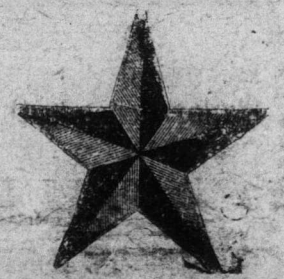

Such addresses must have been registered previous to July first, 1914, and are permitted to be used as addresses only, not as signatures.

For telegrams to Allied Countries full address of addressee must be given (not to be telegraphed).

In all cases it is provided that addressee or sender, or both, are non-European residents.

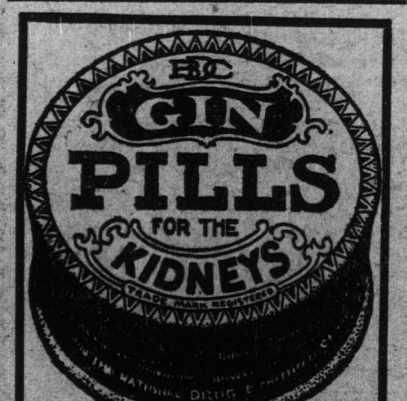

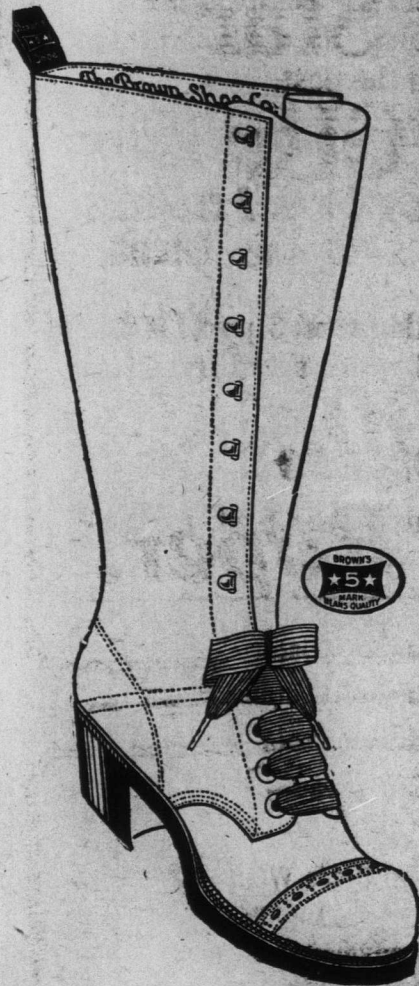

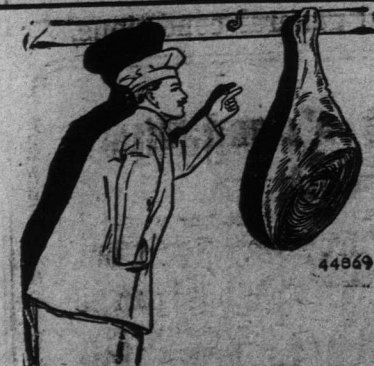

ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.

Oct. 27.—(Official.)
The fighting is particularly heavy at the entrance of the Yser and in the region of Lens. In this part of the front the allied forces have not fallen back anywhere, but have continued to progress in the region between Ypres and Roulers. In the region of Soissons and Berry-au-Bac an artillery duel has turned to our advantage and resulted in the destruction of several German batteries. In the region east of Nancy between the forest of Bezange and of Parroy we have taken the offensive and thrown the enemy beyond the frontier.

Russia.—On the San and south of Przemysl, the Russian offensive is growing. Deserters from Przemysl affirm that many men are falling victims to epidemics, and that medical provisions have given out. Everybody is obliged to work constantly at the fortifications which are quickly destroyed by continual Russian artillery which keeps going even during the night by means of powerful searchlights.

LITTLE TO REPORT.

PARIS, Oct. 27.
To-night's official announcement says that there is nothing to report, except some progress on the part of the allies to the south of Dixmude.

ENEMY DRIVEN BACK.

