FIRST GUN FIRED FOR PROHIBITION

E. Tennyson Smith, British Tem-
perance Lecturer, Opens at
Campbellton.

A STIRRING ADDRESS.

Declares War on Liquor Traffic
and Provincial Campaign Will
be Inaugurated.

Campbellton, N. B., Nov. 11.—
Ref. E. Tennyson Smith, the dis-
tinguished English temperance lec-
turer, arrived here on the English
mail special on Friday evening to
enter upon a week's campaign.
Friday evening he met the local
committee and the plans for the
meetings were discussed and final
arrangements made, but it was
not until today that the real cam-
paign began.

On Saturday evening a welcome
was given Mr. Smith by the tem-
perance people and Mayor Murray,
on behalf of the town. The mayor's
address was warmly applauded
and at its close he gave Mr. Smith
a hearty handshake. J. M. Mc-
Lean, W. P. of Campbellton divi-
sion, presided and gave an appro-
priate address. Warm words of
welcome were also expressed by
each of the four Protestant clergy-
men of the town.

W. F. Trueman, who had just re-
turned from the session of the
Grand division at St. John, also
spoke, and made it clear that the
definite object of the campaign
should be and is provincial prohibi-
tion.

The address in reply by Mr.
Smith proved him at once to be
the very man wanted to arouse
the province to the realization of
the drink evil. He first extended
thanks for the hearty welcome he
had received and humorously con-
trasted the difference between land-
ing at Rimouski and his arrival at
Campbellton. After a very feeling
reference to the death of his wife,
and the sad trip to his native land,
incidentally stating that had it
not been for his pledged word to
the committee at St. John it was
doubtful if he would have ventured
from his native shores, he asked
those present to join him in sing-
ing "Blest Be the Tie That Binds."
All hearts were touched, and need-
less to say the old hymn was sung
with a new force.

Mr. Smith then launched forth
upon one of the most stirring ad-
dresses ever heard in this town. He
referred to the fact that war had
been declared upon the liquor traf-
fic and he wanted that understood
from the outset. War means that
someone is going to be hurt unless
it is a sham fight, where blank
cartridges were used. He didn't
use blank cartridges. If no one
was hurt he would take the first
boat to England. He had been
called an extremist, and he frankly
admitted that there was no word
in the English language strong
enough to express his feelings in re-
gard to the liquor business. If he
could talk Welsh he might accom-
plish it. (Laughter).

"People didn't realize the evil.
We see the comedy but fail to see
the tragedy," and here the lecturer
told some incidents from his ex-
perience that somehow made a
deep impression, and one found
oneself unconsciously making
strong and higher resolves.

In conclusion, Mr. Smith said he
was glad to learn there was a de-
finite object in view as the final
outcome of the campaign.

Visitors to the Vessel Found Every-
thing Intact on
Deck.

BRAVE P. E. I FISHERMEN.

Subscriptions Taken Up to Reward

has reached here that some parties
succeeded in boarding the Adeona
this morning and found everything
intact about the deck. There was
no sign of life aboard except the
cat.

—Public subscription lists have
been started to get a purse
for Austin Grady and Duncan P.
Campbell, two young fishermen of
Priest Pond, who, at imminent
danger of their lives, set out in an
ordinary double dory and rescued
two out of the three men remain-
ing on the wrecked Finnish ship
Sovinto on Thursday morning. The
mate of the ship is ill with pneu-
monia, and his recovery is doubt-
ful. Another body was found to-
day at Black Bush, four miles from
the wreck. The survivors will be
sent home by the Russian consul at
Halifax.

**The S. S. Farmand, Bound For
Miramichi Rescued
Sailors.**

Halifax, N. S., Nov. 10.—The
crew of the barquentine Marion C.,
of Halifax, were brought here to-
day by the Norwegian steamer
Farmand, bound from New York
to Miramichi. The Marion C., had
to be abandoned one hundred miles
west southwest of Cape Sable.
The crew took to a boat, and were
seventy hours drifting about be-
fore being picked up by the Far-
mand. They had a terrible experi-
ence. The Marion C. was bound
from Bridgewater to New York.

**Fifty Killed and Many More In-
jured—Fire Caused by

GOOD YEAR FOR SONS OF TEMPERANCE

Rev. C. Flemington is Again Chosen Grand Worthy Patriarch.

