## MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL

The Resignation of D. T. Black, the  
Town Engineer, Was Read  
and Accepted.

A meeting of the town council  
was held in the Council Chamber  
last evening. There were present  
His Worship Mayor Murray and  
Coun. Alexander McDonald,  
Mowat, Miller, McLennan, Rich-  
ards, White and Morris.

The minutes of the previous  
meeting were read and confirmed.  
The report of Auditor F. E.  
Blackhall was read certifying to  
the correctness of the Treasurer's  
books. This was placed on file.

Clerk read the resignation of  
Town Engineer D. T. Black, to  
take effect March 31st.

Coun. McDonald, chairman of  
the water and sewerage committee  
said that the engineer has notified  
him several days ago that he had  
been appointed engineer for the  
town of Welland Ont., and wished  
to be relieved at as early a date  
as possible. He (Coun. McDonald)  
was sorry that Mr. Black was sev-  
ering his connection with this  
town, but glad that he was better-  
ing his position. He moved that  
the resignation be accepted. Car-  
ried.

The School Board is asking  
that the town apportion a portion  
of the amount of guaranteed bond  
issue for school purposes. The  
Board requires about \$30,000 to  
build and equip a suitable build-  
ing for school purposes. This was  
referred to the Finance Committee.

Chief Hughes reported officer  
Brown had been suspended for  
incorroboration and for using  
abusive language. Matter was  
laid on table.

F. Mann made application for  
position on police force.  
The clerk read communications  
from the building committees of  
the Presbyterian and Baptist  
churches asking permission to  
build their various churches in  
wood. This was referred to the  
Provincial Board of Underwriters.  
The Chairmen of the several com-  
mittees presented their reports,  
recommending payment of their  
several accounts. The annual re-  
port of the police and license com-  
mittee was presented for publica-  
tion. The report stated that the  
old police record book had been  
lately found and from details  
therein from 1st January to 11th  
July then from 1st Dec. to 31st  
1910, the total number of arrests  
was 227.

The annual report of the Public  
Charities Committee was presented  
which stated that although the  
relief committees had taken a lot  
of work from the town on the  
matter of charitable assistance  
there were still two inmates  
chargeable to the town in the  
Provincial Hospital and other  
three persons in receipt of relief.  
The Mayor trusted that the an-  
nual reports of the other commit-  
tees would be ready for next meet-  
ing.

On the recommendation of the  
police and license committee it was  
agreed to refund to Mrs. N. R.  
Riddell a proportion of her Bowl-  
ing Alley license fee.

Councillor Alexander in his re-  
port of the assessment committee  
recommended that D. F. Courts  
assessment be reduced \$167.00  
that no reduction be granted N. R.  
Fraser, that J. B. Christopher's  
assessment be reduced \$500 and  
Alex Kerr's \$200.

This was agreed to.  
In the report of the public prop-  
erty and streets, Councillor  
Richards recommended that the  
application of Jos. Boudreau for  
public scales in Water St. be  
granted at a rental of \$1.00 per  
annum, on the understanding that  
they be removed on order by the  
Council at thirty days notice.

## MARITIME CRASHES INTO 'WHOOOPER'

Harvey McDougall Was Killed and  
Several Injured in Wreck on  
Thursday Morning.

Harvey McDougall was killed  
and others received serious injuries  
in a head on collision at Derby  
Jct., on the main line of the I. C. R.  
on Thursday morning. The delayed  
express crashed into the Newcastle  
Blackville suburban, known as the  
'whooper' on the Derby Jct. siding  
about 10:40 and the engines were  
badly demolished. The accident re-  
sulted from an open switch. Mr.  
McDougall was killed instantly. He  
was about 35 years of age and re-  
sided at Indiantown. Gordon  
Atkinson and Chris. O'Brien were  
seriously injured.

This was agreed to.  
On the motion of Councillor  
McDonald it was agreed to adver-  
tize in the "Ontario Star" and  
"The Canadian Engineer" for a  
Town Engineer to succeed Mr. D.  
T. Black. Councillor McLennan  
of the fire protection committee re-  
ported a grave shortage of hose  
and the absolute necessity of hav-  
ing chemical fire extinguishers.  
The committee were authorized to  
purchase 500 feet of hose and two  
lengths of suction hose.