LONDON, Oct. 27.
A despatch from Paris says: Again to-day there is no marked change to report in the general situation, though the impression remains favorable, and it is said that the allies have advanced slightly between Ypres and Roulers, and about Soissons. In the Nancy district the enemy has been driven back beyond the frontier.

DEFENDERS IN BAD STATE.

PARIS, Oct. 27.
The Russian bombardment of the fortress of Przemysl in Galicia, says a despatch from Petrograd, was conducted during the night, aided by strong searchlights. Deserters from the fortress say that many of the defenders are succumbing to epidemics, and that medicine and provisions are virtually exhausted.

PORTUGAL ALLY OF BRITAIN.

LISBON, Oct. 27.
Portugal is excited at the possibility of taking part in the war as the Ally of Britain under the Treaty which required this country, if asked, to supply 10,000 troops. The Government, anticipating a winter campaign, has ordered 10,000 thick uniforms, and is buying great numbers of mules.

EXPULSED FROM BRITISH TERRITORY.

PEKIN, Oct. 27.
The authorities at Hong Kong and other British possessions in China, to-day issued orders for the expulsion from British territory of all Germans and Austrian subjects, except those of military age, who will be detained. The order is to be effective on November 1st.

GERMAN GENERAL REPORTED DEAD.

LONDON, Oct. 27.
A despatch from Rotterdam says that General Von Bosseler, conqueror of Antwerp, is dead. It is said that he shot himself on Thursday in a room at Bruges.

EULOGIZES KITCHENER.

CHATHAM, Ont., Oct. 27.
Speaking of the war, while motoring through Chatham on his way to Detroit, Thomas A. Edison, the famous American inventor, declared that he had profound admiration for Lord Kitchener, who, he said, was the hero of the British Empire, at the present time.

MINE EXPLOSION.

ROYALSTON, Illinois, Oct. 27.
A hundred or more miners were killed, it is believed, in the Mitchell coal mine here to-day, when an explosion occurred in the lower level of the mine, soon after 300 men began work. Of those who entered the

mine 100 escaped, but 30 bodies were soon brought to the surface. More than 100 other men are known to be imprisoned in the lower level, cut off from rescue by fire. It is thought that all those shut off by the wall of flame in the interior soon burned to death.

MANCHESTER COMMERCE MINED.

BELFAST, Oct. 27.
The British freight steamer Manchester (Commerce), bound from Manchester for Montreal, struck a mine at midnight, last night and sank. The captain and thirteen men were drowned. Thirty other members of the crew were saved by trawlers.

ADMIRALTY WARNS SHIPPING.

LONDON, Oct. 28.
The Admiralty has warned ship owners that the Germans have succeeded in laying mines around the North of Ireland, and that ships should therefore not pass within sixty miles of Tory Island. It is considered probable that it was one of these mines that the British steamer Manchester of Commerce struck.

OFFICIAL FROM BERLIN.

BERLIN, Oct. 28.
The battle on the Yser canal near Ypres and southwesterly from Lille, is proceeding with the same stubbornness. Yesterday the German troops made progress. On the other battlefield in the western theatre no important events have occurred. To the west in Augustow the attack of the Germans is slowly proceeding. To the southwest of Warsaw our troops have repulsed all attacks. Strong Russian forces are north of Ivanow. A new Russian army corps has crossed the Vistula.

GERMANS PAY DEARLY.

LONDON, Oct. 28.
A despatch from northeastern France says that the Germans were yesterday driven back across the Yser River, with heavy losses, by the French infantry, aided by fire of the Minitors. When the Belgians undertook the defence of the Yser they held it for a week. Then by sheer weight of artillery and men the Germans pushed the Belgians back but not before they paid the full cost for the temporary gain. At last two army corps faced the Belgians. Their object was to force their right into

France and thus succeed in turning the Allies left. It cost the Belgians 1000 casualties to prevent the attainment of their object. It is reported from reliable authority that the German Emperor had placed eight army corps in this section of the field and their losses have been frightful and their successes practically nil. Towards the end of last week the situation was doubtful, but now there is no reason to fear failure. On the contrary, first class success may be looked for which will place the Germans finally on the defensive in the West. Great progress is being made in the reorganization of the Belgian army.

