Was Prohibitive

The supreme court en banc yesterday afternoon upheld the decision of Judge Winter quashing a conviction before a magistrate for defendant's failing to pay the tax imposed by a bylaw on poolrooms in the municipality of Magrath. It was held unanimously by the bench that the bylaw was ultravires, and in the words of His Lordship Chlef Justice Harvey it was more prohibitive than regulative. The costs will have to be borne by the appellants, the municipality.

The case was tried primarily before a justice of the peace, and the man who was running the poolroom was fined for not obeying the bylaw which imposed the heavy tax. The case-was then carried to Judge Winter as the district court judge, which should have been a final appeal according to the law. Judge Winter quashed the conviction, and it was from that decision that the municipality had appealed to the court en banc.

There was some argument on the nature of the offence, whether it could be regarded as a continuing offence and whether the man could be fined the day following for the same thing Three cases had been initiated in this instance.

The question which was put to the court en banc was whether the bylaw was valid or not. Their lordships replied "No." The bylaw, in the words of the Chief Justice, was beyond the powers given to the municipality to regulate poolrooms, and it was apparent that the intention was to prohibit and not to regulate.





Lumber Case to Privy Council. Vancouver, June 4.-J. E. McMullen, licitor for the C. P. R., at Vancouver,

solicitor for the C. P. R., at Vancouver, left the city today for London, where he will assist in the presentation of the appeal to the Privy Council against the judgment in the case of the King Lumber company vs. C. P. R.

The suit was over fire losses alleged to have been caused to the timber limits of the King Lumber company near Kamloops by a spark from a C. P. R. engine. 



DAY IN CALGARY

ALREADY BACK AT **USUAL WORK**

independent Firms Acceding to Request of Men For a Higher Scale of Pay

The strike of the plumbers in Calgary is to a large extent already over. The independent plumbers of the city have already acceded to the demands of the men for a raise in wages to 65 cents an hour. As these are more numerous than the others who are holding out, it looks as though the plumbers have won the day.

Of the 200 or more plumbers who went on strike for the higher wage at the beginning of the week more than half have already returned to work as the demand which they made has been acceded. The Evans Amerile company, which is doing the plumbing for the new Hudson's Bay Company store has given the men the wage asked and so also has the Alberta Plumbing and Heating Company and Parkington and Anderson. It is expected that the others will fall into line within a few days.

Few Members of Union

As there are only 12 members of the master plumbers' union in Calgary and about 38 independent firms, it is thought that the opposition to the higher scale of pay will soon be broken down.

It is usual at the beginning of June to draw up a schedule of pay for the year and notice is always given before that time to the masters by the men in February this year and there was no particular reason for expecting any opposition till last week when a conference was held between the masters' union and the men. It was then that one of the masters, James Marr, it is stated by C. Wildeman, chairman of the strike committee, said the men were worth about 35 cents an hour and should get that. Then the trouble started and it was evident that the matter would not be settled easily.
