Ordinary meetings of the Kirk Session are held on the first Saturday in each month at 4 p.m.

Meetings of the Board of Managers are held quarterly on the first Monday in the months of January, April, July and October, at 7.30 p.m.

Pew rents are payable to the Treasurer, quarterly in advance, at the Managers' Room, on the 21st day of March, June, September and December. Sittings not paid for within six weeks thereafter may be re-let by the Managers.

The Managers will be in their Room on the first Monday in each month, from 7.30 to 9 p.m., to attend to applications for sittings. Those who give up their sittings should notify the Managers, as sittings cannot be transferred to other parties except by the Managers. Sittings cost 75c., \$1, \$1.25 or \$1.50 per quarter, according to location.

Packages of envelopes will be furnished, on application to the Managers, to Members and Adherents of the Church who are willing to adopt the "Envelope System" of making their weekly offerings. The plan is the following: Each envelope bears a number corresponding to the number opposite to the contributor's name on the Treasurer's book. Each contributor undertakes to give a fixed amount weekly, and to make up the deficiency in case of absence on one or more Sundays.

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- 3. FRENCE and Teacher Assembly's French Car School at Pequired for

Missionary, Educational and Benevolent Funds.

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Contributions will be made on the third Sunday in each month during the current year, in special envelopes provided for the purpose, to the Missionary, Educational and Benevolent Funds of the Church. Contributors may, if they choose, indicate the special objects to which they wish their contributions applied. The amount not so designated will be distributed by the Kirk Session. The following are the chief objects for which contributions are asked:

I. Home Missions.—For the support of 650 Mission Stations in the needy districts of Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, the North West Territories, and British Columbia. The average attendance on the Lord's Day at public worship in these stations is 27,112. The people contribute for the support of ordinances amongst themselves, \$37,845. The amount required to aid them for the current year is \$36,000.

2. FOREIGN MISSIONS.—For the support of Missions in five fields. (1) Among the Indians in the North-West; (2) in Formosa; (3) in Central India; (4) in the New Hebrides; (5) in Trinidad. \$71,000 is needed this year.

3. French Evangelization.—Missionaries, Colporteurs and Teachers are employed, under the direction of the Assembly's Board, in spreading a pure gospel among the French Canadians. There is an admirably conducted School at Pointe aux Trembles. The estimated amount equired for the current year is \$40,000.

4. Colleges.—(1) There is a common fund for the support of Knox, Queen's and Montreal Theological Colleges. The amount required this year is \$14,200. (2) This Congregation is responsible for two scholarships—one of \$60 and the other of \$50—in Queen's University. (3) A grant is also made for the support of Manitoba College.

5. MINISTERS' WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.—For providing annuities for the widows and orphans of ministers who die in the service of the Church. Each minister contributes \$12 per annum to this Fund.

6. AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND.—Amount required, \$10,000. The maximum annuity hitherto granted is only \$220, and ought to be increased.

7. St. Mark's Mission.—One-half of the Missionary's stipend is paid by the Managers; the other half (\$400) is paid from the monthly contributions to Missions.

8. THE SUNDAY SCHOOLS.—The expenses of the St. Andrew's, St. Mark's and Dorset Sunday Schools are a charge on the Missions Fund. Amount required, say \$350.

The Fund for the Augmentation of Ministers' Stipends is not included in the above. A special collection will be made for this object towards the end of the year. The amount required for the current year, in order to secure to each minister in the Western Section of the Church a stipend of \$750 per annum, is \$30,000.

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A Word from the Minister.

take advantage of the issuing of the Annual Report to repeat one or two things which I have said from the pulpit, but which may strike ome of you more forcibly if you see them in black and white.

First, as to Public Worship. It is a source of great satisfaction that attendance on the part of the great majority is so regular. I believe you do heartily enter into the sentiment of the line,

"Pleasant are Thy courts below."