Councillor Alexander asked a  
question re the grading of Andrew  
street. The town engineer pro-  
duced a plan shewing a proposed  
permanent level of the street and  
it was remitted to the public prop-  
erty and streets committee to re-  
port on at next meeting.

The condition of O'Leary street  
was once more brought up, but  
after discussion and looking to  
the fact of the possible widening  
of the street it was left in the  
hands of the committee to act with  
the town engineer and report.

The School Board's request was  
then brought on. A great deal of  
discussion then ensued on the  
question of ways and means and  
town solicitor A. E. G. McKenzie,  
stated clearly the wants and the  
position of the Board, their ideas  
and intentions regarding school  
accommodation.

It was moved and seconded that  
the request of the Board for \$30,-  
000 be granted, provision to be  
made in the legislation to be  
enacted so that any sum not used  
by the board would revert to the  
Council.

This became the finding of the  
council.

The case of the suspension of  
officer Brown was then taken up.  
The council felt very keen over  
this matter and thought they  
could not strongly enough stand  
to the chief of police. If chief  
Hughes was the head of the police  
then he was entitled to and would  
get the support of the Council.  
After the merits of the case had  
been discussed it was moved and  
seconded that officer Brown be  
re-instated provided he made full  
and ample apology to the chief.  
Motion was carried.

His Worship the Mayor, Coun-  
cillors McDonald and Miller were  
appointed a committee to draw up  
a memorial for presentation to the  
I. C. R. Board of Management in  
conjunction with the Board of  
Trade.

The town solicitor was instructed  
to look after the interests of  
the town with regard to a request  
for legislation affecting the act of  
1906, and if necessary to employ  
counsel.

This was all the business and  
council adjourned.

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## I. C. R. MAY BURN OIL ON ITS LINES

Officials Thinking Over Use of it as  
Fuel for Locomotives.

It may be only a question of short  
time before the locomotives of the I.  
C. R. are fired with oil fuel.  
The recently developed wells of Al-  
bert County are yielding abundantly  
of both oil and gas, and already pre-  
parations are under way to supply na-  
tural gas to Moncton houses for light  
and heat and to manufacturers and  
others for power purposes. A large  
flow of oil is expected after new wells  
are opened and the operators are very  
hopeful over the outlook.

The crude petroleum so far obtained  
possesses in its natural state all of the  
qualities required for high class fuel,  
giving a bright flame and generating  
a tremendous heat. So full of promise  
are the operations in Albert County  
that the attention of the I. C. R. of-  
ficials has been given to speculating  
what the probable results might be  
and whether or not they will soon jus-  
tify the railway in substituting crude  
oil for coal as a prodigal of motive  
power.

The advantages of oil fuel are ob-  
vious as by its use greater speed could  
be obtained, as well as greater  
cleanliness and comfort of travel.  
It is claimed also that the use of  
oil as fuel would be a measure of  
economy that would be an important  
factor in its favor.

## JAMES ADAMS BURNED TO DEATH

Cookhouse of Lumber Co. Caught Fire  
and Cook Could Escape.  
Camp Destroyed.

James Murray Adams cook for  
the Dalhousie Lumber Co., at one  
of their camps on the International  
met a tragic end Saturday night  
last about eleven thirty o'clock.  
He was burned in his bunk when  
the cook house was destroyed by  
fire.

He retired to his sleeping quar-  
ters, which were in a small room  
partitioned off the cook house  
about 10:30 o'clock. Therein were  
contained a quantity of miscellan-  
eous articles, and the room was  
heated by a stove.

It is supposed that after he fell  
asleep fire from the stove set fire  
to the woodwork of the room and  
soon the interior was a raging  
mass of flames with no exit except  
the door, which the unfortunate  
man could not reach even though  
he regained consciousness, which  
is very doubtful.

