LIBERAL PRESS AND THE VATICAN

Insinuations of the Vatican Are Denied

EL LIBERAL SAYS

Pope Pius is Now Sowing What Will He Reap in Following the Advice of Two Spanish Cardinals—History of Negotiations

Madrid, Aug. 2.—The Liberal press officially denies the insinuations of the Vatican, that it only demanded the withdrawal of the bill prohibiting further religious orders until the concordat has been revised, and also points out that the bill in question did not violate the concordat which recognizes only the orders. El Liberal says Pope Pius X. is now sowing what will be reaped in following the advice of two Spanish cardinals.

San Sebastian, Aug. 2.—Garcia Prieto, the minister for foreign affairs, in an interview today in which he recited the history of the negotiations between Spain and the Vatican, denied that Holy See had adopted a conciliatory attitude. He added: "The Government asked only two things. First, the suppression of the convents and monasteries which entered Spain illegally, and second, that the Pope should authorize the Bishops to suppress or transform the establishments unnecessary to the aid of the priests in their ministrations. The government offered a year for the transformation which was desired by secular clergy whose existence is heavily compromised by the monks."

Paris, Aug. 2.—King Alfonso of Spain and Queen Victoria, who are stopping here en route to England, were the guests of President Fallieres at a luncheon at Rambouillet today. Premier Briand and Minister of Foreign Affairs Delcasse were present at the luncheon.

DOCK PLANT WRECKED

Duluth, Minn., Aug. 2.—Two heavy charges of dynamite were exploded at the Philadelphia and Reading coal docks in Superior, Wis., early today. The docks were nearly destroyed. A steel unloading rig weighing 500 tons and costing \$80,000 was thrown down and partly wrecked. The contracting firm operates on the open shop plan, but has never had any labor trouble.

SASKATCHEWAN CROPS ARE IN GOOD SHAPE

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 2.—Dr. Wm. Saunders, director of Dominion Experimental Farms, has telegraphed from Regina to the Deputy Minister of Agriculture as follows: "Crops in Saskatchewan from the boundary to Indian Head are in many places good, in others the straw is short and crop somewhat lighter. Reports from many parts of the province are favorable, especially in the more northern sections. In the southwestern and southeastern parts the drought has been more severe and the crops will be lighter in the Indian Head district. The yields of grain are quite heavy and very promising on the experimental farms. Crops of both promise to be usually good, both in quantity and quality, and are finer than any seen elsewhere, emphasizing the importance of good farming especially in dry years."

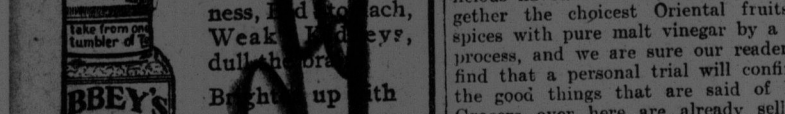

FAMOUS GEMS OF PROSE

WHERE IS THE MORAL CURSE OF SLAVERY?

By Alexander H. Stephens

From a speech on an Indian appropriation bill in the U. S. house of representatives, Dec. 11, 1854.

I HAVE no desire to deprive the people of any state or territory in our common country of the right of adopting such institutions for their government, when they become states, as they please. It is anti-American and entirely at war with the spirit of the age about which we hear so much. I ask why the people of any section of the country should be prevented from adopting the institutions of the south if they wish them? Socially, morally, and politically, or in any respect of the question, is there any reason for deprecating them of such right? Is it for the sake of humanity that gentlemen are not willing for the people of Kansas to assign the African the same condition there that he occupies in the south if they think it best to do so?

Are gentlemen willing to degrade their own race by not permitting them to vote upon matters relating to their own government while they are endeavoring to elevate the negro to the standard of the white man? You may degrade the white man, but you cannot raise the negro to the level you purpose. It is impossible. You have to reverse a law of nature first. Man may indulge in philanthropic speculations as much as they please, but here is the great immutable law of nature, and they cannot avoid it. I am not here to argue whether degrees of the most high are right, wise and just. There is a difference, vast difference, established by the Creator between the different races of men.

