Plumbers Divided \$20,000 Supply Houses "Tied Up"

And There Are Other Startling Facts—\$7500 Is Mysteriously Missing—Local Supply Houses Control U.S. Competition Here.

That one-time popular song, "How would you like to be the iceman?" has become a chestnut. The gay and festive plumber, since he came under Mr. Curry's cross, makes the iceman look like a chunk of his own goods.

The investigation into the ways that were dark, as practiced by the Plumbers' Association, was continued yesterday with Crown Attorney Curry as the lone fisherman and Secretary Meredith as the star witness.

The association has divided nearly \$20,000 amongst its members during the past two years. This is in addition to the regular profits they received on work done by them.

That \$7500 which was in the Ontario Bank and transferred to the Bank of Montreal, had disappeared mysteriously. That the master plumbers were not only organized through Canada, but that the Toronto association was affiliated with the master plumbers in the United States, thus shutting out legitimate competition.

When Secretary Meredith went into the witness stand, Mr. Curry submitted a schedule of prices taken from the minute book of the association in Bath, closed and single, cold water only, \$38; hot water, \$38; bath, basin, closet and sink, hot and cold water, \$40.

CANADIAN LIFE INSURANCE AGAIN

The "Natural Premium" in the Old Line Companies is increased from year to year. The "Level Premium" never changes. The latter is so adjusted as to be more than adequate at first, in order that the excess accumulated during the earlier years, improved at compound interest, will be sufficient to make up for subsequent deficiencies in other words, that he may not pay less than is sufficient when he is old. These level premium rates for the net premium for all ages, based on a 4 per cent, 5 per cent, and 6 per cent, have been gathered into tables, have been printed in book form, and are the familiar tools of the life companies and are quite accessible to the general reader.

THE NET COST OF INSURANCE.

The fundamental fact in considering the principles and methods of life insurance is this: The net cost of insurance can be and has been accurately determined. There is no rule of thumb about it. As the manufacturer knows the net cost of the goods he sells, so does the life company know the net cost of its goods.

For example, the net level premium and reserve (Actuarial) Table of Mortality for \$1000 insurance, ordinary life, at the various ages are:

Age	4 p.c.	5 p.c.	6 p.c.
20	\$12.95	\$13.20	\$13.45
30	15.87	16.25	16.63
40	23.68	24.65	25.62
50	35.78	36.67	37.56

It does not require much mathematical skill for the policyholder to see how even the matter of half per cent, would make a big difference to him in the years, or even longer. The lower the company fixes the rate, the bigger the premium, but of this, more when we come to consider the matter of "Reserve".

SPOT WHERE POLICYHOLDERS ARE PINCHED.

And just here it ought to be most carefully noted that while the premiums for the net cost of insurance are set in the three columns of the above table are based on the British Actuaries' tables, according to which most of our Canadian companies are doing business, the "Hunter" tables, prepared by Dr. J. Howard Hunter, superintendent of Insurance in the Province of Ontario, for the guidance of the assessors of the Friendly Society, give much lower rates for level premiums, net cost. Having explained what is meant by the "Net Level Premium" the net cost of insurance—we come now to the only kind of premium, the "loading" policyholder is likely to hear much of. The "gross" or "office" or ratebook premium—the rate at which the salesman, i.e., the agent, sells the goods, i.e., the insurance of the company, i.e., the premium. The agent is not allowed to invoice his goods below the market price. He may "re-bate," that is, he may pay the agent, or a part thereof, but the company puts its price upon the goods.

To determine this "gross" premium the companies add to the net level premium a percentage of itself technically called the "loading" for expense of management, contingencies, losses, etc. This "loading" runs anywhere from 20 per cent to 30 per cent, according to the kind of policy. Another spot of which Jesurun waxes fat and the policyholder grows lean.

But this is only one of the many places where the Actuaries and the companies get in their fine work, and we shall show later on. The "loading" (isn't it a funny word?) doesn't remind you of the "flat-topped" which the insured men's shoulders are given to be borne by whom the lineal descendants, the profane would say, are Messrs. McCall, McCurdy, Hyde and Co.—the loading is usually made as heavy as the policyholder can be made to stand, and the fierceness of the competition among the companies will permit.

