WITNESS AGAINST REBELS DISCREDITED Convict Informer's Record Bared In Court, the Judge Helping

Trial Held Secretly—Man and Woman,
Prisoners, Known in America,
Make Defense.

ST. PETERSBURG, March 10.—Nicholas V. Tschakovsky and Madame Brashkovskaya, revolutionists, who have many friends in America, were placed on trial today for alleged criminal activity in their cause. The court adjourned its sittings at 11 o'clock tonight with the testimony of the prosecution and defense entirely in. The prosecution's whole case rests on the statements of Pateuk, a convict informer, who added nothing to what he had already given in the indictment. The cross-examination, in which the judge played a prominent part, brought out Pateuk's criminal record of murder and brigandage. Pateuk has been cited as a crown witness in eight political trials yet to be held.

Tschakovsky's witnesses included business associates from England. The court also admitted as a witness a committee member of the Labor party, who testified that Tschakovsky had been delegated by the Labor party to collect funds in America for the benefit of exiles.

The public was not admitted to the courtroom, the audience being confined to the prisoners, court officers, Tschakovsky's wife and forty gentlemen and plain clothes officers. Judge Krasnenko presided. At the opening of the trial a motion for separate trials as well as the request by the state for an adjournment of Tschakovsky's case in view of the non-appearance of Pateuk, the political agent of the secret police. Subsequent American witnesses were also denied.

Madame Bracy, daughter of Tschakovsky, was admitted to the courtroom. She was seated next to her father. The court permitted Madame Bracy to remain at the trial, but this was refused.

The witnesses, including several prominent radicals and Pateuk, the convict, who appeared as a witness against the state during the preliminary trial, before the opening of the trial, Madame Bracy, the daughter of Tschakovsky, who was the only woman in the courtroom, declined to testify, claiming that the trial was within closed doors.

Tschakovsky pleaded not guilty and Madame Brashkovskaya responded: "I admit that I am a Social-Revolutionist," when the trial began. On the red-covered table were seated the judge and the three class representatives of the nobility, urbanites and peasantry. Tschakovsky's emotion was marked as he replied to the customary questions. His occupation, he said, was that of a preacher and the doctrine he expounded was "socialism."

SHE REVELED HIM, YET HE LOVED HER Dupe of Countess Slew Lat- ter's Husband

Sensational Murder Trial Resumed in
Venice Court—Aristocrat Says Woman
Is Irresponsible.

VENICE, March 10.—The interrogation of Dr. Naumoff, one of the four defendants accused of the murder of Count Komarowski in 1907, was resumed in the Assize Court today. The other three defendants are the Countess Tarnowski, who was the second wife of the Count Komarowski, a well known aristocrat named Priloff, and her maid, Elie Perier. The woman had divorced her first husband, Count Tarnowski. Naumoff and Priloff were lovers of hers. Count Komarowski insured his life for \$100,000 in her favor, whereupon it is alleged, he induced the other defendants either to kill him or act as accessories. Dr. Naumoff, it is alleged, fired the five shots into the Count's body.

Before the opening of the court today Count Orloff, father of the Countess, met her outside the doors. Both were affected to tears. The Countess, however, soon regained her composure, and followed the testimony of Dr. Naumoff very closely. Dr. Naumoff testified to his infatuation for the Countess, and how she had gradually persuaded him to murder Count Komarowski.

Today Naumoff adhered to his original statement that the Countess had ordered him to kill Komarowski. He said he still loved the Countess, although she had turned and reviled him. The judge proceeded to reconstruct the case. His highly dramatic narrative moved the court profoundly.

Prof. Rossi, of Genoa, declares that the Countess is suffering from a madness which makes her unanswerable for her acts. He recalled the fact that she has three times attempted suicide.

TOWN FUNDS IN
THE DEFUNCT BANK
Not Exploited.

ST. STEPHEN, N. B., March 10.—There are no developments in the bank situation today, and probably nothing will be known of the affairs until the morning when Mr. Kessen makes his statement.

