DOWIE'S LACE MAKERS BARRED.

A joint meeting of the Committee on Works, Reception and Legislation was held yesterday afternoon to consider Ald. Lamb's radial railway scheme. Ald. Lamb

They were also furnished with a map showing the proposed routes of the railway within the city boundaries, the terminal being the St. Lawrence Market.

Ald. Lamb intimated on the strength of private correspondence received by him that there would be no difficulty in securing a company to undertake the work.

Ald. Urquhart asked why the city did not get the charter itself, and either seli it or offer it for a term of years. If the franchise was valuable for a company, it would be valuable for the city of Toronto.

Ald. Lamb said he thought the enterprise should be in the hands of a strong, determined company. The city, if it secured the charter, might have to make surveys, define routes and go to a large expense. The interests of the city would be amply safeguarded in any contract that might be made with a company.

Ald. Hubbard thought that outside municipalities were sceptical about this scheme, because of the opposition of the alderment to allowing the Metropolitian road entrance to the city. He thought it would be better to find out in the first place the exact position of the Toronto Street Railway on the matter.