THE INSURANCE COMBINE.

In Canada there is no operating "combine" in life insurance, in which about a dozen companies, headed by the Canadian Life, sell insurance at a uniform rate. The rate of the combine after the loading has been put on, is: Age 20, \$19.40; age 30, \$24.25; age 40, \$32.60; age 50, \$47.05; the actual premiums on a whole life policy for \$1000 "participating" which the most part-combined to sell. It must not be perfectly clear that insurance CAN BE SOLD FOR VERY MUCH LESS THAN THE GROSS PREMIUMS NOW CHARGED and the companies still make money.

GETTING ON THE GROUND FLOOR.

Incidentally, the policyholder can also see how a company in competition with another company or agent may "cut the rate" to the quick, that is to say, the net premium, may take in a friend or a firm on the "ground floor" and give him his insurance at manufacturer's or "wholesale" prices, without absolute loss to the company, while, for the most part, the policyholder has no idea of the game. In such cases the agent—being the one who is sacrificed by the company, but the greedy company does not care. This is only one of the tricks of the trade. But this, by the way.

WHAT POLICYHOLDERS SHOULD DO?

We have dealt thus minutely with the theory of life insurance, and its general principles, in order that the policyholders may understand the why and wherefore of their contracts, and in the discussion of the revision of the Insurance Act to be made at the next session of the Dominion Parliament. It is in a position intelligently to look after their own interests, and while there is undoubtedly a large mutual interest between the company and the policyholder, it may be put down as an incontrovertible fact that the company will in insurance as well as in other branches of trade and commerce—for life insurance is trade and commerce—and policyholders must learn to stand up against them, and they must do it intelligently by learning first the foundation principles of the business.

THE MAKING OF SLEUTHS

THERE'S METHOD IN IT
How Detectives Are Taught to Specialize in Catching Criminals.

Justice has become a pupil of crime. The one is giving lessons to the other every day. The latest may be called "how to specialize."

The law is attentive because the ways of thieves, more often than not, are the roads to retribution. And so Scotland Yard delves to walk them.

There are detectives for every class of crime—men who study one branch, and only one. Results are gratifying. Justice, worked on a modern business basis, is one of the big successes of the century.

When a policeman casts his uniform and becomes a detective, it is a thousand to one on him exhibiting at once a peculiar proficiency in dealing with a particular crime. His superiors are not slow to notice this and very soon he is a specialist.

Murder, forgery, coling, embezzlement, pocket picking, housebreaking—whatever he is chosen subject he must study it well. He must read about it all he can, and in every way possible become conversant with the ways of men who study it from another point of view, as a writer in London answers.

To this end there are thousands of books, records, newspapers, cuttings and the like, always on hand to which detectives may refer. There are treatises at the "Yard" on almost every crime in the calendar, careers of criminals, descriptions of the methods they employ, together with lists of their peculiarities, habits and a hundred other things.

For this "specializing" is no child's play. Nor has the word been invented to terrify offenders. The police have works upon it. They are called "crime classics." Unlike others of the classic ilk, they do not bear the stamp of triumphant age. It is true, but they give hints that a writer's most inspiring dream never conjured up for him.

Several men at the famous headquarters of London detectives have actually devoted years to watching one man. One criminal, one detective, cost only the fact of his crime. But the records. You will see how the fingers have been foiled, burglars thwarted, thieves tripped up at the critical moment, all through specializing.

Opportunities are given the majority of detectives employed at Scotland Yard now go to the rounds of the metropolitan police courts in order to study the characters of some of the prisoners who make their appearance on minor charges, and not only so, but try to discover those in court with whom the prisoners have acquaintance.

In the great majority of cases heard at the police courts the prisoners may be observed, upon making their appearance in the dock, to glance round the court in order to ascertain whether they have any friends present. Detectives are keen to detect the slightest sign of recognition and, if any takes place, they keep a careful watch over the friends, finding out where they live, how they employ their time and whether they are already known to the police.

