

TELEGRAPHIC.

Copenhagen, July 24.
The Danish government has intimated to Prussia its willingness to give guarantees for the protection of the German inhabitants of North Schleswig, but demands information as to the nature of the guarantees required by the Prussian Cabinet.

New York, 25th.
The S. S. Columbia, from Havana, July 24th, arrived yesterday. She brings late South American and Mexican news.
Yellow fever still prevailed in Havana but the number of deaths had decreased.
It was expected that the cable to this continent would be in operation in fifteen days.
Gen. Lopez, of Bolivar, has taken the field against the army of the Federal Government of Columbia.

The news from Mexico has the announcement of the shooting of Gen. Villauria by order of Gen. Diaz.

London, July 25th.
McMillan has been named for Judge of the Admiralty Court.

The Bill of the Bank of England has increased £55,000 during the past week. The Bank rate has been reduced to 2 per cent.

Omar Pasha reports that the Military Forces under his command have succeeded in suppressing the insurrection in Cania, and that the war in that Island is now ended.

Dublin, July 25.
While the police were conducting a search of Fenians through the principal streets of Tralee, the bystanders boldly cheered the prisoners, and increasing in numbers to a mob finally attacked the escort with stones. No determined attempt, however, was made to rescue the prisoners, and they were deposited in the town jail.

Paris, July 25th.
The Corps Legislatif yesterday passed all the provisions in the Budget for the Extraordinary Expenditures. By this action the only Sections of the Budget which had not previously been agreed to were disposed of and the other general business of the Session having been completed, the Corps Legislatif adjourned.

Broadstairs gradually dull, Coru 55 3/4.

New York, July 26.
A political riot took place in East Tennessee Tuesday, in which two persons were shot dead seven mortally wounded, and about thirty slightly.

London, July 26.
There is much caution shown by capitalists and business men here, the feeling having become general that war between France and Prussia is imminent.

A private despatch from Berlin received this evening makes mention of the general opinion there that war is certain, and adds that Prussia is actively urging forward her preparations for such event.

Vienna, July 26th.
Emperor Napocon sent a note to King William of Prussia, urging him to surrender the Danish Princes of North Schleswig to Denmark.

The Emperor of Austria refuses to interfere in the matter at all.

Ottawa, C. W. July 26.
The surveying party to ascertain the length of the Ottawa river has returned. The river is ascertained to 1000 miles long not 500. A large lake was discovered which hitherto was unknown. The natives of the country through which they travelled are Pagans. The men have a plurality of wives.

New York, July 27.

Berlin, July 26.
A couple of conscripts belonging to the Imperial army attempted to escape, they succeeded in reaching an American vessel at Bremerhaven, which was on the point of sailing. The Prussian authorities threatened to open their batteries on the ship if the commander refused to give up the conscripts. After a short parley the men were surrendered.

London, July 26.
The names of the persons recently arrested at Cork on suspicion of being Fenians are Callaghan, Griffin and Goulding.

Reilly, who has been on trial for a fortnight charged with complicity in the recent outbreak in Kerry, has been found guilty of high treason.

Berlin, 28th.
Notwithstanding the official denial in the Moniteur, of Napoleon's note to the King of Prussia, in regard to North Schleswig, the semi-official journals of Berlin continue to urge King William to repel the intrusion of the French Emperor in the political affairs of Germany.

London, July 29.
The sincerity of the repeated denials put forth in the Paris Moniteur of the war reports now current in Europe is doubted here. The London Times in its city article of this morning is of opinion that the alarm created by these warlike rumors, will have the effect to check trade generally until next spring.

THE RELEASE OF THE BRITISH CONSUL AND OTHERS AT ALEXANDRIA—CAUSE OF THEIR DETENTION.—A few days ago we were informed by a cable despatch that the British government has ordered a detachment of troops to go to Abyssinia and compel the release of the British subjects who have been imprisoned there for some time resisted the power of Great Britain, but the indications are that he will be compelled to come to terms at last. With regard to the origin of the difficulty, in the year 1864 King Theodore took a notion that Queen Victoria of England would make him a suitable wife and Queen, and he proposed to a British Consul in his dominions that he should send to England a formal proposition for the Queen's hand. The Consul refused to send his sovereign such a proposition, and was at once seized by the King and put in prison. From that time to the present the King has disregarded all threats for the Consul's release, and other Englishmen who have been sent there to endeavor to bring the King to terms have been seized and imprisoned with the Consul.

THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT.

As there appears to be some misunderstanding in regard to the composition of the Local Government, the following statement of the exact position of affairs may not be without interest to our readers.

Hon. Mr. Williston is not a member of the Government, having resigned his seat there as well as his office of Solicitor General.

Hon. Mr. Tilley is not a member of the Government, having resigned both his seat and his office, but Mr. Tilley continues to act as Provincial Secretary and must so act until his successor is sworn in. Mr. Tilley has drawn his salary since July 1st.

Hon. Mr. Cogan has resigned the office of Chief Commissioner of the Board of Public Works, but retains his seat in the Government for the present, although he has accepted the position of a Senator of the Dominion.

Hon. Mr. Mitchell, who is a Senator of the Dominion and member of the Privy Council, has tendered his resignation of his seat in the Local Government, but His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has not yet signified his acceptance of the same.

Hon. Mr. Williston, a Senator of the Dominion, Hon. Mr. Connell, Hon. Mr. Fisher and Hon. Mr. McMillan who contemplate offering for the Commons, continue to retain their seats.

Under the Imperial Act Hon. Mr. McMillan must continue to hold the office of Postmaster General and perform its duties until relieved thereof by the Parliament of the Dominion.

From the above statement it will be seen that only two gentlemen recently members of the Local Government have absolutely retired from it, namely, Hon. Mr. Williston, who is appointed a Judge under the County Courts Act, and Hon. Mr. Tilley, Minister of Customs for the Dominion.—[Telegraph.]

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ST. ANDREWS, JULY 31, 1867.

The Election.

On Monday last, the Sheriff held his Court according to public notice, in the County Court House for the purpose of nominating a person to fill the vacancy in the representation of this County, owing to the Hon. John McAdam having vacated his seat, and accepted the Office of Chief Commissioner of Public Works.

After the usual ceremony of reading the Election law, &c., JOHN BOLTON, Esq., in a neat and appropriate speech, said he had much pleasure in nominating the Hon. John McAdam for re-election; he believed that the Hon. gentleman's unfitness had not been impaired by his appointment to office, and that he would serve his constituents with the same assiduity in the new position which he held, as he had done formerly. He hoped that there would be no opposition, and that Mr. McAdam would be elected by acclamation.

HENRY WEBBER, Esq., seconded the nomination, and observed that Mr. McAdam had served his constituents faithfully for thirteen years, and that the office had been conferred upon him, as a tribute of merit—that he had been a useful representative and would continue to be so in the enlarged sphere of duty to which he had been appointed. He did not think it necessary to allude further to Mr. McAdam's services, as the constituency knew them. He hoped with his friend Mr. Bolton, that there would be no opposition.

DR. THOMPSON had much pleasure in also seconding the nomination, and bearing testimony to Mr. McAdam's services in the legislature; spoke in high terms of his abilities, and physical strength for the performance of his duties as Chief Commissioner of Works.

The Hon. Mr. McADAM thanked the gentlemen for the handsome compliments they had paid him. This was the seventh time he had come before them, and it was now to endorse his appointment to an office which had been conferred upon him by the universal approval of the Government; he should be elected by a show of hands, it would be highest compliment they could confer upon him, and would be an expression of their confidence in him. He came to this country when a mere boy, still had an affection for old Ireland, the land of his birth. He said it was natural to

him to be loyal, that his father had fought under Wellington, and that he hoped to die under the glorious old Flag. He censured those who favored annexation, condemning them for entertaining such disloyal sentiments. He admired the United States, but desired no closer connexion with that country than business relations. He had large business transactions with the Americans particularly in the State of Maine; they admitted that the taxes were oppressive. He had a small property in Canada, and had paid \$500 taxes on it, this year. He was sorry to see so many young men leaving the Province for the West; they would find their mistake; he believed that British America was one of the finest countries on the globe, and that New Brunswick was well adapted for the poor man, as he could live cheaper and make as comfortable a living as he could anywhere on this Continent. Mr. McAdam's remarks were well received and elicited frequent applause.

At 2 o'clock, there being no opposition, the Sheriff declared the Hon. John McAdam duly elected.