HOUSEHOLD NOTES

Buy soap by the hundred cakes if you would be economical.
Household cleansing powders, etc., give much cheaper bought by the box.
Tomato is said to be successful in removing ink stains from white materials.
Put lettuce and celery in cold water they will wash much more easily.

Outroding Herod.

The s.s. Manchester Commerce has been destroyed by a mine laid by the Germans in the steamer lane North of Ireland. The laying of mines in the neighborhood of Tory Island off the North of Ireland is infinitely worse than the laying of them in the North Sea. For the latter something approaching an excuse might be advanced, for the former there is really no excuse whatever. No one could reasonably object to the Germans laying mines near the approaches to their harbors or in the neighborhood of them as a protection to the harbors and their fleets from hostile attacks or landings. But even in such cases, if these waters were frequented by ordinary shipping, especially neutral, it would behoove them to give notice that a particular area was mined and could not be used except by ships in charge of pilots in the confidence of their Admiralty. This is what is done by the British. When the area north of the Straits of Dover was made a mine field for the protection of the English and French coast, notice was given to all the world, in order that neither their own nor other shipping would be damaged by passing unknowingly through a mine laid area. The international crime committed by Germany in laying mines promiscuously in the North Sea, was due to certain characteristics of their plan. The mines were not laid down in defence of their ports or shores or ships. They were laid in the open sea near the coast of the enemy for offensive and not defensive purposes. They were a menace to ordinary shipping and not merely to ships of war. The Germans, however, might claim that North Sea waters were waters on which the most effective part of the British Navy was based and that in order to destroy that Navy they had to chance destroying commercial shipping, largely British but partially neutral.

But such an excuse will not hold for the promiscuous mining of water, where only a scattered warship may occasionally visit, but which is frequented largely by commercial shipping. Such warfare is diabolical. It outrages every sense of humanity, and is a menace as much to Swedish, Norwegian, Danish, American and other shipping as it is to our own. The world at large, particularly America, has little sympathy for Germany. Outrages of this nature may raise antipathy to a degree that will disturb the neutrality these nations are trying to observe.

NOON.

A LEIPZIG STORY.
VANCOUVER, To-day. Rumors are again floating around regarding the German cruiser Leipzig. This time, it is said, on what resembles good authority that the Leipzig was towed into Esquimaux Harbor this morning by a Japanese warship.

LIFE GUARD OFFICERS MISSING.

LONDON, To-day. Lieut. Sir William Edmund Franklyn, who commanded the third division of Kitchener's new army, died suddenly to-day. Capt. John Jacob Astor, First Life Guards, was wounded in a battle in France. The casualty list issued last night dated October 23rd, reports 16 officers killed, 35 wounded, 23 missing. Among the wounded are Brigadier General C. T. McKavanaugh and Lieut.-Colonel F. B. Cook, First Life Guards; Lieut.-Col. A. H. Ferguson, Second Life Guards, and Lieut.-Col. B. E. Ward, Middlesex Regiment.

BIG ORDER FOR HOUSES.

BAY CITY, Michigan, To-day. A local manufacturing concern today closed negotiation with the British Government for the manufacture of six hundred houses, each 20 x 60 feet which it is presumed are to be used in housing war refugees in England. The order calls for houses complete and ready for erection. It is said the six hundred houses will accommodate 18,000 persons.

ANOTHER REBELLION IN SOUTH AFRICA, HEADED BY DEWIT AND BEYERS.

