Although this is undoabtedly a great piece of mechanism, we are able to state that a still greater work has been made and in use in this State for several years. There is a steam hammer at the Kemble Foundry, Cold Spring, Putnam County, opposite West Point, which weighs eight and a half tons, or 17,040 pounds, which is something more than 'about 14,000 pounds.' This immense instru-ment was made at the works whore it is used. Un-der its persuasive influence large masses of wrought iron are thrown into the shape of shafts for steam-boats and steamships of any size that may be re-quired, no matter how large. Other articles of havy weight are made to take any form desired by the manufacturer; and natwithstanding their p inderosity, they are handled with the same facility int a blackmith handles a horse shoe withal. This foundry covers about four acres of ground, and from fore hondred to seven hundred men find constant enployment in it.
