**SALISBURY, July 17.**  
Major Hewston, the Royal Artillery Corps, was killed here today by falling off his monoplane.

**NEW YORK, July 17.**  
Hugo Meisner, a young helper in the Brooklyn ice plant, was frozen to death today in a sealed compartment which he entered to adjust the machinery.

**LONDON, July 17.**  
It is stated that the marriage of Prince Arthur of Connaught, to the Duchess of Fife, will be celebrated in October, before the Duke of Connaught returns to Canada to resume the duties of Governor-General.

**SCHNEIDMUEHL, July 17.**  
The military dirigible balloon, Schmehehaus, which was acquired some time ago by the German Army, was taken from her moorings here by a gale of wind this morning. Another pilot nor crew were on board, but the sentry on duty guarding the balloon was caught up in the cordage and carried to a height of 600 feet, whence he fell to the ground and was killed.

**BERLIN, July 17.**  
The German Foreign Office denied today that Germany demanded the United States Government to protect Germany's interests in Mexico. Germany has not taken any diplomatic action at Washington, and the Foreign Office is not aware whether Count Von Bernstorff, Germany's Ambassador, has discussed the Mexican affair with Bryan, and if so, it was of an unofficial character.

**TOKIO, July 17.**  
Considerable publicity has been given here of a statement signed by two missionaries, W. A. Wilson of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and J. G. Dunlop, of the American Presbyterian Church, affirming that in company with a competent physician they examined a number of Koreans acquitted by the Appeal Court in connection with the recent conspiracy trial, at which they were charged with plotting against the life of the Governor General. They found the men bore marks, which undoubtedly resulted through torture from burning, beating and kicking.

**LONDON, July 17.**  
That the Government intends to let the country have the final word on Home Rule was intimated during a debate in the Lords by Baron Ashby, by St. Ledger, who holds a minor position in the Government. After Lord Lansdowne's declaration that the Upper House would not consider the Bill before a general election, St. Ledger said there would be none before 1914, by which time the bill would have been passed a third time by the Commons, and signed by the King, but there would be an election after the Irish Parliament had actually been established. The Liberal Government would probably pass the Bill by May. It would then be submitted to the Lords. If returned to power again the Government would expect the Lords to accept the position, but if the Unionists were successful, it would be for them to repeal the law, or do what seemed to them best under the circumstances.

**LONDON, July 17.**  
Winston Churchill announced in the Commons this afternoon that coal oil will be used in the Imperial Navy this year, though the oil will be burned as auxiliary fuel. The Admiralty has opened negotiations with the Eagle Company for a long term contract for the supply of oil fuel. Churchill declared over 100 torpedo boat destroyers, being built for the Navy, owing to the rejection of Canada's gift of three dreadnaughts, will burn oil fuel. Battleship building operations are being rushed as a result of the rejection of Canada's Naval Bill. The Government, said Churchill, would accelerate the construction of the three warships, which would be ready the third quarter in 1915. He added he did not think the question of Canadian contribution in defence of the Empire was closed. There was no reason to suppose that Britain would be left to face the emergencies in the future, unaided. There was an overwhelming consensus of opinion in Canada, he declared, that action should be taken in one form or another, and by the end of the first year the Admiralty would be in a better position to know whether further acceleration or direct addition to the programme would be forced on them. In the meanwhile the Navy would be increased by a new destroyer every week for the next nine months, and by a light cruiser every thirty days for the next year, and by a super-dreadnaught every forty-five days for the next eighteen months.

**The Morris Crowd are Sick and Despondent.**

Beaten soundly on its defamatory allegation that we had undergone a recent conversion to the fold of Sir Robert Bond and had relegated Mr. Coaker to the discard, the editor of the Daily News resorts to subterfuge and innuendo. He republishes an apology from the Evening Telegram to Sir Edward Morris for an unfounded imputation which was published in an article, written by a contributor during the absence of the editor of the Evening Telegram in Fortune Bay. We take no exception to the re-publication, although his readers may have some difficulty in seeing what relevancy the re-publication has with the issues the editor himself raised. But we do take exception to the insinuation he makes to his journalistic friend, as he calls us. He says: "Perhaps the best advice we can give to our journalistic friend is not to get so excited as to render such humiliating apologies necessary." In other words, he advises the editor of the Evening Telegram not to do it again. The implication here is that the editor made the imputation for which an apology was tendered. This insinuation, Mr. Robinson knows, is as false as it is base. What about what Mr. Robinson himself has apologized yet to Sir Edward Morris for the attacks he made on him? If not, why not? Has he apologized for publishing in the Free Press of Sept. 27th, 1904: "Those who could not vote for a party which, rightly or wrongly, they regarded as controlled by the Reids, will now cast their ballots with the united Opposition Party against a Government in which the Reid-Morris influence is so notorious that only two years ago a sum of \$2,554,000 was given to Mr. Reid, and \$19,000 to a handful of lawyers, including \$6,000 to Mr. Morris."