BIG PROFITS IN MOVING PICTURES Edison, as Inventor, Gets About \$7,200 a Week

Recognized Producers Get an Injunction
Against Unauthorized Traders—Now
Some 13,000 Shows in U. S.

NEW YORK, March 10.—Since the settlement not long ago of the differences between Thomas A. Edison and the Biograph people and various independent moving picture companies, which terminated in Mr. Edison's patent rights, peace had promised to reign among the manufacturers of the pictures for the first time in nearly fifteen years. But a few months ago a number of new manufacturers springing up, it is charged, boldly infringed upon Mr. Edison's patents and set about justifying themselves on the ground that, as they alleged, the eleven manufacturers in this country and Europe who since the settlement have been paying Mr. Edison royalties were violating the Sherman anti-trust law.

It is declared that they would either break up the settlement or force Mr. Edison to open his patents to them. This idea of contesting the exercise of an inventor's patent rights led to violation of the Sherman law and was the only novel feature in the litigation, which resulted yesterday in a decision by Judge Joyce of the United States Circuit Court that an injunction should lie against the group of defendants, who admittedly have been infringing upon Mr. Edison's patents, the defendants being Carl Laemmle and the Independent Moving Picture Company of America, of which he is president, and the Patograph Company.

The president of one of the companies which are paying royalties to Mr. Edison, said yesterday: "You may see at a glance that with the 1,000,000 or 2,000,000 persons who make up the daily attendance of the 13,000 moving picture theatres in this country the question of the supply of these films is a matter of wide interest."

THE CAMORRA A Mysterious Body Whose Power is Always Increasing.

The historian Signor Pasquale Villari contributes an article to the "Nuova Antologia" about the resuscitation of Naples, in which he examines the different causes that hinder the moral regeneration of the inhabitants and the industrial development of the city. He explains at length the mistaken policy adopted towards the improvement of Naples, consisting in demolishing old houses and building new ones, which resulted in the increase of house rents and in the consequent over-crowding of the slums.

After suggesting the proper remedies for the solution of the housing problem he concludes by giving some interesting particulars about the Camorra, the scourge that in half a century the Italian Government has not succeeded in eradicating. Signor Villari contrasts the fact that whereas under the Bourbon Government the Camorra existed only in prisons, where no doubt it originated and flourished, and people referred to it in whispers, at present it has extended to all classes of society and is a topic of public conversation.

Evidently the original character of the Camorra has been altered and the institution has become akin to a secret mercantile undertaking with the sole object of making money at all costs even if crime has to be resorted to. The Camorra now fosters usury, clandestine lotteries and illegal pawn-broking.

It protects vice, organizes burglaries and actively participates in administrative and political elections. The power of the Camorra increases daily. The police resort to the Camorra to detect crimes, and private citizens seek its aid to recover stolen property. A chauffeur ran over and killed a lady and he sought safety in flight. "The police will never catch him," Signor Villari overheard a man saying. "Yes, they will arrest him tomorrow morning," replied his friend, as the Camorra has taken the case up.

A police officer confessed in court that he would never have arrested two burglars and he not involved the Camorra's aid. The head of a young ladies' seminary worked the Camorra's protection to prevent the girls from being insulted in the streets, since the police were unable to help him.

No deputy can be elected in Naples if the Camorra opposes him. All the efforts to combat the Camorra are useless since according to law no man can be convicted and punished unless he commits a crime. Thus when recently the police arrested the newly elected mayor of the Camorra they were less than successful. The Camorra is not a crime. Capt. Fabroni of the carabinieri initiated a war against the Camorra, but he had to give it up as he arrested Camorristi simply for being members of the association and the judicial authorities ruled that he had exceeded his functions.

Signor Villari hopes that the forthcoming Cuscolo trial will reveal whether the charges against the civil police who hampered the work of Capt. Fabroni are well founded, and he concludes by invoking a special law sanctioning the arrest of members of the Camorra independently of any crime committed.

