GET POWER FROM FALLS OF JORDAN

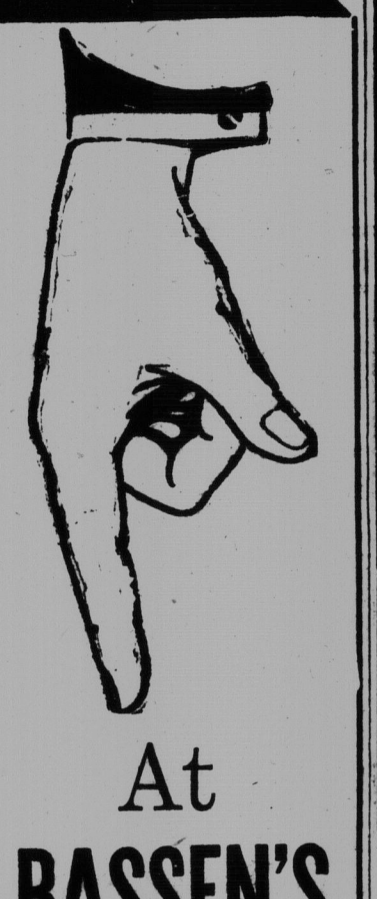

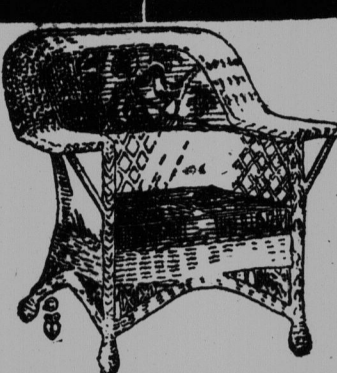

PAY TRIBUTE TO HON. W. S. FIELDING

Members Join in Felicitations to Finance Minister on His Fortieth Political Birthday.

Ottawa, Ont., June 20—Before the house met this afternoon, Liberal members of the house gathered together to pay tribute to Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance, for his forty years of faithful service in public life.

"The country, not less than yourself," the prime minister concluded, "is to be congratulated that today finds you in the midst of your labors, more solicitous of Canada's well-being, and more devoted to her interests than at any period of your long and distinguished political career."

In reply, Mr. Fielding showed much emotion. He recalled the day forty years ago when he was elected to public life, touching lightly on his political experience in the interval.

Shows Value of N.B. Health Legislation

Yesterday's monthly meeting of the sub-district Board of Health, at which John Kelly presided, disclosed through the medium of its reports a pronounced forward movement in the conservation of public health. Its deliberations epitomized in striking manner much of the measures contained in the new provincial health act, which for practically no legislation is being rapidly assimilated into the public life of St. John and environs. Special tuition for backward school children, due to deficient mental, physical and sanitary inspection in rural districts, a new step forward in checking tuberculosis, sewerage for East St. John and a further isolation of milk vendors who persist in unsanitary methods were outstanding items on the meeting's programme.

One of the chief items of interest brought before the board was a series of reports from health inspectors in rural districts, a feature of the new health act. These reports gave data on contagious diseases, quarantine and pleading for same; reporting of householders having unclean premises; neglected privies; one man reported for allowing a dead horse to remain unburied on his farm; dumps and nuisances ordered discontinued and, in a general way, the working of the new law was brought to light through reports handed in from different sections within the board's jurisdiction.

Another striking feature of the meeting was the increase in cases of tuberculosis reported by the nurses, Miss S. E. Brophy, of the Anti-Tuberculosis Society, the total having jumped to 403 cases now under her observation. This increase is due to the searching enquiry made during the case-finding campaign of several weeks ago when more than 200 new names were added to the list. Miss Brophy's report was not unduly alarming since it was generally felt by health officials that a community the size of St. John must have more trace of tubercular trouble than indicated in the reports of the last few years—hid-

one to two a week, or more if conditions warranted.

It was brought out in dealing with the milk situation that there were 291 retail vendors in this city. Some of these were under the ban for non-compliance with the regulations governing proper receptacles, icing, etc., and those who persisted in flouting the law were being refused licenses and proceeded against as public offenders.