As Mr. Robinson is now booming Sir Edward Morris as the legitimate successor of Sir William Whiteway, has he yet apologized to Sir Edward for publishing this statement: "After all, the man who could vote for the contract of 1898, and then vote for that of 1901, could vote for any-

thing, and we may well be pardoned for not taking seriously his views of any contract where capitalists are concerned!"

In reply to our criticism of his pretension that Sir Edward Morris is the legitimate successor of Sir William, Mr. Robinson offers an absurd explanation. He admits our criticism that he opposed Sir William in office, but says he "enjoyed the honor of his confidence when deserted by his friends, and freed from the dead-weights which had dragged him to political destruction." The latter part of Mr. Robinson's explanation is full of chronological as well as terminological inexactitudes. Sir William was not deserted by his friends. He was asked to resume the leadership of his party and only when he declined was Sir Robert Bond appointed leader. The occasion was the fighting of the bye-election in Fortune Bay, and we believe that of St. John's East. Mr. Robinson's connection with Sir William came on later. In the meantime he had accepted a job from Sir Robert Bond to stick stamps in albums. Towards the end of 1903, Sir William was induced to co-operate with Mr. Robinson and later became the leader of the Morison party, which towards the end of September, 1904, coalesced with the Goodridge Party which had opposed till then. It was this unfortunate connection which lured Sir William to political destruction.

Mr. Robinson's apology is, however, most absurd, for he opposed Sir William Whiteway personally as leader of the Liberal Party. He denounced the acts of his administration and his policy while in office, whereas lately he has been lauding Sir Edward Morris as the legitimate successor of Sir William, and leader of that Whiteway policy he denounced and opposed. Mr. Robinson was an opponent of the Whiteway Railway policy and now he lauds Sir Edward Morris as the legitimate successor to that policy. He is also somewhat unfortunate in his reference to dead-weights from whom Sir William, he says, was freed. Among those who supported Sir William at the 1897 election and opposed him in 1904, was Sir Edward Morris. Mr. Robinson's reference is a stinging cut from a man posing as Sir Edward's friend. But then we know the friendship of the Morison group, for Sir Edward is none too strong, and they enjoy a sly cut at Sir Edward, whenever the chance offers. The Morris-Morison alliance is not one of cordiality, it is a matter of sheer necessity, and it is irksome to Morison, Robinson, Crosbie and those of that ilk.

The halo the Morris-Morison combination were preparing for Sir Robert Bond, has been consigned to the dust-heap; they now declare he is impossible of success as a leader of any party. The laudations they were preparing for him are now turned to revilings. They are a despondent crowd now, and afford a sorry spectacle. They know the members of the F.P.U. will do their utmost to oust Morris and Morison from power, and they are sick at the prospect.

LONDON, To-day.  
The Bulgarian ex-Premier Guechoff started for Bucharest to make terms to prevent a further advance of the Roumanian army.

KIU KIANG, China, To-day.  
The northern troops have taken possession of Kiu Kiang forts of the southern rebellious forces who are defeated and fleeing.

SAN JUAN, To-day.  
At Delsin Nicaragua, earth shocks of more or less violence continued in Nicaragua, principally in the departments of Managua and Masaya. At Masaya several houses were destroyed and the Santiago volcano is active.

QUEBEC, To-day.  
The Degrasse Paper Company, in conjunction with the New York World purchased from D.H. Pennington, Quebec, his pulpwood limits at Murray Bay, comprising fifty two thousand acres. The price paid was four hundred thousand dollars.

LONDON, To-day.  
The Anglo Saxon Club at its banquet last night had as guest of honor the American Ambassador Page. In reply to the toast Ambassador Page dealt upon the great prerogative of the Anglo Saxon race in leadership. He said, every President of the States had been dominated by English or Scotch delegates, while the overwhelming majority of members of congress, President of Educational Institutions of America bore names of English, Irish or Scotch descent.

LONDON, To-day.  
The Roumanian troops are all at Plevna and Mesedra, the latter within 20 miles of Sofia. King Ferdinand of Bulgaria is suppliant to the King of Roumania for terms of peace. It is understood the Powers are striving to induce Roumania not to occupy Sofia, urging Bulgaria to appoint a delegate to confer with the Serbian and Greek premiers. The real facts of the situation are only just becoming generally known at Sofia and are causing uneasiness among the people. M. Malinoff's efforts appear to have failed. Fighting of no great importance continues on the Greek and Serbian frontiers.