LONDON, To-day. Another rebellion has broken out in South Africa. General Christian DeWit and General Christian Beyers have taken the lead of the rebels in Orange Free State and Western Transvaal. Having put down the rebellion in the Northern Province of Cape Colony, led by Maritz, the Government of the Union of South Africa is now faced by a new and more serious one under DeWit and Beyers, the latter of whom resigned his command of the Union forces in laying the Boer resistance and the town of Heilbron in the Northern part of Orange River Colony has been seized, and the Government officials have been taken prisoners, while a train has been stopped and armed citizens of defense force have taken from it and destroyed. The Union Government has issued a proclamation to the people announcing these and other facts, and although it was aware of these rebellious preparations, it had been taking steps to preserve peace without bloodshed. Now, however, the proclamation, the duty of the Government is clear. It is determined to deal with the matter with a firm hand and is taking all necessary steps to this end. The very great majority of citizens every province of the Union are thoroughly loyal and detest the very idea of rebellion. When they are aware of the situation they will undoubtedly give the Government every assistance in restoring order and will carefully abstain from giving the rebellious movement any encouragement or support. DeWit is the cavalry leader who gave the British so much trouble in the South African war. It was announced that he had offered his services to England.

ST. PIERRE BULLETIN.

Official, 27th.—Nothing to note apart from the advances on our part south of Dixmude. The French military met this morning under the Presidency of Mr. Poincare, Messieurs Millerand, Delcasse and Ribot and discussed the military diplomatic financial situations of France. Rear Admiral Favereau has been appointed Commander Second Light Squadron. Mr. Henry Romanet, Councilor of La Guyane Appeal Court died as a result of wounds received.

Thrilling Story of Gallantry of British.

1.15 P.M.

LONDON, To-day.

A correspondent of the Times in Northern France sends the following regarding the fighting in Belgium under Tuesday's date: British fire at Ypres, after a glorious stand for five days against overwhelming odds, drove the enemy back fifteen miles. The German forces were commanded by the Bavarian Crown Prince, who, it is reported, has been wounded. The British forces captured Langemark, five miles north-east of Ypres on Friday, after inflicting enormous losses on the enemy, and established encampment on the scene. At night after the roar of cannon had ceased there was suddenly a shrill whistle and the bushes soaked in petroleum broke into flames, throwing a glare over the scene. Masses of men sprung up from the beet crops within a few hundred yards of our trenches and with bugle sound, yell and song they came forward to our position. Though taken by surprise our brave men were not unprepared. They took their places in the trenches and held them, pouring a terrific fire into the advancing hosts. Answering with rifle and machine guns the enemy advanced still with bugle playing amid shouts of "Hoch, hoch." They were in dense masses and they fell by hundreds. They got within thirty yards of the trenches when they recoiled. Then came three blasts of a whistle sounding retreat. Our men sprang out of the trenches and went in among them with the bayonet. The slaughter was terrible and there were many hands to have encountered the glare of the burning bushes. Some of the enemy threw down their rifles and pleaded for mercy. No quarter whatsoever was given on either side. The work was too desperate for that. Bayonet and bullet did their work and the enemy was driven back on Roulers. A battery and several machine guns were captured and thousands of prisoners taken, including a General and several other officers.

THE STORY OF THE SINKING OF THE MANCHESTER COMMERCE.

FLEETWOOD, Eng., To-day. The trawler City of London arrived here from Manchester to Canada. Manchester Commerce, Capt. Payne and thirteen of the crew were drowned, while thirty others were saved by the trawler. Second officer Gee told the story of the disaster. He said the explosion occurred twenty miles north of Tory Island on the main trade route to Canada. The explosion shook the vessel as if it was merely a chip of wood. There was no doubt in anybody's mind as to what had happened. The ship began to sink at once and was beneath the waves seven minutes after striking the mine. Officers and crew lunched the greatest of the sea. In circumstances. We were able to launch only one life boat when the ship gave a sudden lurch and went down. The captain and officers who were at the moment preparing to launch the other boats jumped into the water to try to save as many as possible. I was in a single boat already launched. Several of them were carried down with the ship. I was swimming for twenty minutes before I was picked up. The last I saw of the captain he was giving orders for launching the second boat. I took command in the solitary life boat and we picked up all survivors and then cruised about for a long time. When satisfied that there was no more to be heard we hoisted an improvised sail. We had gone forty-two miles when we were picked up by a trawler. Several of our men suffered from sea sickness, as most of them had on no clothing except shirts and trousers.

