



Le Soleil does not know that these persons hissed because Sir Wilfrid is a nch-Canadian. If there were any who did so, let Le Soleil condemn them. Is there any reason why their conduct should cause a quarrel between four million English-speaking people and a million and a half of French-Cana-

dians? At the same meeting, Lord Dundonald's friendly references to French-Canadians were received with thunders of applause. Suppose we called upon the Province
