## MARINE AND FISHERIES DEPARTMENT.

## FISHERIES' DEPARTMENT.

*Cape Sable Seal Island Light.*—The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain White Light, elevated about eighty feet above high water mark, and may be seen on approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about  $3\frac{1}{4}$  miles S. by W. by compass.

from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island, there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

*Brier Island Light.*—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof—a plain white light.

*Digby Gut Light.*—The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia, is placed on the West side of Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The coast is very bold, and not indented; the light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin—a white light.

*Gannet Rock Light.*—This light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands, off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. It is a light of the Fourth order, Holo-potal system—fixed *white* light 45 seconds, eclipse  $5\frac{1}{2}$ , flash  $5\frac{1}{2}$ , eclipse  $5\frac{1}{2}$ . The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

*Bearings and Distance by Compass from the Gannet Rock Light House.*

This Light bears from the Light House on Brier Island, N. N. W.  $\frac{1}{4}$  W., 22 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Old Proprietor, E.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S., distance 7 miles.  
From the Gannet Rock to the Black Rock, off White Head Island, N. E.  $\frac{1}{4}$  E., 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the South West Head of Grand Manan, N. N. W.,  $6\frac{1}{2}$  miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, N. W.  $\frac{1}{4}$  N.,  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles.

To the Southernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge, W. S. W. 2 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to Machias Seal Island, W. and by N.,  $\frac{1}{2}$  N., 12 miles.

**NOTE.**—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extends Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westward, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker, called the Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.

From Brier Island Light to the Old Proprietor, N. and by W.  $\frac{1}{4}$  W.,  $18\frac{1}{2}$  miles.

The Blonde Rock from the Southernmost point of the Cape Sable Seal Islands S. and by W.,  $5\frac{1}{2}$  miles distant.

*Machias Seal Island Lights.*—There are two fixed *white* lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, one elevated about forty-five feet above high water; the other a new tower, erected last season, fitted with a 3d Dioptric light, stands 69 feet above high water level, and visible from all points of approach for a distance of 25 miles in clear weather; and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W., distant about 170 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast (British or

American.) Both the buildings are painted white. The following are the bearings from them, viz.:

- To the Southernmost Murr Ledge (St. Mary's) E. S. E., easterly.
- " Gannet Rock Light, E. by S.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S., 13 miles.
- " Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N.  $\frac{1}{2}$  N.
- " Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  E.
- " N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.
- " Little River Head, N. by W.
- " Libby Island Light House (American), N. W. by W.

Vessels standing to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will not then be more than three-fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the Lights.

[It is recommended that the Ships' Compasses should be well compared and adjusted particularly in new ships, before they leave Partridge Island, as serious errors have frequently occurred from want of attention on this point; and as the variation in the Bay of Fundy is seventeen degrees Westerly, (or  $1\frac{1}{2}$  points), it will be found by the latest published Admiralty Charts, that the course from Partridge Island down the Bay, South Channel, between the Old Proprietor and N. W. Ledge, is S. W.  $\frac{1}{4}$  S.; but the course to be steered must depend on the direction of the wind on leaving Partridge Island.]

*Head Harbour Light.*—Next in order, after passing Grand Manan and the plain white Light (American), on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campobello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels to go at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed *white* light. The building is painted white, with a red cross on it.

*Point Le Preaux Lights.*—Upon this projecting head land, two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant 28 feet. Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, they were may be useful—both are fixed, and *white*. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally.

A Steam Fog Alarm has been placed in this Station, which will sound twice in each minute.

*Partridge Island Light.*—This Light at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed *white* light, and that the Light House and Keeper's Dwelling are painted red and white, in vertical stripes. The Steam Whistle on this Island is sounded ten seconds in every minute during foggy or thick weather.

*Acron Light.*—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or Bar, which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a Fourth Order Dioptric Light, visible ten miles, is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels wing pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed *white* light. The house is white and black, in stripes vertically.

*Quaco.* A revolving *white* light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can

be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red, in horizontal stripes.

*Cape Enrage Light.*—On the Point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N. S. A plain *white* light. The house is painted white, and is about 120 feet above tide mark. Light visible 18 miles.

*West Quoddy Light.*—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the St. Croix by Lubec and Eastport.

*Cape Ferchu Light.*—On Cape Ferchu, on the Western side of the entrance to Yarmouth (Nova Scotia), in lat. 43° 39', N. long. 66° 8', W. It exhibits a plain, revolving light—visible one minute and a quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white, and is elevated 235 feet above the level of the sea.

*Grindstone Island Light.*—An Octagonal Tower, 60 feet above the level of high water on Grindstone Island, in Chignecto Bay, in lat. 45° 43' 13" N. Long. 64° 37' 25" W. The Tower is painted white, as is also the Keeper's House, one story, situate about 50 feet to the Eastward of the Tower.

Bearings and distances of several places from the above Light House:  
Cape Enrage Light, by compass, S. 61½ W., 10 1-7 miles.

Highest Point of St. Mary's Ledge, by compass, N. 40 W., 6-10 mile.

The point of low water off the Light House, by compass, S. 78 W., 2-10 mile.

Jones' Ledge, N. 10 W., 3-10 mile—it dries at low springs, and has about 2½ fathoms on it at half tide.

A Sand Bank, S. 15 W., 6-10 mile; it has 1½ fathoms on its shoalest part at low water springs.

