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

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*To the Subscribers and Friends of the Fresh-Air Fund.*

In submitting a report of its work during the past season, the Committee would express its gratification at the generous and spontaneous support it has received. There has been no canvassing for funds, and yet nearly all the money needed to carry on this work has been subscribed.

The inaugural meeting, this year, was held at 165 St. James Street, on the 7th of June, when a number of gentlemen interested in the movement were present.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The following gentlemen composed the Executive Committee: The Revs. J. Nichols, James Patterson, Samuel Massey, Robert Lindsay, H. J. Evans, John Holmes, Chambly; E. McManus, Chambly; Rev. Father Lesage, Chambly, and Messrs. Charles Alexander, D. H. Henderson, George Kemp, Peter McLeod, Peter Sinclair, Henry F. Lunan, S. H. Parsons and S. T. Willett. The Rev. John Nichols was re-elected Chairman, Mr. Charles Alexander was re-elected Hon. Treasurer, and Mr. J. F. Cunningham was appointed Secretary *pro tem*.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE.

The national Societies were asked to elect representatives to form and Advisory Committee.

SELECTION OF A HOME.

The question of a Home was very carefully considered. After reviewing the work of last year, the Committee decided not to send any

children to Murray Bay this season; also that a change from Varennes Springs was desirable, provided a suitable building could be secured elsewhere. Information was received that the well-known "Officers' Quarters," at Chambly Canton, were available. Several Members of the Committee went out to examine them and reported favorably. Finally, the buildings were leased for the season, with the privilege of storage of furniture, etc., until the 1st of May, 1889. The rooms are large and lofty, and the breeze from the Richelieu Rapids is refreshing and gives all the fresh air needed. The building was in need of repairs, and the want of shade trees was a drawback, but the Committee did its best to compensate for this latter want by erecting a number of awnings, which cost little and afforded a welcome protection from the sun. Owing to the close proximity of the river, the river bank was rendered safe by a suitable fence. Bathing houses were also placed in the river, and well guarded. A little expense and a great deal of care were devoted to the sanitary arrangements, so that no danger might be incurred from this direction.

#### DIVISION OF THE WORK.

Profiting by the experience of the past, the work, this year, was simplified and more efficiently performed by dividing it into sections, and placing each under the care of a sub-Committee. All the sub-Committees reported weekly to the general Executive, when each report was carefully considered and instructions given for the ensuing week. The Chairman was, ex-officio, a member of each sub-Committee.

#### COMMITTEE ON SELECTION OF INMATES.

First, there was a *sub-Committee for the selection of suitable inmates* for the Home. This was a work of vital importance and required men well acquainted with the city's poor and their needs. The Rev. Jas. Patterson and Messrs. Peter McLeod and Peter Sinclair were entrusted with this work. The sub-Committee met daily to receive applications and to take action thereon. It was also instructed to employ a Physician to visit the houses of all applicants, to certify whether any contagious disease existed there, and whether the parties were sick or delicate and required a change of air for restoration to health. The services of Dr. James McNeece, of St. Lambert, were secured, and were rendered to the satisfaction of the Committee. It was decided that the parties selected should be sent to Chambly on the Tuesday and Friday of each week, and that they should remain in the Home about fourteen days, except in cases where circumstances rendered it desirable that they should remain longer. The first party went out on the 28th of June, and the last party returned on the 30th of August. Altogether about 1,050 have enjoyed the advantages of the Home at Chambly. This number is 340 more than the total sent to the two Homes last year. It was stipulated, as a condition for admission to the Home, that the applicant should produce a certificate from a Clergyman or Priest, testifying as to moral character and general fitness to be-

come an inmate. The zeal, care and intelligence with which this sub-Committee discharged its duties are deserving of the highest praise. In many cases it had a trying and thankless task to perform, and all through the season a heavy tax was imposed upon its strength.