This form of specializing has resulted in many well-known criminal gangs being broken up. The real detective is born, and as talent flourishes among the rich and poor, it is not surprising to learn that in the ranks of detective specialists are men who began life in the gutter. They can go straight to haunts of crime because they came from there. And what matters it if the years unable to pass the exam?

But another type is needed. There is the man from Oxford or Cambridge—the linguist, the mathematician, the scientist. And when such men as these decide to check their knowledge on the mysteries of crime can you wonder at the results? High-browed men of intellect they are, but they can pass crime like a mariner does the sea, and read guilt or innocence in the eyes of evildoers. They meet the most polished and graceful ambassador at St. James' or peep thru a cranny in Soho at the pale, at-on-stamped countenances round the gaming tables.

You will find them everywhere.

COURSE OF SPECIAL LECTURES.

University Proposes to Help Those Whose Time is Limited.

In pursuance of the policy announced last session, of making it possible for persons who are unable to attend the regular instruction in the general course at the University of Toronto, and are yet desirous of taking some work leading towards a degree in arts, it has been decided to offer during the present academic year, instruction in the subjects of the first year, for which a sufficient number of persons may make application.

The subjects for which provision is being made and the members of the staff who have agreed to take part in this work are Latin, Profs. Fletcher and Miner; English, Prof. Alexander and W. F. Allison; French, Prof. Squair and Mr. Hough; German, Profs. Hartig and Lang; mathematics, Profs. Mackenzie and Fielder; physics, Profs. W. F. Loudon and McLellan.

It is proposed that each course shall involve two hours per week, to be arranged at such times as will suit the majority of the applicants. The following extract from the Calendar shows the scale of fees adopted:

Tuition Fees.—For a course in any one subject, \$10; for a course in any two subjects, each \$9; for a course in three or four subjects, each \$9; for a full course in five or more subjects, prescribed for any one year, \$40.

Examination fees.—For examination in any one or two subjects, each \$4; for examination in any three or four subjects, each \$5; for examination in five or more subjects, prescribed for any year, \$14.

THIEVES AT UNION STATION.

Several Cases of Robbery—Employees and Travelers Suffer.

In the past few days systematic robberies have been carried on at the Union Station. The thieves seem to have more than their usual amount of nerve. In the early part of the week a number of suitcases belonging to the Children's Aid Society were robbed and on Tuesday night about 11 o'clock thieves entered the engine-room at the station, rifled the lockers containing the clothes of the nightmen and took about \$200 from the pockets.

One of the men employed in the engine-room noticed a man go to the lockers and make a systematic search of the contents. However, he supposed that the man worked at the station and thought nothing further of the matter.

Another loss that may be attributed to the thieves came to light yesterday. A number of immigrants were coming by the G.T.R. from Montreal and as the train stopped at Cornwall three or four of them got off to buy some food.

Seemingly they did not understand when the train was to leave and got left behind. All of them left handbags and overcoats in the seats and when they arrived in Toronto yesterday by a later train, nothing could be ascertained about their belongings, although a systematic search was prosecuted. The missing articles were about all they possessed in the way of clothes.

TAX TELEPHONE COMPANY FOR USE OF THE STREETS

Mayor Duggan Has a Good Idea—Bricklayers Have Complaint—Street Railway Legislation.

The mayor has an idea to be used in the city's streets with the Bell Telephone Co. He presented the following motion to the board of control yesterday:

Before the board of control there appeared yesterday a deputation from the union made up of James Lizzadro, president; Harry Fussell, George Oliver, George Hill, John Murphy, Albert Steinhilber, and John Vuch, members. Many of them householders, and that work would be taken out of their hands, and that they were being forced to pay for the use of the streets for concrete at \$1.25 per day and the use of \$100.00 per day. Controller Hubbard suggested that Mr. Rust get an expert opinion on the matter, and that the bill would be a nuisance to residents.

NO FIRE STATION THERE.

Another fire station will be found for a fire station, to serve the Avenue-Road district. The chief selection of a site on Madison-avenue, at a point about equally distant from the College-street, Osgeston-avenue and Berkeley-avenue residents yesterday and the board gave way to pressure.