REV. C. W. HAMILTON ELECTED GRAND SCRIBE.

Annual Meeting of the Grand Division Opened at St. John last Week—Reports Show Activity and Interest.

At the first session of the annual meeting of the Grand Division last week, Rev. C. Flemington, of Point de Bute, was re-elected grand worthy patriarch for the ensuing year and Rev. C. W. Hamilton, grand scribe. The reports of the various officers were handed in and referred to the usual committees. These reports were all of a very encouraging nature and showed that the order is in a healthy condition both numerically and financially.

After the opening exercises six candidates were initiated. The attendance is large and many delegates were present from outside points. The first report received was that of the grand worthy patriarch.

GRAND WORTHY PATRIARCH'S REPORT.

Rev. C. Flemington, G. W. P., in opening his report spoke of the general progress made by the order since the last meeting of the grand division. Rev. C. W. Hamilton, he said, was in the field and was carrying on a vigorous campaign and another speaker, E. Tennyson Smith, would soon arrive in this city.

Three new divisions have been organized—one each at Campbellton, Dalhousie and Port Elgin. Besides these Rev. Mr. Flemington said he hoped within the next two or three weeks to start the work at two other points in the province.

The excellent work which has been done by the district division for Westmorland and Albert counties, recently organized was touched upon and the G. W. P. said it would be made the subject of a report later in the session by District Worthy Patriarch Clarence Hicks. During the year these district divisions have been established at Harcourt, Point de Bute, Sackville, Baie Verte and Port Elgin. Rev. Mr. Flemington commented on the great utility of these organizations and urged all subordinate divisions within the districts named to send delegates to the meetings. He went on to say that if all districts were organized in that manner it would be found necessary for the grand division to meet once a year instead of twice as at present.

The report concluded with a synopsis of the work of the G. W. P. during the past six months as follows: Public meetings addressed, 12; public installations of officers, 10; visits to district divisions, 10; committee meetings attended, 6; letters written, 150; candidates initiated, 120; miles travelled, 3,000.

The report of the grand scribe, E. A. Everett, which was also very cheering in tone, was as follows:

GRAND SCRIBE.

Grand Scribe E. A. Everett, in presenting his report, referred to the organization of the N. B. Temperance Federation, to the temperance legislation procured since the last meeting of the grand division

and the coming campaign of E. Tennyson Smith in this city.

Touching reference was made to the death of two members of the grand divisions—Rev. J. D. Murray of Red Bank, Northumberland county, who was a P. G. W. P. of the order and Jacob I. Keirstead, of Collina, Kings county, P. G. W. Associate. Reference to propagation work, the grand scribe said that Rev. C. W. Hamilton has been in the field a month.

Returns were in from 29 divisions for the six months ended June 30 and from 28 for the six months ended Sept. 30. From these returns, the grand scribe went on, the following figures, which are approximately correct have been compiled.

New members initiated by taking the pledge, by card and re-initiation, 429; members suspended for violation of the pledge, expelled, withdrawn and died, 207; a net gain of 222. On Sept. 30 last there were in the order 2,315 active members in 48 divisions, while on Sept. 30, 1905, there were 2,166 active members with 47 divisions.

The grand scribe concluded his report by saying that, owing to some changes which have taken place in his private business, he would be unable to again accept nomination for the office. He would, however, be glad to render all the assistance in his power to his successor.

FINANCES.

Thomas H. Lawson, grand treasurer, reported total receipts \$419.80 with expenditures of \$416.44, leaving a balance of \$3.36. A balance of \$37.24 was also reported in the grand lecturer's fund.

Other reports received were from the superintendent of young people's work, the grand lecturer and the district division of Westmorland and Albert counties.

Letters of regret at inability to be present were received from Rev. W. J. Kirby and J. H. Forbes, grand worthy associate. The election of officers was then proceeded with. Rev. C. Flemington, of Point de Bute, was re-elected G. W. P.; G. R. Carson, G. W. A.; Rev. C. W. Hamilton, G. S.; Thos. H. Lawson, St. John, G. T.; Jas. Falconer, G. Chap.; A. E. Pearson, Bass River, G. superintendent of young people's work; M. J. Steeves, Moncton, G. C. and Thos. A. Clarke, Newcastle, G. S.

