USE BOURDEAUX MIXTURE

Those who used Bordeaux on their potatoes got from one third to one half more barrels of potatoes to the acre than those who did not.

It has been a question with the farmers of Carleton county whether it pays to "Bordeaux" or not. Our neighbors in Aroostook county, who have had much more experience in raising potatoes than we have, have come to the conclusion that they will undertake to raise potatoes with inferior grades of fertilizer or even without fertilizer, but they will not undertake to raise potatoes without using Bordeaux next year. They find that when they use Bordeaux five or six times during the season they need little or no paris green. Paris green is likely to cost from forty to fifty cents per pound this year and by using Bordeaux mixture our farmers will need much less paria green.

Blue vitriol, one of the chief components of Bordeaux mixture is about double the price it was last year, but our farmers are already procuring their season's supply. With seed from \$3 to \$4 per barrel and low grade fertilizer at the present high price there will probably be less potatoes planted, but they will be better cared for than ever.