*Grand Manan.*—There is a Light House and Keeper's house at the "Swallow Tail," on the North Eastern part of the Island of Grand Manan, in the Bay of Fundy. The Light is 45 feet from Base to Deck; the point on which it stands is 103 feet above high water, making 148 feet elevation. This is a conspicuous mark in the South Channel between Briar Island and Grand Manan. Both houses are painted white.

*Richibucto Head Light.*—This is a fixed White Light, situated on Richibucto Head, Northumberland Strait, in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence. The light is placed at an elevation of 70 feet above high water, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 14 miles. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the fourth order. The tower is square, about 50 feet high from base to vane, painted white, and stands in lat. 43° 39' 40" N., long. 64° 43' 30" W. of Greenwich.

*Cape Jorvisain, Straits of Northumberland.*—Lat. 46° 10' 00" N.; long. 63° 51' 00" W.—Visible from all points of approach from the ground by N. to W. The Light House is an octagonal wooden pyramidal building, painted white, 40 feet high, elevated 72 feet above high water, and stands 66 feet from the extremity of the cliff. The Keeper's house, a one and a half story wooden building, painted white, is situated 50 feet to the westward of the Light House.

*Point Escuminac Light.*—This Light House is situated in Ramich Bay, north latitude 47° 4' 30"; west longitude, 64° 50' 30". It is a

fixed bright light, elevated seventy feet above high water. A Third Order French Dioptric lighting apparatus has been placed on this Tower, which is visible for twenty-five miles.

*Miscou Island Light.*—This Light House is situated on Bireh Point, north latitude  $48^{\circ} 1' 00''$ ; west longitude,  $64^{\circ} 30' 00''$ . It is a fixed red light, elevated seventy-nine feet above high water.

*Shediac Lights.*—On Point DuChene Wharf, in the summer, north latitude  $46^{\circ} 14' 6''$ ; west longitude  $64^{\circ} 31' 5''$ . It is a fixed White light.

Two Fixed White Beacon Lights on Shediac Island, visible ten miles.

*Miramichi River.*—Light House on Portage Island. Fixed White Light, elevated — feet above high water.

Two Beacon Lights on "Preston's Beach," about five miles above Escuminac Light. Two Beacon Lights at Oak Point. Two Beacon Lights at "Grant's." All fixed *white* Lights. Visible ten miles.

*Caraquet Island, Bay de Chaleur.*—A new Light Tower and Keeper's House is in course of erection. Character not yet determined on.

*River St. John Lights.*—Green Head, Sand Point, Oak Point, No Man's Friend, Oromocto Shoals, Wilmot's Bluff, and Cox's Point, Grand Lake. Visible ten miles.

### Rates of Pilotage.

*Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of St. John—passed 27th July, 1869.*

One dollar per foot for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her in a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the wharves; and One dollar per foot for removing or taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.

In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of vessels, under and by virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such vessels, the sum of Two Dollars per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting Vessels (unless square rigged), going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, vessels not exceeding 100 tons burthen, registered at any port within the Dominion, Steamboats, and Vessels propelled by steam, trading and plying between this port and any port or ports in North America, and all Vessels drawing under six feet of water,

are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

For removing vessels from any mooring ground to any wharf, or from one wharf to another wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding one hundred tons, One dollar and Fifty cents; for vessels over one hundred, and not exceeding two hundred tons, Two Dollars; for vessels over two hundred, and not exceeding three hundred tons, Three Dollars; and for all vessels over three hundred, and not exceeding four hundred tons, the sum of Four Dollars; and twenty-five cents additional for every fifty tons each Vessel may measure over four hundred tons.

*First Distance.*—From Partridge Island to Musquash Head, bearing North West, One dollar per foot.

*Second Distance.*—From Musquash Head to Point Le Preaux, bearing North West, One dollar and Twenty five cents per foot.

*Third Distance.*—From Point Le Preaux to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing North West, or North Channel, bearing South East, one dollar and Fifty cents per foot.

*Fourth Distance.*—From the North Head of Grand Manan, or North Channel, as aforesaid, to Maclias Seal Island, bearing South, or Brier Island, bearing South-East, One dollar and Seventy five cents per foot.

*Fifth Distance.*—Any where outside of and beyond the fourth distance, and within a bound ranging with Mount Desert and Cape Sable Seal Islands, bearing North-west and Southeast, being the outer cruising bound, Two dollars per foot.

### Harbour Master's Fees.

On vessels of 30 and under 50 tons, 2s. 6d.; vessels of 50 and under 75 tons, 3s. 9d.; 75 and under 100 tons, 5s.; 100 and under 150 tons, 6s. 3d.; 150, and under 200 tons, 7s. 6d.; 200, and under 300 tons, 10s.; 300, and under 400 tons, 12s. 6d.; 400 tons and upwards, 15s.; decked vessels under 100 tons, owned and registered at Saint John, and all British vessels under that tonnage, trading within the Bay of Fundy, or arriving from ports to the Northward of Cape Cod, or the Westward of Cape Canso, or from any port in Nova Scotia to pay annually as follows: Under 30 tons, 3s. 9d.; over 30, and under 50 tons, 5s.; over 50, and under 75 tons, 6s.; over 75, and under 100 tons, 10s.

By special arrangements at Western Extension Railway Office (to which Company this Ferry has been leased for a term of years), the following will be ferried at commuted rates: School boys and girls, over twelve years of age, clerks under twenty one years of age, apprentices, sewing girls, manufacturers, and others, using the Ferry extensively.

