RAILWAY TRAGEDY.

C.P.R. Trains Collide--59 Casualties Among Passengers -- New Zealand Elects Massey Govt -- 25 Lives Lost in Marine Disaster -- Cathedral at Edmonton Burned-- Ex-Kaiser Agrees to Conditional Trial.

MASSEY SWEEPS NEW ZEALAND.
LONDON, Dec. 20. The New Zealand election results are a great surprise. The Reformers have captured 48 seats with a combined opposition of 30. Prohibition seems to have carried. Premier Massey swept the country and Sir Joseph Ward himself failed to secure election. The results follow: Reformers 48, Liberals, 18, Labor 10, Independents 4.

WHAT THEY OWE.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 20. It is impracticable to pay interest with dollars, states U. S. Secretary Glass. Current interest due to the United States from Great Britain, France and Italy is \$475,000,000 yearly.

SERIOUS COLLISION ON C. P. R.
HALIFAX, Dec. 20. Fifteen were killed and thirty-five injured in a head-on collision between a freight train and passenger special near Brownville, Maine, on the line of the Canadian Pacific this morning. The passenger train was filled with third-class passengers from the S. S. Empress of France which arrived at St. John yesterday from France.

CAUSE OF COLLISION.
MONTREAL, Dec. 21. Failure to count the number of C. P. R. passenger special from the liner Empress of France, which docked at St. John, by the engineer of the east-bound freight, was apparently the direct cause of the collision which took place at Onawa on Saturday morning. The freight engineer let three of the passenger special pass him and did not wait for the fourth. This was the ill-fated train, with the third-class passengers from the liner on board which crashed into the freighter.

RESULT OF COLLISION.
ST. JOHN, Dec. 21. The total casualties to-night of the head-on collision of the Empress of France special and freight train yesterday morning at Onawa, are given at twenty-one killed and thirty-eight injured.

GOVERNMENT FORCED MINERS TO WORK.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 20. The Government's firmness had forced the miners to resume their work, said Attorney General Palmer in a statement before the Senate Coal Investigation Committee. Several witnesses gave evidence concerning the coal strike and matters relating to the resumption of operations at the mines, and the investigation will be continued on the strength of the information brought out.

DISTURBANCES AT CAIRO.
LONDON, Dec. 20. Incipient disturbances occurred at Cairo Monday and Tuesday, but the police have been successful in preventing disorders. A demonstration at Cairo by 250 students on Monday resulted in the arrest of eleven students who were court-martialed.

CLUE TO FRENCH'S ASSAILANTS.
DUBLIN, Dec. 20. Belief is expressed to-day that evidence has been secured that may result in the arrest of several persons who planned and carried out the attempt to assassinate Viscount French.

NOT WORRYING ABOUT THREATS.
LONDON, Dec. 20. The Irish Secretary, Liam Macpherson, has arranged to go to Ireland but will be strictly guarded. The Daily Mail's Dublin correspondent quotes Lord French as saying recently, "If they want me they will find me doing my duty. I am not going to alter my routine for all the threats in Ireland."

ANOTHER MARINE DISASTER.
BRANDON, Ore., Dec. 20. At least 25 lives were lost when the oil tanker J. A. Chansier, bound in ballast from Portland, Ore., to San Francisco, was wrecked off Cape Blanco, Thursday night, according to the report of Earl Doolley, a member of the crew who was washed ashore from one of the Chansier's lifeboats near here early to-day.

REMOVING WAR RESTRICTIONS.
OTTAWA, Dec. 20. With the first of January, Canada practically comes to a peace basis. War-time restrictions imposed by Order-in-Council under the War Measures Act, with some exceptions, Orders-in-Council terminate at the end of next session of Parliament.

Obituary.

JOHN EDGAR PICKAVANT PETERS.