From the cooks quarters to the  
main camp which contain the  
bunks for the crew, their is the  
usual narrow enclosed passageway.  
The fire burned along the roof of  
this and communicated with the  
main building. In this passageway  
was stored a barrel of coal oil  
for lighting purposes. When  
the fire reached this it exploded  
with a roar which aroused the  
men in the bunks. They hastily  
pulled on scant clothing and  
rushed out, when a systematic  
effort was made to check the flames  
by shovelling snow on them, but  
without avail. The entire camp  
and contents being destroyed.  
When the men reached the cooks  
quarters, that section was a mass  
of ruins, and it was not until the  
next day that the remains, burned  
to a crisp were recovered. Many  
of the men escaped with very  
little clothing and suffered from  
the intense cold, as Sunday morn-  
ing was one of the coldest of the  
season, it being about 20 degrees  
below zero.

Word of the sad fatality was  
sent to Coroner A. Martin, M.D.,  
who after holding an investiga-  
tion did not deem an inquest  
necessary and the remains were  
conveyed to the home of the un-  
fortunate young man at Glenelvit.  
Deceased was an industrious  
young man, a son of Daniel Adams  
of Glenelvit, was twenty-three  
years of age and leaves a wife and  
one infant to mourn his death.

The funeral took place Tuesday  
and was very largely attended,  
upwards of seventy teams being  
in line. Interment was made at  
the Flatlands burying ground,  
Rev. Mr. Hardy officiating.

## GREENE DEMANDS

### PAUPERS' OATH

Gaynor's Accomplice Begins Final  
Effort for Freedom.

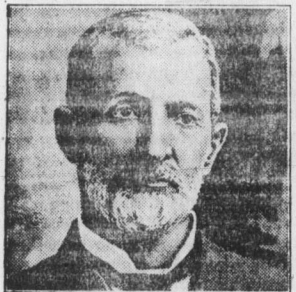
Benjamin D. Greene, who, with  
John F. Gaynor, was convicted of  
conspiracy to defraud the Gov't in the

This fine stands between him and  
liberty. Yesterday he made written  
application for permission to take the

set for March 7, and it is understood

in a few days. The Government, it is  
understood, will oppose the petition,  
asserting that the prisoners still have  
one of the \$375,000 left.

## NEARLY A HUNDRED DEAD IN THEATRE FIRE

Terrible Panic Among Spectators When Picture Machine Exploded, Firing the House--Many of the Victims were Children.

St Petersburg, March 6.—A moving picture machine in a small theatre at Bologoy, in the Southern part of Novgorod province, exploded yesterday and instantly flames shot up, sweeping to all parts of the building. There was a terrible panic among the spectators and, according to the reports received here, nearly a hundred persons, many of them children, were burned to death. Half a hundred others were injured. Baron Taube, chief of the gendarmes corps at St Petersburg, and two of his

children are reported to be among the missing.

The fire caught while the show was in progress and quickly enveloped the building, cutting off every way of escape. Futile attempts at rescue were made by those who happened to be close by the exits when the fire started and by others from the outside, but the fury of the flames drove them back before they could reach the shrieking victims, who in their efforts to get out of the building fought desperately among themselves.

## VETO BILL PASSES SECOND READING

British Government Still Able to Muster Majority of 121 or More.

London, March 2.—Four days of debate given to a measure involving a great constitutional reform came to a conclusion tonight, when the second reading of the veto bill was passed by a majority of 125, the vote being 368 to 243. Prior to this the house divided on Austen Chamberlain's amendment with a majority of 121 against it. The figures on the veto bill were greeted with prolonged cheers, after which the bill on the premier's motion was sent to the committee of the whole house. This stage is likely to be deferred for some time to enable the government to dispose of financial business. The opposition leaders are drafting an elaborate series of amendments.

## CANADIAN NORTHERN WANTS I. C. R.

Halifax, N. S., March 1.—At a banquet tonight in his honor, Sir Wm. Mackenzie spoke eloquently of the post of Halifax and of the great need it has to be linked up with one of the transcontinental lines. He expressed the opinion that it would join hands with the Canadian Northern and that his road wanted to do his by obtaining possession of the Intercolonial.

## HOME RULE BILL COMING.

London, Mar. 4.—Augustine Birrell, Chief Secretary for Ireland, speaking at Oxford last night, indicated that the government's Home Rule measure, subject to modifications that time has shown will be wise and rational. He said that the govt is now engaged in an inquiry into the fiscal position of Ireland, preparatory to granting Home Rule.