### COMMITTEE OF AMUSEMENTS.

A *Sub-Committee on Amusements* was appointed and contributed in no small measure to make the time pass cheerfully and happily. This sub-Committee was composed of the Rev. Samuel Massey, and Messrs. Parsons, Henderson, Graham, Kemp and Sinclair. These gentlemen obtained the assistance of many kind friends in the city, who gladly aided them in ministering to the social, physical and mental gratification of both old and young. To mention all those who thus contributed to these enjoyments would require a great deal of time and space, while to name a few only would be invidious where every one did well. Moreover, public notice was taken of the different entertainments at the time they were given. These embraces ventriloquistic and magic-lantern exhibitions; short addresses upon the benefits of domestic cleanliness, order, etc.; vocal and instrumental music, and a variety of games and sports, all of which must have taxed the ingenuity of the promoters, and for which simple prizes were given.

### A PURCHASING SUB-COMMITTEE

was appointed which soon discovered that it had a formidable work upon its hands. It was found that the Home was capable of accommodating about 260 mothers and children, at one time, and that its capacity was likely to be taxed to the utmost. It became necessary, therefore, to buy a large number of additional beds, bedsteads, blankets, pillows, bolsters, and bed linen. Besides these, the numerous other things required for housekeeping purposes had to be provided in proportion. The best and cheapest market had to be sought out and the greatest care exercised in selection. Then, to cater for so large a number was a serious matter. The Committee resolved that for a fortnight, at least, these poor people should have as much plain food and milk as they cared for. Good milk and vegetables were secured in Chambly, and the best bread, meat and groceries, which could be bought were sent out daily from the city. The Chairman and Mr. D. H. Henderson, had this branch of the work committed to them.

*The Staff at the Home* consisted of Mrs. Kollmyer, Matron; Mr. Howard D. Kemp, resident medical attendant; "Carroll," who acted as Caretaker and man of all work; and seven others who attended to the cooking, dining-room, chambers and laundries. All these had a busy time, but discharged their duties faithfully and well.

In the opinion of the Committee, Mr. Howard D. Kemp deserves the warmest gratitude for the valuable services which he rendered, gratuitously, and with such ability and cheerfulness. Night and day he obeyed the call

of duty. Messrs. Willis & Co. kindly sent out a piano to the Home for the entertainment of its inmates; and every evening the instrument was employed in leading the singing, mothers and children "joining in" with evident delight. These gatherings will be long remembered. After singing came the evening prayer, led by the Rev. Mr. McManus, or the Rev. Mr. Holmes.

#### COMMITTEE OF FINANCE.

*A sub-Committee on Finance*, composed of Messrs. Chas. Alexander, D. H. Henderson, G. Kemp and S. H. Parsons, was appointed. All accounts were settled weekly, and a statement of receipts and disbursements was presented at each meeting of the Executive. All accounts, after being checked and initialed by the purchaser, were presented to the Finance sub-Committee, by whom they were again initialed and ordered to be paid. All the accounts have been audited by Messrs. Philip S. Ross & Sons, Chartered Accountants, whose report is herewith submitted. The accompanying Financial Statement shows the actual receipts to have been \$5,074.23, and the disbursements, including unpaid liabilities, \$5,169.23, leaving a deficit of \$95.00.

About \$1,000.00 have been spent upon furniture during the season, and the Committee estimates that it has \$2,500.00 worth of plant now in its possession, all of which is carefully packed and stored.

#### THE INMATES.

Did they really belong to that class which the public desired should receive the benefits of this movement? The Committee would emphatically answer yes, with now and then an exception, but, when such exceptions were detected, they were promptly returned to the city. The members of the Committee have had special opportunities of knowing the real circumstances of those sent out to the Home. At the time when public attention was called to what were deemed the most wretched localities of the city, there were at the Home representatives from nearly everyone of the dwellings to which public notice had been directed. In some other instances referred to, the Committee had found the father and mother incapable through drink, and it was impossible to take charge of the children. Those who would justly estimate this work should bear in mind that to see the mothers and children on board the train, or carefully provided for by the Committee, is a very different thing from seeing them in their ordinary garbs at home. Many of the applicants were provided with articles of clothing before they could venture to leave town, and others were supplied when they arrived at the Home. On reaching Chambly, not a few manifested a decided aversion to the cleanliness and order which the rules of the Home required. Some of these, however, in a day or two, gave up the contest and presented an improved appearance. A few, not many, on the other hand, preferred to return home rather than fall into line.