Letters received from W. M. Buck, Esq., C. E. dated at Grand Falls, state that he has obtained a large amount of information with reference to the country through which the Frontier line will probably pass. Mr. Buck in his travels met Mr. Ellis of the St. John "Globe," hon. F. Rice, and Col. Emerson of Victoria, and some gentlemen connected with the Grand Trunk R. R. The people in the sections of Country through which he had travelled were all in favor of the Frontier route.

Mr. Kennedy, the Scottish Vocalist, has been delighting St. John audiences, particularly his countrymen. His reading and singing are highly praised. He is to give two concerts in Fredericton, this week. It is some what expected that he will visit St. Andrews next week and give a concert or two. He is accompanied by his daughter who performs it is said admirably on the Piano.

Alex. L. Light, Esq., C. E., recently from England, was in town last week, his numerous friends were happy to meet him after so long an absence. We believe Mr. Light is connected with the Intercolonial Railway as one of the Imperial Engineers. He left for Woodstock on Saturday last.

Sheriff Harding arrived at Halifax on Tuesday morning. The noble crew of the New Brunswick boat which beat the World are coming by way of New York. If men ever deserved an ovation—the Carleton Crew do.

The merchants and traders of St. Andrews, have wisely determined to receive the British shilling at 24 cents and American quarter at 22 cents, and other denominations at a similar rate. This is a move in the right direction.

MAP OF NEW BRUNSWICK.—Messrs. J. & A. McMillan have just published a most beautiful and entirely new map of this Province, on a large scale. It is neatly got up, accurate, and shows all the Railways, Roads, towns, villages, &c., with plans of the Cities of St. John and Fredericton. We trust it will have an extensive patronage.

We have heard James Murchie, Esq., of St. Stephen spoken of as a Candidate for the local Legislature, for that section of the County. Should Mr. Murchie offer, there would be little doubt of his election, as he is decidedly popular and a man of excellent business capacity.

The last Premiums in the Agricultural Society's List of Premiums should have been omitted, as the upper flat of the Hall is not to be let this year as a Refreshment room.

Mr. Thomson, from Messrs. Greene & Sons Montreal was in town last week soliciting orders for Canadian cloths &c. This is only the commencement of a trade which will ere many years be increased. Several goods of which he had samples, can be brought here cheaper than they can be purchased in England.

We are pleased to notice by papers per English mail full accounts of the races at the Paris Regatta, in which our New Brunswick oarsmen were the victors; it appears however that they could have beaten their competitors with ease, as they made better time in American waters.

The weather for the last two days has been all that could be desired by haymakers, and they are improving the time. The crop is abundant and of good quality.

HUTCHINSON'S NEW DIRECTORY.—Mr. W. H. Lester has been in town during the week, obtaining the names, residences and business places of the inhabitants of this place for the new Directory now in course of publication by Mr. Hutchinson.

SUGGILLING.—An agent of the United States Treasury has arrived in Washington to report in reference to the recent rail made by the customs officers and Treasury agents upon the inhabitants of Washington county, Maine, from the mouth of the St. Croix river to Grand Lake. From all that has transpired in relation to this grand descent it seems that the government authorities have for once suddenly interrupted an old established custom in the way of trade between a large number of the residents along the border and the tradesmen of New Brunswick, the result of which is that many citizens of good standing in society have been placed in an embarrassing position, and the price of certain goods has considerably advanced.—[Exchange.]

THE VICEROY OF EGYPT IN LONDON.—The Pall Mall Gazette gives the amusing account of the Sunday experience of the Viceroy of Egypt in London:—

"On Sunday last London Society gave the Viceroy of Egypt a bitter-taste of its quality. Everybody knows that, although it is very wrong for the lower class of London to go anywhere but to Church on Sunday, or to wish to drink anything but water, the upper class of the metropolis may with perfect propriety amuse and refresh themselves innocently at Richmond, Greenwich, Maidenhead, or in the Regent's park as much as they please. Consequently the approaches to the Zoological Gardens are crowded on Sunday afternoons with hundreds of private carriages, conveying to the gardens the wealth, beauty, and fashions of London, fearfully and wonderfully attired. In a rash moment the Viceroy of Egypt was tempted by his carriage to repair thither too; and as soon as his highness was known to be in the gardens a commotion ensued much such as might have been expected had the lion escaped from their cages or the cobra capella set loose.
