Thursday Night

The benefit night given the Newcas-
tle band at the rink on Thursday night
was attended by a large number of
people, despite the night being stormy
and disagreeable. The band was pre-
sent in full force and a splendid pro-
gram of music was furnished. A
large number from Chatham were in
attendance.
The special attraction of the evening
was the hockey match, a return game,
between the Campbellton ladies team
and the Newcastle ladies team. A
short while ago the local girls in a
game, met defeat at the hands of the
Campbellton ladies, but, as The Ad-
vocate predicted, when on their own
ice they would turn the tables on them,
which they did in good style, receiving
round after round of applause for their
expert handling of the stick.
The game, while fast and exciting,
was clean and the very best of friend-
ly feeling existed all through. Referee
Drummond kept the game running
smooth, there being only a couple of
penalties paid by refractory players.
As a matter of skaters, the teams
seemed pretty equal, but for off-side
work, the visitors were as adept at
that as they were their good combina-
tion work, while the local team seemed
in fear of being penalized if they
made an off-side play, and stuck close-
ly, too closely, to the rules as laid
down by their coach.
The visiting team played probably
a better combination, but they were
not able, even at that, to score against
the home team, for Newcastle's de-
fender of the net stopped some very
sneaky shots, thereby helping to win
the game for her own team. For the
short time our girls have been in the
game, and the small amount of ex-
perience they have gained by going up
against an opposing team, they all did
remarkably well, and we are told that
excitement ran high in the veins of
some of our girls on the promenade
that they could hardly be kept from
jumping over the boards onto the ice.
While the Campbellton team is
made up of a sextette of real good
and clever skaters, after having seen
this game we are of the opinion that
our local team is their equal at every
stage of the game. Miss Gladys Kean,
of the visiting team, who was heralded
as a star, while really showing a
marked skill in getting away with the
puck, nevertheless found her equal in
Newcastle's plucky little rover, Miss
Laura Williston, who would have even
played a stronger game, had it not
been for an injury she received in the
first period. In fairness to all on both
teams it can be truthfully said that
they played an exceedingly clever
game, and it is hoped that next sea-
son will see more of the ladies in our
north shore towns interested in this
winter sport.

OCEAN LIMITED, MAY 2ND.
It is officially announced the Can-
adian Government Railway's fast
train, the Ocean Limited, between
Halifax and Montreal, will make the
first run May 2nd. With new sleeping
cars, new dining cars, new day coaches,
the most modern and powerful loco-
motives, of the dreadnaught class, and
any of the older equipment thoroughly
renovated and brought up to date, the
Ocean Limited service will continue to
grow in favour with those who travel
between the Maritime Provinces and
Montreal. As in previous years, the
Ocean will leave Halifax at 8:00
a.m. with the usual connections from
the Sydneys and Prince Edward Is-
land, the time table being so arranged
as to permit daylight views of some of
the most picturesque scenery on the
continent—the Wentworth Valley, La
Bate de Chaleur, and Metapedia Val-
ley, and is scheduled to arrive at Mont-
real after twenty-five hour run, 8:00
a.m., the following day at Bonaventure
Union depot. From the same station
the Grand Trunk's International Lim-
ited departs at 9:00 a.m. daily, making
a fast run to Toronto, arriving there
at 4:30 in the afternoon, thence to
Hamilton, London, Detroit, Chicago
and all western points.

A HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS FOR THE WAR

Unanimous Vote Passed in
House of Commons in Aid of
the Measure

Ottawa, March 24.—With a nod of
the head from the government and the
opposition leaders the war vote of
\$100,000,000 went through parliament
this morning. The measure which
authorized Canada to borrow \$100,-
000,000 from Great Britain and spend
it to defeat Germany passed unani-
mously in just one minute. Parliament
never passed a hundred million dollar
measure so quickly before.
The pension scheme was introduced
before the war appropriation measure
was passed. It provided a generous
measure of aid.
Sir Robert told the house that the
regulations were made under the au-
thority of the War Measure Act, but
that the pensions would not go into
force until they were approved of by
parliament.
Pensions are provided for soldiers
injured on service, and for the widows,
children and widowed mothers of
those killed in action or dying from
illness contracted on active service. A
soldier who is totally incapacitated
will draw half his pay for his wife at
the rate granted to widows of those
who have died on active service.
The pensions for wounded or incapac-
itated soldiers range from \$75 a
year for a slightly wounded private
to \$2,100 for a totally incapacitated
brigadier-general.
The amount of the pension depends
on the extent of injury.
The four classes are:
First degree, those rendered "totally
incapable"; second, rendered "incap-
able"; third degree, those rendered
"materially incapable," and fourth,
those rendered "in a small degree in-
capable" of earning a livelihood.
For privates, pensions are \$264 a
year for first degree, \$192 second
degree, \$132 third degree, and \$75 for
fourth degree; sergeants, according to
degree of incapacity, \$396, \$252, \$168,
\$100; lieutenants, \$480, \$360, \$240,
\$144; captains, \$720, \$540, \$360, \$216;
colonels, \$1,440, \$1,080, \$720, \$456.
Widows of privates, \$22 a month
and \$5 a month for each child.
Sergeants, \$28 a month and \$5 a
child.
Lieutenants' widows, \$37 a month,
and \$6 per child.
Captains' widows, \$45 a month, and
\$7 per child.
Colonels' widows, \$60 a month and
\$10 for each child.
Widowed mother, whose son was her
sole support, granted widow's pension.
For orphans rates may be doubled.
Pensions are paid from the day follow-
ing the death and commence with a
two months' gratuity.
Pension ceases where widow re-mar-
ries, but she will be paid two years'
gratuity. Should the widow become
unworthy or wealthy the pension may
be terminated. No pension or gratuity
for a boy over fifteen or a girl
over seventeen.
The pensions are to be paid monthly
in advance, and special cases may be
dealt with by the government.

paid the legal expenses incurred.

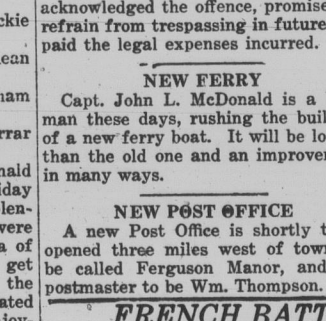
NEW FERRY

FRENCH BATTLE SHIP SUNK IN DARDANELLES ATTACK



THE "BOUVET"
Here is shown the French battle ship Bouvet, which was sunk in the same engagement in which
the British battle cruiser and the British battle ship Ocean were lost and several others put out of action. The
Bouvet was a French battle ship of 12,250 tons and had a complement of 630 men. She was 397 feet long, had a
maximum draught of 28-1-3 feet and a speed of seventeen knots. She was built at Lorient, where her keel was
laid down in January, 1898, and she was completed in 1908 at a cost of \$8,000,000. She had three groups of Belleville
boilers and 14,000-horse power. Her armament consisted of two 12-inch guns, two 10.8-inch, eight 5.5-inch, eight
4-inch, ten 3-pounders and twenty 1-pounders.

RETAIL MERCHANTS ASSOCIATION FORMED

Society Aims at Better Trade Re-
lations and to Encourage
Home Trade

The branch of the Dominion Retail
Merchants Association formed here, is
taking up its work with vigor. At a
meeting held recently, it was decided
to organize a "Dollar Day", or day of
special sales for the benefit of citizens,
and to encourage our people to buy at
home.
The aims and purposes of the Retail
Merchants Association have been
misrepresented by some person or
persons who have no knowledge of
what is being done by this association.
The Dominion organization has been
in existence in Ontario and the West
for some years, and was not formed
for the purpose of effecting a combine
to boost prices as some here have
stated, but to work in the best inter-
ests of both merchant and trader. It
has been found to work advantageously
wherever its principles have been
faithfully carried out.
The following are a few of its ob-
jects:—
To watch pending legislation and see
that it does not conflict with the best
business interests of the community.
To provide means of getting infor-
mation as to the credit standing of
strangers and the chronic "dead beat",
so that the consumer, who in the long
run has to pay for such, will be re-
lieved of carrying this burden.
To take an active interest in civic
and municipal affairs; to work to-
gether for the advancement of the
town.
To work together in an endeavor to
convince our citizens that when they
patronize mail order houses they are
working against the best interests of
the whole community. With this in
view "Dollar Day" is being planned.
The objects of the Association are
all in the best interests of the com-
munity and every merchant should be
a member of it.

**SUCCESSFUL RAID
ON SUBMARINE BASE**

German Works Set on Fire and
Considerable Damage Done.—
British Steamer Attacked

London, Mar. 25.—The Admir-
alty on Wednesday afternoon
made the statement that a suc-
cessful air attack was carried out
that morning by five machines of
the Dunkirk squadron on Ger-
man submarines being contract-
ed on Hoboken near Antwerp.
Two of the pilots had to return
on account of thick weather.
After planing down to a thous-
and feet level they dropped four
bombs each on submarines. It
is believed that considerable dam-
age was done to works and sub-
marines. Works were observed
to be on fire. In all five subma-
rines were seen on the slips.