The passing of Mr. J. E. P. Peters removes from our midst one of the most outstanding figures in the commercial and religious life of the community. He was a type of citizenship that makes unflinchingly for betterment and uplift. The guiding principles of his life were evidenced by his sterling integrity, fidelity to duty and ungrudging co-operation in all those things which make for righteousness. The praise and plaudits of his fellows held no attraction for him; and once satisfied that a course of action was right, no influence or power could induce him to swerve a hair's breadth from the path. Mr. Peters was a religious man in the best sense of the word. None was more attentive to the duties of his church, none more appreciative of the privileges of public worship, and none more regular in attendance. He lived his religion as well as practised it, carrying it into the daily and hourly transactions of business life. His word was his bond, and no man held a higher place in the regard, the confidence and esteem of his fellow citizens. Throughout the Methodist Church in Canada and Newfoundland the tidings of his death will bring general sorrow. To Gower St. Church the loss comes with great severity. In the official life of the Church, Mr. Peters had been active for half a century, and the seal of his personality is figuratively stamped on every institution connected with the present building, which, as did its predecessor, destroyed in the fire of 1892, owes so much to his personal influence and faithful stewardship. To keen powers of observation Mr. Peters added a humour, which was as effective as it was spontaneous, giving piquancy to his pithy and concise commentaries on current events in Church and State. For Mr. Peters, death was translation. He passed away in perfect calm and consciousness. Little wonder that when the news was passed from pew to pew in his beloved Gower Street Church yesterday, that the words of the Psalmist sprang to the lips of many—"Mark the perfect man and behold the upright, for the end of that man is peace."

John Edgar Pickavant Peters, namesake of the well-known Methodist Missionary, was born at Carbonear on April 5th, 1839. His father was at that time principal of the Methodist Grammar School, and subsequently became Judge of the District Court at Harbor Grace. At the age of 15 Mr. Peters came to St. John's, entering the business of Messrs. Steer and Ayre. In 1863 he married Miss Rosanna Cole, niece of the Hon. C. R. Ayre, who died shortly after the golden wedding anniversary in 1913. In 1875 the business of Peters, Badcock and Co. was established. When Mr. Badcock died in 1882, Miss Roche, now Mrs. Mitchell, joined the firm, then known as Peters, Roche and Co. The following year Mr. Peters established the well-known commission business with which he has been so long and so honourably identified. He was twice returned as a member of the House of Assembly for Burin District, in 1882 and 1885 respectively. In the former election Sir James Winter was his colleague the district returning one member on each side; in the latter, Mr. Henry W. LeMassurier, C.M.G. Mr. Peters has held almost every office in the gift of his Church, and has represented it year after year in the Newfoundland Annual Conference and on many occasions was elected delegate to the General Conference in Canada. Seven sons, one daughter and several grandchildren survive. Two of the grandsons made the Supreme Sacrifice in the Great War. The daughter is Mrs. Blythe, of Oyster Bay, N.Y., whose husband, the Rev. J. J. Blythe, was for some years resident in this city. Rev. John E. Peters, M.A., stationed at Bartonville, Ont.; Alfred M., Manager of the Bank



"So I made up my mind that no matter what she did, I wouldn't say another word," said my friend. "I guess that's the best way," said I.

"I suppose so," said she, but it seems as if I should explode sometimes when I see how much harder she makes it for herself by not sticking to her word. I just think and think of things I'd like to say."

One more example of the energy uselessly used up in mentally criticizing relatives and friends.

If all the energy that all the world uses up in a day in both voiced and unvoiced criticism of little things they don't like about their friends and relatives (especially the latter) and in resentment of different points of view held by those close to them, could be corralled and used in a physical way I feel sure it would move mountains.

Petrified Forest.

Within the stretch of Arizona's desert lies sixty square miles of petrified forest. There lie preserved for all time fallen tree monarchs, millions of years old, turned to rocks. Mammoth trunks, sometimes five feet in diameter and 50 feet in length; or cracked smoothly into blocks, are transformed into everlasting stone, beautiful in quality and coloring—quartz, agate, chalcedony, jasper and exquisite opal, infinite in the variety of delicate tint and rich shading.

The method of petrification, by which the giant trees became rock, was one of the strange alchemistries of nature. Probably the wash of water from hot mineral springs rich in silica was the cause. The chemical permeating the tissues of the plant, acted as a hardening agent, preserving the original structure and detail of the tree with astonishing perfection of detail.

About D'Annunzio.

It is related that at his villa, near Florence, several years ago, he had tamed a little salamander which would get upon the writing table, apparently considering that it belonged to him and his master. The salamander was a general pet. Great was the grief of the poet, when it died after several years. By the side of the hearth which the salamander loved so well, D'Annunzio had him buried in a little vault closed by a black slab of marble. To this day the poet is said to carry with him the silver key to the little tomb.

PRIMATE CONGRATULATES FRANCE.
DUBLIN, Dec. 21.

