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N.B. IS THE HUNTER'S PARADISE

Moose, Deer, Bear, Partridge and Duck Are Always Plentiful.

Try a number of Albertans who like to spend their vacation with rod and gun in New Brunswick to best known as a happy hunting ground, says the Dominion. The province is thickly forested outside the towns and villages, which are far apart, game is plentiful. At least once a year a bear will be seen and in some places the moose can be seen in the woods. One has only to go a few miles outside the city to find fishing and hunting grounds that are hundreds of miles from civilization. The St. John River, which courses for over four hundred miles through the Province of New Brunswick, has numerous tributaries on the upper reaches of which the angler can expect to find bear's foot, and with good results. There are also numerous lakes and streams in the province, and the favored ones who know them. One of the best of these is named Disappointment, which is really a beautiful stream to the ardent fisherman.

There is a plan on foot to set aside several thousand acres in St. John and Charlotte Counties for a fish and game preserve. If the plan goes through, this section will be properly equipped with camps and guides and will be open to local and visiting sportsmen.

This district is one of the best hunting and fishing grounds in Eastern Canada. Moose, deer, bear, partridge, woodcock and wild ducks are plentiful and there is splendid trout and landlocked salmon fishing.

BADEN P. WYERS BURIED FRIDAY

Letter Received Giving Full Account of the Young Man's Tragic Death.

Berkeley, Calif., Sept. 18.—Fire sweeping over the hills east of Berkeley yesterday laid waste to the Cragmont and Radcliff Avenue districts, destroying at least 600 residences within an area estimated at 60 blocks, one of the choicest residential sections of the city, with damage estimated at \$10,000,000 and rendered homeless approximately 2,400 persons.

No lives are known to have been lost, although two students were seen to plunge into a vortex of fire when the roof of a house upon which they had collapsed.

Hundreds of residences fled from the burning area as the fire swept down the slope of the hills, burned its way through the closely settled and exclusive district and eventually died down to a smoldering ring of flames encompassing the entire area which it had devastated. The prospectus residential section was a smoky waste.

"The county jail," he said, "is a den of dirt, disease and degeneracy."

He declared that this institution played an important part in increasing the amount of crime and the number of criminals.

GOOD SHOWING WAS MADE IN SPITE OF GREAT HANDICAPS

Official C. N. R. Statement Analyzes Comparative Returns in Two Years Lower Rates as Factor.

The following statement, authorized by Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National Railway System, was handed to the Gazette yesterday by the Publicity Department of the System:

The Montreal Gazette of September 13th publishes an Ottawa dispatch with respect to the Canadian National Railway System which does not accurately reflect the true position, and which demands comment if the public is to be correctly informed, and, therefore, while there is no desire on the part of the administration of the System to be unduly contentious, the following statement is given for the information of the public.

The statement is made that considering the entire System—both in Canada and United States there was a betterment to the extent of \$4,172,000 for the first half of 1923. The fact is that for the first half of 1922 the System as a whole was operated at a deficit of \$2,925,997.17 while for the first six months of 1923 this deficit was turned into a surplus of \$1,246,231.73, or an increase in net earnings of \$4,168,228.90. Within the period under consideration the operating ratio was reduced from 102.85 per cent in 1922 to 98.71 per cent in 1923. This was accomplished in the face of the floods and adverse weather conditions which obtained in March and April of 1923, and is emphasized by the fact that for the first six months of 1923, "removal of snow and low" involved the System in an additional expense of \$1,548,000 over the same period for 1922; in addition to which there was a loss of revenue due to interruptions in traffic, reduced engine loads, and all of the collateral expenses which arise from such sources.