Mine sweepers are again at
work in Dardanelles, but wind is
still too high for other observa-
tions.

Athens, Mar. 25.—Hestia pub-
lishes a statement to the effect
that President Poincare has as-
sumed a Greek Minister at Paris.
It is said that "Coming events
will convince Greece of the neces-
sity of abandoning neutrality."

Washington, Mar. 25.—Gov-
ernment will call attention of
Germany to report from the
Hague that German aeroplanes
had dropped a bomb that endan-
gered Belgian relief ship Elfland
near Dutch coast.

Copenhagen, Mar. 25.—Red
posters inscribed "Bread or
Peace" are continually appearing
in German towns, but Police re-
move the placards.

London, Mar. 25.—British car-
go steamer Teal, which arrived
in Thames on Wednesday was
target of a German aeroplane,
while off the coast of the Neth-
erlands.

Bombs and steel arrows were
dropped. Besides the damage
done, they opened fire with small
machine guns.

Russians are waging a terrific
struggle in the Carpathian
Mountain passes.

on the 5th of May, and the Ocean

EARLY ICE RUN
One of our oldest and much respect-
ed settlers, Mr. Willie Nichol, was in
town a few days ago, and your cor-
respondent in talking to him regard-
ing the early season, made the very
interesting statement, that in the year
1845 our river ice ran out on the 25th
March. This is about a month earlier
than usual. That same spring, on the
5th of May, a fire was started in the
woods at Flatlands, on the Quebec
side, and made a clean sweep of the
forests, from there to Nouvelle River.
Another early running of the ice oc-
curred fifteen years ago, when the ice
ran on the 30th March, and that day a
canoe crossed to Duncan's point, and
on the 7th of April, the ferry boat
crossed to the wharf at Campbellton.

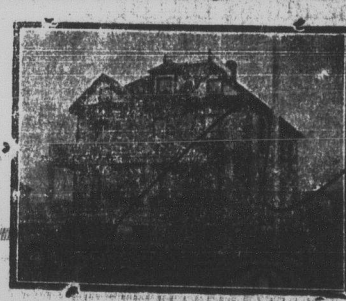

NEWSPAPERS AND THE LIQUOR BUSINESS

All over the United States the attention of newspaper publishers is being concentrated on questions of morality and of social service. A few newspaper subscribers are insisting that these questions be faced. They insist that advertisements as well as editorials and news reports have to do with the making of public opinion, and that in a democratic country public opinion is the power behind law and is the defence and guardian of free institutions. One of the most significant changes of the present time is in the attitude of both the public and the publishers to liquor advertisements in newspapers circulated in the homes of the people. In almost any convention of newspaper publishers this question presses into the forefront.

Recently The Editor and Publisher of New York stated that "the barring of liquor advertising by leading publications seems to be gaining in popularity" among the publishers. It quotes one publisher whose last alcohol advertisement appeared on December 31 "although such advertising has heretofore yielded a revenue of \$50,000 a year." The greatest dailies in Philadelphia, Chicago, and other American cities are closed to the advertisements of brewers and distillers. The publishers in Cincinnati and St. Louis know that "it is only a matter of time," and especially in the cities of the South "the time when the liquor advertisements must go is now."

In the same issue The Editor and Publisher says editorially that the high cost of newspaper production and the depressed condition of business advertising combine to crowd out the one-cent newspapers. The price of many American papers has already been increased, and the increase for others is inevitable. The people will be more readily responsive to the increase if it will insure the newspapers against dictation from the liquor traffic.

In Canada the same trend has set in. The menace of the organized liquor interests, and the traffic's sinister influence on public opinion when its advertising patronage is sorely needed, are points even the common man is ready to emphasize. That emphasis from the purchasers of the newspapers is part of the evidence which is framing the sentence in the court of public opinion: "Booze ads, must go!" With regard to the above it is not long since the Graphic turned down a \$150 order for advertising a certain

brand of Gin, and within very recently refused an order for advertising a certain beer. It may be considered by some to be bad business in refusing advertising orders of this kind, but the publishers are satisfied with their position and can say "No Boose ads. allowed." This has been and always will be their attitude, and according to the views of the members of the Canadian Press Association, the time is not far distant when liquor ads. will be barred from all respectable home papers.