ENTIRE CREW WERE LOST.

Adeona, Wrecked at Richibucto, Lost Eleven Men.

Richibucto, N. B., Nov. 8.—With the fragments of the Norwegian design flying at her mizen as a signal of distress, the bark Adeona abandoned in terror by her crew, still holds together on the sand bar at the entrance to this harbor. The men, eleven all told, are believed to have been swept away to their death by the huge breakers and the under-tow as they tempted to leave the vessel in the long boat on Monday last.

As yet but two bodies have been washed ashore, and owing to the continued fury of the gale it has been impossible to approach the ship, but the lighthouse keeper, from his post, a quarter of a mile away and the pilots as they venture with their craft almost without grip of the breakers, report no sign of life on the Adeona's decks and the belief that all have perished is reluctantly becoming a certainty.

CANADA'S POSTAL REVENUE IS FORGING AHEAD.

Ottawa, Nov. 7.—Canada's postal revenue is forging ahead at an astonishing rate. For the month of October it amounts to \$660,796 a gain of \$150,441 and \$286,847, respectively, when compared with the same month in 1905 and 1898. For the four months ending October 31st, the total receipts of the Post Office Department were \$2,450,065, as against \$2,136,066 for the same months of 1905-06 and of \$1,418,728 for the first four months of the fiscal year 1898-9.

THE COUNTRY NEWSPAPERS.

It occurred to us this week as we ran over our forty or fifty exchanges, to note the moral tone of them. These papers are of all sizes and grades, from every variety of town, and are edited by practical men who are pretty well acquainted with the world, the flesh and the devil. In not one of them did we find a case of immorality. In not one of them did we find a semblance of defense for whisky. In not one of them was there a trace of vulgarity, and none taught or justified dishonesty. Neither could we find a sneer at purity, at religion, at the better things of life. In many of them were bits of excellent advice, little homely sermons on temperance, frugality and industry. All of them were loyal to the home town, and advocated honest principles in government and individuals. Wherever there was mention of the public schools it was in terms of praise. To be sure, here and there was some fun poked at shams, some scorn at pretence. But the note in every one of these two-score papers was for decency, progress, enlightenment, morality. And of these editors, we know many of them personally, and of all those we know not one is a drinking man, and not one is a gambler, not one is a libertine. Most of them are well read, most of them good judges of people and events. A pretty decent lot they are; in fact, we doubt if any other profession can offer a higher—or even as high a—showing. Besides all this, the country editor is proverbially liberal, free-hearted in every way. No stray printer goes away hungry if he has a quarter. No public subscription list ever passed him without his mite. He gives freely of time and space to the public welfare. This is not an effort to throw a bouquet at our contemporaries, but, with Paul, we believe every man should magnify his calling, and we are proud of ours.—Press and Printer.

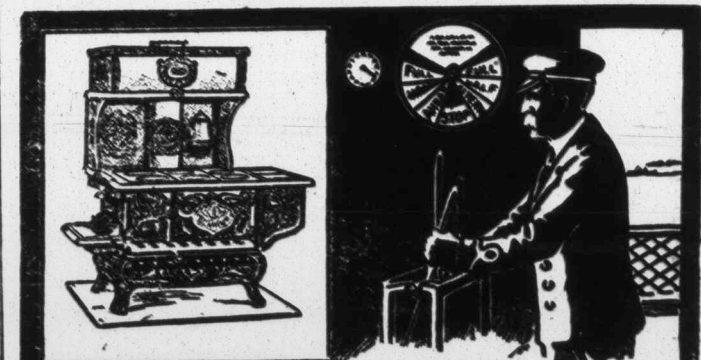



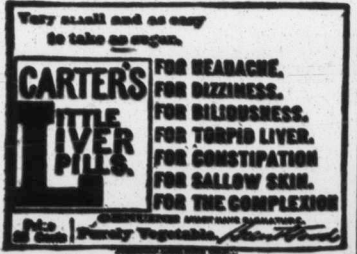

LIFE SAVING

APPARATUS NEEDED.

Recent Wreck Brings Up This Question in Formable Manner.

