ROYAL WEDDING.

The Duke of York Weds His Cousin, Princess May. LONDON, July 6.—The marriage of the duke of York, prince George of Wales, and princess Victoria Mary of Teck took place at noon to-day, in the Chapel Royal, St. James palace.

The chapel was beautifully adorned with palms and flowers from the royal conservatories. Drawing room dresses were worn by the ladies, gentlemen appearing in full evening dress.

The bride wore the veil which was worn by her mother on the occasion of her own marriage. Her wedding gown was of silver brocade in perfect harmony with the bridesmaids' toilet of white satin and silver lace.

The dejeuner was served at Buckingham palace, the queen presiding at the head of the bride and bridegroom.

The bride leaned upon the arm of her father, and as the procession advanced her train was carried by her bridesmaids.

The duke of York responded to the questions in a clear and pleasant manner, being audible in the farthest corners of the chapel.

LONDON, July 6.—The duke of York and bride arrived at the city at 8 o'clock this evening and were met and cheered by thousands.