## NEW FRENCH CABINET FORMED

Paris, March 3.—Senator Antoine Emmanuel Ernest Monis has formed a new cabinet to succeed that of Aristide Briand who resigned on the 27th ult. The new government is more Socialistic than that of Briand, and a moderately Socialistic program is outlined. Paris hears that Germany is preparing against the appointment of M. Delcasse, Minister of Marine, because of his activity against Germany in Morocco six years ago. At that time Delcasse, who was minister of foreign affairs, was dropped on pressure from Germany.

## KING GEORGE HAS FAITH IN PRAYERS

London, March 2.—Expressing confidence that the prayers of the Church will aid him in conducting the affairs of state, King George replied to the convocation address of the Archbishop of Canterbury to day. He said:—"It will always be my endeavor, with God's help to maintain and consolidate the foundations of public and private virtue which you labor to preserve on which the welfare of my people rests. The knowledge that prayers are offered unceasingly by the church in my behalf strengthen me and increase my trust that the Almighty will bestow blessings in the fullest measure on the solemn hour of my Coronation and throughout whatever length of years he may be pleased to grant me."

## BILL MINER IN GEORGIA

Notorious Outlaw Who Escaped From New Westminster Jail Held at Gainsville on Train Robbery Charge.

Ottawa, Mar. 1.—The identity of the train robber under arrest at Gainsville, Georgia, has been established as that of Bill Miner, the outlaw, who escaped from New Westminster, B. C. penitentiary while undergoing life sentence for holding up a C. P. R. express train.

## NO RECIPROCITY YET.

Washington, March 4.—The Senate adjourned without taking action on reciprocity. An extra session will be called by President Taft who is determined to have the Bill pass.

## NO MONOPOLIES FOR AUSTRALIA

Melbourne, March 1.—The Socialist Premier of the Commonwealth, Andrew Fisher, in opening the campaign yesterday in support of the proposed changes in the constitution, said it was essential to obtain adequate powers to deal with monopolies, which he added, "can skin the consumers alive if they choose."

The Premier, therefore, proposed to nationalize certain lines of business wherever necessary to the public interest. He cited the United States as a warning to Australia, saying that there 1 percent of the people owned 50 percent of the wealth, and 50 percent of the people owned nothing.

## WESTERN RY MEN GET INCREASES

Board of Arbitration Reports in Favor of Increases Ranging from 12 1/2 to 15 per cent, on C. N. R. and C. P. R.

Toronto, March 1.—After taking evidence for 37 days the arbitration board appointed to consider the grievance of the International Association of Maintenance of Way men on the Canadian Northern and Pacific railways have made their report recommending an increase of 12 1/2 per cent on the C. N. R. west of Winnipeg and fifteen per cent between Port Arthur and Winnipeg. On the C. P. R. Atlantic, Eastern and Lake Superior divisions an increase of 15 per cent, Central Western and Pacific Divisions 12 1/2 per cent. Men are to get overtime for Christmas and New Year's days. If the report is accepted it is to go into effect Sept. 1, 1911. Some 6,500 men are affected.

PROVINCIAL AID FOR CAMPBELLTON  
The Provincial Government will introduce legislation to pay Campbellton \$5000 a year for ten years, and, possibly, to guarantee the Town Bonds to the extent of \$100,000.

The Central Building of the University of London will witness this July (26th-29th) one of the most inspiring sights of history. Representatives of all the races in the world will meet as equals and in council to discuss how prejudices may be removed and friendly relations established between the Western nations and the other peoples of the earth. Never before has a meeting of this kind taken place, and it is to be hoped that it will be only the first of a series of such gatherings. The First Universal Races Congress will be truly inter-racial; for India, China, Japan, Turkey, Persia, and Egypt, as well as the African and other races, will be represented by writers of their own kith and kin. Great Britain being represented by Sir Sydney Olivier, K. C. M. G., Sir Charles Bruce, G. C. M. G., and Sir Harry Johnston, G. C. M. G., among others.