HOLLAND DETERMINED.
PARIS, Dec. 21.
The trials of persons accused of war crimes will be held at Paris and Lille in 1920. The court martial at Lille has issued numerous warrants against German officers and soldiers, and a Captain and four Lieutenants, already have been imprisoned in the fort there. A Brussels despatch says it has been learned from an authorized source that Holland is declared to have stated officially she will not deliver up former Emperor William for trial.

To All Returned Soldiers and Sailors.

GREETINGS! And my hearty good wishes for a jolly, merry Xmas—for some of us the first one at home in five long years—and may the coming months bring along with them the inestimable blessings of peace, prosperity and contentment to each and every one of you.

I like to think that in whatever part of the island you may be at this season of family-gatherings, good-fellowship and merriment, whether in the far-away frozen north, in and around our capital or in some foreign land, you will gather in little knots, and for a few moments your thoughts will wander back to those days of long ago when the vital question was "Will they let us out of the line for Xmas?"

And you will smoke your pipe, and travel all the way back to the armed Inverness and Naíra, to Gallipoli and its meagre supplies of bully-beef and dog-biscuits; to the little village of Champ-en-Amenois with its wonderfully hospitable people; to prettily situated Fressin where the weather was terribly cold and fuel scarce, and finally to Eildon, Turfless Fife, where the few geese we managed to get were never paid for.

One or two of you may remember how in a certain hot spot, the Brigadier (and his staff) had to wait out the one turkey to be obtained in the place, but some of those d—d sergeants of the Newfoundland Regiment didn't, and how in time the Brigadier forgave but never forgot. Another will recollect the famous occasion when the Co.'s bottle of extra special liqueur brandy arrived on the table quite full when it should have been half empty and the look of bewilderment on his face when he was told that "them fellows out there must have thought it was whiskey and put too much water in the bottle."

And in recalling those incidents, you will give one thought, you soldiers, to the brave fellows who made it possible for us to defend the Empire, who faced the dangers of the seas day in and day out; whose heroic deeds in the presence of the arch-pirates, remained long unchronicled, but will live as long as there are British ships to sail the seven seas, and a British sailor to spin a yarn. We never forgot you "out there" and we never shall. Some day I hope, one or more of you will give me some idea of what you went through; of what the North Sea is like in a nor'easter, and a thousand other things which we naturally knew little of as we gathered round our festive tables and prepared to enjoy ourselves.

So far as we soldiers were concerned, I shall never forget the spirit of good comradeship, the kindly feelings and the desire to please that existed in the Regiment at all times; indeed, but more particularly at Xmas time. Who but noticed the zealous care with which the Q. M. and his staff watched over the precious comforts sent to the front, the folk of the Old Land, the endless pains they took in the preparation of the Xmas dinners and their pride in having everything so plentiful and as well served as possible? Who among the officers did not feel grateful to his batman for the many and unobtrusive attentions he rendered at this season? A bit of evergreen over the special photographs, Xmas cards neatly arrayed on table or mantelpiece; a small, merry, but very much valued present; all of which bespoke the kind heart, and a devotion which could not be too highly praised.

Will the R.S.M. feel conscious, when I tell him I shall always remember his face as he came along a few days before the great occasion, to see whether somehow or other the Sergeants' Mess couldn't be granted permission to have a small amount of "special comfort"; and his smile of pleasure (I don't believe he ever had a doubt about the result of his visit) when permission was granted. And so each and every one of us will, I hope, have some pleasant memory of those wonderful days when amongst the discomforts, hardships and miseries, attendant upon war, each of you strove to be cheerful, to forget he was in a foreign land miles away from his friends, and did his best to brighten his own and his comrades' surroundings and give a homely touch to the too-often miserable billets. And all of us, I trust, are conscious of that indefinable but unbreakable bond which surely and firmly unites in one great and mighty body, all those who heard the cry of the oppressed, and having heeded, conscious of the immense power for good which we have in our hands and determined that this power shall be used in no way but a just and righteous one.

Alcock, Hero!

The untimely death of Capt. Sir John Alcock, K.B.E., D.S.C., removes one of the principal figures from the aeronautical world: one which, perhaps, was the most notable in the science of aviation, and one whose name was famous, as being, in company with Lieut. Sir A. Whitten Brown, K.B.E., the first to conquer the air in a non-stop flight across the Atlantic Ocean from Newfoundland to Ireland. It is but a few months ago since Alcock and Brown were in our midst, making arrangements for the air journey, the successful accomplishment of which brought them both fame and honor. Now Alcock's name is but a memory of great things done, yet a memory that will live for aye, his great feat of the first aerial crossing of the Atlantic being among the wonders of the world. Where others failed Alcock succeeded.