I am especially glad that so many of the children delight to come to the Lord's House, not merely on the first Sunday of the month when the sermon is addressed to them, but on every Lord's Day. I intend to continue the practice of having, as a rule, one of the Children's Hymns sung at every forenoon service. I should be glad if some of you who are young men would come more regularly in the forenoon as well as in the evening. You are not all so over-wrought on Saturday (though some of you are) that you are too wearied to rise early enough on Sunday to attend morning service. It is in the forenoon that I have generally given systematic exposition of some Book of Scripture, which, I judge, is the most profitable sort of preaching.

I do not make this remark because the attendance at morning service is small. As a rule it is larger in the forenoon than in the evening. I do not urge attendance at both services upon all. Parents who have young children to care for may find it necessary, or very desirable, that one or both of them should be at home in the evening; and teachers who have spent forenoon and afternoon in public worship and teaching may find it profitable to have the evening for private reading and rest. I beg of you, however, not to allow Sunday evening to be consumed in the chit-chat of small talk or gossip either at home or among friends. Let the hours of the Lord's Day be turned to the best account for the spiritual improvement of yourselves and your children.

Attendance at the weekly *Prayer Meeting* has been greatly improved of late; may there be "showers of blessing" in answer to earnest, united prayer! I purpose devoting one evening in each month (the Wednesday before the third Sunday) to prayer for Missions and Missionaries. Other special topics will be taken up from time to time, and it will, I believe, add greatly to the interest and value of our meetings, if those of you who have upon your hearts anything that concerns the extension of the Kingdom of Christ will ask us to join with you in supplication.

A weak point with us in St. Andrew's (for this observation does not apply to St. Mark's) is the small attendance at *Bible Classes*, especially on the part of young men. Two Bible Classes are taught every Sunday afternoon in separate rooms—one for men and women, by Mr. Massie; another for young men, by Mr. Clark; but the number attending is small. What is the matter? Will some of you be good enough to give me your reasons for declining to take advantage of the opportunities afforded for Bible study?

Secondly, as to Personal Work. Each of us is bound to contribute his or her share of service for the general good. "We are members one of another," and no member, however insignificant, is superfluous. What can you do, then, for the building up of the "spiritual house?" The main outlets for activity are: (1) the St. Mark's and Dorset Missions; (2) the Sunday Schools; and (3) the several Associations. It is very gratifying to note how large a number are engaged in one way and another in these branches of work. There is always room for more workers. St. Andrew's School needs more scholars; find some neglected children; bring them in and teach them. St. Mark's needs more teachers; let some of you within reasonable distance offer your services. More visitors are wanted by the "Willing Helpers;" come to the meeting next Tuesday and volunteer to take a district. The Men's Association will be glad to have additional hands to take a turn at the Bank on Saturday evenings, especially in summer, when many are out of the city for a few weeks. Additional voices are needed from time to time in the Choir, etc.

Much good work may be done apart from these organizations. For example, many a man who does not think himself competent to teach

a class in Sunda fellow-clerk, or church, to come good by finding home. Scores home influences mending, after s she cannot get of the Lord?

In a word, Br of work may van body's steps, yo you will be "1 fellows.

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a class in Sunday School, may prove a real missionary by inviting his fellow-clerk, or fellow boarder, or acquaintance, who is going to no church, to come with him to service. Some of you may do untold good by finding out some stranger and inviting him or her to your home. Scores of people are going astray for lack of kindly christian home influences. Need I say that many a weary mother, darning and mending, after she has put her little ones to bed, and sighing because she cannot get out to "meetings," may do a blessed work at home for the Lord?

In a word, BE A FOLLOWER OF JESUS CHRIST, and while methods of work may vary, you will be a "lamp" shedding light to guide somebody's steps, you will be "salt" seasoning the life of those about you, you will be "leaven" working silently upon the characters of your fellows.

