GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present herewith the Eighteenth Report of the Trade and Commerce of Montreal, &c., and to ask attention to the circumstances of its issue.

Early last Spring, the Secretary, (the late MR. WM. J. PATTERSON,) expressed a very strong desire that a Report covering the years which had elapsed since the publication of the last, for 1880-1-2, should be issued, so as to complete the Third Series. Referring to his failing health which would not permit of his giving to the Report the personal labour of former years, he asked that I would this year undertake its preparation, promising at same time assistance in paragraphing, and advice regarding information to be collated. With this request I gladly complied, and commenced at once upon the Second Section, *i.e.*, General Summary of Canadian Commerce and Industry. Fair progress was being made when the illness of the Secretary, followed on 12th June by his death, interrupted the same, and deprived me of the promised assistance and advice just when it was commencing to be most needed.

So soon as the pressure of work incident to the death of the Secretary and my assumption, by your favour, of the duties of his office, had somewhat lightened, I turned my attention to the completion of this Report, and have therein, day by day, had occasion to regret the loss of the extensive knowledge and ripe experience of my late Chief.

It is unnecessary to comment upon the Report itself, further than to say that I have followed as closely as possible the scheme which MR. PATTERSON had outlined; the omission of certain particulars regarding local industries given in the last number, being due to the space occupied by the valuable series of tables, chiefly relating to Exports of Canada, which form Section First.

The difficulty of procuring the financial assistance necessary to supplement the contribution of your Boards and that of the Harbour Commissioners, towards defraying the expense of these Reports, has been so great of late years, that MR. PATTERSON had indicated he would not, after the present issue, again attempt their publication unless relieved of all monetary responsibility therefor, and I must respectfully take a like position, though quite at your service with regard to the labour entailed in their preparation.

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In Memoriam.

WM. J. PATTERSON,

A NATIVE OF GLASGOW, SCOTLAND,
DIED AT MONTREAL, CANADA, 12TH JUNE, 1886,
AGED 70 YEARS AND 8 MONTHS.

It seems but fitting that in this Report, commenced during Mr. Patterson's lifetime, but concluded after his death, there should be some record of the projector of the series and compiler of all previous issues.

Mr. Wm. J. Patterson became joint Secretary of the Montreal Board of Trade and Montreal Corn Exchange Association at the end of April, 1863, his previous connection with the newspaper press in the United States and this City, and general knowledge of commercial matters, together with a natural aptitude for statistical research, rendering him specially fitted for that position, which for over twenty-three years he held with credit to himself and advantage to the corporations he served.

During his Secretaryship Mr. Patterson was the author of a large number of trade reports, pamphlets, &c., which derived special value from the faculty he possessed of extracting from the various voluminous blue books, &c. the information most likely to be serviceable to the commercial community, and of presenting it in comprehensive and intelligible form. Of these reports the most important are undoubtedly the series of which this, the eighteenth issue, forms the closing number of the third volume. But there were many others, amongst them being "Commercial Relations of the British North American Provinces," issued in 1866; "Descriptive statement of the Great Water Highways of the Dominion of Canada," in 1874; three "Trade Letters," in 1876; No. I.—"Can our Commerce with the Australian Colonies be increased?" No. II.—"Can there be an enlargement of our Trade Relations with the West Indies and South America?" No. III.—"Brief Notes relating to the Resources, Industries, Commerce and Prospects of Newfoundland;" in 1880 "Trade Letter" No. IV.—"Commercial relations between Brazil and Canada, with supplementary information relating to trade with the West Indies;" and "Harbor Dues and Transit Charges at Montreal and Atlantic Ports." In 1881, "Necessity for Reducing the Canal Tolls;" in 1882, "Canadian Inland Commerce;—Report on Water Communication and Commerce between the Older Provinces of the Dominion and Manitoba and the North West;" in 1884, "Report relating to the Ice-Bridge between Quebec and Levis;" and also (in 1881) replies to a series of questions propounded at the instance of the Chancellor of the German Empire by W. C. Munderloh, Esq., the Consul here, comprising particulars about the Canadian North West, Climatology of Canada, General Export Trade of the Dominion, &c., &c.