Richibucto, Nov. 8.—People are asking why it is that, at such an important place as Richibucto, the port is left without any means whatever of saving life in case of such a disaster as lately overtook the ill-fated Norwegian bark "Adeona."

It appears that here there is neither life boat, surf boat or life-saving rocket apparatus of any kind, such as is provided in any British port.

Two of the Adeona's crew were washed ashore near the lighthouse, and it is alleged that one of them was still warm when secured by the lighthouse keeper. But while the latter ran for assistance the chance, if chance there were, for resuscitation had passed.

Lighthouse keepers should be trained to render first aid to those persons in whom any spark of life is supposed to exist. It is time that all keepers were rendered competent in this matter, and that in all ports of any considerable size life-saving apparatus should be provided. In Britain, a number of fishermen or others used to water are engaged to be ready to man the lifeboats whenever the danger signal is given. The expense of such service is very small, as the men go about their regular work daily and are seldom called out for a wreck. But when the wreck occurs, they are ready.

No moral blame can be attached to the Richibucto official, he was untrained, none to Richibucto sailors, the necessary boats were not at hand, but the Norwegians are dead just the same. Such a catastrophe may or may not happen again soon, but the next time it does happen the marine officials should be in a position to cope with any emergency.

According to the Local chairman of the Board of Health, smallpox was brought into St. Norbert, Kent Co. by a Mr. Thibideau returning from Maine, who after visiting several St. Norbert houses also carried the infection to St. Anthony. The cases were quite promptly quarantined, and this week there are only about fifteen cases in the whole country, all of which are at the two villages above named. The fifteen cases are in eight houses. Thirty-two cases in ten houses have recovered but are still quarantined. Only fifteen houses have been affected. Quarantine was established at St. Norbert on Oct. 8th and in St. Anthony on the 10th.

Premier Gouin of Quebec announces that all of the increased provincial subsidy will be devoted to education. We hope that Premier Tweedie will be nearly equal in this province.

Prohibition seems to be coming all along the line. It is admitted that the worst narcotic is opium, and China the greatest user of it. China has arranged for a gradual reduction of the growth and importation of opium, the business to cease by 1916.

The first convention of the new Labor Party to be held in British Columbia or in Canada, met in Vancouver on the 1st instant, and voted to join the socialist party of Canada, which has two members in B. C. Legislature. Straight Laborites are talking of forming an opposition party.

If the powers that be, so govern as to remove the popular impression that injustice is done to the poor, Hearst's candidacy in 1908 will be impossible, but otherwise he will be nominated for president with a good chance of winning.

Let the people and government of Canada avoid the mistakes that have evidently been made in the United States.

Another feature of the United States elections last week, is the entrance into parliament of a labor party distinct from the two socialist organizations which both advocate the public ownership and operation of all the means of production, distribution and exchange. In Pennsylvania, the United Mine Workers have elected two state senators and six representatives, the first time they have entered politics as a separate party.

Long live king Edward VII. one of the ablest statesmen Britain has ever produced, and the leading peacemaker of Europe! It is remarkable that, no matter what broils there are in the empire, all parties look up to and reverence the sovereign whom none of them blames for any injustice that prevails. May he be long spared, to preserve the peace of Europe and Asia and promote the commercial and industrial expansion of his empire in proper channels.

Dr. Weldon's candidacy failed to prevent minister Fielding's triumphant re-election in Queens and Northumberland Counties, N. B. in 1905. He may be personally as pure as he represents himself, but the party he represented have never been distinguished for their political virtues, and doubtless the electors felt that their interests would be as safe in the hands of Fielding and Laurier as of Borden, Foster and Fowler.

The revelations of the committee investigating insurance business in Canada will deepen the impression of many that insurance can be supplied by the government.

An Australian commission has unanimously reported in favor of extending the system of old age pensions, practised in two states to the remaining four states of the Commonwealth. Newfoundland, last year, took a decided step in the same direction.

President Roosevelt has reprimanded Willis L. Moore, chief of the weather bureau at Washington, because the latter, after unsuccessfully urging a printer in his office to pay his strike assessment to the Printer's Union, transferred the said printer to New Orleans. The President could scarcely have acted otherwise, as in the present state of affairs, a man should not be discriminated against merely because he fails to comply with all the rules and regulations of some particular Union any more than from failing to live up to those set by some particular religious denomination. Let the Unions cease their strike and the boycott, cease trying to disarrange commerce and industry in that way, and do whatever striking they think necessary in an orderly way at the ballot box.

