EDUCATION IN POLAND.

How Schools Are Apportioned in East-ern Galicia.


The Ruthenian and Polish population of Eastern Galicia being so intermingled that there are practically no districts in which there are not inhabitants of both nationalities, both Ruthenian and Polish are taught in the majority of the exhapt

are taught in the majority of the schools. A recent survey of educational condi-tions shows that there are in Eastern Galicia 3,910 state elementary schools, of which 2,510 are Ruthenian, 1,382 Polish and eighteen German. In some districts the number of Ruthenian schools is as high as ninety-five per cent. of the total and in others as low as twenty per cent. The manner of determining the lan-guage of instruction in each school is by vote of the city or village council. There-fore, the relative density of Ruthenian or Polish population determines the per-centage of schools in each language. A need for more elementary schools in Eastern Galicia, as in all Poland, is re-ported, but the condition in this respect is said to be better at the present time than at any time in the history of East-ern Galicia. The number of private ele-mentary schools is considerable. In 1921 there were seventy-five Polish-language secondary schools and fourteen Ruthenian-language secondary schools, as against sixty-seven secondary schools, as against sixty-seven secondary schools, as against sixty-seven secondary schools, maguage and ten with Ruthenian the prin-cipal language in 1914. Since the Polish government took over the administration of Eastern Galicia the number of state teachers' training schools increased by nine, of which five have Ruthenian as the language of instruction. 
The first series of the R. K. Y. C. linghy races was completed last night