Letter From Nfld.

Volunteer Abord Florizel, Oct. 13th

"Well, as you know, we left on Sunday, Oct. 4th, and on Monday morning, at about 10 o'clock, we met the whole Canadian contingent, consisting of 24 transport ships, and we have been in company with them ever since. The way we are sailing is in two lines of eleven ships and one line of twelve ships. There is also a warship at the head of each line. It is certainly a wonderful sight and I never expect to see such again. There are some very big ships in the transport. Here are some of the names of the ships: The s.s. Lealand, Laurent, Mesanitic, and all about 18,000 tons. The Empress of Britain and many other large ones are also with us. I think we are the smallest ship in the line and we must look like a toy ship. Yesterday H. M. S. Princess Royal, a 24,000 ton battle cruiser, that had been out scouting, steamed in and passed up on our starboard side about twenty yards away from us. All the tars were lined up on deck and their band played "My Own Canadian Home." It was certainly a magnificent sight. We cheered them first and not a word of the battleship moved till the command was given, and then a roar went up that nearly split the heavens in two. I think that is all the news about the ships around us."

Traitor Left Garrison Taking Away Rifles and Ammunition.
Cape Town, via London, Oct. 24.—The correspondent of the Cape Times at Carnarvon, Cape Colony, describing the recent revolt of Lieut. Maritz, says:
When Maritz came to Kakamas, in the Cape province, in the capacity of commander of the defence force, he took away all the rifles of the local garrison on the plea that he needed them to arm a force against the Germans. Maritz went away and was returning with a force of 700 Germans and traitors, when the garrison luckily heard of his approach.
"A party of thirty-eight daring men from the garrison went to his camp in the night and succeeded in getting a supply of rifles, ammunition and horses. Maritz caught up with them thirty miles away. There was a brief fight before the men from the garrison took to the bush, where they played hide and seek for six days before they escaped with the loss of only one man."

Hindu Killed W. C. Hopkinson of Vancouver.

CHIEF ASSISTANT TO IMMIGRATION INSPECTOR SHOT DEAD IN COURT HOUSE.
Vancouver, Oct. 21.—William C. Hopkinson, chief assistant to the immigration inspector here, was shot and instantly killed at the Court House on Georgia Street this forenoon by a Hindu. The alleged assassin was immediately arrested by the police.
Hopkinson was standing in the main corridor of the court house when a party of Hindus passed by. A man named Mewa Singh, is charged with having done the shooting.
Hopkinson was threatened at the time of the Komagata Maru's visit to Vancouver, but the reason of his assassination this morning probably arises out of a trial now pending at the Assize. He was to have been a witness to-day in the case of Beha Singh, which was to have been taken up by the grand jury this morning. Ram Singh, another Hindu, was acquitted on a charge of murder yesterday. Hopkinson gave testimony favorable to Ram Singh, who was an enemy of Mewa Singh. The police intend to proceed immediately with the charge against Mewa Singh, so that the matter may be disposed of at the present Assize.
It is stated that after the departure of the steamship Komagata Maru, a vendetta was declared against all these, white or Hindus, who were active in preventing the landing of the ship's passengers, and in having them despatched back to Hong Kong.
Argan Singh, who was shot in a rooming house some weeks ago, and Herman Singh, found with his throat cut, are supposed to have been two of the marked men. Inspector Hopkinson was a third.