### Time for going through the Falls.

The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the *flood*, and about two and a half on the *ebb*, so that they are passable four times in twenty-four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

POSTAGE.

All Letters sent to any part of the Dominion and P. E. Island, are liable to a uniform rate of three cents per half ounce, according to the following scale, if prepaid:—

A Letter not exceeding half ounce in weight.....	\$0	3
A Letter exceeding half ounce, and not exceeding one ounce.....		6
A Letter exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding one ounce and a half ...		9
A Letter exceeding one ounce and a half, and not exceeding two ounces ...		12
A Letter exceeding two ounces, and not exceeding two ounces and a half... ..		15

And so on, adding three cents extra for every additional half ounce.  
If unpaid, such Letters will be liable to a rate of five cents per half ounce.

The same scale of reckoning by half ounces is applicable to Letters to and from the United States, but the rate on such Letters is six cents per half ounce.

Postage on Drop Letters, one cent, and must be prepaid.

On Packet Letters to and from the United Kingdom, pre-paid, the scale of rates is as follows:—

A Letter not exceeding half ounce in weight.... ..	\$0	6
A Letter exceeding half ounce, and not exceeding one ounce.....		12

And so on—adding 6 cents for every additional half ounce.

Letters via Boston, when so addressed, are sent weekly: postage 8 cents.

Letters for Newfoundland, 6 cents; Bermuda, 6 cents; West Indies, via Halifax, 12 cents.

It is advisable that all Letters should be prepaid, and by Postage Stamps.

Printed Books and Pamphlets, under 48 ounces in weight, can be forwarded by Post in New Brunswick, at the rate of one cent per ounce; Periodicals, one cent per four ounces.

Transient Newspapers require to be prepaid—two cents each. Newspapers for subscribers do not require to be prepaid, the charge being one cent on delivery; prepayment can be made either at the Office where mailed, or by the subscriber at the Office where delivered, at the following rates: For a paper issued once per week, five cents per quarter; twice, 10 cents; and so on.

Pamphlets, Periodicals, and Books, to pass at the above rates, must be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides or ends.

No words or marks (except the name and address of the person to whom sent), shall be written on any Newspaper, Pamphlet, Book, Periodical, Parliamentary or Government paper.

Any violation of these Regulations will subject such Newspapers, Pamphlets, Periodicals, or Books, &c., to be treated in every respect as Letters.

Book Postage to United Kingdom, under 1 oz., 2 cents; 1 to 2 oz., 4 cents; 2 to 4 oz., 6 cents; 4 ounces and under 8 ounces, 12 cents; 8 ounces and under 12 oz., 18 cents; 12 oz. and under 16 oz., 24 cents; 1 lb. and under 1½ lb., 30 cents; 1½ lb. to 2 lb., 48 cents.

Periodicals printed in Canada can be sent to United Kingdom for 2 cents.

To Newfoundland, same as England.

REGISTRATION.—The system of registration is applicable to all description of letters without distinction, whether they contain articles of value or not. It also applies to parcels. The charge in addition to postage is for letters 2 cents; to United States, 5 cents; parcels 5 cents; to England, 8 cents.

PARCELS.—Parcels closed at the ends and sides can be sent by mail throughout

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the Dominion, at a rate of 12½ cents per half lb. The weight of each parcel is not to exceed 3 lbs., nor the size to exceed 2 feet in length or breadth, and 1 foot in thickness. The parcel must not contain any glass, liquid, or any substance liable to do injury to the mail, under the penalty of a forfeiture of the parcel if discovered. The parcel is not to contain any writing. Parcels must be pre-paid by stamps. The sender, by writing his name on the outside, can have the parcel returned in case of failure to reach the person addressed.

**POSTAGE STAMPS.**—Postage stamps are provided at the respective values of ¼, 1, 2, 3, 6, 12½, and 15 cents: all bearing as a device the effigy of Her Majesty.

Patterns and samples are transmitted between the Dominion and the United Kingdom at the same rate as per book post. The pattern or sample must be open at the end or side, except in case of seeds, drugs, &c.; which can be sent in closed transparent bags.

Persons remitting money should obtain a Money Order, as the Department is not responsible for the loss of a letter containing money; and in no case should a money letter be sent without registration.

Letters for Manitobah and British Columbia are forwarded daily via Island Pond route, postage, 3 cents. Letters for the British and Foreign West Indies, Cuba, Porto Rico, Mexico, Central America, South America, China, Japan, the Sandwich Islands, and the Australian Colonies, are forwarded daily via New York, if so addressed and prepaid. Mails leave New York for Cuba and the West Indies every Thursday; for St. Thomas, Brazil, Buenos Ayres, Monte Video, and the Atlantic Coast of South America, on the 23rd of each month; for Panama, Central America, Chili, Peru, and the Pacific Coast of South America, on the 4th and 19th of each month. For West Indies (British and Foreign), Demerara, British Guinea, and Honduras, on the 15th of each month. Mails leave San Francisco for China and Japan on the first of each month. Postage on Letters—Bahamas, 3 cents; other British West India Islands, 10 cents; Danish Islands, 18 cents; other Foreign West India Islands, 18 cents; Sandwich Islands, 9 cents; Acapulco, Aspinwall, Colon, Costa Rica, Guatamalo, Mexico, Panama, and Venezuela, 13 cents; China, Cuba, and Japan, 10 cents; Australia, 10 cents; New Zealand, 15 cents; Honduras and Nicaragua, 13 cents; Brazil, 18 cents; Buenos Ayres and Monte Video, 21 cents; Bolivia, Ecuador, Chili, and Peru, 25 cents.