In 376 sediment tests made of milk taken from numerous sources of supply and vendors during the month, twelve per cent were labelled "clean," seventy-one per cent "fair," and seventeen per cent "dirty." A similar check is kept on the bacterial count of milk brought into St. John so that the Board is always in possession of authoritative information that weeds out offending dealers and producers.

In the department of Dr. T. Fred. Johnston, dairy inspector, six producers or milk farmers have been refused licenses for failing to carry out progressive and healthful measures appertaining to their premises. Dr. Johnston gave the various slaughter-houses under his supervision a satisfactory bill of health. Relative to child welfare work, it was reported that sixteen clinics were held last month in the Carleton street building and that forty-six new babies were added to the observation list. A new clinic had been started in Prince Edward street under the direction of Dr. MacGregor.

Deaths during the month of May numbered fifty-two, from all causes. The city of late had been singularly free of notifiable diseases, there being

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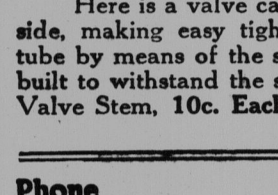

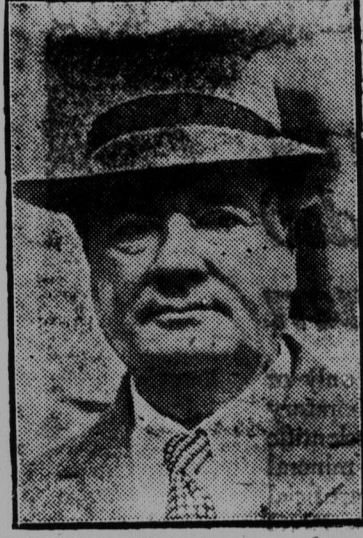

WOMAN TRIES DEATH BY HATPIN IN COURT

Mrs. Vardeman's Move Frustrated as She is Sentenced in Robbery.

New York, June 21.—Mrs. Bertha W. Vardeman, a singer, created a stir in the courtroom of the Special Criminal Term of the Supreme Court when she attempted to stab herself with a hat pin, after she, her husband and Arthur P. Chase, formerly watchman in the Chase National Bank, were sentenced to prison by Justice Louis M. Martin for the theft of \$200,000 from the bank several weeks ago.

John W. Vardeman, her husband, and Chase pleaded guilty to grand larceny in the first degree. A tentative plea for grand larceny was entered for Mrs. Vardeman at the time, but she was permitted to change the plea to receiving stolen property just before she and the other two defendants were arraigned.

BEEES KILL HORSE DRIVER DYING

Paris, June 21.—A swarm of bees attacked a horse which was being driven to the market at Troussay, near Ber Le Duc, and within several minutes stung the animal to death. The driver, who attempted to save the horse by fighting the insects with his coat, was quickly stung into unconsciousness. When found by passersby he was taken to a local hospital. His condition is such as to make the doctors despair of saving his life.

Y. W. C. A. GIRLS PICNIC

The Indoor Outdoor Club of the Y. W. C. A., went for a hike to Red Head yesterday and had a picnic supper on the beach. There were about twenty girls in the party and Miss C. Littlefield was in charge. Some of the girls went in bathing and others prepared the savory meal which was cooked on a large bonfire. After the good things had been demolished a camp fire singing and a story telling session followed and it was with much reluctance that the girls quipped their fire and turned homeward when the hour was too late for them to stay longer.

WOMAN GETS PRISON TERM FOR POSSESSING A PISTOL

New York, June 21.—Mrs. Amelia Percella, 30 years old, and the mother of three children, was sentenced to the penitentiary for not less than six months nor more than three years when she was convicted in Special Sessions last week of having a pistol in her possession on March 10 last.

Detective Lavender told Justice Salmon, Hermann and Healy that when he and other detectives were raiding Mrs. Percella's home at 18 Charlton street on that date in quest of violators of the Mullan-Gage law somebody shot him in the shoulder.

Miss May Mangan, probation officer, said that felonious assault and hoodlugging charges were pending against Mrs. Percella.

A. is requesting a new physical director to take over the duties of Miss C. Littlefield, who has resigned, and a new general secretary to fill the vacancy made by the retirement of Miss Innes MacKenzie. No definite action was taken yesterday in regard to the appointment of the two officials as further applications are to be considered.