For myself, I believe that he who made us all is just, and that he made the white man as he made him—and he made the negro as he made him—for wise and just purposes. Some vessels are made for honor and some for dishonor, one star differs from another in magnitude as well as in brilliancy. I believe, too, that the system of government as adopted by the south defining the status or relation of these two races is the best for both of them; and I am prepared to argue that question with the gentlemen, here or anywhere. Take the negroes in Indiana, take them in the north generally, and compare their conditions with those of the south. Take them in Africa; take them anywhere on the face of the habitable globe; and then take them in the southern states and the negro population of the south are better off, better fed, better clothed, better provided for, enjoy more happiness, and a higher civilization than the same race, the same people, the same people on the face of the world. Could Howard, the philanthropist, who has left an undying fame for his deeds of humanity have taken the same number of Africans from their native country and raised them from their barbarous condition to that of the slaves of the south, he would have added much to that stature of immortality which in his day he erected to himself.

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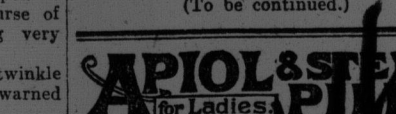

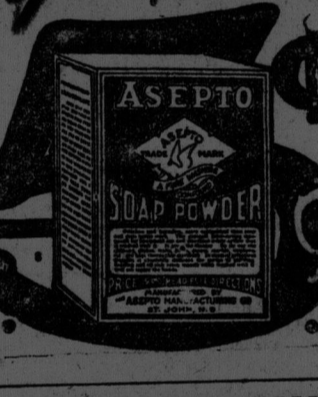

COMMON COUNCIL

Special Meeting to be Held to Consider Paving Matter—\$3,000 More Voted for Campbellton—Baxter Resigns Chairmanship

CONVENTION OF THE C.M.B.A. IN OTTAWA, AUG. 10

Many Matters of Interest to the Order to be Considered—The St. John Delegates

The triennial convention of the C. M. B. A. will be held this year in Ottawa, beginning on Wednesday, August 10, and promises to be one of the most important in the history of the association, as many weighty subjects are to be dealt with, and a great many delegates will be present from various quarters. Of late years the organization has rapidly spread until there are at present about 400 branches of the order scattered throughout Canada.

The C. M. B. A. in St. John is one of the leading Catholic societies and is doing much good in the way of relieving from financial worry many widows and orphans. The three local branches are in a prosperous condition, and will be well represented at the convention at the capital. Richard J. Walsh, Patrick McMurray, and Thomas Morrison leaving for Ottawa on Monday as delegates.

A very important matter which will be debated at the conference is the amendment to the constitution in the matter of the payment of half his policy to any member who has for twenty-five years been in good standing, the remainder to be paid his beneficiary, on condition that the assessment be continued until death.

COURT MATTERS

Case of Peter Smith vs. City of St. John Adjudged to Tuesday Next—County Court Cases—Probate

His Honor Mr. Justice McKeown, in the King's Bench Division this morning disposed of a number of cases. In the matter of the claim of Peter Smith vs. the City of St. John, Dr. W. B. Wallace, K. C. counsel for the defendant, and MacPhee, who appears for the claimant, is absent from the city; the hearing was adjourned until Tuesday next at 11 a. m.

In the case of McEldred vs. the C. P. R., Dr. L. A. Curry, K. C., obtained an order to file the writ.

In the case of Garland vs. Newton Stiles of Albert, J. J. Porter obtained an order for review.

Estate of Sarah Harris, spinster. The accounts of John Johnston, the executor, are filed with petition to pass the same and for order for distribution. Citation issued returnable on Monday, 8th September next at 11 a. m. Edmund S. Ritchie, proctor.

Final judgment was signed by Judge Forbes in the cases of Jones & Schofield vs. Godard Bros., \$215, C. F. Sanford, and the Bank of British North America vs. J. A. Reid, \$20.25, C. F. Inches.

Judge Forbes in chambers this morning in the case of the Empire Cream Separator Co. vs. Willie McAteer, of Chipman, dismissed the defendant's application for a review of the case from the parish court of Chipman, presided over by L. R. Wilson. The grounds of the application were technical and after listening to the argument of counsel his honor ordered the judgment of the inferior court to stand.