Organization Incomplete

It is stated that the Canadian National Railway Board had control of the Grand Trunk at the end of February this year, and was in control for at least two-thirds of the period covered by the first six months returns of 1923. This gives rise to unfair conclusions. The present Board took control of the properties about the first of November, 1922. The President arrived in Canada about December 1st, 1922 and naturally some months elapsed before the present Board could commence even a semblance of its functions. The organization for the administration of the Canadian National Railway System as a whole was not announced until about March 1st, 1923, and even at that time only heads of department were determined upon so that it can be said with truth that the present administration in entirety did not begin to make itself felt in any degree until the first of May 1923, and even today the administrative machine is not operating with that degree of efficiency which can only come about in the course of a reasonable time. It has frequently been pointed out, and will be recognized by all unprejudiced people that most of the great railway systems on this side of the Atlantic have been developed by a process of gradual evolution extending over several decades, in which period ample time was given for the development of that organization which was best for the selection and training of officers, and the investigation of transportation and other problems, and the acquisition of that knowledge of the economy interests of the territory served, which is an essential for efficient administration. With respect to the Canadian National Railway, the present Board of Directors have been confronted with the task of attempting to accomplish in a few months what other railroads have done in tranquility through many years. How important a factor this is, is shown by the experience in the organization and activities.

Rates One-Third Less

Another vital and important consideration is the fact that for the first half of 1923 the rates under which grain and grain products moved were 33.1 per cent lower. It is conservative to assume that had the Company enjoyed the same rate on grain and grain products as had during the first six months of 1922, the net receipts of the System would have unquestionably been increased by at least \$3,600,000. There were reductions in rates on other basic commodities and on international traffic which would have materially increased this figure, but which cannot be calculated without the expenditure of unjustifiable time and money. In a nutshell, it may be said that had freight rates been on a parity with the first six months of 1922, the net receipts of the System would have been approximately \$5,500,000 instead of \$1,500,000. These figures are conservative, and leave out of consideration the weather conditions referred to, and many other factors which are susceptible of exact computation.

ANNUAL BOARD OF TRADE MEETING

Some of the Matters Considered At the Two Day Sessions At Halifax.

Halifax N. S., Sept. 18.—With the object of bringing something concrete out of the mass of resolutions which have been brought before the Maritime Board of Trade at their twenty-fifth annual conference, the sessions of this morning were largely devoted toward the formation of some organizations of a permanent and established character which would deal with the matters discussed and be in constant touch with the three governments of the Maritime Provinces. The idea which has been formed for many years by the Maritime Board of Trade, and which would consist of a permanent secretary toward the expense of whom the three governments of the province would contribute. Having received this substantial promise of some form of assistance from two of the provinces, the Maritime Board of Trade, at the suggestion of H. J. Logan, M. P., M. E. Demmon, Moncton, and A. A. Pomeroy, of Charlottetown, was immediately formed to wait upon Premier Armstrong. They reported back to the meeting that Premier Armstrong had given the matter consideration, that he was not desirous of having the government contribute toward a secretary for the Board, but favored the appointment of some man who would be a freight and railway traffic expert, whose services might be available by the Maritime Board of Trade as their secretary, and to look after a number of matters of mutual interest to the three Maritime Provinces.

Land Settlement and Immigration

occupied considerable attention, the feature of the morning being an address by Major John Barnett, chairman of the Soldiers' Settlement Board of Canada, who came purposely to address the conference. He said that at the request of Premier Armstrong the Department of Ottawa was to make a thorough survey of the farm lands for settlement in Nova Scotia. A resolution moved by May Chesley, of Kentville, for a committee to formulate plans for the organization of an association to co-ordinate the colonization and development work of the Maritime Provinces was passed and a committee appointed as follows: Nova Scotia—Mayor Smith, Amherst; F. G. J. Comeau, Halifax. New Brunswick—Angus McLean, Becharof; E. A. Sehefeldt, St. John. Prince Edward Island—E. T. Tigge, Charlottetown; A. A. Pomeroy, Charlottetown.

Stripped For Action

Although the article in question does not refer to the July figures for 1923, it may be of interest to the public to know that for that month the net results from operation were up 203,000,000 pounds or roughly 10 per cent over the net results for the first seven months of the year as approximately \$3,000,000, as compared with a loss from operation for the same period in 1922 of \$2,200,000, or an improvement of \$5,200,000 for the whole period. This rate of improvement will not only be maintained, but should be materially improved, because the last six months of the year, in the history of the issue now included in the National Railway System, have always been the most profitable half of the year. In short, several of the heavy items of expense have been saved for in the first half of the year. The railway has stripped itself for action, is prepared to handle with economy and dispatch the large movement which is anticipated, and there is no reason to feel but that when the year is closed the net results will constitute material improvement over the same results for 1922.