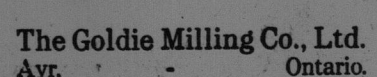
BIG WESTERN DISPLAY FOR ST. JOHN FAIR

Manager H. J. P. Good of the Exhibition Association arrived home from Montreal and Toronto yesterday. While in Upper Canada Mr. Good addressed a convention of the Eastern Passenger Association at Montreal, strongly urging upon that body the consideration of preferred rates to the city of St. John during the Dominion exhibition in September. Mr. Good took occasion to state that he thought the eastern provinces might show some preference in railway fares, as special rates were given in a western direction. He claimed that at present they were encouraging traffic by the establishment of parks at their own expense, and in the same way stations were increasing passenger traffic for steam railways.

In Montreal and Toronto Mr. Good interviewed a number of important persons with a view to having them make exhibits at St. John. Some who had already decided to do so indicated upon what lines they expected to make a display, and others who had not given the matter serious thought were induced to come east. The general indication was that more western concern in the matter of special attractions several amusement managers held conferences with Mr. Good, who explained to them the facilities offered in this department. It is quite probable some of these entertainment promoters will come to St. John to personally look over the ground.

EMPRESS SAILED

THIS AFTERNOON

Virginian at Halifax With 1439 Passengers

Herperan Delayed Waiting for Passengers
—Certain Day Tomorrow From London and Havre.

The C. P. R. steamer Empress of Britain, Captain Murray, sailed this afternoon for Liverpool via Halifax. The steamer had on board about 1400 passengers. The Empress took away a large general cargo. There were several reports on the steamer. These people reached this city yesterday at noon.

The Montreal express arrived in two sections today. The second section, with passengers for the Empress, went to Sand Point direct.

Allen liner Virginian reached Halifax at 4 o'clock this morning. The steamer is bringing 1439 passengers from Liverpool, which is the largest number carried by an Allen liner during the present season. It is expected that only a small number of the passengers will leave the steamer at Halifax. The Virginian sails tonight for this port and will arrive here tomorrow afternoon.

Allen liner Hesperian, which now lies at No. 1 berth at Sand Point, will sail for Liverpool tomorrow. The steamer was to have left today, but some of the passengers have been delayed. The steamer will carry over 200 passengers.

The Allen liner Corinthian will arrive at this port this afternoon from London via Havre. The steamer is bringing over 200 passengers. The Corinthian is the largest steamer on the London service. She is carrying a very heavy cargo.

The steamship companies look forward to the continuance of the present heavy passenger travel until the close of the season.

NO "LEAD PIPE CINCH" ABOUT THIS AFFAIR

Boy Who Stole Junk Was Assaulted by Dealer and Then Arrested—Social Provisions G. I. Him Into Trouble.

Harold Glaspy was arrested about ten o'clock this morning by Sgt. Campbell, charged by a junk dealer, named Louis Dritz, with stealing about ten pounds of lead from his wagon in Sheffield street. Glaspy and another boy, named Louis Gorman, were seen taking the lead from the wagon. Glaspy put it under his overcoat and ran. He was chased by the dealer, who caught him on the dump at the foot of Sheffield street. Dritz struck the boy a blow on the face, and just as he was about to land another, Sgt. Campbell happened along. The officer took Glaspy in charge on the complaint made by Mr. Dritz. He also reported Dritz for assaulting Glaspy on Sheffield street.

Glaspy was brought before the court as soon as he arrived at the central police station. Dritz took the stand and swore that he saw the Glaspy boy take the lead from the wagon and run down Sheffield street towards the dump. Mrs. Brown, from whom he was buying junk, told him that two boys were stealing from his wagon. He did not see the other boy but succeeded in catching Glaspy.

Sgt. James Campbell told of making the arrest. Dritz gave the boy in charge.

The sixteen boy explained that he was on Sheffield street with Louis Gorman. The latter took the lead, which weighed about a pound and a half, he would judge, and dropped it while running. The prisoner picked it up and threw it into some straw near the Imperial Oil Company's shed. The boy said that he was not wrong because he was to a party last night. He asked off yesterday afternoon to get ready to the party, and had to stay away from work this morning, because he got in so late. In the meantime he got into trouble.

The case was here adjourned until two o'clock when the Gorman boy and Mrs. Brown will be present to give evidence.
