

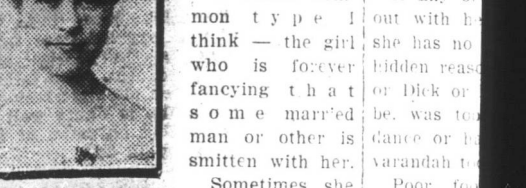

Much has been done legitimately to advertise Newfoundland in America and much illegitimately. Here is an instance of the latter.

A suit involving \$85,000,000 will be brought against the Newfoundland Government by Mrs. Claremont Marshall of No. 215 East Seventy-eighth Street in the near future...

This is not a dream of a fanatic, said Mr. La Point. "It is not a paper suit. This is a bona fide claim and there are only two heirs concerned."

his death by drowning while sailing in a small boat, and although all possible efforts to find the will were made, the important paper was never brought to light. The two girls could not produce proof that they were the rightful heirs of their brother's estate, and so the Newfoundland Government took the property and sold it at auction, taking up Samuel Churchill's landmarks and substituting its own.

For years, according to Mr. La Point, Claremont and her sister fought to regain the property, but were unsuccessful, and now the contest is being taken up again by Mrs. Marshall, the granddaughter of Claremont. Mrs. Marshall and her sister, Mrs. John Walsh of Boston, are the only heirs of the Churchill family.

They have made several attempts to recover the property which they believe rightfully belongs to their grandmother, and at one time interested Benjamin F. Butler to such an extent that he went to Newfoundland to take up the case. He died before he had advanced far in his investigation.

"I have been able to find the records establishing the identity of Claremont Bolin and her ancestry," said Mr. La Point. "Her marriage certificate has been unearthed and data concerning Bolin. I hope A. Duffy, Mrs. Marshall's lawyer, will be able to establish her right to her brother's estate."

Councillors Channing and Martin advised the removal of a gully from New Gower St. to Springdale St.

The offer of Messrs. G. M. Barr and W. Monroe to clean up the Gower at Tessier's for \$100 was thankfully accepted. The Council will also repair the leakage in the water pipe there and build a concrete house.

Engineer Ryan reported that the laying of the sewerage system on Pennywell Road was almost completed. He will report on the cost to the residents of connecting houses there with the main. He recommended that some new hydrants be erected at different places on the Highway Levels for the greater convenience of the fire brigades.

An inquiry will be made into the cost of extending the water service to certain localities. Mr. W. J. Howse, Inspector Donnelly reported that Mr. Jos. Wheeler of the Water Dept. is ill and unable to work.

The Avondale Garden Party.

Preparations for the Garden Party which takes place at Avondale on the 15th of August are progressing favourably. The object for which the event is being got up, namely to contribute to the building fund of a new church to replace the one destroyed in the lightning storm of June 17th, demands more than the ordinary efforts and attention in such cases, and the committee of ladies and gentlemen in charge of arrangements are thoroughly well-wishing the bill.

The base of operations throughout the event will be in the field of Mr. W. Moore, the location of which is central, and in every respect admirably suited to the purpose. To those who may become overreached from indulging in football or any other exciting event, as well as others, it affords the advantage of inhaling the pure and invigorating breeze from the sea that rustles almost at its northern boundary, whilst its eastern and southern sides are lined with a thicket of fir and spruce, with intervening alders and "blowmosses," furnishing a most gay, and that provides shade terraces from which the onlookers may watch the proceedings. Close by stand the extensive business premises and dwelling of Mr. Edward Kennedy, and closer still the residence and beautifully laid-out gardens of Mr. Jones, the site of which not many years ago, when the Dr. established his practice here, was of forest and boulder as "nature placed it at birth." Either subject in the foregoing remarks is located at the base of a rising and partly wooded plain interspersed with small fields and highways, and it was a short distance to the summit, we beheld it crowned only with the foundation stones and charred remnants of timbers that through the agency of fire have usurped the station of which the beauty and position of which excite the admiration of all passers-by. From the visitors in the field of the Garden Party these traces of the stately building that form its lovely position o'er looked the incline below, mark the only spot in the landscape with a frown; yet, even they will serve the good purpose of not reminding the participants, and in fact all visitors to the field, of the cause towards which their efforts are being directed, and thus instill them with more enthusiasm to make the event a potent factor in accomplishing the object in view.

Will Become Lord Mayor of London.

