A slight skirmish has occurred near Hangu, from which point a small column of British troops has been sent to the districts of Atangui, Nawimela and Turi.

LUTBERT MURDER TRIAL.
Did This Man Kill His Wife and Dissolve the Body?
SENSATIONAL TALES TOLD.
Mrs. Christine Feldt Gives Startling Evidence for the People.

It was supposed that she was a witness for the defence, but she turns up as a witness for the prosecution—Lutbert says he can disprove the arguments of the Chicago Police—but can he do it?
Chicago, Ill., Sept. 4.—Curiosity seekers who attempted to gain admission to-day to Judge Tutbill's court, where the Lutbert murder trial is being held, found themselves intercepted at the entrance to the Criminal Court building on Michigan-street. Hundreds were turned away, and the crowd in the court room was kept within bounds successfully.

There was a sensation when Mrs. Christine Feldt of 151 Cylburn-avenue was called as a witness for the State. Mrs. Feldt is the widow whose name has been so often mentioned in connection with the case. Her testimony, as reported in The Globe, that only four hundred people could be drummed together in the banner County of York to hear the Premier, a smaller number than that had greeted him on any occasion but one.

Lutbert, over and over again, assured his correspondent that he would overcome the police and be with her again a free man. Mrs. Feldt testified that Lutbert told her months ago that he cared more for Mary Simon than he did for his wife. She said she visited his house May 5th, and asked Mary Simon where her husband was. Lutbert said he was in the jail. Lutbert said he would be back soon.

What a Little Girl Saw.
Little Gottlieb Schimpke, 14 years old, testified that on the night of Sept. 1st, shortly after 11 o'clock, she saw Lutbert and his wife walk around the corner of the factory in the rear of her house. This evidence sustains the theory of the State that Lutbert took his wife into the factory to the witness stand in the absence of the watchman, whom he had sent to the drug store.

On cross-examination she said it was her sister who saw Mr. Lutbert that night and told her about it. The letters of Lutbert to Mrs. Feldt were not read to the jury, but this will be done Tuesday morning. Monday being a legal holiday there will be no session of the court. States Attorney Denoon has a sensation for the defence in the Lutbert trial next week which he believes, clinch the fate of the accused. It is nothing less than the possession of a skull, a number of teeth and the first tooth of what is believed to be the left index finger of a human hand, which it is claimed were found in the basement of the sausage factory. It is believed by the attorneys for the State that they will be convincing when introduced as evidence with the expert testimony of Professors Defontaine and Haines that they are human. These two experts, as a result of experiments recently conducted, will, it is said, state positively that it is possible under the circumstances under which it is alleged by the State that Lutbert would destroy and disintegrate a human body.