The news of his death in France, on Friday, came as a shock to the people of St. John's. They had remembered and appreciated the strong, quiet, but nevertheless affable and obliging aviator, whose engaging personality made for himself hosts of friends during his brief stay. Newfoundlanders, too, were among the first to applaud his aerial conquest, and to tender him congratulations on having achieved the almost impossible, and Newfoundlanders will not be the last to tender their sincere sympathies to the relatives and friends of the latest tragedy of the air. The brave, whether their deeds are performed on land, sea or in air, never fail to command respect and admiration, and if death seeks them out in the performance of their duties, we shed a tear for their loss and emblazon their names on the scroll of honor, and write them in our hearts. "The paths of glory lead but to the grave," wrote the poet Gray. In Alcock's case, not the glory of battle, but the far transcending glory of science led him to a premature end, but his deeds do follow him. Intrepid, daring, and skilful the conqueror of the unknown spaces of the air unfortunately met the fate that has come to many an airman. Something about his machine was not quite right; some little thing had been overlooked and left undone at the tuning up preliminaries, and because of that, or because of some, it may be, atmospheric disturbance in his immediate vicinity, John Alcock, Hero, crashed to earth and died shortly afterwards from injuries received in the fall.

His pilot on the transatlantic flight, Lieut. Sir A. W. Brown, characterized the death of Alcock as a true sacrifice for the sake of humanity. What nobler epithet could be written. That sacrifice was made in endeavoring to perfect aerial navigation in the interests of the world and the world's trade, that humanity might benefit. But it was not fated that the pioneer of the long flight should carry his plans to fruition. The great

spaces will never more be penetrated by John Alcock. The air which he had overcome, for a time, claimed him as a sacrifice for itself, and in his death as a martyr of science in the sacred cause of humanity, he stands pre-eminently first among equals, and the world will lament his early passing.

Cold Weather Across Country.

A N. W. gale with blinding snow and intense frost raged along the West Coast from early Saturday until last night. At Bishop's Falls the thermometer registered 22 below, and at Lewisporte it was down to 16 during Saturday morning. In the afternoon it became mild and rain fell. Yesterday morning it again changed and the mercury went well below zero. Last night a regular hurricane with snow, raged west from Bishop's Falls.

Harbors Frozen Over.

Humbermouth has frozen over during the last few days and the S. S. Princess, with a part cargo of freight from Halifax, was not able to force an entrance, and it is probable that her freight will have to be landed at Port aux Basques. Lewisport has also frozen over and it is unlikely that the coastal steamers will be able to call there again this season.

Holy Name Society Meeting.

The Holy Name Society attended Benediction in the Cathedral yesterday afternoon. The spiritual director, Rev. Dr. Green, preached an appropriate sermon on the proper celebration of the Christmas festival. After the service the regular monthly meeting was held in the society's rooms. Next month the annual meeting will be held, when officers for the ensuing year will be nominated.

Fine Ice at Rink.

Skating enthusiasts will be able to enjoy their pastime at the Prince's Rink on Christmas Day, if a mild spurt does not set in between now and then. There is a five-inch sheet of ice there now, and as the frosty spurt lasts this thickness will increase. Last evening, at nine o'clock, there was a three-inch sheet, and this was flooded every two hours. The rink was first flooded on Friday afternoon at six o'clock, the floor by having been covered with one-inch roofing material. It took seventy-nine rolls of this material to cover the floor, there being some four hundred square feet in each roll. The floor at the upper end was broken through by the monster trucks of the Peace Parade, and these holes had to be patched up. Even then it was found to leak, and the rubberoid had to be laid. Mr. Bulley, the rink manager, states that the place will be open to skaters for Xmas Day, and books of tickets were placed at different stores to-day for disposal. On opening day the full C.C. Band will be present, while for the duration of the season the same band will attend every night and three afternoons a week. The big orchestra has become out of order, and an expert will arrive shortly from Halifax to repair it. Last year the Prince's did not open until the seventeenth of January, and but fifteen days of skating were enjoyed. It looks as if many more will be available this season.

