

Synopsis of Chapters Printed.

In the first instalment of his thrilling story "The Conquest of the Pole," printed in The World of Wednesday, Dr. Frederick A. Cook told of the start from Gloucester on the "Bradley," of the voyage to the polar seas, and of the overhauling en route of the equipment needed for the dash to the Pole. In a graphic manner, the discoverer wrote a story of Eskimo life that never has been excelled for human interest. He told of the home life, the tragedy and comedy that mingle in the dreary existence of the dwellers in the Arctic, and of the child-like eagerness of the natives to trade their valuable furs and ivories for the simplest things of civilization. The yacht, her owner, John R. Bradley, the explorer and his party were pictured in their preliminary work for the final dash. Finally, after describing the various places visited in Greenland in search of guides and information as to conditions further north, Dr. Cook wrote of the trip across Inglefield Gulf, past Cape Auckland, and on toward Cape Robertson. Here the discoverer closed the first part of his narrative, with Etah and Annotook, the last points of call, looming in the icy distance.

In the second instalment, Dr. Cook describes the voyage to Etah and then on to Annotook, the place of plenty, which he selected as the base for his dash to the pole.

The explorer in the third instalment, published yesterday, describes the work of preparing his winter quarters, closing with a graphic description of a narwhal hunt.

FOURTH INSTALMENT.

Storms now came up with such force and frequency that it was not safe to venture out in kayaks. A few walruses were captured from boats, then sea hunting was confined to the quest of seals thru the young ice. A similar quest was being followed at every village from Annotook to Cape York. But all sea activity would now soon be limited to a few open spaces near prominent headlands.

The scene of the real hunt changed from the sea to the land. We had as yet no caribou meat. The little auks, gathered in nets during the summer, and eider duck, bagged later, disappeared fast when used as steady diet. We must procure hare, ptarmigan and reindeer, for we had not yet learned to eat with a relish the fishy, liverlike substance which is characteristic of all marine animals.

Guns and ammunition were distributed, and when the winds were easy enough to allow one to venture out every man sought the neighboring hills. Francke also took his exercise with a gun on his shoulder. The combined results gave a long line of ptarmigan, two reindeer and sixteen hares.

As snow covered the upper slopes the game was forced down near the sea, where we could still hope to hunt in the feeble light of the early part of the night.

NO ANXIETY FOR WINTER.

With a larder fairly stocked, and good prospects for other tasty meats, we were spared the usual anxiety of a winter without winter supplies, and Francke was just the man to use this game to good effect. for he had a way of preparing our primitive provisions that made our dinners seem quite equal to a Holland House spread.

In the middle of October, fox skins were prime, and then new steel traps were distributed and set near the many caches. By this time, the Eskimos had all abandoned their sealskin tents and were snugly settled in their winter igloos. The ground was covered with snow and the sea was nearly frozen over everywhere.

Everybody was busy preparing for the coming cold and night. The temperature was about 20 degrees below zero. Severe storms were becoming less frequent and the air, tho colder, was less humid and ess disagreeable. An ice fort was formed and the winter sledging was begun by short excursions to bait the fox traps and gather the

All these pursuits with the work of building and repairing sleds. making dog harness and shaping new winter clothing ,kept up a lively interest, while the great crust, which was to hold down the unruly deep for so many months, thickened and closed.

During the last days of brief sunshine the weather cleared, and at noon on October 24 everybody sought the freedom of the open for a last glimpse of the dying day.



Applications of this kind intended to benefit the masses are promptly denounced as paternalism, a "only these measures are denounced as paternalism that promise to protect the many against the few, the weak against the strong." But the time is coming when the masses, who only need to realize their power, will insist that a democratic government live up to its profession. Governments then will make the public interest their only guide and the day of the franchise exploiter will be over.

Professor Brooks in his "Social Unrest" has some pertinent observations with the prevailing colors in Wall on the situation as it has developed in Papers. the United States. He says:

Our magnates of industry have not preached paternalism, but, in season and out of season, they have practiced it. They have practiced it so long and so openly, and with such conspicuous profit to mselves, that it is grotesque drollery for them to cry out against paternal legislation. They have not merely looked to the government to assist their enterprises, they have taken possession of it. Hat in hand, they have begged with such importunity that lawmaking power, federal, state and municipal, seems to have been looked upon as a private preserve. Yet those who discovered paternalism and reduced it to a political art and method never fail to raise the alarm when the humbler classes ask legislative aid of city or state. No lackey was ever more subservient to his master than Pennsylrania to its railroads, or than the State of California to the Southern

Pacific. These corporations have owned the states, as landlords in England owned the rotten boroughs before the reform. 

LORD ROSEBERY'S CRITICISM OF THE ASQUITH BUDGET STYLES IT AN ATTACK ON PROPERTY AND LIBERTY

A Measure Prepared Without a Mandate from the People -Ex-Prime Minister Declares Landowners Will Be Forced Out or Seriously Crippled By the Taxes Announced.

The following is a continuation of the notable address of Lord Rosebery at Glasgow on Sept. 10, in which the one-time prime minister and former Liberal leader separated from his party on the budget issue.

The opening portion of the address The opening portion of the address was given in yesterday's World. The it Lord Rosebery declared that the government has no mandate from the people for this budget, from the people for this budget, which he said indicates "a new Liberalism, and not the Liberalism I have known and practised." In the "long and almost haphazard catalog of impositions," there was a multitude of taxes which seemed designed for no other object ex-cept to cause a feeling of universal insecurity. The principle seemed to be to take as much and harass as much as possible. The land tax, tho small, was like a dumdum bullet which expanded when it got into the victim's body and killed. By the special taxation, the state guarantee on all forms of property was grievously imperilled. "Depend upon it," he warned, "that the unearned increment for land, once accepted, will soon spread to all securities." He then continued:

I think I have shown enough contagious character of this tax. The landowner may say: "To-day it is my turn; to-morrow it may be yours," but I want to say a few words about land itself, because that is a special point. I have no special affection for land as a property, but a sentimental affection. I like the land which has been transmitted to me, and I do not wish to part with it; but I have always found it a very harassing and unremunerative form of property. I do not think the land system is perfect. I would gladly see more people settled on the land, and parliament has shown ample zeal in assisting the government to settle more people on the land. I would even go further, and I should be glad to see the govon the land. 



Crop Rotation. Crop rotation is of utmost importance in dealing with the perennial sow thistle and other weeds of like nature Some sharp, short rotation of crops should be adopted, which will allow of the frequent use of the cultivator, the cutting of the flowers before seeding, and the introduction of a smother crop or hoed crop. One cannot recommen a system of cropping which will be suitable in all kinds of farming. Each farmer must select the rotation which