Thirdly, as to giving. Some of you smiled incredulously a few years ago when I said that I hoped to see the day when you would give at least as much for the great general Missionary and Educational work of the Church, as for strictly Congregational purposes. You have reached that mark during the past year.

"So henceforth we will not go back."

Nay, if the Lord will graciously increase the spirit of liberality, we shall devise yet more liberal things. You have given \$10,190 for missions, etc., as against \$10,101 for congregational purposes. The Managers are asking, and I heartily endorse their request, \$12,750 during the current year, in order that some needed improvements may be made on the church edifice, and that \$1,500 of floating debt may be paid off. Let us not be content, therefore, with less than a like sum for missionary and benevolent purposes.

When I analyze the lists, I find that 281 of you (including anonymous givers) contributed to Missions, and 198 to Augmentation, 328 persons having given either to Missions or Augmentation, or both. On the principle that every one who is earning money ought to give, there should be not fewer than 470 givers in St. Andrew's (not reckoning St. Mark's). Now, if you deduct 328 from 470, you have at least 142 persons represented as the givers of \$43 by "open collection" during 1886 for all the Missionary work of the church. Need I say that this

is not as it should be? If the 328 included only the rich, and the 142 only the poor, I would not find fault; but any one who analyzes the lists will see that this is by no means the case.

Good friends, rich and poor, kindly look over the list of objects for which you are asked to contribute monthly. Let those who have not given hitherto give this year twenty-five or fifty cents a month, or a dollar, or five dollars, "as the Lord hath prospered them;" let those who have been giving well take yet larger thought concerning Christ's cause. We have grown in the grace of liberality: \$25 and \$50 are not uncommon contributions, where \$5 or \$10 was given a tew years ago; but I hope to see the day when, alongside of the \$1 and \$2 and \$5 given by poorer members, there will be a considerable number of contributions of \$100, \$250, \$500 and \$1,000 each. "Give, and it shall be given unto you; good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, shall they give into your bosom." "Make to yourself friends by means of the mammon of unrighteousness; that, when it shall fail, they may receive you into the eternal tabernacles."

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Minutes of the Annual Meeting of the Congregation.

The Annual Meeting of the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church was held in the Sunday School Room of the Church, on the evening of Wednesday, the 19th January, 1887.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. D. J. Mac-donnell.

On motion duly moved and seconded, Mr. Macdonnell was appointed Chairman, and Mr. William Mitchell Secretary, of the meeting.

It was agreed to adopt the minutes of the last Annual Meeting of the Congregation, as printed in the last Annual Report, without being formally read.

The Secretary submitted and read the Report and Financial Statement of the Board of Managers; whereupon it was moved by Mr. J. D. Hay, seconded by Mr. I. C. Gilmor, and agreed,—That the Report and Statement now submitted be, and they are hereby, received and adopted.

On motion of Mr. James Massie, seconded by Mr. John Joss, Dr. Thorburn, John Kay and Wm. Mitchell, the retiring Managers, were unanimously re-elected.

It was moved by Mr. James Maclennan, seconded by Mr. W. A. Shepard,—That in view of the resignation by Mr. Russel Inglis of the office of Treasurer to the Board of Managers, this meeting desires to give expression to the obligation which the Congregation is under to Mr. Inglis for the faithful manner in which he has discharged the

responsible duties of this office during the past seventeen years; and as a slight recognition of these services, the Managers are hereby instructed to hand Mr. Inglis a cheque for one hundred dollars on behalf of the Congregation. Carried unanimously.

Mr. James Maclennan gave notice that he would move at the next Annual Meeting of the Congregation,—That the Constitution be so amended as to provide that the Board of Managers may be increased to a number not exceeding eighteen, as also to provide for their retirement.

Reports were read by the Superintendents of St. Andrew's, St. Mark's and Dorset Sunday and Night Schools. The Chairman read the Report of the Dorset Sewing School.

Reports were also read from the Women's and Men's Associations and the Willing Helpers.

