Just before going to the Elysee Palace, to report to the President, M. Briand said:

"My intention was to form a cabinet of the Left, Including M. Herriot, Painleve, Paul Boncour and Blum, but I have not succeeded and prefer to abandon the task."

Within the last few years Canadian wheat, thus diverted, has poured out millions of dollars in employment to American labor, and added greatly to the population of American centres, while our own ports are languishing and our own people have been leaving this country through lack of employment.

It is at an enormous cost to ourselves that we are thus shingling the other fellow's roof. It is root time that we began to put Canadian shingles on Canadian roofs in this matter of traffic.





that it might be a highway providing for the carrying of traffic east and west, bringing the Canadian grain to Canadian ports, and carrying back to the prairies the European and Canadian goods required there.

It was designed especially to prevent the very leakage of traffic of Canadian origin that is bleeding this country white

The Transcontinental, from Winnipeg to Moncton, Saint John and Halifax, instead of being deserted, instead of being a locked-up investment, a paralyzed asset, should be humming with traffic, particularly after inland navigation closes. The effect would be twofold. In the first place it would stop the gigantic leak to American channels, and in the second it would build up the ports and the transfer points all along the line.

MANY thousands of trainloads of Canadian wheat go to the

Think what it would mean if most of that traffic, or all of it, were brought where it rightly belongs, by Canadian hands, over Canadian rails, to Canadian ports.

This issue is one of intense interest to the Maritimes, but is essentially a national issue, and we have just had evidence that its vital nature is appreciated in Winnipeg, in Toronto,

The Maritimes and the country at large have frequent assurances from the Canadian National executive of their strong desire to carry the greatest possible amount of traffic to Canadian ports. But the Transcontinental, which could be employed to that end, is not being so employed. Unless action is taken very soon, when inland navigation closes, the history of the coming winter season will be that of previous ones.

OBVIOUSLY, as the Toronto Star says, it would be much better for Canada if the Canadian traffic now going to American ports were carried to our own harbors, even if the railways received no more than the bare cost of operation. But both the Toronto Star and the Manitoba Free Press point out that the traffic can be kept in Canadian channels at a

Sir Henry Thornton, President of the Canadian National system, having the Transcontinental under his jurisdiction, holds the key to this situation in his hand. He is hearing from Winnipeg, from Toronto, and from other national centres. They are not offering him empty advice, but are pointing out the actual and effective remedy, which is to make proper use of the Transcontinental as a lever to restore this stream of traffic to its natural course.

Could there be a more practical or a more important subject for united and immediate action on the part of the Maritimes—of their Boards of Trade, of their labor organizations, particularly those of port and railway workers, of their members of Parliament, of their citizens generally?

EDMONTON, Nov. 23—Pre-mier Herbert Greenfield, leader of the Farmer Governmier Herbert Greenfield, leader of the Farmer Government since he took over the reins of office from the former Liberal administration in 1921, submitted his resignation to Lieutenant-Governor Egbert to-day, recommending that His Honor ask Attorney-General Brownlee to form a government. Premier Brownlee was sworn in immediately thereafter, followed by his ministers, the official duty being performed by His Honor at his chambers in the government buildings.

OTHER MINISTERS STAY.

Secretary to Mr. Hoadley, while the portfolio of Minister of Municipal Affairs held formerly by Mr. Greenfield was not a candidate he was called upon to form a government after Henry W. Wood and Hon. J. E. Brownlee had both declined to take office as premier.

On August 13, 1921, Premier Greenfield assumed office. He was elected a member of the provincial legislature for the Peace River constituency on December 9, 1921, following the resignation of D. M. Kennedy, and has held the principal seat in the farmer government ever since.