No empire occupies such a vast area nor has its constituent parts so widely scattered as the British Empire, and accordingly no other empire has to face so constantly the grave problem of being fair and just to other races. For this reason it was only right that the First Universal Races Congress should take place in London, and that the support should mainly come from the Empire. No less than twelve Colonial Governors and eight Colonial Premiers are among the Hon. Vice-Presidents of the Congress, besides several Cabinet Ministers in England. The Congress Executive issues herewith a hearty invitation to all friends of the cause of inter-racial friendship in the Colonies to make a very special effort to attend the Congress and convert it into an imposing demonstration in favour of good will between the peoples of European and those of Asiatic, African, and Australian descent. The Committee hopes that the Coronation of the King and the festivities and Exhibitions connected therewith will act as an additional incentive to Colonial sympathisers of the great Cause to undertake the long journey. It feels sure that those who attend will carry away with them precious memories, valuable knowledge, and a new hope for the near future.

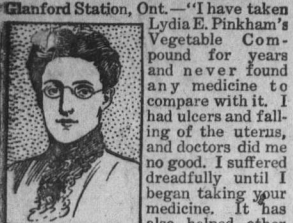

## FARMERS AND DAIRYMEN MET IN CONVENTION

Helpful Criticism Offered re Agricultural and Technical Teaching Need A Farmer's Party Endorsed—Labor Representation Needed.

The 35th annual session of the N. B. Farmers' and Dairymen's Association opened in Fredericton on the 28th ult., Pres. S. B. Hatheway in the chair, and closed on the second instant.

The President's address advocated a more practical system of agricultural and technical training in our public schools, and deplored the backward condition of our agricultural industries. No provincial government had ever given agriculture serious consideration, which was largely due to the extremely few farmers in the Legislature, past and present. The beef sold in the province was largely imported from the West. Fruit growing should receive more consideration. The St. John Dominion exhibition had been lacking in educational features.

In December last he had the honor and pleasure of representing this association, and along with another New Brunswick, Mr. W. B. Fawcett of Sackville—the farmers of the province at the noted Farmers' Convention at Ottawa. He unhesitatingly, both at the convention and before the Premier, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, advocated the free interchange of farm products with the United States, and endorsed strongly all the other resolutions proposed.

He was not influenced by personal views in this matter, but by the overwhelming evidence he secured from prominent farmers and shippers throughout the province. Men with a thorough knowledge of our possibilities and advantages, who realized the seriousness of a restricted market and who believed that in advocating such a course New Brunswick would become "the land of opportunity." Moreover, men who were broad-minded enough not to consider for a moment that in providing conditions with the United States would influence or taint our Imperial sentiment, did not cast the shadow of doubt on our love for King and Empire.

If this tariff reform becomes a reality, both in Canada and the United States, it will stand as the greatest achievement and to the everlasting credit of Canadian statesmen.

Hon. D. V. Landry, Commissioner of Agriculture, expressed the opinion that there was a great future before agriculture in New Brunswick. Co-operation on the part of the farmers was what was needed. The number of agricultural societies had increased to a marked extent and the increase would continue. Expenditure by the government for agricultural purposes had been increased in the immediate past and he felt would be increased in the future.

Following the line of the president's address, Dr. Landry stated that it was quite possible that educational system of the province might well be modified so as to give some instruction in agricultural subjects in the rural schools. Similar subjects might be taught in the Normal School. He could not see why every student of the institution could not be instructed to test milk and to judge the milk-producing qualities of the cow, and also to teach that knowledge to their pupils.

The speaker said he was sorry more New Brunswick students did not attend the agricultural colleges at Truro and Guelph. The old government he admitted, had inaugurated good system for the assistance of agricultural students, and the present government was following that system. With

suitable education the farmers of New Brunswick would be equal to any in the world.

County Vice-President's reports were presented from Gloucester, Restigouche, Madawaska, Victoria, York, Carleton, Charlotte, Sunbury and Queens.

The North Shore reports were as follows:

### RESTIGOUCHE COUNTY

Much attention had been given to the raising of small fruits and poultry. A good market for the latter had been discovered in Montreal. It had been found that wheat of good quality could be raised. Flour mills were needed however. The building of the International Railway had opened up a large tract of new land suitable for farming. The town of Campbellton was being rebuilt with the result that an improved local market is promised.