The Report of St. Mark's Mission was presented by the Chairman.

It was then moved by Dr. Thorburn, seconded by Mr. Russel Inglis,—That the Reports of the various Schools and Associations now presented be received, and the thanks of the Congregation tendered to the teachers and other workers who have so faithfully discharged the duties connected therewith.

Moved by Mr. Hamilton Cassels, seconded by Mr. Jas. Massie, and unanimously carried,—That this meeting tender to the members of the Choir and to the Board of Managers hearty thanks for their valued services during the past year.

These figures indicate that there has been real growth in liberality during the past year. For Augmentation of Stipends there has been \$1,710 contributed, as against \$1,434 in 1885. By montally contributions the sum of \$2,943.61 (including interest, \$26.68) has been realized for the Missions Fund, as compared with \$2,589.51, an increase of \$354. We have thus been able to make larger appropriations to all the principal funds of the Church than in any previous year. Deducting from the total given above the amount expended on St. Andrew's Sunday School (\$244.19), it is very gratifying to note that \$10,190.46 has been contributed for the Missionary, Educational and Benevolent Work of the Church—a sum just about equal to that contributed for Congregational purposes, viz., \$10,101.04

The work connected with the St. Mark's Mission has been vigorously carried on both by the Missionaries who have successively conducted the services—Rev. J. F. Somerville, Messrs. J. F. Smith and A. Gandier and Rev. G. Al. Howie—and by the staff of Visitors, who have lent valuable aid. Miss Gardiner, the Bible Reader, supported by the "Willing Helpers," has also rendered most efficient service by coming into close contact with the wives and daughters in

There is reports of the attendance a

many households, speaking and reading to them of "Jesus and His love," and giving them whatever he!p or counsel she can in order to secure more comfortable and attractive homes. Her testimony, shortly after she began her work, was that amongst the one hundred and thirty families which she visited there were only twenty in which the Word of God was read at all. The number, however, is on the increase; several persons have asked Miss Gardiner to procure for them Bibles in large type, so that they may read by lamp-light.

No fewer than thirty families have been found suffering more or less severely from the curse of drunkenness, the women in some cases being themselves intemperate, in other cases growing careless, hopeless and ill-tempered, because of the conduct of the husband, father or brother who drinks. Special efforts have been made in connection with the organizations reported last year both to prevent and to cure this great evil. Some have been rescued and are leading new lives. There is room for wise, patient, earnest Christian effort on the part of all who realize how terrible is the bondage of those who are slaves of drink.

At the service preparatory to the Communion in October last, out of 41 persons who were added to the Communion Roll, no fewer than 21 had been attending the services at St. Mark's, and of these 14 united with the Church on profession of faith. There are at present on the Roll 49 communicants whose connection with the Church is due to their attendance upon the services at St. Mark's.

There is room for much thankfulness in reading the reports of the several Schools and Associations. While the attendance at the "St. Andrew's" School shows a slight de-

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crease, this is partly accounted for by the very marked growth of the "St. Mark's" School, which draws from the western portion of the parish, and partly by the distance at which so many families live from the Church, which makes it almost impossible for them to send their children to school in the afternoon. When we reckon the number of scholars attending the three Sunday Schools, we have the goodly number of 710 provided for in one way or another by St. Andrew's Church.

I have to report a somewhat smaller attendance than last year, the average being 185 out of a roll of about 285.

The offerings of the School have, however, increased, and amount, with the addition of bank interest, to \$257.40, being an average of \$4.95 per Sunday.

These moneys have been allocated as follows: Central India, \$60; "Dayspring," \$50; Trinidad Schools, \$20; Formosa, \$15; Bohemian Mission, \$10; Welland Canal Mission, \$10; Sabbath School Association of Canada, \$10; Sick Children's Hospital, \$30; Dorset Schools, \$52.40.