In addition to holding the before-mentioned joint Secretaryship, Mr. Patterson was, at a Meeting of Representatives held in Montreal on 5th and 6th October, 1870, to organize a Dominion Board of Trade, appointed Secretary of that body, and thereafter

afforded valuable service both to the Executive Council and at the Annual Meetings of the Board at Ottawa, which consisted of Delegates from all affiliated Canadian Boards of Trade. The reports of these meetings were edited by Mr. Patterson, and several Papers on topics then attracting notice prepared by him, these including "Some Plain Statements about Immigration and its Results," and "Considerations in favor of a Dominion Department of Commerce."

This active and useful life was somewhat unexpectedly terminated on Saturday, 12th June, 1886, by blood-poisoning following an operation for an aneurism in the leg, which, although painful, had not been deemed serious. On the afternoon of the day he died, Mr. Patterson spoke to the undersigned of some matters connected with this issue of the Report.

The newspaper press far and near voiced the regret felt at the removal of one who had so well and so faithfully served, not only the organizations with which he was officially connected, but also the Dominion generally, the commercial interests of which he had, with an intelligent and never wearying ardour, always endeavoured to promote. Several Canadian Boards of Trade honoured his memory by passing resolutions of regret and condolence; those adopted respectively by the two Boards of which Mr. Patterson was the joint Secretary being appended, as an appropriate close to this brief record of the official life in Montreal of one whose place will long seem unfilled to those who knew his worth.

Resolution adopted by the Members of the Montreal Corn Exchange Association at a Special Meeting, held on Thursday, 17th June, 1886 :—

RESOLVED,—That the members of the Montreal Corn Exchange Association desire to give public expression to their deep sense of the loss they have sustained in the death of Mr. Wm. J. Patterson, who for the past twenty-three years faithfully served the Association as its Secretary;

That Mr. Patterson's accurate knowledge of the trade and commerce of the Dominion enabled him to fill that office with great credit to himself, and with much advantage, not only to this Association, but to the commercial community generally;

That the members of the board feel they have lost an officer, who in addition to being peculiarly fitted for the position he occupied, was also, from his high character and great abilities, an honor to the Association with which he was so long connected;

That the Committee of management, together with members of the board generally, do further testify their respect for the late Secretary by attending the funeral in a body, and that the board do now adjourn for that purpose;

That a copy of these proceedings conveying the deep sympathy of the members of this Association be transmitted to the bereaved family.

Resolution adopted by the Council of the Montreal Board of Trade, at Meeting held on Tuesday, 15th June, 1886 :—

RESOLVED,—That this Council records with sorrow the death of Mr. Wm. J. Patterson, Secretary of the Montreal Board of Trade for the past twenty-three years, and who during that time has been intimately connected with every measure having for its object the advancement of trade and manufactures in this city;

That Mr. Patterson's special work as Secretary of this Board has at all times been most earnest, intelligent and valuable, and the members of Council deplore his loss as that of a friend;

That as an additional mark of respect and regard the members of Council do attend the funeral of the late Secretary in a body, and that the general members of the Board are hereby requested to accompany them;

That a copy of these resolutions be sent to the family of the deceased, with an assurance of the Council's sympathy for it in this bereavement.

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It is only necessary to remark at the outset, that the various STATEMENTS given on the following 76 pages are meant to afford easy means of reference to those interested, for ascertaining with approximate accuracy, the extent and details of the commercial relations that have existed between Canada and all other Countries, —the increases or decreases, &c. It must be borne in mind, that all the detailed EXPORT STATEMENTS relate exclusively to articles the growth or produce of the Dominion.

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The arrangement adopted with regard to EXPORTS is simple and comprehensive and the recapitulations will be serviceable. It is also considered that the recapitulations of values of merchandise imported from all the foreign countries with which Canada has traded during eight years, will be deemed useful as showing the values of all goods entered for consumption, besides the aggregate importations from each.