Mrs. James F. Robertson presented the Travelers' Aid report which told of 286 trains and twenty-one boats met; 115 persons assisted at the depot, and seventy-three taken to the transient home. Several special cases were cared for and the account given of these revealed some distressing conditions. One little girl of ten years who was traveling alone had been cared for.

Mrs. E. C. Weyman, in her report for the physical committee, said April and May had been the busiest months in the gymnasium when the preparations for the display were in full swing. The display had been splendidly successful but to date receipts totalled \$1,068.30, expenses, \$979 and the net proceeds amounted to \$818.30. The gymnasium girls had given a farewell party to Miss MacKenzie.

Turning to speak of the summer activities Mrs. Weyman reported 200 girls taking part in the various events and 150 enrolled in the swimming classes. The girls had been especially keen for the dollar tickets for ten dips. The hikes and week-end trips were popular and, in this connection, Mrs. Weyman asked the members if they could give any information as to empty summer bunks which the owners would lend to the girls for a week-end. The girls were again enjoying the use of the tennis courts of the German street Baptist church and were very grateful for the privilege. All the accessories had been provided for them.

Mrs. J. D. Hunter in her report of the girls' work committee, said the Convalescent Club had been re-organized by the club and was holding its meetings fortnightly, but they were taking the form of supper gatherings out of doors. She asked for a volunteer leader for the club during August when she would be away at summer camp. Last year's captain, she said, had held a picnic meeting at the breakwater when they had honored Miss Jean Sommerville, who is to leave this fall for China. Miss Mary Allison had been present at the picnic and, on behalf of the campers, had presented to Miss Sommerville a camera, as a parting gift.

MORTALITY DUE TO TUBERCULOSIS IN THE DOMINION

Death Rate Higher in Nova Scotia and P. E. Island Than in New Brunswick—In Other Provinces is Lower.

The mortality due to tuberculosis in 1921 is shown in a special bulletin issued by the dominion bureau of statistics. The total deaths from tuberculosis in the whole dominion, with the exception of Quebec, which was not listed, that year were 4,778, and of those 3,897 were caused by tuberculosis of the respiratory system. The first four months of the year had the larger number of deaths, proportionately, the maximum figure being 480 in March. The bulletin gives the deaths classified according to the different provinces and places the number of deaths in New Brunswick at 403, or 104 for every 100,000 of the population. The death rate in Nova Scotia was higher than in any province except Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia. The death rate in Prince Edward Island was 143 for every 100,000 of population, and in Nova Scotia was 134 for every 100,000. Saskatchewan had the lowest death rate, forty-three for every 100,000, and the other provinces were placed in the following order—Alberta, fifty-two; Manitoba, sixty-nine; Ontario, seventy-one, and

SAY AIR DEFENCE IS INADEQUATE

London, June 21.—(Canadian Press).—The outcry of certain newspapers with regard to the alleged inadequacy of Great Britain's air defence was reflected in the House of Commons yesterday when Major-General Seely declared that the royal air force reserve to be provided by civil aviation had almost entirely disappeared. Consequently, he said, the British defensive power in the air was dangerously low.

Hon. Austen Chamberlain, government leader, replied that the government was alive to the importance of developing aviation in all its aspects with a view to the national service and was very carefully considering the position.

"This must not be taken," he said, "as indicating that our defensive power is necessarily dependent to more than a limited extent on the position of civil aviation."

SIX DANCERS IN BATHING SUITS ARE ARRESTED

Girls From Restaurant Deny Gult But Are Held in \$500 Bail Each.

New York, June 21.—Six young women, none of them yet twenty years old, and all clad in one-piece bathing suits, were arrested at Murray's Restaurant, 228 West Forty-second street, and taken to the West Thirtieth street station, where they were charged with being indecently dressed and taking part in an immoral dance. Joseph Susskind, manager of the restaurant, was also arrested, charged with permitting the dance.

In spite of that protest that their dance was anything but immoral and their offer to prove this to the six gentlemen by a demonstration, the six girls were held in \$500 bail each, which was furnished by the wife of the manager.