Saving By Spending

It is stated that on the Canadian National and Grand Trunk the previous administration practiced a rigid economy. The Board of the Canadian National System expresses its admiration for the policy which was achieved, which in no sense are to be minimized. It is fair to say, however, that in the policy with respect to the maintenance and operation of any property, the results for the year are more important than the results for six months, and a course must be pursued which, when the fiscal year is closed, will produce a maximum of net receipts. The Board of the Canadian National System and the operating administration thought it wise to follow a policy of reasonable vigor with

PREMIER VENIOT AT WOODSTOCK

Heartly Congratulations on His Campaign Speech Made on That Occasion.

(Glasgow, Fredericton.)
 Premier Veniot did well in opening the Woodstock Exhibition last night, by making special reference to the substantial progress which New Brunswick is making in the development of an agriculture, and also in the development of the factory. Certain outside New Brunswick have been working for some years past to minimize the efforts of our system and the efforts of our leaders in industrial enterprises. And within the province we have our own provincial leaders, the pessimists who can find no good or progress in any line of effort or in anything and are ever ready to suggest a change. We have, for instance, a class of men who feel that the other parts of the Dominion are ordered to destroy us; to wipe us out and to take the place of the Maritime Provinces; and their only hope is in the loss against the world. We have also so silly politicians, led by the leader of the Conservative party in this province, who, having miserably failed in everything which they have had connection with the public arena are setting up that our only salvation lies in a political Union of the Maritime Provinces—with of course the capital at Halifax, N. S. And the pessimists of the trade classes and the politicians of the political classes are working hand in hand.

Premier Veniot's broad presentation of the situation is cheering, enlightening and manly. View these facts as he presented them:

"Farm products, 1921, in Nova Scotia, \$58,000,000; in Nova Scotia, \$38,000,000."
 "Nova Scotia export, \$67,000,000. Nova Scotia import \$38,000,000."
 "New Brunswick export, \$118,000,000; New Brunswick import \$40,000,000."
 "Nova Scotia balance of trade, \$29,000,000; New Brunswick's balance of trade, \$72,000,000."
 "New Brunswick has invested in the lumber industry \$65,000,000; has 254 mills, five pulp mills and five paper mills."
 "The loss by provinces in agricultural products during depression were: Nova Scotia, \$21,000,000; Prince Edward Island, \$5,000,000; Quebec, \$13,000,000; New Brunswick, \$11,000,000."
 "The population of New Brunswick increased from 1909 to 1920 15 per cent; in Maine, Vermont and New Hampshire, only 7 1/2 per cent. In these States, 521,000 acres in same period increased in value three times. Manufactured articles in these States increased in value three times, while in New Brunswick they increased 4 1/2 times."
 "The only deterioration in New Brunswick is in the culture and honor of the men who seek place in the public life; and if this province has suffered, it is wholly through the deterioration which is now, perhaps more apparent to our own people than to the outside critics who have taken advantage of the situation to minimize us. We must confess the politically, the Conservatives have recently made a great years of things."
 "We congratulate Premier Veniot on what he is reasonably doing to restore this province to its proper place in the map."

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Saving Seed Of A Farmers Account Book

Any merchant handling several lines of goods would regard it as folly to neglect to keep a complete set of books, enabling him at all times to ascertain his profits and losses on each article and liability, and so on. A manufacturer who failed to do so would be neglecting his business. It is curious, then, that Canada's basic industry—agriculture—should be carried on so far as individual producers are concerned with it, to casual and haphazard methods. Especially in this strange time when it is considered how simple farm book-keeping is by comparison with that of other businesses.

In a survey of some eight hundred farms conducted some time ago it was discovered that very few farmers indeed followed anything like a complete method of accounting, while a large number adopted absolutely none at all. These, beyond having a sort of general idea as to "what paid," were often quite hazy as to actual returns from different lines of work.

In order, if possible, to remedy this undesirable state of affairs the Dominion Experimental Farms system has published an extremely simple farmer's account book, which will adequately serve all necessary purposes. Set out on it, in concise, plain language, is a school exercise book, and is designed to last a complete year. To keep it needs no knowledge of ordinary accounting; simply the ability to write and add; and a record of all transactions might be made in an hour a week. A few plain directions as to making entries, some aids to taking inventories, a table of soil capacities and a giration table, are given on the inside of the cover, while on the back are printed calendars for last and next year.