Mail Steamers for the United Kingdom, leave Quebec or Portland every Saturday; Boston, every Wednesday; Halifax, every alternate Tuesday. The Mail Steamer for Bermuda, leaves Halifax every fourth Monday. For Newfoundland, leaves Picton every second Tuesday, except during the months of December, January, and February, when it leaves once in four weeks.

From Amherst, 138 miles from Saint John, travellers are conveyed daily, by four-horse coaches, 65 miles to Truro, and thence, 64 miles, by Railway, to Halifax, Nova Scotia.

During the Summer, Steamers running from Shediac, in connection with the European and North American Railway, convey passengers and freight to the northern portion of New Brunswick; to Canada and Prince Edward Island.

Table for Foretelling the Weather through all the Lunations of each Year.

This Table, and the accompanying remarks, are the result of many years actual observation; the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the Sun and Moon, in their several positions respecting the Earth, and will, by simple inspection, show the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the Moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom found to fail.

Observations.—The nearer the time of the Moon's change to noon or midnight, the more nearly will the result accord with the prediction.

The space for this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next morning.

The moon's change, first quarter, full and last quarter, happening during six of the afternoon hours, i. e., from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the wind, as is noted in the table.

Though the weather, from a variety of irregular causes, is more uncertain in the latter part of autumn, the whole of winter, and the beginning of spring, yet, in the main, the above observations will apply to these periods also.

It is also said that less dependence is to be placed on the Table in winter than in summer.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The following extracts from the Act passed at session of Dominion Parliament in 1872, to amend the Act relating to Banks and Banking, is important to business men. In all matters relating to bills of exchange and promissory notes, the following, and no other will be observed as legal holidays, or non-judicial days, that is to say:—

1. In the Province of Ontario, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia—

Sundays,

New Year's Day,

Good Friday,

Christmas day,

The birthday (or the day fixed by proclamation for the celebration of the birthday) of the reigning sovereign.

Any day appointed by proclamation for a public holiday, or for a general fast, or a general thanksgiving throughout the Dominion; and the day next following when these days respectively fall on Sunday.

And in the Province of Quebec the same days shall be observed as legal holidays, with the addition of—

The Epiphany,

The Annunciation.

The Ascension.

Corpus Christi.

St. Peter and St. Paul's Days.

All Saints Day.

Conception Day.

2. And in any of the said Provinces of the Dominion any day appointed by proclamation of the Lieutenant Governor of such Province for a public holiday or for a fast or thanksgiving within the same.

3. And with regard to bills of exchange and promissory notes, whenever the last day of grace falls on a legal holiday or non-judicial day, in the Province where any such bill or note is payable, then the next day following not being a legal holiday or non-judicial day in such Province shall be the last day of grace to such bill or note.

4. All provisions of any Act or laws, or portions of Acts of laws heretofore in force in any of the said Provinces of the Dominion, inconsistent with the provisions of this section, are hereby repealed.

This Act shall apply to the Provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick.

*An Act Relating to Bills of Exchange and Promissory Notes.*—

Whereas doubts exist as to the time of the maturity of a Bill of Exchange or Promissory Note payable at a month or months after date, and it is desirable to set such doubts at rest: Therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, declares and exacts as follows:

1. Every Bill of Exchange or Promissory note which is made payable at a month or months from and after the date thereof, becomes due and payable on the same numbered day of the month in which it is made payable as the day on which it is dated, unless there is no such day in the month on which it is made payable, and in such cases it becomes due and payable on the last day of the month, with the addition in all cases of the days of grace allowed by law.

**SOME ARTISTS' BLUNDERS.**—Tintoretto, an Italian painter, in a picture of the children of Israel gathering manna, has taken the precaution to arm them with the modern invention of guns. Cigoli painted the aged Simeon at the circumcision of the infant Saviour; and, as aged men in these days wear spectacles, the artist has shown his sagacity by placing them on Simeon's nose. In a picture by Verrio of Christ healing the sick, the lookers-on are represented standing with periwigs on their heads. To match, or rather to exceed this ludicrous representation, Durer has painted the expulsion of Adam and Eve in the garden of Eden by an angel in a dress fashionably trimmed with flounces. The same painter, in his scene of Peter denying Christ, represents a Roman soldier very comfortably smoking a pipe of tobacco. A Dutch painter, in a picture of the wise men worshipping the Holy Child, has drawn one of them in a large white surplice and in boots and spurs, and he is in the act of presenting to the Child a model of a Dutch man-of-war. In a Dutch picture of Abraham offering up his son, instead of the patriarch's "stretching forth his hand and taking the knife," as the Scriptures inform us, he is represented as using a more effectual and modern instrument; he is holding to Isaac's head a *blunderbus*. Berlin represents in a picture the Virgin and Child listening to a violin; and in another picture he has drawn King David playing the harp at the marriage of Christ with St. Catherine. A French artist has drawn with French taste the Lord's Supper, with the table ornamented with tumblers filled with cigar-lighters; and, as if to crown the list of these absurd and ludicrous anachronisms, the Garden of Eden has been drawn with Adam and Eve in all their primeval simplicity and virtue, while near them, in full costume, is seen a hunter with a gun, shooting ducks.

