RAILROAD ACROSS THE ISTHMI.—The public were taken by surprise yesterday morning, on seeing it announced that Wm. H. Aspinwall, John L. Stevens, Henry Chauncey and their associates, "have secured to themselves an exclusive grant or privilege of 99 years, from the Republic of New Granada, for constructing a Railroad across the Isthmus of Panama," and propose, with the indirect co-operation of the United States Government, to commence the execution of the project within one year, and complete it within three years from the present date. The aid which they ask from the government is to this effect, that the Secretary of the Navy be empowered to contract with them for the transportation, on said Road, for a period of twenty years, of naval and army supplies, including troops, munitions of war, provisions, naval stores, the mails of the United States, and its public agents, at a sum not exceeding the amount now specified by law to be paid for the transportation of the mails alone from New York to Liverpool.

The construction of the proposed Railroad, in connection with the line of monthly steamers between New York and Chagres, on the Atlantic side of the Isthmus of Panama, and from the city of Panama on the Pacific side of said Isthmus to California and Oregon, would complete an uninterrupted steam communication between the two extremes of our vast country, and reduce the time occupied in the passage, from three or four months to a few weeks. The importance of such a communication cannot well be estimated; and the United States government having by a treaty with New Granada, secured the perpetual right of way across the Isthmus, and the perpetual neutrality of the immediate territory through which a railroad would pass, there remains no impediment whatever to its construction, provided the necessary funds can be raised. And if Congress shall see fit to grant the encouragement, asked, or something equivalent to it, we believe that they can be raised. For it is now evident that, with such a Road, there would be an immense travel and freight across the Isthmus, which could hardly fail to make the investment profitable. But this is not all; since, in addition to the revenue to be derived from the Road itself, and the indirect aid which may be afforded by our government, the government of New Granada has offered very great advantages to any company which shall construct such a road.—[New York Jour. Com.]

MOBILE GAS WORKS DESTROYED.—The Gas Works of Mobile were wholly destroyed on the night of the 6th inst. The origin or extent of the damage not yet ascertained. The works were the property of James H. Caldwell, Esq. of New Orleans.

TERRIBLE ACCIDENT. Seven Men Drowned.—A heart rending calamity occurred near St. Johnsville. Seven men in attempting to cross the Mohawk in a small boat, were drifted by the current against the rope which stretched across the river for ferry purposes. The water was high, and the boat struck the rope in such a position as to upset it instantly. Five of the seven men in the boat succeeded in catching hold of the rope; but it broke under the pressure, and the unfortunate men were immediately carried down the river and drowned. We learn, verily that they were all laboring men. Their bodies had not been recovered when the last night's train passed.—[Ath. Eve Jour.]

MECHANIC'S INSTITUTE.—Last Monday evening, George N. CANADA. The Montreal Pilot, in noticing the present depression of trade in Canada, assigns the following reasons.—"The failure of the lumber trade for three seasons; the losses on produce in 1847, amounting to two hundred and fifty thousand pounds by the Montreal and Quebec merchants alone; the disastrous effect of the present bankrupt law; our position as regards the balance of trade against us in England and the United States; and the want of domestic manufactures."

The Quebec Gazette of the 7th inst., contains the following paragraph:—

St. Lawrence and Atlantic Railroad.—On Saturday last the Directors, with a few invited guests, made trial of the new locomotive, the A. N. Morin, arrived recently from Portland, proceeding to a distance of 22 miles from Longueuil. The speed attained, in some places, was at the rate of 30 miles an hour.

A destructive fire occurred at Toronto on the 30th November. The property was principally insured. A fireman of the name of William Thornton received a severe injury, which ultimately caused his death.

FROM BERMUDA.—She Steamer Osprey arrived at Halifax, with late dates from Bermuda.

The Legislature of Jamaica met on the 20th of October for the dispatch of business, but down to the 20th ult. no great amount of work had been done. The Governor had involved himself in a little difficulty with the Assembly, by offering in a message to the House, certain fiscal suggestions relative to the appropriation of the loan from the Imperial Parliament. The Assembly voted the Message a breach of their privileges, and sent a copy of the Resolution to his Excellency, who very promptly disavowed any intention of interfering with the privileges of the House, so the matter dropped.

THE SEASON. During the whole of the past week, the weather has been unusually mild for the season of the year. What little intercourse we have had with the opposite shore has been kept up by the ferry-boats, which effect passages as often as the openings in the floating ice will admit of it.—[Glencoe.]