The aggregates of Export Trade can be seen at a glance by examining the several Recapitulations.

The Tabular Statements of Steam and Sail Tonnage speak for themselves.

A perusal of the foregoing table reveals a steady increase in the several items from year to year, although such increase has been less marked in 1883, 1884, and 1885, than during the three preceding years. The freeing from postal charges, of newspapers and periodicals mailed from office of publication, has largely increased the bulk and weight of that class of mail matter, thus augmenting the expenditure without adding ought to the revenue. In the Savings Bank Department it is most gratifying to find such evidences of prosperity among the less wealthy classes, the amount at deposit on 31st December, 1885, being \$18,874,547, or an increase of nearly 75 per cent. (74.11) over the amount at close of 1882, (\$10,840,642); the number of accounts and average amount standing to credit of each, was on 30th June, 1885, 73,322 and \$205.81, against 51,463 and \$184.08 in 1882. This improvement must however be partly attributed to the circumstance that the Government allows 1 per cent. interest more than other Savings Banks, which has led to a considerable transfer of accounts. In September, 1885, the Post Office Savings Bank System was extended to the Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, but at present the deposits are but small, owing to the ample Savings Bank accommodation already afforded by the Government Savings Banks managed by the Finance Department.

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DISCOUNTS...

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An incident, unique in itself, and interesting as illustrating the pioneer services which the Post Office may be called upon to render in advance of actual settlement, is deemed worth recording here. On the 1st of January, 1885, a Post Office and Money Order Office was established at what, for convenience, was designated "End of Track, Rocky Mountains, Canadian Pacific Railway," the Post Office and Postmaster's home being in a railway car roughly fitted for the Service, and moving westward a few miles from day to day with the progress of track-laying. On the 7th of November following, with the meeting in the Rocky Mountains of the two Sections of Railway, that proceeding westward and that coming eastward, the so-called "End of Track" ceased to be. The laborers and navvies employed in construction dispersing, the objects of the temporary office ceased, and it passed out of existence with its name, having issued, during those ten months, money orders to the value of \$65,304.

CHARTERED BANKS, STOCKS, &c.

VALUE OF RAILWAYS TO A COUNTRY.

Apart altogether from the important purposes for which railway companies are organized,—the carrying of passengers and transportation of merchandise,—the value of railways in other respects is very seldom adequately appreciated. The influx of money during the construction of a line through a tract of country is a never-to-be-forgotten event. The profit or loss to shareholders is always patent from the traffic returns; but the steady, silent outflow of money in every city, town, village, and hamlet through which passengers and traffic are carried, is overlooked or unknown. The following particulars show how close is the connection of a large Railway Corporation with the country through which it passes :

The estimated number of the population of Montreal dependent for wages, as well as subsistence, on the Grand Trunk Railway, including contractors, is about 14,000 persons. The wages paid yearly to these employes amounting to over \$1,400,000. The Company's dealings with business firms in this city amount to about \$1,350,000 per annum.

Three items of the G.T.R. Company's expenditure in Montreal for a recent year were, Civic Assesments, \$14,733.75; Water Rates, \$13,276.55; Gas Account, \$6,166.40, amounting to \$34,176.70.

The Grand Trunk Railway since the completion of its Canadian road with branches and connections in the United States, now places the Dominion in direct communication with the South-Western, and North-Western States, and with all the Trunk Railroads running through that vast region of country.

CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY.

The completion of this trans-continental railroad within the short space of five years, (only half the time contracted for with the Government) is one of the greatest railway achievements of the age, and by its means connections are obtained that were but recently looked upon as impossible. The line was opened to the Rocky Mountains on the 2nd of November, 1885, and the through passenger service from Montreal to the Pacific was inaugurated on Monday, 28th June, 1886, by a train which, leaving Dalhousie Square Station at 2 p.m., reached Vancouver, B.C., on Sunday, 4th July, at noon (4 p.m. Montreal time) thus covering the distance of 2,906 miles in 140 hours.