In the book itself are pages for the entry of receipts and expenditures (both of which may be seen at a glance on the same page relative to cattle, horses, sheep, swine, poultry, crops and labour; and there is also ample space for miscellaneous items. There is a page for amounts owned to and by the farm, and forms on which may be made inventories of land and buildings, of live stock, of feed and supplies and of machinery. Following is a page on which may be filled out a summary of the year's business, to serve as a guide to the farmer in filling it out intelligently at the end of the year.

Further, for the farmer's information there is a table in which to enter acreage and yield of crops, and one in which to keep a live stock service record.

The whole thing has been reduced to the simplest possible terms, and is so simple that even a child could use it. One of the most useful publications issued from the Experimental Farms for some time. It should be recognized that farming is a business, the same as any other. The stem rust of cereals, which causes immense losses in some years, is well known. The crown rust of oats is not so well known, nor do the losses caused by it attract much attention, as they are not usually so severe. It is, however, common, and it seems to be growing more severe, especially in western Canada. It attacks the leaves of oats, killing them and thus reducing the vigor of the plants and lessening the yield. The rust appears as small orange reddish masses on the leaves of oats in the

I have been informed by men who were members of that jury in this case, that he was terribly bruised about the lower parts of body and side, that his nose was broken and that there was a deep cut on his head. I also wish to state that his mackinaw coat was seen in the middle of the road by people who passed it about two o'clock Sunday morning, and several others also saw the coat. 

CAMPBELLTON'S BEAUTY ADMIRER

Editor of Barrie Examiner
Writes of Brief Visit to This Town.

(By J. C. McEwen, of the Barrie Examiner, Barrie, Ont.)
The sun from Barrie to Campbellton provided some of the finest scenery of the trip, skirting the south shore of the Bay of Chaleur for many miles, a series of charming pictures met the eye, with the rugged hills of Gaspe, across the bay, as a background. Added charm was given to the scenery by the softening light of a June sun setting towards evening. It was after seven o'clock before the train pulled into Campbellton, a thriving town which stands at the head of navigable water on Chaleur Bay. Although this place was almost completely destroyed by fire in 1910, it has been nearly all rebuilt and has numerous good business blocks, many beautiful homes and two fine hospitals, one of which is a war memorial, erected at a cost of \$140,000.

The town, which is beautifully situated, has a population of 6,000, and is noted as a prosperous business centre as well as an attractive summer resort. From the business standpoint its chief interest lies in the lumber industry, the annual output of which is about 90,000,000 feet square. Campbellton possesses many attractions for the detourist of the summer tourist. Almost directly across the river in the Gaspé county of the Province of Quebec, is Miramichi or Cross Point, noted for its Indian reservation of 500 Miames, while back of the town is Sugar Loaf Mountain from which those who climb its 2,000 feet can obtain a glorious view of the surrounding country. In fact the whole surrounding country is well diversified and exceedingly picturesque with its many valleys and conical hills.

Though time permitted but a short stay, the obliging motorists once more came to our aid and gave us an opportunity of seeing the town. Before this visit, Campbellton to most of us was known principally at the home of Harry B. Anslow, publisher of the Graphic and a popular director of the C.W.N.A. As the night was falling, we farewelled Mr. Anslow and his township in song, concluding with "A Perfect Day" sung in choral style under the direction of the versatile "Sandy" Lindsay of the C. N. R.

Good-bye to New Brunswick. After a run of but thirteen miles from Campbellton, passing serene through the interesting district of Miramichi, Matapedia, in the Province of Quebec, is reached. Matapedia is famous for its point where the rivers Restigouche and Matapedia join their respective waters as they flow onward into the Bay of Chaleur. From this point a railway runs to the Gaspé Peninsula. The Matapedia, famous for its scenic effects and its salmon, is followed by the railway for a distance of over twenty miles, thus affording the tourist ample opportunity for feasting upon its beauties. In thirty miles of its course the river has no less than 222 rapids.