EVERY BRITON'S DUTY
R. H. Rew, C. B., concludes an illustrative article on "Food Supplies in War Time," being one of a series of Oxford Pamphlets, after pointing out that Great Britain might hold out a year if actually blockaded by saying: "Farmers, in my belief, will prove, in this crisis, not unworthy to be countrymen of those who are heroically defending British homes and hearts on the field of Flanders. They will do their duty by working their utmost—often under grave difficulties—to maintain and, if possible, increase the produce of their farms, not because it is (as in fact it will be) profitable to do so, but because it is the desire, no less than the duty, of every Briton, each in his own sphere, to do his part to help his country in the time of her direct need." Is not every Canadian a Briton in heart and sympathy, if not by actual birth.

JUDGMENT GIVEN AT NEW CARLISLE COURT

Far Reaching Verdict Rendered in Superior Court When Hon. J. H. Kelly Wins Case

Hopetown, Mar. 27.—Judgment has just been rendered by the Superior Court at New Carlisle in a most interesting case, which had engaged the attention of the Court for a few years. It was a case wherein Francis Anez of Hopetown, took an action against Elias Mauger of the same place, claiming the ownership of a piece of land which he, Anez, had bought from William James McRae. The plaintiff, represented by Honorable John Hall Kelly, K. C., claimed a certain piece of land in the township of Hope, on the second range, in virtue of a title by which he had bought from W. J. McRae. The defendant, Mr. Mauger, represented by Messrs. Fabien Bugeaud & Emile Cote, pleaded that the land belonged to the Mauger estate, that it was an undivided property, that all that W. J. McRae had bought was the rights of one of the heirs, and as Anez had bought from McRae, that Anez had no more right in the property, than McRae had, that is to say, an undivided part.

The Honorable Mr. Kelly answered that it was true that McRae only had bought an undivided share, but that when Anez bought from McRae, that he, Anez, did not know that it was an undivided property. As ten years had gone by since Anez thus bought in good faith, Honorable Mr. Kelly claimed that his client was now the owner of the land in virtue of the ten years' possession.

His argument was based upon the old French law of the Province of Quebec which states that if a man buys a property in good faith, and has peaceful possession thereof during ten years, that his title is perfect.

The Court upheld this interpretation of the law, and gave judgment in favor of the plaintiff Anez.

Messrs. Bugeaud & Cote also set up that the property had been patented a few years ago in the name of the "legal representatives of Mauger", and produced the patent in support of this pretension.

Honorable Mr. Kelly replied that when a patent is issued in the name of the "legal representatives" of anybody, that the rights of all parties, whether they are heirs or legal representatives at law or not of the said party, are protected by the letter-patent, and that consequently, although in the ordinary sense of the word, Anez was not a legal heir or representative of the Mauger's, he was however a representative in legal interpretation and thus protected by the wording of the patent. The Court also upheld this view. This was the first time that a Court in the Province of Quebec was called upon to decide the question concerning the meaning of the words "Legal Representatives" in letters patent granted by the Crown, and this judgment will have a far reaching effect.

TWELVE THOUSAND BOY SCOUTS ENTER MILITARY SERVICE

Fifty Thousand Have Helped British Forces in Various Ways.

London, March 24.—Boy scouts are now engaged in the Navy for signalling, and are receiving more pay than midshipmen. More than 12,000 scouts have entered military service, and 2,000 more, who are nearing the age of enlistment, are in training.

At the outbreak of the war, the scouts by thousands guarded telegraphs, telephones and bridges, served as messengers, and performed countless duties of value to the War Office and the Admiralty. More than 5,000 medals have been given to scouts who performed not less than 28 days' service. About 50,000 boys have served a lesser number of days.

The sea branch of the movement volunteered to carry out the duties of the coastguardsmen recalled to the fleet, and they were detailed to duties on the east coast. This required more boys than this branch could supply, and the land scouts joined, and now 1,600 boys are employed, in patrols of eight, under their own leaders and with their own equipment.