"OLD WIVES' LAKE" AN INDIAN TALE

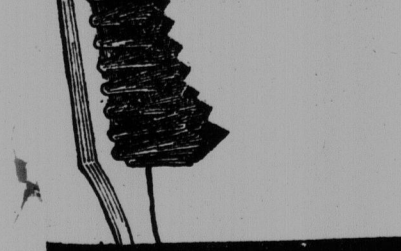
Crees Invaded the Blackfoot Country in Search of Buffalo

Attacked by Enemies; Aged Women Gave Lives to Degrade Pursuers While Remainder of Tribe Escaped.

Among the many fascinating folk tales and legends concerning those almost forgotten days before the white man came, none present more interest or contain more glamor than the story of "Old Wives' Lake."

The geographer may take the map of Saskatchewan and search its length and breadth, but will fail to discover any lake so designated. It is there, however, though masquerading under another name, the name given by the palefaces—Lake Johnson.

One spring, many years ago, a great prairie fire had swept the country in the vicinity of the salt plains south of Humboldt, in the Little Arm district, and the Qu'Appelle and Touchwood Indians usually hunted their buffalo.

The hunters heard rumors of Blackfoot war parties, but food was scarce after the long winter, and though burdened with women and children, the Cree party decided to cross the creek, enter the Blackfoot country and continue the quest for the lost herds.

The prairie fire, which had driven the buffalo herds before it, burnt itself out in the Dirt Hills, and along the shores of Old Wives' Lake the hunting Crees found the animals for which they had searched long and dared much.

The usual clamor and commotion of the barbaric buffalo hunt ensued; a great many animals were slaughtered, the pemmican was made, hides prepared and the proceeds of the hunt loaded on the backs of the wiry Indian horses.

Burdened as they were, the Crees had little hope of reaching Qu'Appelle in safety. Evening was falling and the whole party was called into consultation.

"My son, we old women, who have the wisdom of age, have talked together and have made a plan. We are old, and are no longer fit to become the mothers of men.

The plan was carried out. In the morning the Blackfeet attacked and found only the old women sitting in their blankets about the camp fires.

GRENFELL'S "WOPS" ARE COLLEGE BOYS IN VACATION TIME

In Labrador there is a unique college fraternity. It is called "The Wops" and is made up of university boys who give their services each summer to Dr. Wilfred T. Grenfell, the physician, magistrate, and parish priest of the northern coast.

The name "wop" is truly descriptive of the nature of the work. The college boys dig drains, lay pipes, excavate for foundations, build concrete cellars, and on the sideact as stevedores, and lumberjacks.

Last year, among other jobs, they dug the basement for a new orphanage. But

"dug" hardly suggests the picture; one might better say crowded the excavation. Way back in 1834 Jacques Cartier, apparently after some work of his own in the same neighborhood, wrote of Labrador: "It is not to be called new land, but rather stones, for in all the north land I did not see a cartload of good earth. To be sure, I believe that this was the land that God allotted to Cain."

Cartier's stones have become boulders in the interval, and they were the annoyance, despair and triumph of each day's digging. "Haul on the howling, haul, boys, haul," the gang sang as they worked. But mere hauling was not enough.

So unusual a gang would need a boss out of the ordinary. This indeed they had in a professor of higher mathematics, who handled his pickaxe with the effectiveness of a navy and played the organ in the little church on Sundays with the touch of an artist.

Upon the arrival of every coastal boat with freight for the mission the wops changed their hole. They became stevedores, longshoremen, and deck hands. The old winch grinds up packing cases, boxes, crates, hospital materials, and bundles of every description.

When the mission needs timber it's up to the wops to get it. The amount required last year required the felling of 10,000 trees. Besides these heavier occupations, they make hay, paint the school house, and officiate the Boy Scout troop.

As the motive power behind all this, the reason why these young men substitute hard manual labor for cruising or summer resort frivolities lies in the personality of one man. With each individual wop at any of the mission stations, Battle Harbor, Indian Harbor, Spotted Island, as well as at the headquarters at St. Anthony's, everything that Dr. Grenfell says goes.

FOR PLAYGROUNDS IN FREDERICTON

Large Central Area Awaiting Use—Rotary Club is Interested and Will Help.

