Mr. Bunting's Statement. From the Mail of Vesterday.



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

We need not go north to look for cheap potatoes, for north of Toronto the crop is not a favorite one with farmers. But while potatoes are dear in Toronto, it so happen that they are cheap east, west, and south of this point. In Montreal potatoes are plentiful and cheap, and buyers are holding off, expecting to get them at still lower tigures. In New York, good potatoes sell at from 30 to 40 cents per bushel; in Toronto we have to pay double these figures. The Montreal Gazette says :-"Advices from Prince Edward island state that the New York market is so low that this year it does not pay to ship there, several lots having lost money. In New York the price of early rose ranges from 90c to \$1.25 per barrel, which is equal to 30c to 40c per bushel. When therefore we figure duty 15c and freight 10c per bushel from here to New York it will at once become apparent that there is no chance of shipping potatoes to good account. the American market at present, as a shipment of potatoes from here to New