**The King and Teachers**

Buckingham Palace Garden Party.  
The King and Queen are to invite nearly 3,000 of the head teachers and principals of schools, institutes, and colleges associated with public education in London, to a garden party at Buckingham Palace on Saturday, July 19th.  
The invitation, it is understood, is partly the outcome of the pleasure their Majesties derived during the Coronation festivities in 1911, when 100,000 school children sang before their Majesties at the Crystal Palace. The King then expressed his admiration of the perfect organization of the great school.  
The head teachers who will be invited to the garden party include approximately: 1,600 from London County Council schools, 170 from non-provided schools, 150 from special schools, 250 from evening classes, 24 from other London County Council schools, 100 from Polytechnic institutes and colleges.  
A choir of 500 children selected from the public elementary school pupils who made such a favourable impression in the international school singing competition in Paris last summer will attend the garden party and sing songs to their Majesties.

**Big London Hotel.**  
London July 12.—It was announced to-day that the man who bought the St. George's Hospital site on Constitution Hill opposite the entrance to Hyde Park, on which a \$5,250,000 hotel is to be built, is Mr. Harry Mallaby-Deely, the Unionist Member of Parliament for Harrow.  
Mr. Mallaby-Deely says he is acting quite alone. It is his ambition to build a hotel which he says will be "beyond dispute the most beautiful in the world."  
Mr. Mallaby-Deely has travelled much, and says he cannot recall a finer site for a hotel anywhere than the one overlooking the King's Gardens at Buckingham Palace, Hyde Park, and the Green Park. He adds:  
"The charges may be high, but if the hotel is a worthy one I believe that they will actually be one of the attractions of the hotel and others will not hesitate to pay large prices for the best that money can buy."

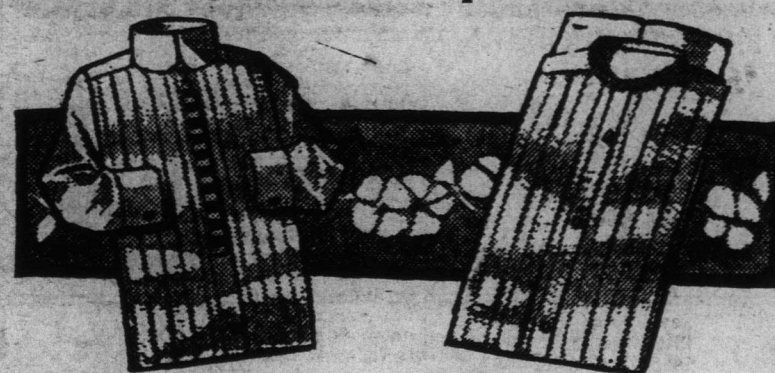

### Gallery of Methodism.

Portrait of the King Envelled at the Central Hall.

A portrait of King George was unveiled recently at the Central Hall, Westminster, the headquarters of the Wesleyan Methodists. Sir Robert Perks, in presenting the picture to the trustees, said he thought this was the first time in the history of the Methodist Church that the portrait of any reigning monarch had been presented and hung by anyone of the public buildings of Methodism. They already had promises of portraits of four men who had been chief magistrates in their time of the United States of America, and who belonged to the Methodist Church. General Grant was one, and President McKinley was another. Canada could not boast of one Methodist Prime Minister, and it was up to some Canadian to present a portrait. Rev. F. L. Wiseman, President of Conference, in accepting the portrait, said they wished to express their appreciation of the gracious act of the King in sitting for a portrait that he knew was to hang on the wall of that building. A George was on the throne when Methodism began its work, and it was a fitting thing that the first King to allow a portrait to be placed on the walls of a Methodist building should be a George.

The portrait which was painted by Mr. Malcolm Stewart, shows His Majesty in the uniform of an Admiral of the Fleet.

London, July 3.—The Lord Mayor, as chairman of the Administrative Committee for "Alexander Day," announces that £18,491 was collected in the various districts. For a single-day collection the sum realized is remarkable, and it is eloquent testimony both to the affectionate regard of the people for Queen Alexandra and to the hold which her "day" has immediately taken upon the public. Last year's Alexander Day (the first celebrated) produced nearly £13,000, a sum which the second collection has exceeded by more than £5,000. In other words, a total well in excess of £30,000 has been secured for charitable purposes in two years through the "Little Alexandra" wild roses.

SOPIA, July 17.  
An official despatch reports the defeat by Bulgarian and Serb forces which penetrated Bulgarian territory on the western frontier. The Bulgarians were routed yesterday and put them to flight. The Serbians retreated in the direction of Vlasina, across the border. Another despatch says that severe losses have been inflicted on the army operating on the Bulgarian left flank.