**THE MUSTANG.**—The mustang, or native Californian horse, like the Indian, will soon be numbered among the things of the past. With all his defects, he has qualities and points of rare value, that should be preserved. He can thrive and subsist where the American or English bloods would starve; is fleet and as sure-footed as the mule, while his powers of endurance in the harness or under the saddle is unequalled. He is small of stature, but as symmetrical as the Arabian; wild by nature, and often vicious, but always spirited, and, with proper training and kind treatment, frequently exhibits all the affectionate sensibilities of the best breeds. It is no uncommon feat for him to carry a good rider one hundred miles a day, and it is claimed that many of them can go much further in that time. We have seen specimens that at the age of sixteen were as gay and as fiery as the best blooded five year old, and that would kill the most enduring of them on a short or long journey. As saddle horses they are preferred by all who know them best, as they are also for all light work. It has always seemed to us passing strange that no attempt has ever yet been made in California to preserve the admirable qualities of this ancient stock of horses in their purity. To permit them to ignobly perish, as now seems likely, would be as singular as unfortunate. Whoever undertakes and succeeds in bringing him to a higher perfection, or preserves his present merits, will carry a name and a fortune.—*Signal, Venture California.*

By the above it appears that if a mechanic or clerk, saves only 2 $\frac{1}{2}$  cents per day, from the time he is twenty-one, until he is three score and ten, the aggregate, with interest, will amount to \$2,900, and a daily saving of 27 $\frac{1}{2}$  cents reaches the important sum of \$29,000. A sixpence saved daily will provide a fund of nearly \$7,000—sufficient to purchase a good farm. There are few employees who cannot save daily, by abstaining from the use of cigars, tobacco, liquor, etc., twice or ten times the amount of the six cent piece. Every person should provide for old age, and the man in business who can lay by a dollar a day will eventually, find himself possessed of over \$100,000.

In the report of the Commissioners appointed to investigate the probable duration of the coal supply of Great Britain, it is stated that in view of possible expedients for reducing underground temperatures, a depth of four thousand feet can be fairly assumed as attainable in coal mining. This proposition has been received in some quarters with much doubt and disfavor; one reviewer going so far as to say that no engineer who had a reputation to lose would affix his name to a report which contemplated the economical working of British coal mines at a lower depth than twenty-seven hundred feet. The deepest colliery in England is some three hundred feet less than this. At four thousand feet, the temperature would be at least 122 degrees Fahrenheit.

The value of oil of turpentine as a remedy in cases of phosphorus poisoning is well established, but the manner in which it affects the system, to produce the desired end, does not seem to be clearly understood as yet. The workmen in a lucifer match factory at Stafford, England, are protected against the injurious action of the phosphorus by wearing a little open vial of oil of turpentine around the neck. A French physician, Dr. Andant, of Dax, treated a case where a man attempted to commit suicide by chewing about one hundred and twenty match heads, but unintentionally neutralized their effect by swallowing half an ounce of oil of turpentine, which he took in order to render death absolutely certain, and thereby saved his life.

Though the question whether consumption is or is not contagious has now been decided in the negative, Dr. C. J. B. Williams, a high authority, says, "Both reason and experience indicate that a noxious influence may pass from a person in advanced consumption to a healthy person, in close communication, and may produce the same disease;" a statement which at once suggests the query whether a similar proposition is not true in regard to many other non-contagious diseases.

The most ancient carvings on ivory are of far greater antiquity than is generally known—so old, indeed, that Sir John Lubbock ascribes them “to a time so remote that the reindeer was abundant in the south of France, and probably the mammoth had not entirely disappeared.” One of the finest collections of such carvings now in existence is that belonging to the South Kensington Museum, which has just been fully described in a handbook compiled for the purpose, wherein it is stated that the ancients are supposed to have been acquainted with the now lost art of softening and bending ivory. Partially decomposed ivory can be preserved from further decay by Professor Owen's plan of boiling it in a solution of gelatine; but no efficacious method of bleaching discolored ivory is yet known.

A German physiologist, who has been studying the action and effect of coffee upon the human system, attributes the popularity of that beverage to its enlivening action, rather than to the caffeine which it contains.

**RAILROAD SIGNALS.**—One whistle of the locomotive means “down brakes;” two whistles, “off brakes;” three whistles, “back up;” continued whistles, “danger;” a continued succession of short whistles is the cattle alarm. The conductor's signal, given by a sweeping parting of the hands on a level with the eyes, means “go ahead.” A downward motion of the hand, “stop.” A beckoning motion, “to back.” A lantern raised and lowered vertically, signals starting; swung at right angles or across the track, to stop; swung in a circle, to back. A red flag waved on the track is a signal of danger; hoisted at a station is a signal for stopping; stuck up by the roadside is a signal of danger on the track ahead; carried unfurled on an engine, is a signal that another engine is on its way.

**DISCOURAGING TO BEER DRINKERS.**—Genuine beer is as hard to find as pure ale or porter. Not only are malt and hop beers largely adulterated, but beers are made without malt or hops. Sugar, honey, molasses, and liquorice are used for malt; alum, opium, gentian, quassia, aloes, cocculus indicus, amara, tobacco, and nux, for hops; saltpetre, jalap, salt, maranta, green copperas, marble dust, oyster shells, egg shells, sulphate of lime, hartshorn, shavings, nut-galls, potash, soda, &c., to prevent souring. The beautiful cauliflower-head, often comes from green vitriol, alum, and salt. The smack of age and the tingle to the palate often comes from alum, and new beer is made old in a few hours by oil of vitriol. Take your ale, beer, and porter, if you will, but remember its strength of intoxicating qualities may be due to the deadly cocculus indicus, foxglove, henbane, multum, and nux-vomica, and the narcotic power to opium, tobacco, and grains of paradise. Smack your lips at the tingle of lime and pepper, and exult in the foam of copperas and lime. Is there not death in the beer mug?—*Dr. E. G. Dalton.*

Mr. Hind, the English astronomer, has recently calculated the time of the only solar eclipse visible at Jerusalem during the ministry of Christ. It is known as the eclipse of Phlegon, and occurred on November 24, A. D. 29. Eight-tenths of the sun's diameter were obscured.