### GLOUCESTER COUNTY

The season for seeding was favorable but the haying season was poor. Fruit and potatoes had a poor yield. Grains had a fair yield. There had been several importations of pure bred stock. A county "farmer's day" had been inaugurated and would be made an annual event. One new agricultural society had been formed.

On Wednesday the Committee on Dairying reported. Although Dr. Landry was favorable to their requests, the committee had been unable to secure what they desired from the Government. To sum up the whole matter they could therefore only report that while practically everyone interviewed was agreed that something should be done yet no one in authority was prepared to attempt to carry out the idea of granting a sum of money sufficient to reimburse the dairyman for the expense of carrying on the important work of weighing his product and testing his production.

Geo. Fisher thought the dairy industry was a winning industry and something should be done to improve it. The government should give more assistance to the industry in the way of a bonus. He would like to hear from the superintendents.

A. Jansen, Salmonhurst, thought the proposition of bonusing the dairy cow was absurd. He thought the dairymen would be alone most interested in this bonusing. Bonusing was not needed if the farmers would do their work right. He did not believe in asking the government for money assistance. Every one could not pull from the government. The farmers could work along the right lines and improve their own conditions.

Fred A. Dixon of Sackville thought bonusing or some other good policy should be adopted to get at the men who were careless and would not try to improve their conditions. The principle of bonusing cows was as good as that of bonusing the steel or any other industry. The government in bonusing would only be giving the farmer his own.

President Hatheway thought bonusing seemed to be the only practical way to get at the matter.

### FARMERS THE MASTERS

I. F. Riley, of Westmoreland County, thought the farmers should have a larger representation in the Government. The farmers were the masters of governments and should demand what they want. He was a Liberal, but when the old Government did not do what was right they were turned out and the same could be done with the present or any other

Government if they did not do what the farmers demanded.

### THE FARMER IN LEGISLATURE

Fred A. Dixon presented figures to show that there was only one farmer in the present legislature. The farmers could not be proud of this. In the legislature there were, he said, 13 merchants, 12 lawyers, 10 lawyers, 5 medical men, 3 of scattering occupations and 1 farmer. The farmer paid the bills, but the other occupations had the representatives.

The judgment of the farmer, he believed, would compare favorably with that of men in any other occupation even though he might not be able to talk so much. There were only two divisions in a community, the wealth producing classes and the non-wealth producing classes. The farmer was a food and wealth producer. All business men were necessary, but they were not wealth producers like the farmers. He claimed the laboring men should be represented also.

Mr. Dixon moved the following resolution, seconded by J. F. Riley of Westmoreland:

Whereas it appears that the farmers of this province are not represented in the Provincial Legislature, nor in the Parliament of Canada by men of their own occupation; therefore,

Resolved, That a committee consisting of a chairman and one member from each county represented in the attendance at this association be appointed to draw up resolutions declaring the attitude of this association with respect to the representation of the farmers in the Provincial and Dominion Parliaments, and that the report of the said committee be laid before the Thursday evening session for consideration.

Mr. Dixon was appointed chairman of the committee.

At Thursday's evening session the report of the committee regarding the representation of farmers in the Dominion and provincial parliaments presented a resolution in favor of forming an independent farmers party, which carried.

J. E. Porter's resolution in favor of reciprocity was after much discussion withdrawn for pensake.

G. E. Fisher read a paper on the social conditions of farm life.

## 1000 CASES OF TYPHOID AT OTTAWA

A Son of Rev. G. F. Dawson of Chatham, N. B. Among the Number.

Ottawa, March 6—There are over 1000 cases of typhoid in the city. As it is not now so certain that the Ottawa water supply is to blame for the thousand or more typhoid cases and twenty-five deaths, the milk supply will also be investigated.

On Saturday afternoon the medical health department was scored for its inactivity at a mass meeting addressed by Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, Prof. Adam Shortt, Dr. Montzambert and other prominent citizens.

In the evening a citizens' league was formed for the purpose of drilling the civic officials and alerting them into their duties and responsibilities in the matter of the people's health. A son of Rev. G. F. Dawson of Chatham, N. B., is one of the members.

