The Commercial Travelers at Variance With the Intercolonial Railway.

From the Montreal Star.

The majority of the members of the Dominion Commercial Travelers' association visiting the maritime provinces are greatly exercised over their treatment at the hands of the Intercolonial railway. Although this class of patrons have been accorded mmutation tickets as on other railways, yet they have found by experience that in many instances a considerable saving can be accomplished by purchasing the ordinary passenger return tickets, which, however, only entitle the holder to carry fifty pounds of baggage. For the round trip, St. John, N.B., to Halifax and return, St. John, N.B., to Halifax and return, the fare is three dollars and a half less than by the commutation ticket. In the same ratio the commutation ticket from Montreal to Halifax and return at \$38 50 could be reduced by nearly four dollars. Commercial travelers, who in some cases found the latter method the most preferable way to travel, were recently taken aback when the management of the road resolved upon an expedient to suppress the continued decrease in revenue. Consequently an order was recently issued enacting that the travelers could only have their baggage checked by prohave their baggage checked by pro-ducing the regular commutation ticket. In an increditable short time this ticket. In an increditable short time this intelligence, which was received with disgust by the members of the association, had the effect of enormously reducing this class of travel over the Intercolonial. All the representatives of the large mercantile and manufacturing houses of Toronto and lontreal now take the Grand Trunk to Portland, thence proceeding through the state of Maine by the New Brunswick railway to St. John. The feeling of the commercial men has become so strong against the Intercolonial that rather than afford them any business they cross the Bay of Fundy by steamer to some of the northern towns, thence proceeding to Halifax. The general impression prevails in the association that the railway officials have needlessly harrassed and restricted them while in the discharge of their duties. It is also claimed that unless the offensive regulation is removed the road will permanently lose the patronage of the association. The secretary, H. W. Wadsworth, who has been the recipient of a number of complaints, has taken prompt way to St. John. The feeling of the coma number of complaints, has taken prompt action, and has just addressed s letter on the subject to the general passenger agent. He expects a reply daily and is confident that an amicable arrangement will be arrived at, when the state of affairs created by the unfortunate order is learned by the railway authorities.