How to HAVE A NEAT FARM.—To those who are desirous of giving a more orderly appearance to their premises, but who don't quite know what to take hold of first, *Hearth and Home* offers some helpful hints: Take a yoke of cattle, or a span of horses, and put them to a waggon or cart. Fasten a stone boat behind. On the stone boat put a crowbar, a pick, a hoe, a spade, an axe, a saw, a brush-hook or scythe, a hammer, nails, spikes, a few bolts of different sizes, a monkey-wrench, and such other tools as you will be likely to want, and drive along the side of every fence on the farm. If you come across a piece of board or a broken rail, throw it into the waggon. If you find a plow-point, a cultivator tooth, a broken reaper guard, a horse shoe, an oil can, or an old hoe, put it on the stone boat, and bring it home. Stones may be thrown on and drawn to some convenient place. If you come across any weeds, mow them down; if any brambles or brushes, cut them with a brush-hook or axe. If a board is loose on the fence, put a nail in it. If a gate sags, straighten it up. If there are any bolts in the gate, see that the nuts are tight. Take a man or a boy, or both, along with you. You will find plenty of work. If there is a plank bridge across a stream, see that the sleepers are not rotten. The hot sun has probably warped the planks, and they will need another spike or two. If there are any sticks or weeds in a ditch, remove them, and throw out any dirt that may have been trodden in from the sides by the cattle or hogs. In this way go over the whole farm. Then attend to the barn-yards. Pick up anything that may be lying around, and put it in its proper place. Boards that are of any use, should be placed in a pile by themselves, under cover. Those that are useless, should be sawn and split up into kindling, to be piled by itself in the wood-shed. If there are any loose stones in the yards, draw them off. Scrape up all the scattered manure or dirt, and place it in a compact heap, where it will ferment, or draw it at once to a grass land, and spread it. Go into the garden and see if there is any rubbish there that should be removed, or any sticks or pieces of boards or tools to pick up. Possibly you will find some old barrel staves or hoops about. Make kindling of them. If there is any old iron about the premises, it is a good time to dispose of it. It is worth one and a half cents per pound. Old implements, machines, tools, etc., that are worn out, and of no further use, had better be knocked to pieces and the iron sold. If there are any parts that may be useful in repairing, they should be preserved by themselves. This is true of the woodwork as well as of the castings. Almost everything, sooner or later, comes in useful on a farm. But unless you have abundance of room, it does not pay to lumber up the premises with useless implements and machines. Have all your bags mended; mark them and hang them up. Mark all the forks, rakes, hoes, spades, shovels, corn-cutters, etc. Rub them over with petroleum, and put them in their proper places. All harvest tools and machines should be painted with petroleum and stowed away. If you are short of room, much space may be saved by taking the wheels off the steel-toothed rake, and the poles and cutter-bars off the mower and reaper. Any one who has not tried it will be astonished how many implements and machines may be stowed away in a small space. When once things are in order, it is a comparatively easy matter to keep them in order.

## USEFUL RECEIPTS.

**TO EXTRACT OIL OR GREASE SPOTS FROM CARPETS.**—If oil is spilled on a carpet, put on plenty of white flour, and do it as soon as possible, to prevent the oil spreading. If the oil is near a seam, but does not reach it, rip the seam, in order to stop it. Put flour on the floor under the oil spot. The next day, brush up all the flour from the carpet and floor with a stiff brush, and repeat the putting on fresh flour. It will not need it the third time. To take out grease spots, rub them with a bit of white flannel dipped in spirits of turpentine. If they show again, repeat the process. It is well to put paper under the carpet, when grease spots are on the floor, as no scouring will remove them entirely.

**TO RENOVATE VELVET.**—Wet a clean sponge in warm soap suds, squeeze it very dry in a cloth, and wipe the velvet with it. Then pass the velvet over the edge of a hot flat iron, turned down sideways—the *wrong side* of the velvet next the iron.

**TO TAKE OUT FRUIT STAINS.**—Tie up cream tartar in the spotted places, and put the garment into cold water, and boil it. If the stains are much spread, stir cream tartar in this water. If still visible, boil the garment in a mixture of super carbonate of soda—a tablespoonful to a pail of water.

**TO CLEAN SILK, AND MAKE IT LIKE NEW.**—Put an old kid glove in a pint of cold water. Let it boil till the water is reduced to one half the quantity. Sponge the silk with this water on the right side, and iron it on the wrong side. This will make old silks or ribbons look like new.

**STARCH POLISH.**—Take one part white wax, and two parts spermaceti, melt and cast into cakes of about two-thirds of an ounce each. Directions for use—Put into a pint of starch a piece the size of a pea, and it will give a beautiful polish, and prevent the iron from sticking.

**TOOTH PASTE.**—Suds of castile soap and spirits camphor, of each an equal quantity, thicken with equal quantities pulverized chalk and charcoal, to a thick paste. Apply with the finger or brush.