The ideas expressed in former numbers of this Report have all been in favor of a railway from Ocean to Ocean on Canadian Territory; in the issue for 1867 it was said, under the heading, "Route to China and Japan through British North America," that "something is now being done to re-awaken public interest "in favor of the way to the Pacific Ocean through British North America, and "to show that it would furnish a shorter and more desirable line for passenger "travel and transportation of freight between the United Kingdom and China

"and Japan." * * * * * "Speaking on this important subject a few years ago, Lord Bury said:—

"Our trade in the Pacific Ocean with China and with India must ultimately be carried on through our North American possessions; at any rate, our political and commercial supremacy will have utterly departed from us if we neglect that very great and important consideration, and if we fail to carry out to its fullest extent the physical advantages which the country offers to us and which we have only to stretch out our hands to take advantage of."

In the Report for 1877, under the heading "The Imperial Element in the Canadian Pacific Railway," the following paragraphs occur:—

"It is, therefore, evident that much the shortest line of communication between Great Britain and Japan and China will certainly be the one through Canada. The difference in *time* being a most important consideration. Passenger travel would undoubtedly prefer that northern route, while its advantages for transmission of mails and merchandise are evident; and, most important of all to the Imperial Government, there will be the opportunity for transporting troops, either in time of peace or war, entirely through British Territory to the Pacific Ocean without risk of impediment,—an advantage the greatness of which cannot be easily estimated. Leading members on both sides of the Dominion House of Commons concur that the 'Canadian Pacific Railway is a matter of the gravest necessity.' Such international complications are possible, as would render it of instant importance for Great Britain to place an armament on the North Pacific coast; and, in such an emergency, the entire cost of that railway to the Imperial Government would be as nothing, compared with the immense advantages it would afford. If, as Capt. COLOMB, R. M. A., has said, British Columbia ought, for strategic reasons, to be the site of a magnificent naval outwork for defence against possible schemes of Russia or other ambitious Powers,—as well as the site of an Imperial military post, intermediate between London and Australia,—then the Canadian Pacific Railway is clearly an IMPERIAL NECESSITY."

"A meeting of the Royal Colonial Institute has recently been held in London, presided over by the DUKE OF MANCHESTER, at which a paper on Canada by SANFORD FLEMING, Esq., C.E., Engineer-in-Chief of the Canadian Pacific Railway, was read. The following passage occurs in it:—

"How can I very briefly—for I fear I have exhausted your patience—how can I, in a few words set forth the *immense importance to the Empire* of having a line through Canada in operation as speedily as possible? Esquimault, the naval station on the Pacific, and possibly the great Pacific arsenal of the future, is some four months' sailing distance from England. I venture to state that by the projected Canadian line it would be possible to carry dispatches" (and he might have added even war material) "from London to this station on the Pacific in thirteen or fourteen days, and that New

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"Zealand could be reached in less time than it has ever yet, as far as I have learned, been reached. The great Australian Provinces must surely be interested! A railway across America on British soil must be of some moment to every British station in the North and South Pacific Oceans. It would open a new route to India! There would probably be less nervousness felt from day to day, and from month to month, here, in the heart of the Empire, about the 'Eastern question,' if we had an overland route through Canada. And in this view the consideration of a very simple yet important Western question might in some degree diminish the interest felt in a very serious and complicated Eastern question."

The possible advantages of this Railroad to the Empire generally, as forecasted in the preceding extracts, have already commenced to be realized, for the first through train from Montreal to the Pacific Coast was freighted with military stores belonging to the Imperial Government; while more recently some English Military Officers have arrived at Esquimalt to inspect and report as to the advisability of erecting fortifications there.

