

Hugo Hayedorn, a German Sailor, Caught in the Act of Robbing for the Third Time the Cash Register in Speardakes' Fruit Store.

Hugo Hayedorn, an eighteen year old German sailor, was early this morning caught in the act of robbing the cash register in John Speardakes' fruit and ice cream parlors on Charlotte street. The German admitted the theft and said he had broken into the store three successive nights, robbing the place on each occasion.

He and his clerks left the store shortly after midnight Saturday, and when the clerks returned Monday morning, they found that the cash register had been opened by the "No sale" key and robbed of about half a dollar in change. On investigation it was found that entrance had been made through a cellar window on Charlotte street. Tho window is left unfastened to allow the ice men to put in the lee early in the morning. On Monday night some small change was left in the register, and Tuesday morning it was found to have been stolen. Last night Mr. Speardakes decided to put on a guard to watch the store and two clerks, Peter Economy, and Thomas Arniotes were detailed for that duty, and were successful in capturing the thief.

They notified the proprietor who gave Hayedorn in charge of night Detective Charles Marshall. Mr. Speardakes informed the court that his pool room has been robbed six of seventimes, Hayedorn admitted to the witness that he had robbed the cash register on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday nights.

He walked to the cash register ard took out sixty cents. At this moment witness levelled his revolver at the thief and sang out "Stop." This awoke Economy who called out to the burgiar "Hand up." So taken by surprise was the German that he dropped the money on the floor and started for the hatchway to make his escape. The clerks took hold of him and after some little difficulty tied his hands with a piece of cord. He was finally handed over to the police.





The exhibition is held in the great hall and gardens of the Casino, an admirable builfing devoted to fashionable promenades, concerts and such like, with saloons, corridors, galleries and a canopied anneze, the whole covering some three acres of ground.

As one passes out of the main building, down the main walk, what a sight is presented! No formal and straight tables to meet the eye, no crowding for the want of space; but instead, the whole of the surroundings have been so skilffully arranged, with roomy walks and beautifully painted pannor amas, that the effect is almost magical, and leads one to imagine himself in an Elysium.
