A Tempest in a Teapot.

A correspondent informs us of a fuss which has lately taken place concerning the management of the Nassagaweya Post Office. It appears that a shoemaker and candy seller, named Robert Meade, of the village of Sodom, thought he had just cause of complaint against Mr. Easterbrook, the incumbent of the post office referred to. He accordingly complained to the authorities, and Mr. Dewe, Inspector, come up to investigate the charges, of which Mr. Meade had drawn up a formidable array. They may be briefly characterized as frivolous, and they were so regarded by Mr. Dewe, who after hear lag half a dozen or so of them advised him to withdraw the remainder. His grievences were, that out of a number of circulars he had sent out, one had not reahed its destination, that some of his letters were not stamped on their arrival, and some from Montreal had been unduly delayed. All these points were, however, explained so much to the Inspector's satisfaction, that the result was as above stated. As the investigation was conducted openly in the Town Hall a large number of people had assembled, and when Mr. Meade's charges had been disposed of, Mr. Dewe inquired if there were any person present who had any objection to urge against the manner in which Mr. Easterbrook had discharged his duties as postmaster. Our correspondent says that during a twenty-five years' residence in Nessagaweys he had never seen such a turn out of the wealthy and influential inhabitants, and some of the foremost of them, among others the Resve, Mr. Campbell, replied to the Inspector's question by bearing very high testimony to Mr. Easterbrook's efficiency, housety and urbane manners in discharging his duty. Mr. Dewe afterwards informed Mr. Meade, that it was his duty to make an apology to Mr. Easterbrook, but the point was i visible to the shoemaker. Thus the matter ended, and the postmaster retains his position with honeu.

The extreme penalty of excommunica-tion was passed upon Messrs. T. O'Brien, Miles Byrne and D. Regan by Vicar-General Bravers, yesterday, in the Roman an Catholic Cathodral of St. Peter's. The occurrence caused intense commo an Catholic Cathodral of St. Peter's. The occurrence caused intense commotion among the congregation, and varied opinions are held as to the advisability of such extreme measures being resorted to under the circumstances. It appears that a pet project with the Roman clergy here, since the arrival of the Bishop, has been to secure the services of some of the Sisters of Charty, and in order to make an opening for them, the Vicar-General notified the female teachers in the Separate School that their services would be dispensed with after a certain date, and their places filled by the Sisters. Some of the Board of Trustees opposed the innovation, and a meeting was called to consider what was best to be done. At this meeting the Vicar-General attended, and warned the Trustees that he would excommunicate all and sundry who would place any obstactes in the way, by either voice or vote. The subject was debated, and, notwithstanding the threats of the priest, six out of eleven of those present had the pluck to vote against employing the Sisters of Charity. Of these, the three above named were inferentially selected, and in open church yesterday the awful denunciations of the church were hurled upon them. The matter will not likely be allowed to rest where it is.—Advertiser, London, Ont.
