Even the most reaction-ary of the czar's advisers were forced to admit that it would be impossible to carry on a war, which to be suc-cessful must be protracted, with the country in a condition of turmoil and dispontent.

Told to Snatch a Victory.

Hence imperative instructions were sent to Geu. Kuropatkin to attempt to snatch a victory in a general or partial engagement at any cost. The object was not to calm public opinion, for it recognized that a single success will not suffice for such purposes, but it would avail as a pretext for turning a favorable ear to a suggestion from France that the Asiatic province was not worth the further sacrifice of valuable lives. Gen. Kuropatkin's effort failed. France therefore, feels herself debarred from making any move until her ally comes to some fresh decision.

FIRE FIGHTERS AGITATED

Scheme to Put Things on Sound Basis Not Generally Popular, But What's to Be Done ?

uiscussions have been prevalent during the past iew days. Many of the younger men are differly opposed to the proposed plain, while among the great majority, especially, the men of long standing of the loce, the frend of oplinon is entirely the other way. The fund was started on Jan. 1, 1801, when the men paid 2 per cent. of their earnings into it. Two years ago, the percentage was increased to 9 per cent., but, as the men simultaneously received an increase of pay of 9 per cent., there was little or no opposition to the larger deduction for the fund.

Chief Thompson said last night: "Two rears ago 1 recommended an increase in safaries, which would give the men a minimum of \$500, and a maximum of \$800; but we only succeeded in obtaining the salaries at present paid. The men at that time scemed perfectly satisfied with the scale for which I asked. Under the schelule now proposed, they will receive more money, with the 10 per cent. deducted, han they would have received if my recommendation had gone thru.

"I do not believe the men can get any men increase as is now proposed, unless to shown that the money will be used argely to make provision for their own uture. The youngest man on the department might be disabled at any time, and would receive, in such a case, just as such as a man who had been a member for cars.

Difference in Pay.

"The pay of the men is generally below that given in cities of the United States, but it is higher than anywhere else in Canada. The men in cities across the line, however, are compelled to buy their own uniforms, rubber clothing and other requirements, but they do not have to pay into a benefit fund. In the various States there is legislation directing that a percentage of certain license fees shall be appropriated for firemen's benefit funds.

"The chief of the department in Montreal gets \$3000 a year, but the men are not as well paid as here. The Ottawa chief is on a graded salary, and will receive \$2500 next year. In Hamilton, the chief is paid \$3000, with a city of only about one-quarter of our population. Twelve years ago, Chief Ardagh received \$2500 per year, and the salary is now at the same figure, while the wages of the men have been increased from time to time.

"The effort that is now being made is every bit as much in the luterests of the young men as of the old. It is a movement entirely for their own good, and I can't see why they should object to it. So far as I am personally concerned, it is entirely immaterial what they do, but I am trying to do the very best I can for the men under my supervision."



lenry B. Gordon Finds in the Buildings of Japan, China and Korea Expression of National Character.

ell, architects, was the speaker at the anadian Institute on Saturday evening, his subject being an inte esting one, dealing with "Impressions Concern-ing Korea, North China and Japan," the architectural point of view. Mr. Gordon spent some time in those countries, where he ha dample opportunity to study the various forms of curious buildings peculiar to each. That he believes in the ability of the elstern craftsman is shown by the fact that in his offices is employed a Japanese architect, who, he says, is a capable exponent of the profession. While in China he also employed a Chillese draftsman.

Washington, D.C. Feb. 5 .-- A ne Washington, D.C. Feb. 5.—A new way for paying the drawback on wheat imported to be milled and then experted as flour, is provided in a bill introduced in the house yesterday by Mr. Lovering of Massachusetts.

For every bushel of wheat imported for milling, the miller shall deposit in bonded warehouse car or vessel the equivalent in flour. The flour so cerosited shall not be sold, except for export. The miller may, how ver, change his mind and receive back the flour so deposited, by paying the prescribed duty on the imported wheat.



Thru a mistaken idea of expected reciprocity, congress repealed the law which existed for our protection. We find that the re-enactment of this law is absolutely necessary to put us on an equality with our Canadian friends."

According to local opinion from those interested, the protest is reasonable. P. C. Larkin of the "Salada" Company, which does by far the largest trade with the United States, explained that while tea coming into Canada was nominally duty free yet it had the 10 per cent. restriction, which is placed on all imports from the United States, whereas Canadian dealers were at liberty to send their goods across the line without duty.

"Our government has been unjust in keeping that 10 per cent. duty against them." declared Mr. Larkin. "My argument is that a merchant should not need protection whatever justification there may be for granting it to the manufacturer. But if the dealer cannot import and sell to the consumer as cheaply as any other merchant, we have no excuse for being here because we serve no purpose unless we are prepared to cater to the consumer as cheaply as possible. The Canadian government should have taken that duty off years ago, and we would then have been in the same relation to the states been in the same relation to the states as they are to us. We have talked of reciprocity, and in this instance where the States are willing we do not meet them half way."

Mr. Larkin said he had on several occasions written to government officials at Ottawa relative to the matter, but without result. He did not think that the removal of the duty would affect the tea trade here.


