to the various contending powers, to prevent the extension of the calamities of war, and to lay the foundations for lasting and honorable peace. It is my constant desire to maintain with all foreign states the most friendly relations.

As soon as the interests of the public service will permit, I shall direct the papers on these transactions to be laid before you.

Rebellion of a formidable character has broken out in the Punjab and the Governor General of India has been compelled, for the preservation of the peace of the country, to assemble a considerable force, which is now engaged in military operations against the insurgents. But the tranquility of British India has not been affected by unprovoked disturbances. I am anxious to draw your attention to the restrictions imposed on commerce by the navigation laws. If you should find that these laws are in whole or in part unnecessary for the maintenance of our maritime power, while they fetter trade and industry, you will no doubt deem it right to repeal or modify their provisions.

A very important addition to the comfort and convenience of the travelling public has been suggested by the general manager of the London and North Western Railway Company, G. H.