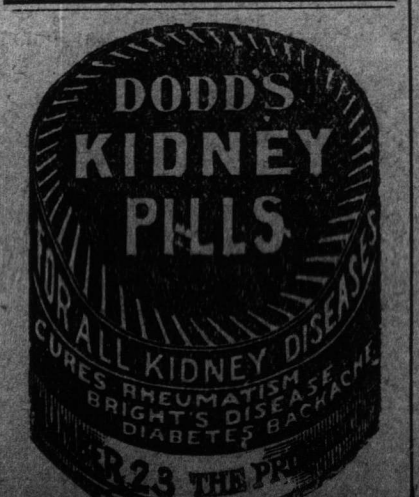

Will Not Retain Isles.

Japan Insists Occupation of German Islands is Temporary.
Washington, Oct. 24.—The occupation of additional German owned islands in the Pacific by Japanese naval forces is to be regarded in the same light as the seizure of Jaluit Island in the Marshall group by the same forces a few weeks ago, according to statements made at the Japanese Embassy this afternoon.
It was explained that as long as there were any German commerce destroyers operating in the Pacific and Asiatic waters, Japan would be compelled to occupy every German owned port which might serve as a base for the German cruisers.
The seizure of Jalands in the Ladrones, East Caroline and West Caroline groups, in addition to Jaluit Island, is in fulfillment of this policy and purely for military purposes, according to embassy officials. The statement was reiterated that there is no intention of holding these islands permanently.
Secretary Bryan announced following the occupation of Jaluit Island that he had received assurances from Tokyo and from the embassy here that Japan had no intention of retaining the islands permanently. It was then suggested that they would eventually be placed in British hands.



Black Cow Aids Germans.

Points Her Horns to Show Where Danger Lurks.
London, Oct. 22.—The Times says that a favorite sign by which German spies convey information is a black cow, crudely sketched in black crayon on walls, gates and fences. The allies passed this "black cow" by without particular notice for a time, partly because it was so badly drawn. Then it was noticed that it sometimes was small, sometimes large, sometimes standing at other times lying down and often the horns were ridiculously long in comparison with the body of the animal.
Finally a study was made of the strange sign and it was found that a small cow signified that the road was only weakly defended; a moderate sized cow meant that the allies' troops were in the neighborhood; a large cow was a warning that there were earthworks or trenches near by. The direction of the danger was indicated by the direction in which the cow's head was pointed. If the head pointed into the air it meant that the spy considered that the German aviator had better reconnoitre the ground before the troops advanced.

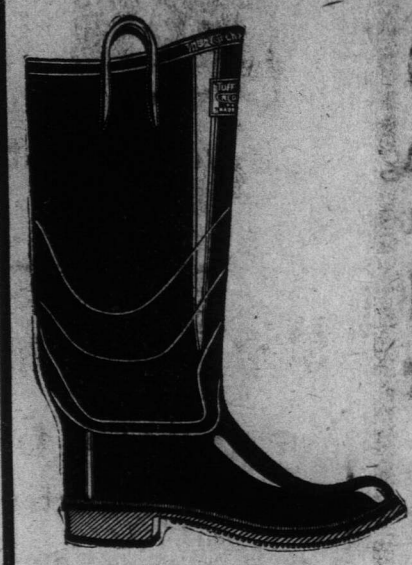

Chief of German General Staff is Dying.

London, Oct. 23.—(12.10 a.m.)—A private letter received in Amsterdam from a high official in Berlin says Lieutenant-General Count Helmuth Von Moltke, Chief of the German General Staff, is dying, according to the Exchange Telegraph's Amsterdam correspondent. "Everything," the correspondent adds, "is being done to keep the news secret General Von Moltke is suffering from an affection of the liver. The cure he was undergoing was interrupted in July by the German mobilization. He has now had to leave Emperor William's headquarters, General Von Falkenhayn, the Prussian Minister of War being left in charge.

"Many German officers ascribe the check to the German advance to the forced retirement of General Von Moltke."