In connection with the Central India Mission, the school is specially interested in Narayan, a native worker labouring at Oojein under the direction of Mr. Wilkie. One or two letters have been received from him, and a photograph of himself and his wife and a co-worker has been forwarded us by Mr. Wilkie.

Five of the scholars became communicants in the Congregation during the year.

Three of the little ones have been taken from us by their Saviour—Maude Steggles, Glover Harrison, and Elmer Evans; and in the homes of several others there has been heavy trial.

The rewards given to the children this year for regular and punctual attendance were given to those only who had not been absent more than once. Nineteen in all became entitled to receive them: eleven for never having been absent at all, and eight for having been absent but once. These were distributed at the social gathering of the School held on the 6th inst., at which we were pleased to see present an unusually large number of the parents and friends of the School.

The Library is in a sad state of inefficiency, and I desire to impress upon the heart of the Congregation the need of fully equipping us in this department of our work.

Report of St. Mark's Sunday School.

In presenting our tenth Annual Report, we are glad to be able to record progress in all the work of the School. There has been a marked improvement in the number of scholars who study the lessons at home, and in the committing to memory of the Word of God. We are uniting our efforts to interest all the parents in teaching their children during the week, which a great many are now doing in some measure, and we are confident of good and blessed results, which we desire more than large numbers.

Our School now numbers 325, with an average attendance of 231, and as the room is now more than full, we have had to refuse all new scholars for some time back.

One of the pleasing features of our work this year has been the forming of a Bible Class, which will be the means of training the older scholars to become teachers, of whom we are in great need. The want of a separate room has been a great drawback to the progress of the class, and we hope before long that a suitable room will be built that will accommodate a large number.

The contributions of the children amounted to \$129.10, an increase of \$38.81 over the previous year. During the last four months we have set apart the first Sunday of each month for missions. The result has been a contribution of \$10 to the Queen's College Missionary Society, and \$15 for the Indian children in the North-West.

It may be stated that the membership fee of the Association is 50 cents, but that anyone paying through it \$1.00 to the W. F. M. S. is considered a member without any further payment.

The sum of \$461.93 was raised during the year by direct contribution, no other means having been used, and no money collected outside the Association. The contributions have been gathered by the use of mite boxes, and of a missionary box on the table at each meeting, in addition to Four life membership the payment of membership fees. fees, 98 fees of \$1.00, and a donation of \$150.00 have been handed over to the Presbyterial Treasurer of the W.F.M.S. within the year; and a bale containing thirty-five new flannel dresses and shirts, along with a quantity of half worn clothing, was sent to join the contributions of other Societies to North-West Indians. The remainder of the money raised has been devoted to city mission work, chiefly the Dorset Mission. The Association undertakes all that is specially women's work in the Congregation, having committees to attend to the various departments of that work. Each committee has its own business meeting. The Association proper meets fortnightly, on Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock, when an hour is occupied in devotional exercises, led by several of the members, the reading of missionary intelligence, including the leaflets of the W. F. M. S., and the transaction of any general business that may present itself. The ordinary attendance has been about 30, two meetings having number took the form was received. Association interest.

Report of Dorcas Committee.

Your Committee have to report having held ten meetings during the past year; the meetings have been well attended, twelve ladies having worked on this Committee, two of the number representing our Mission Church, St. Mark's. During the year we have received \$215 from the Session Fund, which has been expended in the usual way.

We have assisted seventeen families; of this number eight belong to St. Mark's.

Of course the amount of assistance given has varied very much; in some instances a few yards of flannel has been all that was needed; in others, where there has been illness, much more has been required, and therefore gladly given.

A case in point is that of a widow supporting by her work a family of children. She was taken seriously ill, and her doctor said would become a confirmed invalid unless she gave up all hard work for some time. We are therefore allowing her so much per week until she is strong enough to resume her work.

Another case is that of a woman over eighty years of age—a member of our Church—who had supported herself by sewing until a few weeks ago, when she was taken very ill. The doctor would not allow her to be moved to the hospital, so a nurse had to be procured. As soon as she was well enough to be moved, she gladly consented to our

Report of Men's Association.