Ralph St. J. Froux of Sussex, appeared for the plaintiff, against the application, and Scott E. Morrell for the defendant, in support of the application.

NEARLY FOUR INCHES OF RAIN IN JULY

According to the records of D. L. Hutchinson, director of the weather bureau, the rainfall during the month of July, 1910, was 1.27 inches greater than in July last year. The total rainfall last month was 3.88 inches, and in the corresponding month last year, was 2.61. The maximum temperature during the month was 78.5, a decrease of 3.7 from July, 1909, which the record shows was 82.2. The minimum temperature registered 49.7 last month, as against 43.7 in 1909. The average for the month was 61.2, compared with 60.8 in July, 1909.

DEATH RATE SHOWS SLIGHT INCREASE

The records at the board of health office show an increase of five in the death rate for July 1910, compared with the same month in 1909. The number of deaths in July 1906 totalled 42, whereas for the month just closed there were 47. It is, however, noticeable that there are fewer cases of contagious disease in the city than ever before, and the reason for the higher death rate last month may be attributed to the fact that the number was greatly increased by the more common maladies such as heart trouble, cholera, influenza, pneumonia and other such causes.

ANOTHER BUSY DAY IN THE POLICE COURT

Peanut Case Dismissed—Fishermen Warned for Sunday Fishing—Liquor Selling Case Postponed

There was another busy session this morning in the police court when several matters came before the court. Only three prisoners were on the bench, but several other cases of different natures came up for hearing.

The three prisoners, Annie Deberry, Edward O'Brien and Bernard Barry were each fined \$8 on charges of drunkenness, while Barry was remanded on a charge of stealing four pounds of Bologna from John Irons, Main street.

The case against James McCarron reported for throwing peanut shells on the sidewalk, in Charlotte street, was dismissed, and James McCafferty, against whom a similar report had been made, was also allowed to go.

D. Jack, at whose instance the report was made, was present and asked that Policeman Sullivan be called. It was stated that the latter had been detailed for police duty at a picnic, a fact which was strongly commented upon by the court.

Because of Sullivan's not being in court McCafferty was given the benefit of an existing doubt as to whether or not he had thrown the peanut shells on the sidewalk.

Four fishermen, George Wilson, Joseph Yell, Byron East and George Hampton were before the court and pleaded guilty to fishing in the harbor on Sunday night last. The report was made by Inspector Belyea.

The men were warned not to fish again on Sunday and were told that if they were caught at it, their fishing outfit of boat and nets would be confiscated. They were allowed to go.

The case of Robert Campbell charged with selling liquor on unlicensed premises in Carleton, was dealt with. The charge was dated May 28. The evidence of Samuel Aude had been given the case was postponed. Aude took the stand in a very shaky and nervous condition and told of buying liquor in Campbell's beer shop on May 22. Louis Kindred and a man named Hadam were also present. J. B. M. Baxter, K. C. appeared for Campbell, and George E. Henderson conducted the prosecution.

In the case against Robert Beckwith, reported by I. C. R. Policeman Smith for violating the rules as applied to hackmen at the Union depot, two other coachmen named Garvin and Northrup, swore that there had been no violation, and the case was dismissed.

A DROP OF MILK

Mrs. Hayes, Colored, Has Maudie Moore, Colored, in Court on Milk Throwing Charge

A young colored girl, Miss Maudie Moore, was charged this morning in the police court with having assaulted Mrs. Mary Hayes, also colored, in the home of the latter, Elm street, on Saturday night. The trouble arose when Mrs. Hayes on seeing Maudie carrying a milk pail up a flight of stairs from which she had poured it, expressing a desire to "get a whack at it," at the same time throwing a stick of wood at the crockery, narrowly escaping the head of Miss Maudie's fiance, who was sitting a few feet away.

Mrs. Moore proved herself quite agreeable to the request of her colored lady friend, and also showed that she possessed to a certain extent some of the ability which made Cy Coombs famous for she promptly uplied her arm, threw a slight drop of the milk pitcher and landed squarely in the face of Mrs. Hayes.

The result was that proceedings were at once taken by the latter, and the athletic Maudie was in court this morning. After two witnesses had testified concerning the case, it was adjourned until tomorrow morning.
