Montreal, June 27.—Absolute proof has been discovered that Thomas Neal, now in London charged with poisoning Matilda Cloevy, is Dr. Thomas Neill Cream, anative of Quebec City, who was graduated from McGill College in Montreal and who was sentenced to a life term in state's prison for abortion.

Thomas Neill Cream, although he has lived the most of his life on the American continent, was born, so the register of McGill College says, in Glasgow, Scotland, on May 27, 1850. While still a young lad his parente emigrated to Canada and settled in the ancient city of Quebec, where old Mr. Cream managed to accumulate a comfortable competency. Young Cream first worked in the ship-building trade as a carpenter. As he showed considerable matural ability his father decided on sending him to Montreal to study at McGill College for the profession of medicine. Cream went through his chosen course. It was in 1872 when Cream entered college. In 1876 he graduated and was a full-fledged M.D.