In presenting a report of the work done during the past year, it is a satisfaction to note progress and continued usefulness on the part of the Association.

The reports from the various branches of the Dorset Mission are most encouraging.

The Association feel that the work was never more appreciated by those whom it reaches than during the past year.

It was with regret that the resignation was accepted of Mr. Samuel Moore, who so ably filled the position of Superintendent of the Night School. Messrs. Hamilton Cassels and James Strachan very kindly consented to act jointly until a successor should be appointed.

Had there ever existed a doubt as to the efficiency of the Savings Bank, the result of last year's business should certainly dispel it. The amount to the credit of the depositors at the end of the year was the largest in the Bank's history. The number of deposits increased steadily, reaching 921 in excess of the previous year, while the withdrawals were 28 less. This shows that the Bank did business with a class of depositors who are allowing their money to accumulate.

The Association have had to make some special efforts during the year to raise funds for the repairing of the new Dorset Building. In our previous Annual Report we expressed a confidence that the value of the work done would be recognized by our friends in the Congregation, and that the necessary funds (about \$700) would be provided. We have not been disappointed. The Women's Association and the St. Andrew's Sunday School have, as usual, made liberal grants from the funds at their disposal,

Report of "Willing Helpers."

The members of this Society are glad to be able to report a year of continued progress in their work. The usual monthly meetings have been held during the seven months from January to April and from October to December, and, in addition to these, a social gathering took place on the 14th of May, which was attended by many of our friends among the Congregation. The number of members is not so large as could be wished, still even in this respect there has been some improvement over last year.

The most important new feature in the Society's work during the year has been the employment under its auspices of a Bible Reader for this parish. After the matter had been discussed in all its bearings for some weeks, an invitation was, with the approval of the Session, extended to and accepted by Miss Gardiner, one of the members of the Society, to become its first Bible Reader. Miss Gardiner entered upon her work in April last, and since that time has been busily engaged in reading and explaining the Word of God in the many homes within her sphere of labor whose inmates are ignorant or careless of its teachings, and endeavoring to win their hearts for Him who came "to seek and to save that which was lost," and "to preach the gospel to the poor." It is a matter of gladness and gratitude that a large measure of success has crowned her labours, and that in the words of her own report to the Society, there is "good reason to believe that many are seeking and

Two additional items in her work deserve attention, viz.: (1) the help given in nursing and otherwise caring for the sick, and (2) the practical assistance rendered to those who will accept it in showing them how to cook a meal, clean a room, or mend In connection with this work, it may be mentioned that in November last Mothers' Meetings were begun, and have steadily increased in interest, the meetings being held every Thursday in the Dorset Mission House, with an average attendance of 12 for the last five weeks. The nature of these meetings will best be shown by another short extract from Miss Gardiner's report: "We spend the hour from two to three o'clock cutting out and sewing; from three until about a quarter to four we have a very informal, short gospel service; refreshments are then served, and the garments which have been made up by the "Willing Helpers" Dorcas Society are examined and purchased by the mothers and sisters; half an hour is usually devoted to this part of the meeting, after which it is closed by singing a hymn and prayer." It may not be out of place to observe that a number of the members of the Society have assisted in arranging for and conducting these meetings, and that the district visiting, which was a prominent feature in last year's work, has not been discontinued by those who were engaged in it, but has on the contrary been carried on with greater interest and efficiency than before.

It only remains to add that the financial condition of the Society is sound, as will be shown by reference to the subjoined statement of the Treasurer. By far the larger part of the money received has been collected for the express pur-

pose of providing for the salary of the Bible Reader, and it is gratifying to note that up to the present time no difficulty has been felt in raising the necessary funds for this purpose. For this result we have to thank our many friends in the Congregation who have been "Willing Helpers" in this indispensable part of our work.
