ST. GEORGE'S DEBT.

It is well known to all the congregation that a debt of \$1,500 is owing to the bank, on which we pay about \$80 a year interest. This debt is a legacy come down to us from those hard times about five years ago. Since then, owing to better times and also to a reduction in current expenses, the Church now pays its way and the debt has not been added to. A movement has been inaugurated to pay this debt off by Easter, or the greater part of it. Towards this end the Rector and Mr. Hare spoke on Sexagesima Sunday, and for this purpose cards were distributed throughout the Church, any person taking one, pledging themselves to give or collect the sum of \$10.00. Of course, subscriptions are not limited to this amount, and it is earnestly hoped that all those who take or have taken an interest in St. George's will now come forward and free it from debt.