I ain't much good, 'tis true, at rhymin', to sing of brooks that babble free, nor can I paint a glowing sunset to cheer the heart of you and me; on holly-leaves I am no stunner, I leave those themes to our D.C., but let me whisper low and softly—Go do your shopping before tea. Go buy your sweets for the children ere the dark shades of evening fall, go buy your clothes and cream of tartar, ere dawn the window blinds we haul; that fur-lined cloak for Mary Agnes, select before the joy bells ring, and show the clerk behind the counter that Xmas-Joy is a real thing. There's nothing so exasperating as fifteen women strolling in to buy a goose, or dancing-master, or automobile made of tin, at half-past nine on Eve of Xmas, such twacks as these make Xmas blue, such pests as these deserve the treatment so well prescribed by Everett True. So do your shopping in the morning; we'll treat you right, just, there and then; at night-time in the family circle, sing Peace on Earth Good Will to men. —Tim Shannahan.

Dr. Bond Preaches Eloquent Sermon.

BOUNDLY SCORES WEAKNESS OF PRESENT-DAY FAMILY LIFE.

Rev. Dr. Bond, pastor of Cochrans Street Centennial Church, preached one of his well-known vigorous, eloquent sermons at last evening's service. Taking as his text the nineteenth verse of the eighteenth chapter of the Book of Genesis: "For I know him (Abraham), that he will command his children and his household after him and they shall keep the way of the Lord and justice and judgment," the Doctor, for a period of half an hour or so gripped his auditors with his impressive words, and his penetrating insight into the conditions of every heart within the beautiful building. "God knew his man," said he, "when he said that Abraham. God knew that he could trust him to do this thing. What a multitude of people which cannot be trusted and relied upon by God there is in the world to-day! God knew the importance of the family and the household, and he knew that a man's household and family make up the greatest and most important thing a man possesses. Not his business, be it ever so prosperous; not his political standing, nor his money nor all of them together—but it is his wife and children which is his most valuable possession. This is the most important untative government. As the family goes the community goes. As the country goes the country goes. As the nation goes the nation goes. The foundations of national greatness and glory are laid in the homes of the people." The matter of wealth or poverty makes no difference. The home is the very centre of affection and influence of the man and the woman. It is a little kingdom where the man is king and the woman queen. It is here that the habits of mind and body which will govern them in future life are inculcated in the child. "In the homes are the foundations of national greatness laid," and they can be laid nowhere else. Nothing can compare in value with children. The biggest task in life a man has is the ordering of his household and the management of his family. He is the author of that family. Not the creator but the pro-creator. His is a great responsibility. "As a man is so is his family; as he goes the family will go." If he is indifferent to the claims of God the family will be the same. In this city the rule of "like parent like child" applies with terrible force. God does not know of most men and women in St. John's that they will "Command their family and household after Him." Someone has said that if you want to improve a man you must begin with his grandfather. That is largely so. It goes down the line. Traits of character are inherited. "It is God's desire that the home be the spot on earth most like Heaven. This should be the happiest, freest, loveliest place in the world. But there is no heaven without authority on the one hand and obedience on the other. Heaven is heaven not from its position. Heaven is where God dwells. There can be no Heaven here or hereafter without authority and obedience. Many parents do not realize this. They do not insist on obedience. It is an easy matter for one to tell by the action and behavior of children how they have been trained—if at all—at home. It is all 'often the rule here in St. John's, that children may do as they like, go where they like and say what they like. "I can do nothing with them," is a cry often heard. The man who confesses to this has no right to be a father. He neglects the first law of Heaven and his home is not a heaven. "It is easy to see, therefore, what an all-important factor in all civic, national and international life the family is. Every man is the pro-creator of a family which stretches away down the ages as long as the world lasts. You and your habits of thought and body are going to greatly influence that family. From Abraham sprang a great and powerful race. For centuries it prospered and thrived. When it forgot God's laws, however, it fell apart and was scattered over the face of the globe and its units became the despised of man. If the family life of the British nation deteriorates the fate of the Jewish nation can overtake it. "There are too many in this country who are not making an effort to govern the household for God's service. The scene presented by the city streets night after night is eloquent of this neglect. The night after night, moving picture houses are more proof of the inefficiency of our city homes. Not the children but the parents must be blamed. If the home is not made a cheerful, happy, interesting place in which to be, it is natural that the child does not desire to remain there. For this reason it is the duty of every parent to make his home such and then make the undeviated rule that their children are to remain indoors at night. This does not mean that they are to spend the night in study. "Streets, movie-shows, parks and other places of amusement are destroying the very foundations of home life. They are proving themselves the deadly enemies of home, school and church. This is a terribly important matter. The thing is on the increase and I do not know—I cannot think—what is to be the end. "Let me beg of you—fathers and mothers—to take the subject to heart. Take your children off the street. Make your home what it should be. Keep your children indoors at night. Let God be able to say of you, as he said of Abraham, 'I know him, that he will command his children and his household after him and they shall keep the way of the Lord.'"