**BEST HARNESS VARNISH EXTANT.**—Alcohol 1 gallon, white turpentine 1½ lbs., gum shellach 1½ lbs., Venice turpentine 1 gill. Let them stand by the stove until the gums are dissolved, then add sweet oil 1 gill, and color, if you wish it, with lamp black, 2 oz. This will not crack like the old varnish.

**GERMAN FLY PAPER.**—Take 2 ozs. dry starch in powder, add 1 oz. arsenic, and mix completely together; afterwards make them into a thin solution, with sweetened water, then mix sheets of common brown paper into the mixture, saturate completely, and hang up to dry.

**PASTE BLACKING.**—Oil of vitriol 2 parts, sweet oil 1 part, treacle 3 parts, ivory black 4 parts—mix.

**SOAP.**—Take 4 lbs. bar soap, 2 ozs. borax, ½ oz. sal. soda, 2 ozs. spirits turpentine, and 2 quarts boiling water. Cut the soap thin, and mix together all the ingredients, and when dissolved, put into moulds. The quantity, when prepared, will make four or five bars.

**SMALL POX REMEDY.**—The following remedy, tried in a case of confluent small-pox, where the doctors had little hope of saving the patient, saved the woman's life. Other cases were then tried, and every one was successful. The remedy is said to be equally sure in scarlet fever. It is given for what it is worth:—"I herewith append a receipt, which has been used, to my knowledge, in hundreds of cases. It will prevent or cure the small pox even though the pittings are filling. When Jenner discovered cow-pox in England, the world of science hurled an avalanche of fame upon his head; when the most scientific school of medicine in the world—that of Paris—published this panacea for the small-pox, it passed unheeded. It is unfailing as fate, and conquers in every instance. It is harmless when taken by a well person. It will also cure scarlet fever. Here it is as I have used it to cure small-pox: Sulphate of zinc, one grain; foxglove (*digitalis*), one grain; half a teaspoonful of water; when thoroughly mixed, add four ounces of water. Take a spoonful every hour. Either disease will disappear in twelve hours. For a child, smaller doses, according to age.

**COUGH SYRUP.**—Mix one quart hoarhound with one quart water, and boil it down to a pint, add two or three sticks of licorice, and a table-spoonful of essence of lemon. Take a teaspoonful three times a day, or as often as the cough may be troublesome.

**RHEUMATIC LINIMENT.**—Take oil of linseed, oil of cedar, and oil of amber, of each 1 oz., gum camphor  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz.; dissolve in  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz. sweet oil by rubbing in a mortar, first adding to the camphor a few drops of alcohol, so as to powder it; spirits of turpentine and laudanum, each  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz.; mix, and shake well. Rub the parts affected thoroughly.

**AN EXCELLENT WARM PLASTER.**—To  $\frac{1}{4}$  lb. of Burgundy pitch add 1 oz. of beeswax and 1 oz. of white rosin, melt that together, then add about one twelfth the quantity of blister plaster, which must be well mixed together, and spread either on buff leather or strong linen; good strong fleece cotton is almost the best to spread it on.

**PURE VEGETABLE SALVE.**—1 lb. lard,  $\frac{1}{2}$  lb. rosin, and 10 oz. elder bark—boil these over a slow fire half an hour, then strain and put up in small boxes.

**CURE FOR DYSENTERY.**—Take new churned butter, before it is washed or salted, clarify over the fire, and skim off the milky particles; add  $\frac{3}{4}$  brandy to preserve it, and loaf sugar to sweeten; let the patient (if an adult) take two table-spoonful twice a day.

**WELFORD'S DROPS OF LIFE FOR FLUX.**—Gum opium, 1 oz.; gum kino, 1 dr.; gum camphor, 30 grs.; powdered nutmegs,  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz.; French brandy, Jamaica spirit, 1 pt.; color with cochineal or saffron. Before taking, cleanse the bowels with castor oil. For a grown person, 20 to 40 drops, three or four times a day. For children, 4 to 6 drops; administer in a little mint tea, in which is mixed as much prepared chalk as will lie on the point of a teaspoon. This is the best known cure for dysentery.

**WHOOPING COUGH SYRUP.**—Best rum, 1 pt.; anise oil, 2 ozs.; honey, 1 pt.; lemon juice, 4 ozs.; mix. Dose for adults, 1 table-spoonful three or four times a day; for children, one teaspoonful, with sugar and water.

**TO DRY SALT BEEF AND PORK.**—Lay the meat in a tub with a double bottom, that the brine may drain off as fast as it forms; rub the salt in, and be careful to apply it to every niche; afterwards put it in the above utensils, when it must be frequently turned; and after the brine has ceased running, it must be buried in salt, and kept closely packed. Meat which has the bones taken out is the best for salting. In some places the salted meat is pressed by heavy weights, or a screw, to extract the moisture sooner.

**VERMICELLI PUDDING.**—Take a teacupful of vermicelli, boil it in a pint of milk, and stir it until it is well blended; then pour it into a basin to cool. Now add three eggs, a large teaspoonful of marmalade, and sugar to taste. Beat the whole together gently, and pour it into a mould in which raisins have been placed in all its indentures. Tie the mould over, boil one hour, and serve with sherry sauce.

**ICING TARTS.**—Beat the white of an egg till stiff, and when your tart is half baked, take it from the oven, brush it over with the egg, and sift white sugar (not very fine) thickly over it as you put it again into the oven to complete the baking process.