## THE SUB-COMMITTEE ON EXCURSIONS

arranged trips which gave twelve hundred children and mothers a delightful day on the water. These mothers and children were selected from the poorest in the city. Breeze and sunshine sent them home at night like new creatures. These trips were under the direction of Messrs. H. F. Lunan, S. H. Parsons and other members of the Committee, assisted by friends from the various churches of the city.

## RESULTS OF THE WORK.

During the season and since the work was concluded, the Committee have had ample evidence, both direct and indirect, of the good done. Mothers and friends, before and since leaving the Home, at the office of the Committee and in their own houses, have testified to the benefits received. The members of the Selection Sub-Committee in particular, whilst continuing their work among the poor, have witnessed the actual good done, as well as the probable evil prevented.

Dr. McNeece has presented an exhaustive report, speaking of the number of visits which he made; the difficulties which he met with in selecting the most deserving cases; the general improvement in the health of those who were sent out to the Home; the excellence of the food and cooking; that no accident befell any one of the 1050 inmates, and that only two of the little ones died, and they within 24 hours after entering the Home.

## THE FUTURE OF THE FRESH-AIR MOVEMENT.

The Sub-Committee upon inmates makes some important suggestions in its report. As these bear upon questions which the public would do well to consider, we transcribe them here.

"In making selections it becomes a matter of importance to consider how far the benefits of the Fund should be extended. Should they be confined to those who are already sick—or, as much as possible, embrace all who are living in localities exposed to a vitiated atmosphere? How far does the proverb 'an ounce of prevention is better than a pound of cure' here apply? As a matter of fact, living side by side with the very poor who have failed in the great battle life, we have the great body of the humbler portion of the working classes. These, after providing the necessaries of life for their families, find it as impossible to give them *Fresh Air* as do the absolutely poor. Will not an enlightened philanthropy extend a helping hand to these also? Would not this tend to improve the public health, diminish the danger arising to all from epidemics, and promote a kindly feeling between important sections of the community?"

The Committee in many cases acted in this spirit and believe they have the approval of the generous contributors to the Fund in so doing.

There is another serious difficulty which the Committee have encountered in the selection of inmates, and one which it has not yet been able to solve. The movement was started in the interests of *Children*, and children who are sick or weakly. But, in the practical working of the scheme, it has been

found impossible to limit it to the sick children. A sick child requires a nurse, and its natural nurse is its mother, hence the mother has been sent with it. But that mother may be healthy and strong, and she may have other children who are not sick; these cannot be left at home, for they are young and need a mother's care. What is the Committee to do? It must either refuse to send the sick child away or send those who are not absolutely sick with it. This is a problem not yet solved. If those interested would kindly suggest a solution, the Committee would be grateful. But even these stronger ones have derived a great deal of benefit from the change, and careful observers have not been slow to notice this and remark upon it.

The Committee is strongly of the opinion that the movement should be placed on a solid and permanent basis as soon as possible. A prominent citizen generously offers \$1000.00 towards this object, stipulating only that a suitable building be purchased or erected and opened free of debt. Perhaps this offer will stimulate others to do likewise. Here is an opportunity for our wealthy citizens to do good on a large scale.

In conclusion, the Committee would gratefully acknowledge the help it has received from the numerous contributors to the Fund; to the children of well-to-do parents, in the city and at the summer resorts, who organized bazaars and concerts in aid of the Fund. Contributions from these sources were doubly encouraging; while they largely assisted the Fund, they cheered the little ones under the Committee's care. It was very gratifying to them to know that the better-off boys and girls were interested in their behalf. It would also tender its hearty thanks to the following for their special favors:—To James Stephenson, Esq., Supt. G.T.R'y, and Mr. John Stone, Agent at Bonaventure Station; to J. A. Willis & Co., for the use of a piano during two months in the Chambly Home; to Dr. Glenn, of Chambly, for gratuitous professional services; to Chas. Alexander, Esq., for his services as honorary treasurer of the "Fresh Air Fund," and to the Bible Society for the gift of a number of Bibles for the use of the inmates.

The Committee tenders its thanks, also, to Dr. McNeece, and Mrs. Kollmyer, the Matron, for the excellent services which they have rendered in connection with this good work.