Another instance of the usefulness of the Canadian Pacific Railway is to be found in connection with the transportation of Tea, large quantities of which, it is confidently anticipated, will now be consigned by this route instead of *via* San Francisco. The initial cargo left Yokohama on 19th June, 1886, arrived at Vancouver 28th July, was there transhipped (filling a train of ten cars), left Port Moody on 30th July, and reached Montreal on evening of 6th August, making the quickest time on record for a cargo of tea between Yokohama and Eastern America. Another cargo has since arrived and others are *en route*.

The following figures obtained since the completion of the road give some idea of the local advantages of the Canadian Pacific Railway to the country that it traverses:—

The Expenditure in Montreal for Civic Assessments in 1885 was \$16,956.99; for Water Rates, \$2,216.73, and for Gas Account, \$3,408.64, aggregating \$22,581.36.

It is computed that the 10,150 miles of railroad in the Dominion originally required in their construction 30,000,000 sleepers or railway ties, which, reckoning a tie to last five years, would give an annual requirement of 6,000,000 ties exclusive of those used in building new lines. Each railway has its telegraph system, and to supply these some 300,000 young trees were needed for the requisite poles, together with a large annual addition to replace any that are unserviceable or decayed. On the sides of the railways would be probably 20,000 miles of fencing, necessitating 15,000,000 pickets, and over 100,000,000 feet of sawn timber in its construction.

It appears to be a recognized fact among railway-men in the United States, that the life of an oak sleeper, or tie, is six years,—that the average number of ties per mile of single track is 3,000,—that the life of an iron rail is seven years,—that the life of a cedar telegraph pole, or a fence post, is eight years,—and the life of a wooden bridge fifteen years.

As emphasizing the rapid enlargement of the Canadian Railway System it is worth recording here that just fifty years ago (on 21st July, 1836) was opened the first Canadian Railway, the "Champlain & St. Lawrence Railroad." That line, fifteen miles in length, linked the navigation of the Richelieu River and Lake Champlain with the River St. Lawrence, but the fiftieth anniversary of the starting of that little train of a locomotive and two passenger cars from Laprairie for St. Johns, Que., finds the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans connected by the great trans-continental railroad from Montreal to Vancouver, a distance of 2,906 miles, and a daily train service from both ends, without change of cars, established thereon.

The figures in the following tables are so suggestive that but little comment is necessary. The National Policy appears to have affected the Sugar trade more than any other branch of industry or commerce. It will be noticed that not only have the imports greatly increased (the quantity for 1885 being 83.59 per cent. over that for 1878), but that, whereas in 1878 there was but seven per cent. of the total quantity imported taken direct from countries of production, in 1885 ninety-five per cent. was so taken. The 200,011,541 lbs. imported in 1885 aggregates a less value than the 108,943,920 lbs. imported in 1878. This is owing (1) to the lower price of sugar throughout the world, and (2) to the circumstance that, instead of the refined article being imported as in 1878, the Refineries now import raw sugar almost entirely. To the same causes may be attributed the fact that, although the imports were so largely increased, the amount of duty collected in 1885 aggregates actually less than in 1878; the specific duty on each pound of sugar being about 2½c. per lb. in 1878, and about 1½c. in 1885. Since the initiation of the present fiscal policy of the Dominion, a large amount (not less than \$2,500,000) is paid out annually to Canadians for refining, barrelling and shipping the sugar, which was formerly distributed among the people of Great Britain and the United States.

A considerable amount of Coal is supplied to Steamers Bunkers, (not included in above statement).

The exports from British Columbia are noted for the first time. The principal market is San Francisco, where the Coal is much liked, and secures almost the highest price.

The falling off in shipments from the Lower Provinces is very marked. The United States markets are now controlled by their own mines. Very great reductions in prices have occurred in the past two years, owing to reduction in cost of mining and the great competition existing between the large railway companies, controlling the transport of Coal to the eastern sea-board.