**SWEET GREEN TOMATO PICKLE.**—Peel and slice two gallons of green tomatoes, and add five tablespoonfuls of powdered mustard, half a pint of mustard seed, one tablespoonful of ground cinnamon, one tablespoonful of cloves, two pounds of brown sugar, and three quarts of vinegar. Boil all together until quite done. Celery tops improve the flavor.

**TO SALT HAM.**—For three hams pound and mix together half a peck of salt, half an ounce of salprunella, one and a half ounces of saltpetre, and four pounds of coarse salt; rub the hams well with this, and lay what is to spare over them; let them lie three days; then hang them up. Take the pickle in which the hams were, put water enough to cover the hams, with more common salt till it will bear an egg, then boil and skim it well, put it into the salting tub, and the next morning put it to the hams; keep them down the same as pickled pork; in a fortnight take them out of the liquor, rub them well with brine, and hang them up to dry.

**GINGER SNAPS.**—One cup of butter, two cups of molasses, a tablespoonful of soda, tablespoonful of ginger. Stir in flour until the dough can be rolled out thin. Bake in a hot oven.

**POP OVERS.**—Four cups of flour, four eggs, four cups of milk, piece of butter size of two nutmegs, half a teaspoonful of salt, melt the butter.

**BEAN SOUP.**—Wash the beans, and boil them with salt pork. When soft, take them out, and pass through the colander. Then put them back in the same water they were boiled in, with four hard boiled eggs, cut in quarters, and a lemon sliced, and a little pepper if you like it. Boil again, and serve.

**URBAN-OF-TARTAR CAKE.**—To one pound and a half of flour, take two ounces of butter; rub it well into the flour. Add one teaspoon of soda, one teaspoon cream of tartar, one quart sweet milk, and sugar. Bake in a quick oven.

**CORN MEAL BREAD.**—Take two quarts of corn meal, with about a pint of (thin) bread sponge, and water enough to wet it.

**ANIMALS AFFLICTED WITH "DROPPING THE CUD."**—The milk will undoubtedly suffer unless immediate treatment is adopted. To regulate the bowels take epsom salts, 12 ozs. ; gentian, 1 oz. ; ginger, 1 oz. ; carbonate of soda, 1 oz. Mix, and administer in a quart of warm milk. The food should be carefully selected, and consist of sound roots, green food or hay, with an admixture of oil cake, corn, bran, &c., and a powder of the following ingredients, given each morning in the provender: Carbonate of soda, 4 drs. ; ground coriander seed, 3 drs. Mix, and administer for at least six days, after the recipe is given.

**FOR STRAINS AND SWELLINGS.**—Strong vinegar saturated with common salt, used warm, is good for strains and reducing swellings. 1 oz. of white vitriol ; 1 oz. of green copperas ; 2 teaspoonfuls of gunpowder, all pulverized together, and dissolved in 1 quart of soft water, and used cold, rubbing in thoroughly, is one of the best applications known for reducing swellings.

**KICKING COWS.**—A few years ago I had considerable experience with kicking cows, and by far the best remedy out of quite a number that I tried, was the strap or surcingle drawn tightly around the cow just in front of the hips, and close to the bag. Tighten up till she does not attempt to kick. I never knew it to fail ; you can gradually loosen it until it will be sufficient simply to lay it on her back. But be cautious and do not loosen or leave it off until she makes no effort to kick with it tight or on. Kick she cannot with the strap tight. The first cow I tried it on was the worst I ever saw. With both hind legs tied together, she would kick backwards like a horse ; then, in addition, one foreleg was tied up, and she would stand on the other and kick with both hind ones, as soon as an attempt was made to milk her, until she tumbled down ; then would get up and kick again until tired out ; so the milk was generally left on the stable floor, and it was decided to dry her up and beef her as soon as possible, though an extra cow. Hearing of the surcingle remedy, I tried it, and effected a cure.

**HOW TO TELL THE AGE OF A HORSE.**—Every horse has six teeth above and below ; before three years old he sheds his middle teeth ; at three he sheds one more on each side of the central teeth ; at four he sheds the two corner and last of the fore-teeth. Between four and five the horse cuts the under tusks ; at five will cut his upper tusks, at which time his mouth will be complete. At six years the grooves and hollows begin to fill up a little ; at seven the grooves will be well-nigh filled up, except the corner teeth, leaving little brown spots where the dark-brown hollows formerly were. At eight the whole of the hollows and grooves are filled up. At nine there is very often seen a small bill to the outside corner teeth ; the point of the tusk is worn off, and the part that was concave begins to fill up and become rounding ; the squares of the central teeth begin to disappear, and the gums leave them small and narrow at the top.

It has been ascertained that a working horse requires a trifle over three pounds of hay, or its equivalent, per day, to each one hundred pounds of its live weight ; oxen, 2½ pounds ; cows, in milk, from 2½ to 2½ pounds ; farrow cows, nearly 2½ pounds ; young growing cattle, 3 pounds ; sheep, 2 pounds. Fifty-six pounds of corn meal are equal to one hundred pounds of good hay.

**TO TOUGHEN HOOFES.**—Wash them frequently in strong brine, and turn brine upon the bottoms, and soak a few minutes each time.

**SCRATCHES.**—Cut off the hair close, and wash the legs in strong soapsuds or brine, or wash with warm vinegar saturated with salt, and afterwards dress over with a small quantity of hog's lard.

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