Mr. Charles Augustus Hanson, alderman and patternmaker, and a highly esteemed member of the Anglo-Canadian community, was on Monday elected one of the two sheriffs for the city of London for the ensuing year, and will in the natural course of events become the Lord Mayor of the first city in the world. Forest Fire Yesterday.

Affairs at Kelligrews.

Editor Evening Telegram:
Dear Sir,—I would crave space in your esteemed paper, to state a few facts re the way the Customs and Post Office is being handled here. These positions were previously held by members of a family who have always managed to obtain a lion's share of Government patronage, and whose only qualifications consist in their ability to bluff the members into the belief that they can convert the electors into voting for them. When the present Government came into power large salaries were anticipated which, however, did not materialize, and the use of resigning was adopted in order to bring the Government to terms. The Postmaster with a display of displeasure resigns, which was followed immediately by the resignation of his son from the position of Customs Officer, and an officer from each department was sent from town to do the work.

Now, under similar circumstances, if the sentiments and wishes of the people were considered these positions would be filled at the earliest moment by other competent persons who have made application for the positions at the present rate of salary. But no, sir, the man with the pull won't allow it. He has resigned but only on one condition that his son who has fumbled through the Customs work for the past two years with the aid of friends, should be given

both jobs at a salary of \$400.00, an increase of \$200 over what was formerly received.
I venture to say, sir, that in no other place in this country would this be permitted; but the people's time will come. If a man cannot do the little Customs work which comes this way without getting someone to help him, a fact which the Department must certainly be aware of, what kind of satisfaction must the public expect if both Post Office and Customs are given him.

The writer is actuated by no other desire other than that of fair play and satisfaction to the public, and is a well-wisher of the present Government, and like all men of common sense is prepared to appreciate and support anything which is done for the best interest of the people and country, but would ask why does a member who is elected by a majority of the people and by 95 per cent. of a settlement, dare to insult the wishes of those men in order to cater to the unreasonable and selfish desires of one or two individuals, who with all due respect is no more deserving than others whose wishes are ignored.

Why do the Minister of Public Works when he comes to visit a settlement where his constituents may want to speak to him on matters perhaps of importance to them, allow near his whole time in the company of one individual, to the evident displeasure of good, honest men, who helped to put him in the position he now enjoys; by so doing he outlaws

every rule and law of justice and equality, and will do well in future to treat every man on common ground, and he will reap that reward which is inseparable with fair play. A member who respects his constituents has no reason to fear them, and while I am not attempting to reflect unjustly on the Minister of Public Works (as his indispensable friends are able to do all that) I would respectfully suggest that he have these Customs and Post Office officials sent to town and allow the appointment of qualified persons who are willing to accept the positions at the present rate of salaries, and it will better serve himself and the people here to give them the other \$200.00 annually to make better roads to their gardens. One man's displeasure may mean one man's vote lost, but in the law of politics in everything else it is the number counts.

Firemen's Meeting.

The deadlock between the Firemen's Union and the Red Cross Agents was up for discussion at last night's meeting.

The Delegate informed the meeting that Hon. E. R. Bowring, the local agent, had agreed to reinstate five members of the Union on the S. S. Florizel this trip and the same on the Stephano when she returns. Whenever stokers were required he would give the preference to local men. It was argued that the Stephano, Florizel and Rosalind have at the present time their full complement of St. John's firemen and stokers, and many members of the meeting could not see how Mr. Bowring's promise was going to work out.

After a long discussion the question was put to a vote and the majority carried Mr. Wood's proposal that the firemen join the S. S. Florizel this trip. Delegate Wood's was emphatic in saying that both Hon. E. R. Bowring and Mr. McGettigan, Supt. of Engineers, were strongly in favour of employing the local men.

A vote was carried thanking Mr. Bowring for his action.
A vote was also carried thanking the Longshoremen for their sympathy in the dispute and for their promising to stand by the Union and back up their request.
The meeting closed at 11 o'clock.

The Regatta Committee met last night for the purpose of entering crews and for the despatch of other important business. There were present: Hon. John Harvey, President; A. Hiscock, Vice-President; J. P. CroTTY, Treasurer; J. L. Neenan, Secretary; Major Ellis, F. J. Morris, J. R. Bennett, T. M. McNeil, J. W. Morris, W. J. Martin, J. J. Bates, A. G. Williams, P. J. Hanley, R. W. Jeans, W. J. Higgins, P. F. Moore, M. Chaplin, W. Duggan, N. Andrews, A. T. Wood, P. Murray, F. W. Hayward, Esq., J. C. Murray, T. D. Carow, Reg. Dowden, T. J. Foran.