The question of playgrounds is receiving special attention in Fredericton at present. St. John's Rockwood playground experience has been duplicated in the capital city. Some twenty-five years ago a large level area centrally located was decided in trust to the city council for use as a civic recreation field. Only within the last two or three years has there been any real development. Some two thousand dollars has been expended in that regard and the area is now in condition to have baseball diamond, running track, tennis courts and playground for small children laid out and put to use. It is being used this season for baseball, and an effort is to be made to keep a physical director on the grounds all through the holidays, and if possible provide supervision for a playground for small children, as swings and tennis and sand-beds are already there. There is a Playgrounds Association, of which the majority are members of the city council, but the council has not felt thus far that it could provide a large grant. This year \$300 was made available, but that sum is wholly inadequate.

A. M. Belding addressed the Fredericton Rotary Club yesterday on Boys' Work, with special reference to playgrounds, although he also urged the need of getting and keeping all children of school age in school, having a thorough medical inspection, encouraging athletics in schools, and providing a vocational high school to make a back-to-school movement of real value to the great majority of pupils who do not enter the classical high school. Mr. Belding reviewed the very inspiring mood of playground development in St. John in the last five years, and urged that in addition to having a physical director on the large playgrounds at least one well supervised playground for small children be conducted this year.

The subject was discussed by members of the Rotary Club and by Judge Limerick, of the Playgrounds Association. President R. L. Phillips of the Rotary Club said there should be a playground in Wilmot Park for the children of the upper portion of the city, and referred to a successful open air rink used last winter as something that should be made permanent.

Rev. Mr. Bates, who was in the chair, and who is chairman of the boys' work committee, urged the need of prompt action, and in such a program as may be carried out with success. The Rotary Club is a very live organization. Like the club in St. John, it believes in hearty singing and good fellowship, as well as practical work.

A visit to the Fredericton Golf Club yesterday revealed the fact that for the folk who love that game the most ample provision is made. The club house sits on the summit of a hill from which one of the finest views in New Brunswick greets the visitor. The great river and the hills below, with the spires of Fredericton and Devon rising above the giant elms that are the glory of city and valley, are a picture of beauty.

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AFTER 45 YEARS HOME AGAIN ON FIRE ANNIVERSARY

Peter McKeown Anxious to Get Trace of His Sister, Whom He Has Not Seen in That Time.

"I left St. John soon after the great fire, and yesterday, the 45th anniversary of that conflagration, I arrived back in St. John," said Peter McKeown to a Times reporter today. McKeown arrived in the city from Boston yesterday in an endeavor to find his sister, whom he last heard of as residing here, and whom he has not seen since he left here. Mr. McKeown was a member of the crew of the steamer New York, which, old residents may remember, anchored in the harbor on that disastrous day forty-five years ago, and gave aid to as many of the refugees as could be taken aboard. Since that time Mr. McKeown has been sailing out of U. S. ports and has been to nearly every city in the world except St. John.

He said this morning that the city of today was not recognizable as the city of forty-five years ago, and everything seemed unreal to him.

Referring to his family, Mr. McKeown said that they had nearly all passed away, and he was desirous of locating his sister, whose name is Margaret Jane McKeown. He is staying at Limerick Hall and will be at St. Peter's church on Sunday. Any information as to the whereabouts of his sister will be greatly appreciated by this old time resident of St. John.