SOPIA, July 17.  
King Ferdinand to-day personally telegraphed to King Charles of Roumania, that Bulgaria was ready to negotiate terms of settlement. The Roumanians to-day took possession of the cable station at Varna on the Black Sea, thus controlling communication with Schastopol. As the railway between the coast and Sofia has also been cut, Bulgaria cannot communicate with the outside world, except through Serbia and Roumania.

NEW YORK, July 17.  
King Ferdinand has denied the horrifying atrocities attributed to various quarters to Bulgarian troops during their retreat through Macedonia. He cabled the following message through his private secretary, to-day: "All rumors about Bulgarian atrocities are infamous Greek calumnies, designed to poison universal opinion, in regard to which the truth will be established one of these days."

CHRISTIANIA, July 17.  
Mysterious stories of an attempt to kill the ten-year-old Crown Prince Olaf, grandson of King Edward VII, caused great commotion. A man was found a week ago hiding in the gardens where Olaf plays. He was arrested, and the fact hushed up. It is reported that when the Queen heard of it she was prostrated, and sobbed for hours, saying the royal family must leave the country; and that the Bill now before the Storting virtually puts a premium on Olaf's head. This Bill provides that if the King and Queen die without a male heir, Norway shall become a republic. The anti-monarchical agitation is making great headway here and the outlook for the royal family is anything but hopeful.

MEXICO CITY, July 17.  
The Mexican Government has decided to take vigorous action in reference to the sending out of false reports from Mexico regarding the situation and matters relating to the administration. A Government official last night announced that foreign correspondents and informed them that inaccurate news, or news that was construed as intending to injure the government, would involve the expulsion from the country of the correspondent responsible for the publication.

MEXICO CITY, July 17.  
U. S. Ambassador Wilson left here last night over the Mexican railway for Vera Cruz, whence he will sail to-day. He will place the exact situation before the Washington administration, but it is not probable that he will make a plea for recognition, unless in some modified or indirect form. That he will advocate intervention unless conditions grow worse, is not considered likely. Many Mexicans regard indications as a certainty. Present indications are that the Federals in the North are meeting with success. They have occupied towns formerly held by Carranza rebels, but the rebels have not been captured and are still operating.

NEW YORK, July 17.

The building of the largest and most complete Y.M.C.A. in the world has been made possible by a gift of \$500,000 by Mrs. Smith of Brooklyn. She is the widow of William Van Rensselaer Smith, of Archibute Brothers, the great sugar refiners. The gift is a memorial to her son Clarence E. Smith, who was a worker among men and boys. The new building will cost \$1,000,000, and will be erected at a central point in Brooklyn.

The Regatta Committee meets to-night principally to receive reports from the collectors, who, we learn, have raised the necessary amount to run the Regatta.  
An application will be considered from the Harbor Grace Brigade for a place on the programme.  
A crew of carpenters are practicing hard in the Myrtle. They will row the Shamrock in the Trade race.  
Only two crews of amateurs are at work.  
Conditions on the lake last evening were unfavourable, fog being the cause.  
Much enthusiasm is being manifested in the Brigade race. Stock is about even.  
The C. C. C. crew have pitched a tent on the back of their boat house and will camp there every night until the Regatta.  
The C. E. T. S. are practicing hard in the Doctor for the Society race. Their opponents the L.O.A., will row the Nellie.  
Five boats will take part in the Factory and the same number will row in the Laborers' race, including the Bell Islanders.

Canada Causes Death of Cooks and Waiters.  
London, July 11.—The leading restaurateurs, hotels and clubs are complaining of the death of chefs, cooks and waiters brought about, largely by the abnormal demand in Canada. During the slack season 620 chefs, cooks and waiters left this country to take up positions in the dining car service on the Canadian railways. A further large number leave next month.

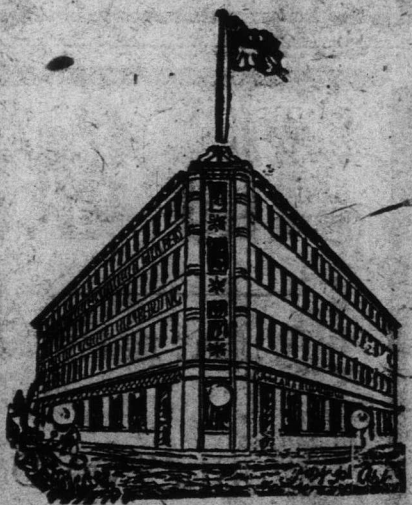

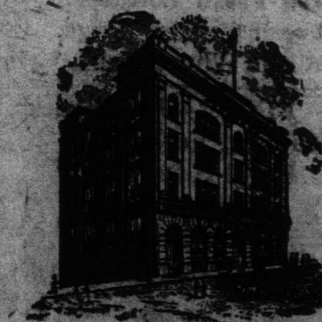