The Kaiser and England.

We have long known that the reason for the particularly bitter hatred against England which obsessed all Germany at the outbreak of the war was the belief, persisting up to the very last moment, that England would stand aside. It has been a German argument that this belief was based on the acts of perfidious Albion herself; that the Government had talked neutrality and finally declared war. The world before this has been unable to judge the extent to which typically Teutonic political blindness thus misinterpreted honest efforts to preserve the peace of Europe, and overestimated the influence of pacifism in the British Cabinet and the British nation. And now the publication of secret German archives by Von Kautsky, Schuchting and Montgelas shows what the Kaiser thought about the Kaiser who at any time before the war could have prevented the war. The Kaiser agrees with the whole mass of propagandists when he says that "one single, sharp and earnest word of warning" from Sir Edward Grey would have made war out of the question. But warning to whom? In the Kaiser's opinion, to Paris and Petrograd. If Grey "enjoined neutrality" upon France and Russia, both would keep quiet at once. The Kaiser, perhaps, did not consciously "will the war" with England. He willed a little war with Serbia; if need be he willed, so far back as July 5, a safe war with Russia. When it became apparent that France would stand by Russia he willed a war with France, thinking he was certain to win. When England stands by France and Russia it is a shameful perfidy; the Kaiser did not will the war; but it never entered his head to avoid it by calling off the safe war with Serbia which had started the whole trouble.

On July 30 the Kaiser wrote to Bethmann Hollweg:
It is now clear to me beyond all doubt that England, Russia and France—on the ostensible ground that they are confronted with our casus foederis toward Russia—have seized upon the Austro-Serbian conflict as a pretext, and have deliberately concerted among themselves to embark upon a war of destruction against us. . . . Either we must basely betray our ally to the mercy of Russia, thereby breaking up the Triple Alliance, or else for our loyalty to our ally we must submit to being set upon and chased by the whole Triple Entente.

That is to say, when the Kaiser refuses to try to calm down his ally, whom he had deliberately incited to war on Serbia three weeks earlier, it is his loyalty. When England refuses to abandon her allies whom the Kaiser is about to attack, it is a deliberately concerted war of destruction, and Sir Edward Grey is denounced in language more indicative of hatred than of resentment. Surely this is the perfection of truly German reasoning.—N. Y. Times.

Celebrities Who Pined in Prison.

What would the world say to-day if on arriving in Ireland after their magnificent flight across the Atlantic, the late heroic Alcock and Brown, instead of being received with the enthusiasm they so richly merited, had been seized by the authorities and thrown into the Detention Barracks in Dublin?

And yet it was into a gloomy dungeon that Christopher Columbus was hurled for an exploit no less daring. All the gratitude that he received was the displeasure of his co-called patrons, the abuse of the populace, threats, imprecations, and then, as if that were not sufficient, the luckless discoverer was clapped into irons.

All that Galileo got for his services to science was public ridicule and a prison-cell. It was Galileo who declared that the earth went round the sun, for which preposterous assertion his judges had only one sentence. "We'll let you go free if you admit this statement to be a tissue of lies," he was told after he had languished in prison for months. "Very well, the earth does not go round the sun," remarked the great astronomer. "It does for all that!" said he to himself, as soon as he had quit the judges' presence.

Sir Walter Raleigh spent over ten years of his life in prison, and the beautiful Mary Queen of Scots a much longer period. So absolutely bored was the first named with prison life that he attempted to destroy himself. For Queen Mary, she, too, became horribly depressed owing to her monotonous existence. It was from one of the many prisons in which she was confined from time to time that she escaped, just prior to the Battle of Langside, after which disaster to her cause she was once more promptly placed in custody.

