THE NERVOUS SYSTEM

Dr. Stewart Skinner Delivers an Excellent Lecture in Natural History Society Course.

Before the members of the Natural History Society, Dr. Stewart Skinner last evening delivered a most instructive lecture on The Nervous System. He first described the brain, spinal chord and the various nerves, the positions of which were exhibited in colored charts.

The many causes of nervousness were referred to and good advice given in its prevention, such as exercise in the open air, abstinence from alcoholic liquors, a moderate use of tea, coffee and tobaccothe latter to be used only by adults. It was claimed that girls should have the same exercise as boys and that indoor gymnastics were often far from as beneficial as they were supposed to be on account of the atmosphere doing more harm than the exercise did good.

'The practice of violent exercise, such as handling heavy weights, was condemned as unnecessary, one remark being that it was useless for a man to master the handling of a heavy sledge, unless his occupation called for sledge handling and that in the matter of exercise it was useless to waste strength on a sledge, when a tack hammer would do.

In conclusion the lecturer said that medicines had their place and power, but that it was the attention to such things as food, habits and exercise that would keep a person in good bodily health.

The lecture was most attentively listened to and at its close a hearty vote of thanks was extended to the lecturer by Dr. H. G. Addy, who presided.



Mr. Fielding Announces a Big Surplus for the Past Year But Expects the Revenue Will Decrease During Coming Year----Mr. Foster Scores the Government for Its Broken Pledges.

quite defensible. I think it would be a cause of surprise to many persons to know that after the lapse of ten and three-quarter years of the present administration there has been such a very small addition to the public debt. During that period we have carried on large operations. We have provided generously for the public service, although my honorable friends opposite would use a stronger word, they would say 'lavishly.' We have provided, for our capital and special expenditure. We have expended \$127.000.000, which forms what is called the capital and special account, and, notwithstanding all these liberal allowances for all the public services, notwithstanding the liberality with which all branches of the public services

Ottawa, March 17—The budget speech of Hon. Mr. Fielding, delivered in the Canadian parliament today, was concise. He spoke for an hour and a half, which is probably the shortest time ever occupied by a finance minister in presenting his financial statement.

He said that Canada stood the test of the financial stringency better than them all. Among the features of the budget may be mentioned a surplus for the nine months ending March 31 last, of more than \$16,000,000.

The public debt was reduced that year by \$3,000,000. Then there is a surplus of more than \$19,000,000 for the current fiscal year, which ends with this month, but the year's transactions will close by adding



Indications are that the opening of river navigation will not be behind last year's date. 