FIRST CATHOLIC SCOUTS INVESTED

Eleven boys were invested as patrol leaders or seconds yesterday afternoon in connection with the organization of the Catholic Boy Scouts here. The ceremony took place in the Y. M. C. 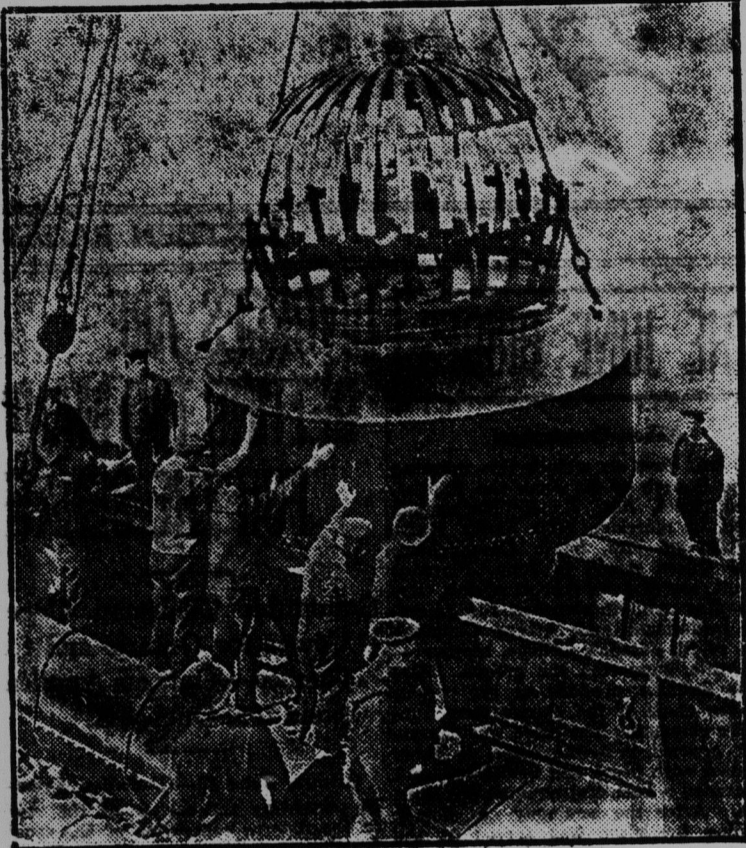

WOMAN KIDNAPPED AS SHE PLAYS GOLF

Three Men Seize Mrs. Marshall on Cincinnati Links and Dash Off in Automobile.

Cincinnati, Ohio, June 21.—Mrs. Clara Marshall, aged 30, was seized on the golf links of the exclusive Maketawh Country Club, and, despite her screams and struggles, was carried to an automobile standing near by and whisked away.

The automobile, with engine running and a man at the wheel, was manoeuvred to a point on the course near Highland avenue, where a player would come close to the roadway. As Mrs. Marshall, Mrs. Louis J. Huck, wife of a former brewer, and two woman companions neared this point the car swung off the roadway and on to the grass. Three men leaped from the car and without a word seized Mrs. Marshall. The chauffeur had only to step on the accelerator when they returned with the struggling woman and the machine dashed away.

Recovering from their amazement, golfers and caddies leaped into machines parked along the course and attempted to give pursuit. No sooner, however, had the alarm been given on the golf links than the police received a telephone message from Earl Lampe, a plumber, who said that he was driving toward Cincinnati over the North Bend road, he saw a car approaching, which he thought he recognized. In the back seat, he said, he saw Mrs. Marshall held firmly in the grip of two men. He made haste to telephone and informed Mrs. Marshall's father and then told the police. He also mentioned the names of the man he says he recognized.

Mrs. Marshall filed suit for divorce from her husband, Albert Marshall, proprietor of the Grand Danant and the Toddston Inn, on April 23. Extremely cruelly was charged. The Marshalls were married last July, but have been separated several months. Mrs. Marshall has been making her home with her father, William Schawe, treasurer of the Krippendorf Dittman Shoe Company.

As soon as the police learned that Mrs. Marshall had a suit for divorce pending, they began a search for her husband to see if he could throw any light on the kidnapers or on the motive back of the abduction. Mr. Marshall, it is said, is very fond of his wife and deeply regrets her attempt to get a divorce, but so far as known he has never given any indication that he would resort to kidnapping to prevent her from having her will.

Mrs. Hauck, one of those with whom

Mrs. Marshall was playing golf at the time of the abduction, said: "It was all over before any one fully realized what had happened. I did not get a good look at the men who seized Mrs. Marshall and put her into the machine, but I am quite sure I had never seen any of them before. So far as I am aware no one who witnessed the affair recognized any of the men."

DUTY MATTERS IN BRITISH HOUSE

London, June 21.—(Canadian Press)—Inimation given in the House of Commons yesterday that the government intends to apply the anti-dumping provisions of the Safeguarding of Industries Act, was very quietly received by the free trade element of the opposition and the real fight will not come until orders for enforcement of these provisions come before the house.

The act provides that no duty shall be imposed under the anti-dumping clauses until it has received the specific approval of the house. A series of lively discussion leading possibly to a revival of the controversy over fiscal matters may be expected.