Hon. W. S. Fielding Author

Imperial Anthem Written by Him Finds Favor in England. The Imperial Anthem, written by Hon. W. S. Fielding, which recently appeared in these columns, has been printed by The London Daily Chronicle, and is being sold for the benefit of the Prince of Wales Fund for the relief of the dependents of soldiers at the front. Concerning it the London Chronicle says: "The Hon. W. S. Fielding, late Canadian Minister of Finance, has written some splendid words to the tune of the British National Anthem. The words rank high among the best of the songs of any nation, and will live when the turmoil of war has passed away. For the present, when all Britons must stand shoulder to shoulder, with unflinching resolve, this anthem will help to bid cheer the sons of the British Empire. This is high praise for Mr. Fielding's fine patriotic production.

Spies are Sentenced.

Geneva, via Paris, Oct. 24.—Three German spies having headquarters in Geneva, were sentenced by the third military tribunal here on Friday. They are Col. Otto Ulrich, of Berlin, Doctor Wohlhaender and Herr Kohr, a chemist.

They were charged with plotting against England and France, and thereby violating Swiss neutrality. Col. Ulrich was not present, having gone into hiding, presumably somewhere in Switzerland. He was sentenced in default to two years in prison and to pay a fine of £200 sterling.

Dr. Wohlhaender must serve three months and pay a fine of \$40, and Herr Kohr must remain in prison and pay a fine of \$20. All three were sentenced to expulsion from Switzerland for life, after serving their sentences.

What Would You Do?

A neighbor of mine is very much excited over a novel which she has just finished. It is a book which you have probably read as it was one of the best sellers two years ago. It is a story of the way the big business man cleanses the outside of the platter with his charities and his formal church-going while he makes the inside of the cup rotten with his oppression of his employees and his indifference to wrong social conditions.

My neighbor, as I said, has been deeply impressed by this story. "How I wish I were a big business man," she says indignantly. The inference of her tone is that she would act very differently from the man of the story.

I wonder if she would. The wealthy man of the story yielded to the temptation of his power and committed the abuses of his class. He was no worse than the average. That means that only those have a right to criticize him who do not misuse any power, however small, which they may have over their fellow beings, nor share the abuses of their class.

My neighbor showed me a package which came to her from a shop the other day. She had ordered a dozen handkerchiefs; they sent her two dozen by mistake. She had no thought whatever of returning the extra ones.

My neighbor keeps a maid. She is obliged to let that maid have her evenings off because the other helpers in the neighborhood have that privilege.

and if she didn't grant it she couldn't keep hers. But she resents the necessity bitterly. Yet the maid works ten hours a day and feels that she should have the rest of the time absolutely to herself.

My neighbor wanted a dress finished for a certain date. In order to make assurance doubly sure, she told the dressmaker that she absolutely must have it because she was going away on the 7th, naming a date a week earlier than the occasion for which she really wanted it. The dressmaker took the order because she could not afford to antagonize the customer. She finished the dress on time by sitting up until two for two nights. Incidentally she did not receive her pay (of which she was in considerable need) for over a month.

This, then, is the woman who thinks that if she were a big business man with all the temptations of power and wealth, all the pressure of competition, she would treat her employees according to the Golden Rule.

Mind you, I'm not justifying the selfish and tyrannical employer. That's the last thing in the world I want to do. I'm only reminding a world of ready critics that we have no right to criticize unless we have been square and kind and forbearing in those relations of life which our humble station imposes upon us.

It is easy to grow indignant over injustice and think what you would do if you had great power.

But what are you doing with the lesser power you do have? As you use that, so, in all probability, would you use the greater.

Ponderous Personages.

ANDREW CARNEGIE

By GEORGE FITCH.

Author of "At Good Old Slawsh." Andrew Carnegie is Exhibit A in two demonstrations—a poor boy's chance in America and the benefits of a high-tariff.

When Andrew Carnegie was born, in 1835, in Dunfermline, Scotland, the event didn't cause a ripple in the town. His father was a poor man and pursued this avocation so successfully that at 10 years of age Andrew was a bobbin boy, working for 20 cents a day.

