# What's in the Contract?

What are the Labor Clauses? Why Keep the People in the Dark.

The public is amazed that Squires will not publish the Humber Agreement. "What," the question is on every lip, "what is in it that Squires dare not publish it?" After careful private inquiry, several things have been suggested as being in the contract which it is not deemed expedient to publish. We shall push our inquiries, and hope to be able to speak with more certainty

It is said, for instance, that there are clauses which vitally affect labor. One provides that no law shall ever be made to prevent the importation of foreign labor. If a strike occurred, because the price of labor were too low, labor from outside could be imported to break the strike, if no law could be passed to prevent it. For that matter, Chinese, Japanese, Greeks or Barbarians could be brought to the Colony, to do all the Humber work, and the influx could not be stopped if the contract did not provide for it. What provisions are made in the Humber contract about labor? We want the facts, not baseless denials. Publish the contract!