Signs of such a revival were not wanting yesterday when the Independent Liberals Laborites attacked the principle of an imperial preference in the finance bill, mainly on the ground that preference were "fertilizers of tariffs."

An attack was also made yesterday on the so-called McKenna duties which were imposed on certain articles of luxuries during the war and have been maintained ever since.

FALLING CHIMNEY KILLS A FIREMAN

Four Others Hurt in Blaze at Old Lillian Russell Home at Fox Rockway.

New York, June 21.—One fireman was killed and four others injured when a chimney caved in while the men were fighting a fire in the old Lillian Russell summer home, a two-story colonial, today on Reid's Lane. The dead fireman was Emmett Donnelly, 1,821, Hollywood avenue, Fox Rockway. He was married and had one child.

The building is owned by the O'Leary estate. It had been used as a hotel, but has been unoccupied for a considerable time. Boys have frequently played in it, and it is thought that possibly they were responsible for the fire. Engine Company No. 154 was the first to arrive. They went into the building and were playing water on the flames on the first floor, when the chimneys collapsed and broke through the roof and the second floor. One chimney was in the front of the cottage and the other in the rear, and the firemen were showered with bricks and heavy fragments of wood.

The four injured firemen, Abrams, Carmen, Dugan and Hesney, were carried out unconscious by other firemen. They were treated by an ambulance surgeon and taken to St. Joseph's Hospital. Shortly after they had been brought out Donnelly was missed. The building was ablaze when this discovery was made and search was impossible at the time. When the fire was under control at 4 p. m., Donnelly's body was found by firemen, and was so badly burned as to be hardly recognizable.

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RIVALRY FOR RUBBER.

Radio Outfit Makers and Pipe Manufacturers Clamor For It.

The radio craze has been a mighty good thing and still is for the masses because of electrical supplies and wireless outfits, but it is not causing any noticeable outburst of rejoicing in the pipe and smokers' article trade, says the New York Times. As a matter of fact, the leading pipe manufacturers in and about New York City have been put to a great deal of inconvenience and expense as a result of the wireless boom.

That doesn't mean that one should jump to the conclusion that the pipe people are put out because radio fans are giving up the "noxious weed." On that score there is no ground for grumbling, for there is no evident decline of smoking, and especially pipe smoking. According to one of the leading manufacturers of pipes, the men and a good many of the women are doing more pipe smoking than at any other recent period.

The reason for their complaint is far removed from the question of smoking and not smoking. It arises from the fact that a material that is used in a minor but rather essential part of pipes and cigarette holders is also just as essential to radio apparatus. That material is vulcanized rubber.

Virtually every moderately priced pipe and many of the very expensive ones have vulcanized rubber bits. The long novelty cigarette holders that at present are enjoying great popularity are also for the most part entirely manufactured of vulcanized rubber.

Radio outfits also used vulcanized rubber to a considerable extent. It is employed usually for bases, insulators, and in almost all types of outfits for the headpieces.

To intensify the conflict of interests between the pipe and the radio industries, the manufacturers who fabricate vulcanized rubber cigarette holders and pipe bits are the identical ones who are engaged in manufacturing the rubber accessories for radio. As a result the radio folk are feeling in these circumstances, but they do know that they are still waiting for deliveries of rubber with a glut of orders and are daily falling further behind in their shipments.

rubber bits and holders are from sixteen to eighteen weeks overdue.

How serious this is to the pipe industry can best be realized when one considers the amount of rubber used for smokers' articles. There are no definite figures available, but one of the leading men in the industry has said that upward of \$500,000 would be a conservative estimate of the amount annually expended by the pipe manufacturers for rubber bits and holders.

POLICEMAN FOUND DROWNED

New York, June 21.—The body of Patrolman Edward Moraghan of the Charles street station, who disappeared mysteriously from the pier at the foot of Ferry street, North River, where he was on strike duty, was recovered by

Theodore Bathen, a diver, twenty-five yards out from the pier.

Evidence showed that Moraghan had struggled to save himself. At 4 o'clock Thursday morning Moraghan's cap was seen floating on the surface near the dock by a brother officer. Throughout the day the men of the main division grappled for the body unsuccessfully. Bathen was hired by the patrolmen of the Charles street station. Members of the fourth squad, to which Moraghan was attached, manned the air pumps. Moraghan was 43 years old and had been a member of the police force for 14 years. He leaves a wife and seven children.