## PRESENTATION TO

MR. B. B. LUTZ

Last Saturday an interesting event took place here when Mr. Bliss B. Lutz Locomotive Engineer was presented with the Imperial Service medal after 35 years service with the I. C. R. The presentation was made by Superintendent Evan Price and the medal pinned on Mr. Lutz's breast by Judge McLatchy. Police Judge Matheson and councillor A. M. G. McDonald also took part, all speaking feelingly on the high character and integrity of Mr. Lutz who replied in suitable terms thanking them for the kind things said and the interest taken on his behalf.

The Imperial service Medal was established by King Edward VII as a reward for long and faithful service to those in the Government service who had not been employed in the clerical or administrative branches of the service. The decoration is in the form of a seven pointed star, one side having a silver shield surmounted by the crown, on the shield in blue enamel are the words, "For faithful service" and the Imperial Cypher, E. R. on the other side is engraved the name of the recipient.

The medal is worn on the left breast suspended by a scarlet and blue silk ribbon.

## GENERAL NEWS

The English suffragettes have been complaining to the Home Secretary that the police handle them roughly when they are carrying on their demonstration.

Governor Carey of Cheyenne Wyo. vetoed a bill legalizing prize fights of 22 rounds, condemning the idea to make Wyoming the same as Nevada.

The Grand Trunk Railway contemplates extensive improvements on their lines between Depot Harbor and Ottawa this Spring. These include the filling in of trestle work and the construction of new bridges. The work will be extremely costly.

Typhoid and general sickness have played havoc with the attendances at the public schools in Ottawa.

A man was fined in Ottawa the other day \$20 and costs for striking his wife who abstracted a \$1.00 bill from his trousers while he was in bed. Why did she not take the trousers by the feet and annex all the loose change that rolled out.

Over 1000 pieces of unclaimed baggage were sold at Windsor station, Montreal the other day. This is the largest amount there has been for some years.

Six months hard labor was the sentence passed on Fred Porter who created a disturbance on a C. P. R. train to St. Anne de Bellevue.

Rev. Z. B. Gross charged with setting fire to his house at Moncton, was discharged by the Grand Jury at the Supreme Court as they found no indictment.

Toronto customs receipts for February were \$1,360,011, as against \$1,242,593 for the same month last year. Montreal returns were \$1,387,240, against \$1,397,479 for February of 1910. It will thus be seen that Toronto is making strides and almost equals Montreal, which is marking time.

Chas. Childers, who was found guilty of stabbing Thomas Shea in a fight on Chatham street, Montreal on Feb. 4, was today sentenced by Judge Choquette to three years in the penitentiary. Childers has already been in prison 15 times for various offences in the past five years.

Edgar Stripling for five years Chief of Police at Danville, Va., has been identified as an escaped prisoner from Atlanta Ga. In 1897 he was convicted for murder but escaped pending a motion for a new trial.

Owing to the number of accidents which have been caused in the streets and on tram cars by the long hupians worn by some women the Budapest police have been instructed to stop any women wearing such, without protectors, and confiscate the offending articles.

The Canadian Pacific Railway will this year expend several millions of dollars in improvements, the construction of new station, freight buildings and yards, and the performance of other work in Ontario. Work will be started as soon as the weather permits.

At a representative meeting of Toronto hotel keepers, a resolution of protest was passed against the proposed tax of five per cent. of the bar receipts in excess of \$40 per day. A committee was named to prepare a higher schedule of hotel rates which will be put into effect should the government insist on imposing the tax.

Rev. J. Edgar Hill, pastor of St. Andrews Presbyterian church, Montreal, succumbed on Friday last to a paralytic attack which seized him on Wednesday evening after speaking at a missionary meeting earlier in the day.

Federation of churches rather than fusion, is the immediate duty of the hour, according to the Presbyterian association for federal union, and the question is to be presented to many of the Presbyterians before that time.

The inaugural meeting of the association took place in Toronto yesterday.

Despite the fact that he had given "his old bent mother" \$50 last summer, Joseph Vance was sent to the Central Prison, Toronto for four months when it was shown in police court that he had assaulted and robbed James McMillen.

