

ENGLAND IN EGYPT.

The Settlement Said to be Favored by Lord Sallsbury. London, July 6.—The Telegraph thi⁸

morning publishes the settlement of the Egyptian question originally proposed by the Earl of Northbrook, first lord of the admiralty in the late cabinet, and says that it was favorably considered at a cabinet council held last Saturday. It pro-vides for the occupation of the Soudan by Turkish troops, under British officers, until the country is pacified ; the abolition of slave raids and the export trade in slaves; protection of legitimate trade; payment of tribute by the Egyptians to the Sultan and the recognition of his right of suzerainty over both Upper and Lower Revpt.