ARBUCKLE ALMOST BROKE

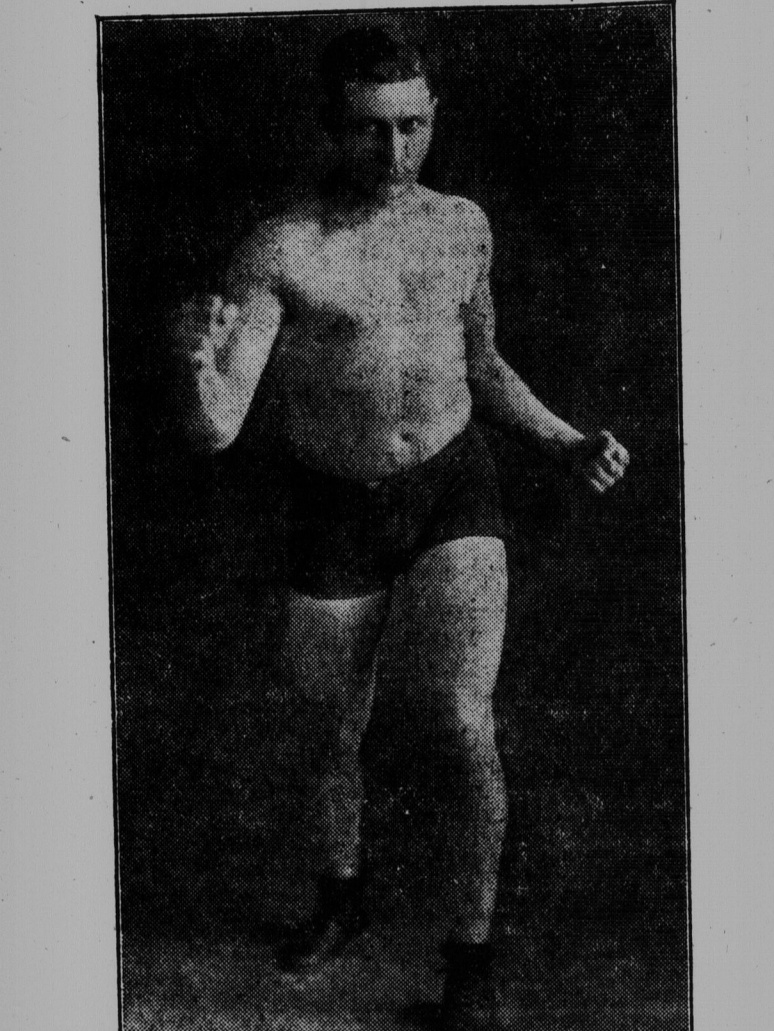

IN WAR LANDS

Polish Situation Better, Serious in Austria, Much Improved in Czecho-Slovakia.

London, June 2—(A. P. by mail) The general situation in Poland has improved considerably in the last six months; Austria's economic condition is still extremely serious, but Czecho-Slovakia has

made a wonderful recovery. This summarizes the observations of Walter Lyman Brown, director for Europe of the American Relief Administration, who has just returned to London after a trip through central Europe. He visited Prague, Warsaw and Vienna. In the two latter cities the A. R. A. will finish its child-feeding in June. The A. R. A. closed down in Czecho-Slovakia in the summer of 1921.
The chief problem in Poland from the A. R. A. point of view, Mr. Brown said, was the devastated region in the East, complicated by the refugees pouring

over the eastern border from Russia. There is also considerable suffering in the big industrial centres, where the rehabilitation work is not yet complete. Legislation has been passed recently by which 400,000 children will be fed by the Polish government and communes until next October, and 800,000 until the following June.
Mr. Brown found Austria still in a serious position. For that reason the A. R. A. offered to leave \$200,000 worth of food to help continue the work after its withdrawal. Legislation making it possible to perpetuate the child-feeding

passed the Austrian Parliament May 16.
In Czecho-Slovakia, from which the A. R. A. withdrew in the summer of last year, Mr. Brown said the problem is entirely different from that in the other countries. Czecho-Slovakia has made a wonderful recovery. There is contribution to the welfare of the coming generations in Central Europe."