Emperor William's well-known fondness for motoring has just been shown by his ordering four new automobiles from German firms. With these additions to his garage, His Majesty will have thirty machines, including half a dozen motor baggage trucks.

The Fredericton Mail says that the Hon. Mr. LaBilloy who has been a member of the Legislature for the past three years has retired from the Accounts Committee on account of ill health. His place has been taken by Hon. Mr. Robinson.

The first work towards the construction of the \$700,000 plant for the Atlantic Sugar Refinery has begun. The contract for concrete foundations of five large buildings on ballast work has been awarded and the manager and foreman of the company are here making arrangements for the progress of the work.

Last Friday a pardon was received for Mrs. Robinson who was sent to the penitentiary for having smothered the child of her daughter of whom her husband was the father. She was released and left for her home near Sudbury. She said she committed the deed to save her family from disgrace. Her husband is still in prison for his share in the crime.

One hundred thousand bibles have been ordered for general distribution by the Gideons as the members of the Christian Travellers Assn. of America style themselves. The order is said to be the largest ever placed and it forms part of a national plan to place a bible in every hotel bedroom in the country.

The Bank of Nova Scotia has increased its dividend by declaring a quarterly dividend of 3 1/2 per cent, this being at the rate of 13 per cent per annum. The old rate was 12 per cent.

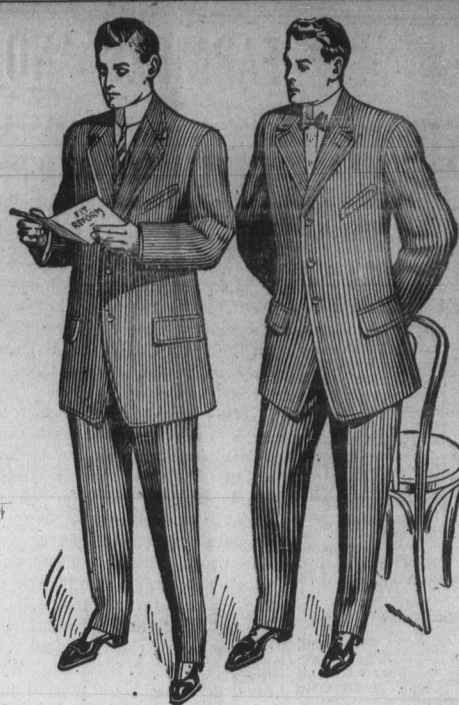
The final curtain was drawn on the last annual ball of the local Bartenders Association in the Recorders Court at Montreal, when Romeo Lepine and Herbert Gingras, the two men who were behind the bar when the morality squad broke in on the proceedings, were arraigned and pleaded guilty to selling liquor without a license. They were fined \$50 and costs.

Jewel robberies at London railway stations are becoming so frequent that the authorities agree that some important action should be taken. This week both the Euston and Waterloo stations were scenes of robberies. At the former a man had a wallet containing hundreds of pounds worth of jewels stolen, while at the Waterloo station a lady who was waiting on the platform had her handbag snatched from her as she was talking to one of the officials. It is believed that the thieves dress like porters in order to disarm suspicion and that they have a cab in waiting in which they escape the cabmen being in the game.

The steamer Senlac that for some time was engaged in the South Shore service and latterly on the Gaspe route will be sold at auction at Dalhousie on April 5 unless disposed of by private sale in the meantime. Built here in 1904 by the late David Lynch, the steamer is practically a new boat. She is 182 feet in length, thirty three feet beam, and sixteen feet deep. Her gross tonnage is 1011 and net 615. There are twenty-six staterooms with sleeping accommodations for eighty-two people. On 'tween decks and in the hold there is 25,000 cubic feet of freight space. It is understood that a number of offers have already been received for the Senlac.

Mr. Sydney Pascall, Hon. Secretary of the London Liberal Federation, is spending a few weeks in Canada looking into the progress made in free trade sentiment. Mr. Pascall has been at Ottawa, and after looking into methods of party organization in Toronto, with a view to comparing them with the system in England and adopting anything that may prove of value, he will go to Winnipeg and the west.

Mr. Pascall says that the next great question in British politics will be the home rule measure. The Liberal Government is fully determined to press the question of local self-government for Ireland to a final issue.