It was as a prisoner that Cervantes wrote "Don Quixote" and Bunyan the "Pilgrim's Progress." Leigh Hunt wrote some of his finest essays in prison, and the late W. T. Stead used to refer to the months he spent in Holloway as one of the happiest periods of his life. Erasmus, the famous scholar, spent





In the Prize Ring.

By ROBERT COREY.

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—William Muldoon thinks that Georges Carpentier had best keep on the other side of the street from Jack Dempsey. The little pot that bumps the big pot is apt to get broken. Carpentier, he says, is a good little man, but Dempsey is a very good big man. "I have always had the theory," said he, "that every inch above six feet and every pound over two hundred is a handicap to the professional athlete. See what happened to the bulky Willard at Toledo. He could not get out of Dempsey's way."

Willard Wasn't Hurt.

Muldoon says that Willard was not hurt in the fight at Toledo. Willard told him so himself.

"He was stunned," said Muldoon. "That is all that happened to him. After that he felt no pain whatever. He knew that Dempsey was hitting him—he had intelligence enough left for that—he could even see Dempsey's arm go back and the glove strike his flesh. But he could not feel it. So that he had a vague, hazy idea in the back of his poor benumbed skull that Dempsey wasn't injuring him. But he really did not know anything—he did not know what was going on—from the time that first hook crashed on him until his seconds asked him if they might throw up the sponge in the fourth round."

"I said 'yes' Willard told me. 'But I didn't know what it was all about. If they had asked me if I could dance a jig I would have said 'yes' just the same."

What He Thinks of Dempsey.

Muldoon is seventy-five years old. He is still an athlete. He has been a professional trainer of athletes—and of late an exterminator of neurasthenia—for forty years. He thinks that Dempsey is a good big man—a very good big man—but he is not satisfied that he is the best big man he has ever seen in the ring. "See how long it took him to bring down Willard after the champion was stunned and practically unconscious," said he.

He has a high opinion of Fred Fulton's fighting ability. Nor is he wedded to the theory that Fulton's heart is soft and yellow. Things he

knows about Fulton make him hold to the contrary.

"If he can live through the first round in a fight with Dempsey—watch out," said the old trainer. Fulton is built like a string bean, and the string bean men have a snap in their blows that the square built men sometimes lack. I doubt if Willard could have gone to the fourth round if Fulton had been battering at him in the arena at Toledo."

Fulton Showed Gameness.

He spoke of Fulton's fight with a hard hitting heavyweight in the west—who knocked him out in the first battle. The crowd was against Fulton, in a hostile environment, but he was game enough to go back for a second fight and finish his man properly.

"That does not sound as though Fulton is yellow," said he. Fulton reminded him, he said, of the time when he was training Ned Hanlon to row Courtney for the championship of the world.

"Courtney could go out on an empty river," said he, "and row faster miles than Hanlon ever thought of rowing. But he got rattled when he appeared before a crowd. Last time they met Hanlon spurted at the start and got ahead of Courtney. Then he laid on his oars and tossed water on his head with one hand."

What Settled Courtney.

"Come on, Courtney, he said. 'Hurry up. Let's make a race of it.' 'That settled Courtney. He was never in the race from that time on. Yet there is no doubt in the mind of any who knew the two men well that Hanlon was inferior to him in speed. The difference was that Hanlon had no nerves. Once when I went for him, to put him in the boat. I found him sound asleep. Bob Fitzsimmons was the same sort. If he were to fight in half an hour, he did not give the fight a thought until his seconds began to lace on his gloves."

Muldoon does not think that Carpentier's defeat of Beckett is necessarily a proof that Carpentier can give a first rate heavyweight a battle. "Beckett was a counterfeiter," said the old trainer. "His managers kept him away from all the dangerous men. You will notice that they did not let Fred Fulton have a chance at him. He is a sullen, impertinent unpleasant youth, from what I have heard of him, but quite destitute of ideas."

Nasty to Antagonists.

"He has won a certain popular following because he is overbearing and nasty to his antagonists. That is the way a great fighter ought to act, according to the British idea. But he was simply a poll parrot. He just repeated the words that others put in his mouth: 'I'll fight you, he used to tell Fulton. 'I'll be glad to fight you. I can lick you—etc., etc.' "That cheered Fulton, because he thought he was to get a chance at Beckett after all. And it made Beckett popular with the English because he was living up to their ideas of champions in pugilism. But some one had told him what to say. He never thought of it by himself."