New Brunswickers Home After Two Months in England

Mr. and Mrs. O. W. Nordin of Nordin, N. B., who have spent the past two months in England, returned to St. John on Saturday. They left Liverpool on the S. S. Adriatic and had an uneventful run to New York. Mr. Nordin is enthusiastic in his praise of the British admiralty; its work, he says, cannot be too highly appreciated. On this side the uninterrupted sea traffic is accepted without any idea of the completeness of the British preparations and their increasing vigilance. Fifty per cent. of the men seen on the London streets are in khaki, and a spirit of calm confidence marks the conduct of the whole people. An interesting sight to the civilian was the large force of professional men, lawyers, doctors and business men who drill daily on the Embankment; they are part of the home service corps and are determined to be ready for any emergency. In the large cafes, restaurants and hotels young boys who are being carefully trained, have replaced the German and Austrian waiter so familiar in these places.

The censorship in regard to news is very strictly maintained and is carefully observed. Mr. Nordin said, although there are many stories afloat of the cleverness and bravery of the allied armies, and especially of the naval movements.

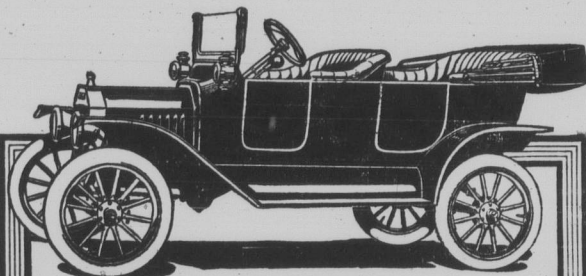

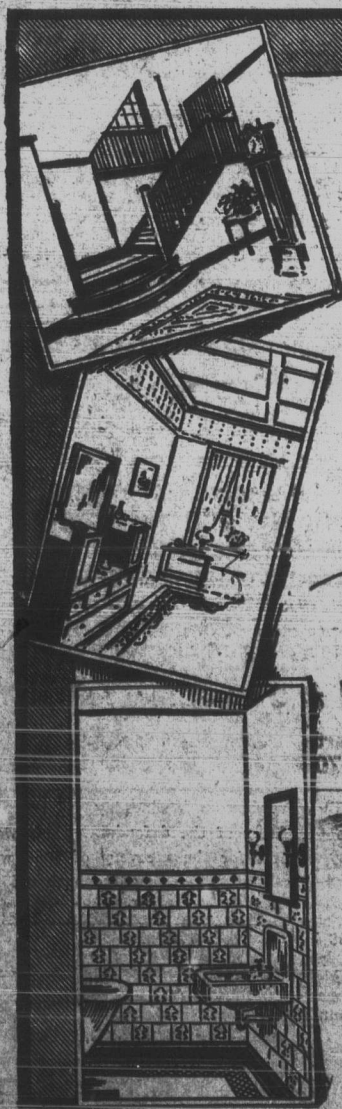
ATTEMPTED SUICIDE

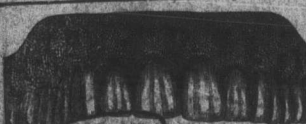

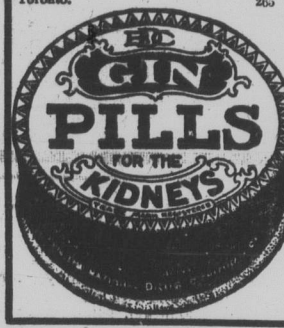

NEAR THE SUBWAY

INTERESTING ITEMS FROM CROWN LAND BOOK

Report Showing Progress of Hazen and Grimmer Settlement up to 31st Oct. 1914.

The following tables give some interesting statistics of Hazen and Grimmer Settlements, on the International Railway, which up till very recently were the homes of wild game in virgin woodland.

Hazen Settlement.
11 mills, 281 houses, 1269% acres of land seeded, 895 acres of land chopped, 53% acres piled, 164 horses, 69 cattle.

Number of families 280, of which are 750 males and 631 females. Total population 1381. 10 tons of hay raised, 14,000 bushels of oats harvested, 2000 bushels of potatoes harvested, 2000 bushels of turnips harvested.

Grimmer Settlement.
3 mills, 118 houses, 5421% acres seeded, 331 acres chopped, 1 acre piled, 56 horses, 41 cattle. Number of families 118. (males 320, females 209), population 530. 60 tons of hay raised, 4000 bushels of oats, 500 bushels potatoes, and 500 bushels of turnips harvested.

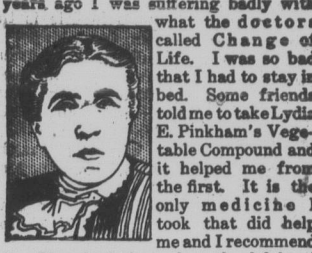