IMPORTS.—Only a general statement can be given of the imports and exports of Coal, as the Government records do not furnish the particulars in sufficient detail. The increase of imports is very striking, and some explanation will be found of interest. There is, no doubt, a very considerable falling off in imports from Great Britain, but the increasing consumption in Quebec and the Maritime Provinces of Bituminous Coal, is provided for from the local mines. From Brockville westward, through Ontario, Bituminous Coal is furnished, at a very low rate, from the mines of Ohio and western Pennsylvania, through the ports of Charlotte, on Lake Ontario, and Buffalo and Cleveland, on Lake Erie. All points on the lakes are reached; Port Arthur receiving a considerable portion of the increase of 1883-1884. Prices for 1884-1885 were the lowest on record.

ANTHRACITE COAL.—Is imported mainly from the United States; very little Welsh Anthracite is sold, American Coal being conveniently delivered in special sizes, and is used principally for domestic purposes. Of late some importation has been made of the smaller sizes—such as Pea Coal, &c., which, being sold at a low rate, are used for steam purposes.

PROVINCIAL COAL (Nova Scotia).—The total sales show very little change in four years, chiefly owing to the dullness of business, and the lessened production of iron at Londonderry. They are as follows:—

MONTREAL COAL TRADE.

BITUMINOUS.—The total imports by water to Montreal, in 1882, were close upon 300,000 tons; but a considerable falling off is shown for 1885, owing to the great increase in shipments by rail, *via* the Intercolonial and Grand Trunk Railways: the quantity received at Chaudiere Junction, in 1885, being 118,503 tons gross.

ANTHRAHITE.—The imports of Anthracite are increasing yearly; a large portion being received by rail, *via* the Delaware and Hudson Canal and Railway Co., which connects directly with the mines in Pennsylvania.

The receipts by Canal are divided between the Chamby Canal, from New York, and the St. Lawrence Canals, from Oswego.

GENERAL REMARKS.—It is in the North West and British Columbia that an extraordinary development of the Coal trade is to be looked for. Dr. Geo. Dawson roughly estimates, that east of the Rocky Mountains, from the 49° parallel northwards, including the Souris River lignites, there are some 65,000 square miles of coal-bearing strata; that on the mainland of British Columbia, about 12,000 square miles may be considered coal-bearing, while on Vancouver and Queen Charlotte Islands, coal fields of very great extent exist.

Very little mining has yet been done in the North West; but at Lethbridge, near Fort McLeod, Sir Alexander Galt has a successful colliery in operation, connected with the Canadian Pacific Railway by an independent line, about 110 miles long. The Canadian Pacific authorities speak in high terms of the quality of this Coal.

Whatever value the foregoing estimates may have, is of course derived from the approximate correctness of the figures, and of the hypotheses upon which they are calculated. It is therefore well to explain. The figures of Imports and Exports are from the Trade and Navigation Returns for years ending June 30th, which may be assumed as crop years, Flour is reduced to grain at 5 bush. per brl. Home consumption includes 5 bush. per annum per head of population, and a reserve of 5 per cent. for seed purposes. Actual observation and enquiries show this to be a liberal allowance. The Report of the Bureau of Industries for Ontario for 1882, placed the consumption for food and seed together at 4.70 bush. per head, with the remark that this is slightly below the English average. The population is taken from the Census for 1871 and 1881, which indicates an annual increase of 1½ per cent. To the quantity under the head of Home Consumption is added the Surplus of Exports over Imports [except in 1876-77 and 1883-84 the Exports falling below the Imports, the deficit is deducted,] the result being the estimated yield. It is not generally considered that any very great quantity of one crop is held over to the following, and any such would be more or less balanced by quantity held over from previous year, and in any case the estimate of an average crop would not be affected.

THE HARBOUR AND PORT OF MONTREAL, SHIP CHANNEL, &c.