The forces of American discontent which in 1892 under General Weaver's populist banner polled 1,025,000 votes in the presidential election, have again, after being somewhat tumbled down under the leadership of the relatively conservative Bryan, found a capable leader in the person of Wm. Randolph Hearst, the newspaper man. It appears that Hearst received about 625,000 votes in New York state last week. And his lieutenant, John B. Moran, in Massachusetts polled about 375,000—a million in two adjoining states. Besides, Hearst's Independence League ran a full ticket in California, and, we believe, in Chicago, also. Thus Hearst's party this year has passed the populist vote in 1892, and Hearst's organization is only in its infancy. Last year the Democratic party of New York City opposed Hearst for the mayoralty. This year, with the exception of the millionaire fraction, the Democrats unconditionally surrendered to the new leader and submissively did his bidding. That Hearst, the first time he ran for Governor, with all the Republican machine, all the rich democrats and every Democratic newspaper opposed to him both the socialist and the socialist labor parties running a full set of candidates against him.

Richmond Smith, the well known Canadian journalist and war correspondent, has caused a mild sensation in London by the first of a series of articles in the standard, in which he describes the "Americanization of Canada" as dangerously likely to lead to the absorption of this country by the United States. Mr. Smith's review of the condition is superficial. There is no danger of the absorption of Canada by the country to Canadian and British, and there is the south. The spirit of Canada is no danger of a revolution.—Evening Times.

The announcement was made at Campbellton on Saturday evening that the object of the campaign inaugurated there by Mr. E. Tennyson Smith, the English orator, who comes to St. John this week, is provincial prohibition. It has been quite a number of years since a general temperance campaign was carried on in New Brunswick, and it will be interesting to note what will now be the effect upon the public sentiment generally of an appeal such as that which Mr. Smith makes to the people.—Ex.

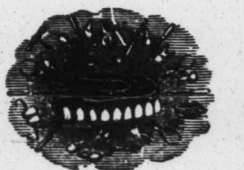

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Nov. 7.—A Norwegian barque, supposed to be on her way to Campbellton, N. B., is ashore at Black Bush, on the north side of the Island, about fifteen miles west of East Point, and is supposed to be a total wreck but no particulars have yet been received.

Another Norwegian barque is ashore between Priest Pond and Black Bush. She is loaded with deals and has broken in two. There are men on both sections with poor prospects of their lives being saved at present. That makes two Norwegian barques ashore between Priest Pond and Black Bush. The second one went on last evening at 10 o'clock. One man who landed cannot speak English. Lloyd's agent is wiring the marine department to send a steamer to give assistance to the wrecks. One of the vessels is the Olga. She is not broken up and the crew will probably be safe.

ing on the lee side of a barbed wire fence, evidently suffering from the effects of the storm. This he remarked, would take away all the profits from these dairy herds for the next four or five months.

Having made a tour of the New Brunswick fairs, he considers the horse exhibit, with very few exceptions, the poorest in the live stock lines. They were invariably much too small to be of service in the farm, and coupled with this a high percentage were unsound or had conformations tending that way. Better feeding of all lines of live stock would mean larger profits and fewer losses to their owners.

Mr. Sharp, one of our own province men, has been this way on two other occasions doing institute work. His last trip through these counties was made three years ago. On being asked if he could see any improvement amongst our farmers he said he was pleased to say that he could. He would judge from aftergrowth of clover he saw in many places indicated that the farmers were awakening up to the value of this plant as a food for live stock and a fertilizer to the land and when plowed down. From the appearance of the stubble on the grain fields he thought the farmers were giving more attention to the cultivation of the land, which in his way of thinking was of the greatest importance to successful agriculture. He noted also that there had been much improvement in farm buildings, many new barns more up to date had been constructed, which meant more comfortable quarters for the live stock.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST.

Homestead Regulations.

Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Entry must be made personally, at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated. The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1.) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.
(2.) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person, residing with the father or mother.
(3.) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.
Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to pay for patent.
