FUNERAL OF THE LATE DAVID COOL

Largely Attended by Railway Men, Oddfellows and Others

NEWCASTLE, Feb. 4.—The funeral of the late L. C. R. locomotive engineer David Cool, who lost his life under such sad circumstances of the wreck of the English mail special near Campbellton Sunday at noon, took place yesterday afternoon. A special car attached to the accommodation from Moncton brought up members of the different railway brotherhoods and of the local lodge of Oddfellows. The funeral took place at 3 p. m. Rev. Mr. McArthur, pastor of St. James' Presbyterian church, conducting the services at the house and church. The Oddfellows took charge of the service at the grave. Rev. D. McDermid of Moncton, acting as Chaplain and Engineer John Stewart as Noble Grand. About 60 Oddfellows from Chatham, Newcastle, and Moncton were present. The pall bearers were members of the Sunday school class of boys taught by the good engineer assisted by A. Donald, representing the B. of L. E. G. L. A. M., the I. O. O. F., W. G. M., the B. of L. E. and P. J. A. Davidson, the O. E. C., J. Fyfe, the B. of R. T. and L. Wallace, the I. A. of M. There was a big turnout of citizens to pay their last tribute to one so well and favorably known and the address of the local post was most impressive.

RE-ORGANIZATION OF THE INTERCOLONIAL

Some Proposals Suggested Which Will Make It a Paying Proposition.

AFTER TOURIST TRADE

TORONTO, Feb. 3.—The Ottawa correspondent of the Star writes: The Hon. George F. Gahan having recently published in the Tribune, also a letter from Mr. Wallace, which appeared in the Graphic.

For a few issues past, erratic and false statements have been appearing in the Tribune regarding the Water Supply. I now beg to inform the citizens that the water in Smith's Lake contains no impurities injurious to the health. The water is quite wholesome, but had it contained any of the impurities and as dangerous as the Tribune would have believed, the matter would have received attention some months ago. It has always been asserted and there is no scarcity. The over-estimated.

The reservoir is not empty as staff work of a week ago was not for the reason as stated by the Tribune.

With reference to Mr. Wallace's letter, I again state what I found and know to be true.

Mr. Wallace had a stable on the land which he has cleared, very convenient to the place in the park which will flow into the town reservoir. On one visit I saw a horse in this dirty stable. A hut in which men have stayed over night is also situated there.

Had these conditions continued all of this stable and human refuse would have flowed into the reservoir, on the meeting of the snow, and possibly an epidemic of typhoid fever visited Camp Belton equal in severity to the Montreal epidemic.

On one visit I met Mr. Wallace at the place in question and while in conversation for a few minutes, he spent 7 times on the snow which will mix with the town's drinking water. Each occasion he looked the style with snow, which showed my reasoning not only the ignorant and dirty actions of a dirty person but also the actions of a public concern.

What can I go for you today? asked one member.

"Well," confessed Mr. Mackenzie, "there are a number of things you could do for me if you would, and if they went arm in arm."

The Would Not Stand for It.

Mr. Mackenzie was not alone in his opinion. A departure from Government ownership and control has been foreign to the thought of the department, and it is not a man who would be so easily deceived.

"It would be absolutely suicidal," said the Hon. H. R. Emmerson, the other day.

"It would involve a sacrifice of the traditions of the party."

"I have always voted with the Liberals, but I would never vote with them on such a thing as that."

Mr. Emmerson is probably sitting nearer the mark when he enquires whether the Government has a policy of Provincial Commissioners as to conditions relating to the railway. It is said, indeed, that the acquiring of branches is in contemplation by the government; also that the department will undertake a system of "feeding the fire," which has been found very profitable by other railways.

One of these is a hotel system, such as has proved a success in the C. P. R. The Intercolonial is a scenic route, and has always been advertised as such. But tourists love bodily comforts. The department, therefore, is understood to contemplate the erection of a hotel, hoping thus to increase the traffic and provide an additional source of profit at the same time.

With the passage and end of the business, thus given the necessary boost the railway would naturally look to the improvement of its freight traffic. The acquiring and developing of mills and mines, especially the former, seems the natural currency. Thus the Government would seem to be plunging further into private ownership, instead of desisting the principle, as some unfortunately fancy.

It is not unlikely that legislation approving of development along lines will be presented to Parliament at the present session.

Higher Freight Rates.

It is claimed, and with some justice, that the Intercolonial handles freight at a lower rate per ton than any other railway in Canada. The passenger rates are also lower, for instance, than those on the T. and N. O. In fact, it is said

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ROYAL BANK MAY NOW ERECT BUILDING

Citizens of Shire Town Have Confidence That Business Will Increase.

WANT SUBSIDY

DALHOUSIE, Feb. 4.—Previous to the destruction of the Restigouche Woodworking factory, the authorities of the Royal Bank of Canada had decided to erect an up-to-date bank building in the shire town. A very central site had been purchased and plans and specifications for the new building were prepared.

When the fire took place, and business felt somewhat the Bank people renewed the lease of their present quarters and have not shown any disposition since towards carrying out their original plans by giving the town a stone building, in which their popular manager could conduct their increasing business with credit to himself and staff, and comfort to their customers.

After the fire, which destroyed our two principal industries, our business men and citizens generally did not get discouraged. They had confidence in the future. Providence had done a great deal for Dalhousie. Governments had been generous, and with our fine harbor, had growing surrounding country with the lumber trade, salmon and smelt fishing, our attraction for tourists etc., we had every reason to forge ahead. We were not afraid to put in a water system that cost over \$10,000.

Should the fire, several new homes have been built, by our working classes which show that the laboring men have confidence in the future. More buildings would have been erected if those who own vacant town lots had been disposed to help in the up building of our town by either selling or leasing land upon which they were paying taxes for years.

Whereas have been built, new mills erected, new stores opened and our citizens are looking forward that within a few months the Royal Bank of Canada will carry out its first plans. Our citizens are signing a petition to the Right Honorable Sir Richard John Cartwright, Minister of Trade and Commerce, praying that a subsidy be granted for a steam ferry between Dalhousie, Pictou, and Cape Breton. The petition sets forth that the Dalhousie Government during the last few years have built ferry wharves at Dalhousie, Pictou and St. John's.

That of late years a very large steam ferry, and consequently a larger expenditure for maintenance, and running expenses.

A similar petition is being signed in the upper part of Bonaventure County, and both petitions will be forwarded to Messrs. Maclellan and Reid, M. P. to be presented to the Minister.

Mr. James P. Wall, a native of Campbellton and for some time in the employ of the Dalhousie Mercantile Co. will sever his connection with this firm at the end of February to open a general store in company with John B. Delaney or Dalhousie. The new firm will purchase the stock of Messrs. Wm. C. Arnesen & Co. who are retiring from business and will occupy the same store which is the property of Mr. Delaney.

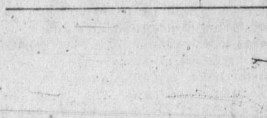