Thousands of other Scotch boys have become bobbin boys, but they have generally made one fatal mistake. They have become bobbin boys in Scotland. Andrew was wise enough to come to Pittsburg, Pa., before beginning to accumulate his starvation wage. He bobbed all day across the river from Pittsburg and at night he looked up chances for becoming a millionaire. Just at this time oil was being discovered in great quantities in Pennsylvania and the chances of becoming the owner of a 30-cent farm with a million dollar oil well on it were very bright. Carnegie began to monkey in a small way with oil, railroads and steel. One good deed deserves another and as soon as he got one good deed he set about acquiring two more. Before long he was running a steel mill.

Many men have run steel mills and have worked themselves into an early tomb over the job. But Carnegie conceived the idea of hiring bright young men to do his worrying for him. Each year he made more steel and bought more mills. About fifteen years ago, just before the trust law and male-factor-of-great wealth era, he allowed himself to be persuaded to sell his mills to the United States Steel Corporation. When this was done, Mr. Carnegie found himself out of a job at the age of 60, with only half a billion dollars between him and the poor house.

Since that time Mr. Carnegie has spent his time in a manful attempt to become poorer. He has built hundreds of libraries; has given Pittsburg a \$25,000,000 technical school, has built a peace palace, and maintains a palace in New York on a street which is repaved every year. In spite of this he is not appreciably poorer. He has given away \$200,000,000, but the confounded interest keeps eating up his deficit.

Mr. Carnegie is a little, white-bearded man with Santa Claus cheeks and a hobby for peace. He would cheerfully give up all his money he made selling battleship armor to secure everlasting peace. In the meantime he is overlooking a bet by not filling Mexico full of libraries and schools. This would, in time, give one particularly vicious dog of war a terrible boot.

The Dryad Uninjured. London, Oct. 23.—The British torpedo gunboat Dryad, which went ashore recently at Kirkwall, off the coast of Scotland, has been refloated. An examination shows that she has sustained no damage.

The Sinking of the Manchester Commerce.

The inhumanity of the "cultured" Germans is again demonstrated in the sinking of the S. S. Manchester Commerce, carrying with her fourteen souls, including the captain, as referred to elsewhere in a despatch from Belfast. The ship was bound to Montreal from Manchester with a general cargo and struck a German mine Monday night. She carried a crew of 44 all told, thirty of whom were saved by trawlers.
 The Manchester Commerce, which had a gross tonnage of 5,365 tons, was well known here. It will be remembered that last winter while running between the same ports, as when she met disaster, the ship struck an iceberg going through the Belle Isle Straits and crippled into this port with her bows battered. The ship was dry docked here for repairs for nearly four months, the undertaking giving a writer's employment to a large number of workmen. The Manchester Commerce was built fifteen years ago by the Furness Withy Co. When the ship was under repair, Capt. W. P. Couch, a cousin of Captain Couch, of the S. S. Adventure, was in command.

Big Landslide Near Humbermouth

DELAYS INCOMING EXPRESS.

A landslide, caused by the recent heavy rains, blocked the railway track for a considerable distance east of Humbermouth yesterday afternoon; and as a result the incoming Bruce express was delayed and will not arrive here until to-morrow.

About 3 p.m., at a point some three miles east of Humbermouth, a mass of earth, trees and crumbling rock came tumbling down the precipice, piling itself on the road bed for a distance of four rails length, which is about forty yards. Section men working nearby were alarmed by the rumbling noise and hastened to investigate the cause. Upon arrival at the scene the soil that had fallen from the overhanging cliff was piled to a height of ten feet in some places along the track. Upon the matter being reported to headquarters a gang of 100 men was ordered out to clear the road. In the meantime the east bound express had reached Humbermouth, but could not proceed further. The men worked assiduously until 11 o'clock last night, when it was thought necessary to abandon the work until daylight this morning, as it was very stormy, and there was danger of injury to the workers. At press hour to-day the track was practically clear again and the express will get away this afternoon, and is expected to reach the city about noon to-morrow. Fortunately no person was on the track at the time of the occurrence, the nearest section men being some hundred yards away.