A perusal of the tables on pages 116 and 117, collated from the Annual Reports of the Harbour Commissioners, affords gratifying evidence of the increasing prosperity of the Port of Montreal during the past three years. The total tonnage of sea-going vessels for season of 1885 was 683,854 tons, which exceeds the previous highest record (664,263 tons in 1883). Of this tonnage only 9.39 per cent. was sail, showing how completely steamers have supplanted sailing vessels in the ocean carrying trade of this port. Of inland vessels there arrived 5,003, with a total tonnage of 724,975 tons, the aggregate of ocean and inland tonnage being 5,632 vessels and 1,408,829 tons.

The Lumber trade continues to be a large item in Montreal's shipping business, the exports to South America in 1885 employing 47 vessels, carrying a total of 26,465,543 feet, the shipments to the United Kingdom being 89,667,407 feet, of which 84,282,275 feet were by steamers.

There is a large and steady increase in the exports of Phosphate, last year's figures being 24,299 tons; for 1884, 20,461 tons; and for 1883, 17,160 tons.

Receipts of Coal by sea in 1885 were, from Great Britain 48,022 tons, from the United States 213,641 tons, and from the Maritime Provinces 215,600 tons, or a total of 478,953 tons.

A new feature in the lower part of the Harbour is the Elevator of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, having a capacity of half a million bushels, and from which grain is now discharged into ocean steamers lying alongside. It is understood another Elevator will be erected close by before long.

The increased business of the Port necessitated an enlargement of wharf accommodation, which to some extent has been accomplished; the new basins of the Lachine Canal have, however, been largely utilized for that purpose this season (1886), and as they, with the lower locks, are now lit with electric lights, as well as the Harbour, the value of wharfage room there is greatly enhanced.

Passing on from the Port to the River that leads to it, the circumstance of the completion in October 1882, of the 25 foot channel between Montreal and Quebec, was noted in a previous issue, and now the deepening thereof to 27½ feet, commenced June 1883, is in active progress, and will, it is expected, be completed by the close of 1887.

SHIPPING AND COMMERCE OF THE PORT.

A table on page 117 affords a comprehensive view of the number and tonnage of all kinds of craft coming into the Port during a period of twenty-three years; also, the dates of the opening and closing of navigation, &c. The following is a summary of arrivals of sea-going and inland vessels since Confederation:—

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COMPARISON OF THE GRAIN TRADE OF MONTREAL WITH THAT OF NEW YORK AND OTHER ATLANTIC PORTS.

A table on page 144 shows for years 1870 to 1885 the total receipts and shipments of Grain and Flour (in bush.) at Montreal and five Atlantic Ports, affording opportunity for observing the proportion of the export Grain trade which this Port has secured.

The following comparison of receipts by rail and canal at Montreal and New York, while interesting in general, are specially so in the light of the controversy as to the probability of railways superseding canals in the grain-carrying trade, and also as showing that while the system of tolls prevailed on both the Erie and St. Lawrence routes, the proportionate volume of yearly traffic carried by each did not greatly vary, but that so soon as the Erie Canal was made free while the St. Lawrence route remained taxed, the share of the latter was largely reduced.

The present year (1886) is the first during which the policy of toll abatement on the St. Lawrence Canals will have prevailed throughout the entire season of open navigation, and the results during the first three months under the new system are eminently satisfactory, the quantity of Grain arriving by Canal in that period nearly equalling the total for whole season last year, in fact to find a parallel it is necessary to go back to the prosperous season of 1880.

S. census reports; those from 1864 to 1885, inclusive, were procured from the Agricultural Bureau, with the remark appended, that in 1864, 1865 and 1866, the quantities (except for Indian Corn) are estimates of the Northern States, or those not included in Secession, while quantities for '67, '68, and '69 are estimates for all the States.]

While the record for crop season of 1885 shows a full average of productiveness, Wheat suffered severely from winter killing, the figures showing a decline of 30 per cent. from aggregate for 1884, and a reduction in harvested area of over 5,000,000 acres. In Corn there was over a full average yield for the first time in five years, and the average being increased by its substitution for the injured Wheat, the total production exceeds any previous year. Oats also shows the largest area and greatest volume of production ever recorded, while Barley was but a medium crop.