Vice-President Hiscock read a letter from Mr. C. O'N. Conroy stating that he and his wife were going abroad and that he could not act as timekeeper this year. At Mr. Hiscock's suggestion Mr. Chas. Ellis was appointed in his place by acclamation. The Premier sent a sum of \$28 to be distributed in prizes to the winning fishermen and laborers, the men getting \$2 an ear.

Councillor C. W. Ryan was empowered that the services of a bugler for this season's Regatta as the bandsmen cannot perform the work.

Mr. Jas. J. Bates handed in \$25 from the Longshoremen's Union for the funds. Mr. C. W. Ellis put down \$30.00 collected by F. W. Hayward, Esq., from Bowring Bros. employees, and \$20 from Harvey & Co. The Royal Stores, Job's and Marshall Bros. contributions were also given the Treasurer, and Knowing's and Ayre & Sons are yet to be heard from.

J. R. Bennett reported that the Government office people would donate the sum usually received from them. Mr. Hiscock also announced the receipt of \$25 to the funds from the Commercial Cable Co.

The President, Hon. John Harvey, announced that the Administrator, Hon. Sir Wm. Horwood, would patronize the Regatta and would be at the course during the day.

Messrs. Hiscock, Bennett, Higgins, Morris and McNeil were appointed a committee to investigate the qualifications of amateur and juvenile crews.

Owing to the fact that only one crew, a Naval Reserve team, could be had for the Naval Reserve Firemen Race, it was decided to alter the rule debarring fishermen, tradesmen and laborers who will row on Regatta Day from that race, so that as usual they will be eligible as well as mixed crews from the brigades.

V. P. Hiscock announced that the Lord Warden medals were here and would be up to be won by the crew making the record time or beating the 9:15 record of the Outer Cove men.

The greasy pole, always a great attraction, will be in evidence this year, and will be usual under the able supervision of Mr. P. F. Moore.

Following the meeting, a protest was made against H. Gooby, stroke of the Guard in the Brigade Race, on the ground that he was a member of the C. L. B. at Regatta Day and therefore could not be a year in the Guards as required by the rules. The matter is being looked into by the Committee.

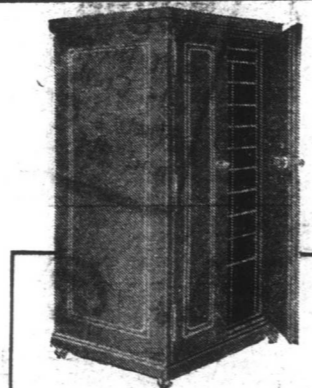

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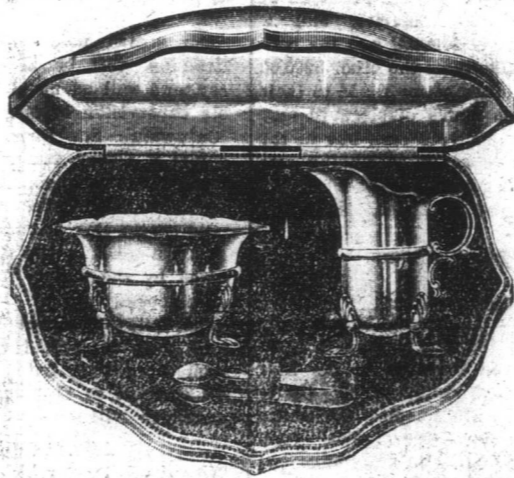

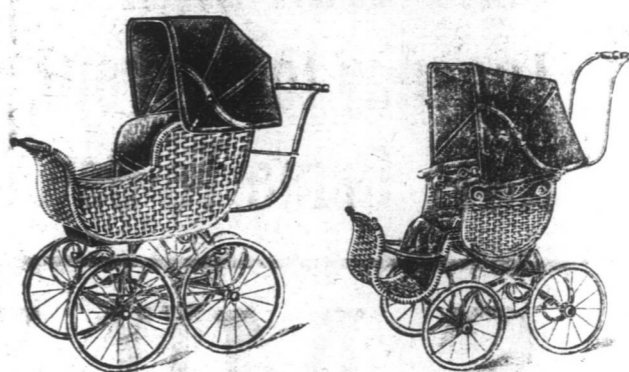
